Addressing the use of cell phones by students in school doesn't have to be difficult. Schools across the country have taken different stances on this technology. From banning them completely to setting policies on their use. Many are starting to realize that technology is a part of our daily life and the use of cell phones are becoming a main line of

communication. Since we are not going to get rid of cell phones and knowing that it is a futile battle to fight against students possessing this technology, we feel it is best to set reasonable limits to the use of these phones.

Tuesday Musicale announces music camp scholarship auditions

Scholarship auditions for area students to attend summer music camp have been scheduled by Tuesday Musicale. Full scholarships will be awarded and students may audition in instrumental, vocal, piano or strings categories to attend music camp. Students have the opportunity to receive private lessons and participate in small and large ensemble groups.

Auditions are planned for 2:30 p.m. April 29 at Falls High School music room.

Students who have com-

pleted grades seven through 11 in 2014 are eligible. Graduating seniors and previous scholarship winners who have received two or more scholarships from Tuesday Musicale are not eligible.

Students from International Falls, Littlefork and Indus may audition for the scholarships. Home-schooled students are also welcome.
