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Larson looks to continue recent domination at BMS

Kyle Larson has dominated Bristol Motor Speedway over the last two races in a way not seen since the 1970s.

One has to go back to the era of NASCAR Hall of Famer Cale Yarborough to see the kind of dominant performances that Larson had in last year's Bass Pro Shops Night Race and this season's Food City 500.

Larson, driver of the No. 5 Hendrick Motorsports Chevrolet, has led 873 of the last 1,000 laps to leave everyone else racing for best in class.

"The last two races we've qualified well, which really helps,' said Larson, the 2021 NASCAR champion. "Then our car balance is just really good. I could tell right away in practice this time around my car was extremely good. When spend 800 and something laps out front, you just become a better leader and a better driver at managing the pace."

Obviously, his rival drivers wish the three-time Cup Series winner at Bristol wasn't so good at managing the pace. Other keys for Larson are knowing how to quickly get around the other cars and having a strong car himself.

"It's learning what it takes to set guys up and what to look for in passing and keeping that buffer to seconds," Larson said. " I think just experience

to go along with a good car and a track that I've really always ran well here. Just knew now I kind of have the team and car to go along with it.

Jeff Gordon, who
had his own share of
success at Bristol
Motor Speedway with
five wins, now serves

as a vice-president at Hendrick Motorsports. He talked about being amazed at what Larson is able to do behind the wheel of a race car.

At the end of the NASCAR regular season, Larson had three wins in the Cup Series, two wins in the Xfinity Series and one in the Truck Series. He also had nine wins in winged sprint cars.

"I've seen him race so many different types of cars and do extraordinary things and dominate races," Gordon said. "It's all about what are the records that he can break or what are the things that he can do next. I'm just glad that he's a part of our organization and that we get to go race with him and he's teamed up with Cliff Daniels, which I think they make just a great pairing for crew chief and driver."

No one would argue with Gordon's assessment as Larson and Daniels appear to have the chemistry that all teams look for. Daniels appreciates how Larson doesn't just rely on his talent. He studies for each race, looking at both recent races and those in the past like the 2004 Night Race won by Dale Earnhardt Jr.

"I like to think of myself as a little bit of a NASCAR history buff, but I totally forgot I think the fact that 'It's Bristol, baby,' came from him from that race," Larson said. "I had exhausted myself on watching all of the 2023 and 2024 races. For me it's a helpful reminder just to see the way the track has evolved, the way the sport has evolved, and just have a healthy appreciation for what we do."

Xfinity Series champion Allgaier relives Food City 300 win

Justin Allgaier saw the gamble pay off at the 2023 Food City 500.

After making a late pit stop for fresh tires, Allgaier powered his way through the field and made a winning pass of Daniel Hemric with 11 laps to go to win the prestigious race at Bristol Motor Speedway.

Allgaier, driver of the No. 7 JR Motorsports Chevrolet, has led the most laps in six of the last 10 NASCAR Xfinity Series races at BMS.

The 2023 victory was his second win at the "World's Fastest Half-Mile" for the veteran driver, but his first since 2010.

The reigning NASCAR Xfinity Series champion recalled how he and crew chief Jim
Pullman had the race as the one they most wanted to win.

"Jim Pullman and I circled this place on the calendar before the season started," Allgaier said. "We were like, 'We're going to win Bristol.' And man, we won Bristol. It's Bristol Baby!"

The win was made more special as Allgaier raced car owner Dale Earnhardt Jr. for the lead earlier in the race.

"How cool was that to battle the boss," Allgaier said. "We'd led so many laps here and come up short. We just had to stay positive. I know the fans wanted Dale Jr. to win, but it was so cool to battle with him."

Earnhardt led 47 laps and was still amongst the leaders when he had to pull in the pits on lap 270 for a fire inside his car. He finished 30th in the final rundown.

Allgaier had previously scored his first career Xfinity Series victory at BMS in 2010. He drove a No. 12 Dodge for Roger Penske when he held off then teammate Brad Keselowski for the win.

The rest of a power-house top-five were: Kyle Busch, Carl Edwards and Kevin Harvick. Bristol is also the site of his best career finish at the Cup level, an eighthplace in 2015.

"Bristol is my favorite race track," Allgaier said "Obviously with my first win in the Xfinity Series and my best finish in the Cup Series, it's near and dear to my heart."

Bristol Motor Speedway serves as home for major events

No idea seems too far-fetched for Bristol Motor Speedway.

