MOOSE, **WY**— Park rangers responded Thursday, July 20, to a report of a climber who fell 40 to 50 feet from the Owen Chimney pitch on the Owen-Spalding route of the Grand Teton, inside Grand Teton National Park. Rangers responded, however, the climber, Braydan Duree of Kuna, Idaho, succumbed to significant injuries during the fall and was pronounced dead at the scene.

Duree's body was short-hauled from the scene and turned over to the Teton County Coroner's Office. His two climbing partners were also flown from the scene to the Jenny Lake Search and Rescue Cache at Lupine Meadows.

On 7/18/23, at about 1641 hrs., B. DuRee picked up a reserved permit at the Jenny Lake Ranger Station to climb the Grand Teton via the Owen-Spalding (OS) route with

B. DuRee had a lengthy conversation with Ranger C. Heerdt who issued the permit, and he appeared to be sumclently informed and capable of ascending the OS route on the Grand Teton. Ranger Heerdt stated that they had a lengthy discussion about the OS route that they were ascending, and that B. DuRee seemed knowledgeable about the route and well-prepared for the ascent. B. DuRee was also advised about, and aware of, backcountry camping regulations and conditions of the OS route (as noted in the permit).

On 7/19/23, the group departed from the Lupine Meadows Parking area and hiked to the Gamet Canyon Caves where they established a base camp and spent the night. On 7/20/23, they began their ascent of the Owen-Spalding route on the Grand Teton by hiking and scrambling to the Upper Saddle, where the OS route technically (using ropes and climbing equipment) begins. They (presumably) completed the Belly-Roll, Crawl and Double Chimney, to the base of the Owen Chimney where they set up.

Heerdt and were flown internally to the LMSARC, arriving about 1725 hrs. Finally, N838AP returned to Garnet Meadows and shuttled L. Hunsaker and Z. Little to the LMSARC with the climbing party's possessions.

The accident took place at 11:30 am on what most climbers consider the most technical pitch of the route, the Owen Chimney (which is generally the second or third roped pitch from the Upper Saddle, dependent upon decisions by the lead climber).

The snrock – the cold conditions cert	The conditions on the technical sections of the Owen-Spalding route were reported to be dry; however, areas of hard snow and ice persisted in some sections. Even on clear days, these areas experience freezing (usually at night), thawing (usually in the morning), and verglas (hard to see thin coatings of ice on rock, especially in small pockets or indentations in the rock). On the day of the accident, at the start of the Owen Chimney, where the climbers established their belay, there was substantial hard snow/ice covering the ledge. The chimney above, however, appeared clean and free of snow and ice from below. The snow/ice present on the belay ledge could have affected the ability of a shoe's (rubber-based) sole to adhere to rock – the cold hardens the rubber, and small amounts of snow/ice can adhere to the treads on the bottom of the sole. These conditions certainly could have played a role in the "slip and consequent fall" that occurred when B.DuRee was attempting to ascend the crux of the pitch.

Duree was clipped into a Figure-of-Eight knot in the middle of the rope while leading. (This configuration would facilitate simul-climbing by especially on easier ground.) The Figure-of-Eight knot was clipped into a locking carabiner which was clipped into his harness belay loop. While leading the Owen Chimney, B. DuRee had placed one piece of protection about half the distance to the crux. At the crux (about 40-50 ft. up), while placing another piece of protection, he slipped and fell, and the protection pulled out. He took a tumbling fall and came to a stop near his partners before the belay was engaged. Had B. DuRee placed additional pieces of protection, especially just below the crux (and the difficult climbing), he may have prevented the 40-50-foot tumbling fall. B. DuRee was climbing with a helmet, but during his tumbling fall, it was dislodged, resulting in significant head trauma that caused his death.
