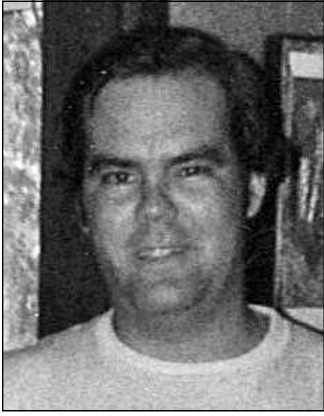

## Shop/collect for winter gift-giving

There are end of season bargains in the stores and great opportunities for gleaning in the outdoors.

A dirt shovel with soil-biting teeth is on my list and I have found it on sale! Hiding it for all that time is a challenge but that is what friends are for. Those soft fabric hoses are still in the stores. They are wonderful to use on decks, around the house, or through flower beds as they don't damage plants, roll up easily and are light. They are especially good for people with limited strength, for children, but are great for anyone because the frustration factor of rolling up stubborn, stiff hoses is eliminated. They are certainly less fatiguing to wrestle around also.  
Many solar garden light styles would be welcome additions to most gardens. There are many specialized hand tools that are well designed to be less fatiguing. A garden bench that your spouse or parent has been commenting about just may be on sale now. A

starting bench for starting seedlings or for wintering over special plants or reviving house plants during our cloudy winter days would be special for an avid gardener in your household.  
Small, hand-held bypass pruners are always welcome tools for dead-heading and cutting flowers. Books on a special plant or topic of interest can shorten the winter season. So can a magazine subscription to gardening magazines. Decorative items to create garden focal points may also be on sale now. A gift certificate to a local nursery would be welcome to all gardeners and shopping locally is good for our communities. If you have been attentive to your gardener's comments, your task should be easier.  
While enjoying the fall weather when you are out for a walk, fishing or hunting, you may see a stump, a piece of driftwood or a moss-covered tree root, or an interesting rock that would cost you

nothing except labor but would create a very memorable gift for a gardener. Then comes the fun of finding a box large enough to hold it. Tape it shut, put a bow on it. This is a way to get your children involved in thinking of other's interests and needs and to teach them that gifts need not be purchased to be special and memorable. It also lets your loved one know that you think of him/her all year and are not just an afterthought.  
Gifts are not only for the recipient if they are true gifts. They also give pleasure to the giver when anticipating the person's reaction and pleasure.