When it was first reported that NASCAR was planning to host a Major League Baseball game, there were plenty of questions and plenty of skeptics. It wasn't "fake news" as it became official months later the MLB Speedway Classic between the Atlanta Braves and Cincinnati Reds would play August 2, 2025.

Since then, there was an incredible transformation to create an "Infield of Dreams" in the BMS infield, and another one to get the speedway back to a race track in a month for the Bass Pro Shops Night Race weekend.

In addition, a full stage to host country music superstar Tim McGraw was also built and later torn down.

Bold ideas are nothing new as Bristol Motor Speedway has become more than a race track, but one of the greatest entertainment venues in the world.

For two decades, the buzz was to convert it into a massive football stadium. They did that in 2016 with Tennessee and Virginia Tech playing the Battle at Bristol in front of a world-record 156,990 people in attendance.

They followed it up with East Tennessee State having a record home crowd a week later with their win over Western Carolina. Football wasn't a new idea, the track hosted the defending NFL champion Philadelphia Eagles in an exhibition game against the Washington Redskins in 1961.

How about making it a concert venue and host the biggest acts in American music?

BMS did that as well, nine years before McGraw with Kenny Chesney returning home to East Tennessee and playing to over 40.000 fans.

OK, let's suspend the largest

four-sided video screen in the world over the middle of the infield. That's been done a while with Colossus, a structure weighing nearly 700 tons and featuring four LED screens 68 feet wide by 30 feet tall.

More recently, they've hosted "Country Thunder" with such acts as Morgan Wallen, Jason Aldean, Cody Johnson and Jelly Roll.

What if the world was hit by a pandemic unlike anything seen in nearly a century?

Say it shuts everything down, how would Bristol Motor Speedway respond? In a place where champions are crowned, the BMS staff stepped up to the task. They were good community partners and provided quality entertainment to the fans.


The Food City presents Supermarket Heroes 500 was one of the first races back after NASCAR returned from the COVID-19 shutdown. BMS then hosted the NASCAR All-Star Race in July 2020 as eventual series champion Chase Elliott sprinted to the victory. It was attended by the largest crowd of any sporting event in America to that point with over 22,000 fans.

Another big crowd came to see the Bass Pro Shops NRA Night Race in September, a cut-off race in the NASCAR playoffs.

A year later, they took the concrete racing surface, covered it with clay and hosted the first NASCAR Cup Series race on dirt in over 50 years. Before NASCAR came to town, they invited the grassroots racers to the track and see how that works.

A week before the Food City Dirt Race, nearly 1,400 entries came to experience the Bristol Dirt Nationals, It was a week-long, highspeed, mud-slinging celebration of dirt-track racing at the world's greatest short track.

The Pinnacle Speedway in Lights, long heralded as the premier holiday lights display in the

region, encompasses a four-mile route with over 2 million lights. It's the primary fundraiser for the Bristol chapter of Speedway Children's Charities, which raises money for agencies in the surrounding 18-county region.

In addition, the facility has served as a place for community meetings, 5K runs, wedding receptions, corporate team-building experiences and hundreds of other motorsports competition.

The latest "far-fetched" idea came directly from SMI Chairman Marcus Smith. He floated the idea of putting a roof over Bristol during Kevin Harvick's "Happy Hour" podcast in July.


Harvick used the baseball analogy that the SMI group swings for the fences when it comes to big events, something that Smith certainly agrees with.

"A roof on Bristol, that's a big

dream, but it's doable," Smith said.
"If we can hang the largest TV in
the world over Bristol, we can put a
roof on it."

It became even more of a topic when constant rain ruined the experience for many during the MLB Speedway Classic weekend. Smith talked about the possibility of more huge events that Bristol could host if weather wasn't an issue.

"We could do Wrestlemania. You could have the biggest UFC fight in the world," Smith said. "Anything you do at Bristol is going to be the biggest at any stadium in terms of having a field and being able to see it. You put a football field at Charlotte, it would be a postage stamp, but at Bristol, everybody can see it."

Van Gisbergen in midst of record rookie year

Shane Van Gisbergen is NASCAR's King of the Road. Can he be the "Boss of the Bullrings?"

The New Zealand native is setting a new standard with four wins in his rookie season. All of the wins heading, however, into the Cup Series playoffs have come on road courses. He will be trying to conquer the "World's Fastest Half-Mile" during Saturday's Bass Pro Shops Night Race at Bristol Motor Speedway.

Van Gisbergen, 36, has totally dominated this season's road circuits by winning over 10 seconds at both Mexico City and Watkins Glen. The driver of the No. 88 Trackhouse Racing Chevrolet, however, has shown improvement on the ovals.

His best efforts at the short tracks are a 12th-place finish last fall at Martinsville and a 14th-place run at Richmond. Van Gisbergen needed little improvement on the road courses, but found it with a switch of teams during the offseason.

"The difference has been

that I'm with the team full time this year and I've been able to develop a setup and fine tune it to the way I want," Van Gisbergen said. "Last year, I just jumped in and got the Trackhouse car delivered to Kaulig and then the Kaulig guys would run it. Whereas this year I'm all involved in the setup, trying to learn every week, and I really feel like as a team we've been able to tailor the car to my needs."

Van Gisbergen was an already accomplished driver when he came to the United States. He's a three-time champion and 80-time race winner. Now he has five wins on the NASCAR circuit, including his first career start at the Chicago Street Course in 2023.

"The prep that we go through, not just for these road courses, but we do it every week," Van Gisbergen said. "I feel like we've gotten a lot better, especially on the ovals. It's been cool working with a great bunch of people, and just to share four wins with everyone, it's so cool."

Van Gisbergen, who has four wins in the Xfinity Series, said setting the rookie record means everything to him. He feels it validates car owner Justin Marks' faith in him. He also loves seeing how excited the guys on the pit crew have been.

He felt a test at Charlotte and a preliminary race to the NASCAR All-Star Race helped turn the tide for him on ovals. Still, there is some trepidation coming to Bristol where finished 38th in the Food City 500 with suspension troubles.

A year ago, he finished 18th, a lap off the pace in the NASCAR Xfinity Series race at Bristol. He explained it's definitely foreign for the foreign racer.

"Probably the one we'd most be worried about is Bristol," Van Gisbergen said before the playoffs. "I ran terrible there. Bristol was so far from anything I've ever done, and that's a really tough place."

LaJoie, host of the

popular Stacking Pennies podcast, was at the Olde Farm Golf Course in Bristol, Va., prior to the MLB Speedway Classic golf tournament. It was something the 33-year-old race driver was glad to do as it supported Speedway Children's Charities. LaJoie has been heavily involved in NEGU, an organization supporting children with cancer, and appreciates the work of Speedway Motorsports chairman Marcus Smith and all the SCC staff with all they do.

"I've been a Speedway Children's Charities ambassador for a couple years now," he said. "Knowing Marcus's heart and the entire SCC team's heart, it always makes me willing to come out here, no matter if it's driving to Bristol. Actually, driving to Bristol is one of my favorite things to do. I love the scenery."

LaJoie, a fan of the Atlanta Braves, was glad to see his team win 4-2 over the Cincinnati Reds in the Speedway Classic. The son of two-time NASCAR Xfinity Series champion Randy LaJoie raced from a young age, but also played baseball growing up.

He played alongside five-time Major League All-Star Corey Seager in high school, where LaJoie said he found his future was in racing.

Front-runner Blaney looking for first Bristol win

Ryan Blaney loves running up front, but there's one lead he'd rather not have.

The driver of the No. 12 Team Penske Ford leads all active drivers with most laps led at Bristol Motor Speedway without a victory. He has paced the field for 555 laps around the "World's Fastest Half-Mile" over 17 races. That is 111 more laps for the 2023 NASCAR Cup Series champion than his good friend Chase Elliott has led.

Blaney desperately wants to win Saturday's Bass Pro Shops Night Race. He has had an affinity for Bristol, even when he was a kid watching his father, Dave, race.

"Bristol is one of my favorite places," he said. "I remember watching my dad there as a kid and loving the atmosphere around that place."

It's a place he has enjoyed success. Blaney beat Kyle Busch on a final restart to win an Xfinity Series race in 2014. He also set the track qualifying record for the Cup Series with a lap at 132.075 mph in April 2019. In addition, Blaney earned the pole for the 2024 Food City 500.

His record at Bristol includes three top-five and seven top-10 finishes in 17 races. It's a track

which his father also showed speed with Dave Blaney qualifying in the top five on five different occasions, including a front-row start in 2005.

Bristol is a place where strategy can come

into play as Ryan finished fifth in April after a decision by crew chief Jonathan Hassler to stay out on old tires.

"It was a good risk to take," Blaney said in an interview with FOX Sports. "I thought Jonathan did a good job of taking a chance. We weren't going to win, I was already running fifth and at the end of the day we got back to where we were running, which is good. I took a chance trying to get a yellow and trapping a bunch of guys lap down, but really good effort."

His recent performance leads Blaney to believe he could finally reach victory lane at the "Last Great Colosseum." Blaney recently scored his 15th career victory in the Coke Zero 400 at Daytona. It was his second victory of the year after winning at Nashville Superspeedway in June.

"I think this team is really doing a good job of hitting our stride when we need to," Blaney said. "I've been proud of our efforts all year, it's just been can we smooth some things out and have some stuff go our way. It seems to be smoothing out and this team is just performing and finishing where we should."

Toyota contingent appears to be strong at Bristol

Toyota has won more NASCAR Cup Series races on the Bristol Motor Speedway concrete than any other manufacturer over the last decade.

There has been eight Toyota wins on the BMS concrete since the start of the 2015 season with five wins each for Chevrolet and Ford.

There's a decent chance a Toyota could be in victory lane again Saturday at the Bass Pro Shops Night Race. Denny Hamlin leads the way among active Toyota drivers with four wins, including three over the last decade. It includes back-to-back wins in the 2023 Bass Pro Shops NRA Night Race and the 2024 Food City 500.

Hamlin, driver of the No. 11 Joe Gibbs Racing Toyota, has four pole positions and 20 top-10 finishes in 36 races. That's one more top-10 than Kyle Busch, who has eight wins on the BMS concrete. Hamlin's last four finishes at BMS include the aforementioned two wins, a fourth-place and a runner-up at the Food City 500 in the spring.

He's the only one of the current Joe Gibbs Racing drivers to have a Cup win on the concrete. Christopher Bell is a former Bristol winner, however, with a victory in the 2023 Food City Dirt Race. He's a driver many feel is close to Larson in sheer driving talent. Bell has five straight top-10 finishes on the BMS paved surface and six overall in eight races.

Chase Briscoe, driver of the No. 19 Toyota, posted a solid fourth-place at BMS in the spring. It was his first top-five and second top-10 in six races on the high-banked, .533-mile oval. Briscoe won at Pocono in June and has been steady throughout the season. He scored a win in the 2020 Food City 500 for the Xfinity Series at Bristol.

Ty Gibbs rounds out the JGR Racing quartet in the No. 54 Toyota. The grandson of the team owner has three top-10 finishes in five Bristol races with a high of third at the Food City 500 in April. Gibbs missed the NASCAR playoffs, but he led 197 laps at the 2021 Bush's Beans 200 for the ARCA Series.

Going outside the JGR organization, Bubba Wallace is in the midst

of the best season of his Cup Series career. The driver of the No. 23 Toyota co-owned by Michael Jordan and Hamlin won the prestigious Brickyard 400 at Indianapolis by holding off Kyle Larson on multiple restarts.

Wallace has three top-10 finishes at Bristol including a third in last year's Night Race. He has a Bristol win in a late model car at the 2017 Short Track U.S. Nationals.

Tyler Reddick, a teammate to Wallace at 23XI Racing, has surprisingly struggled in the Cup Series at Bristol. The No. 45 Toyota driver has just one top-10 finish in eight previous starts. Reddick won at Bristol in 2019, driving for Richard Childress in the Xfinity Series. He has a high finish of 15th in his last five Bristol Cup races.

Riley Herbst, the rookie driver for 23XI Racing in the No. 35 Toyota, finished 28th, four laps off the pace at the Food City 500 in April. Herbst had two top-10 finishes at BMS in the Xfinity Series with a third-place in the 2021 fall race.

Legacy Motor Club's efforts are led by Erik Jones, driver of the No. 43 Toyota. Jones posted a second-place finish in the 2017 Bristol Night Race when he was driving for Furniture Row Racing. He also scored a pair of other top-five finishes at Bristol.

John Hunter Nemechek has shown strength at Bristol in the No. 42 Toyota. Nemechek has a best finish of sixth on the high banks. It came in the 2024 Food City 500.

While Hamlin is the only one in the group with a win on the Bristol concrete, Toyota drivers still look to be among the top contenders in Saturday's race.

Johnson City's King was BMS track champion

Johnson City racing legend Brownie King raced on the sands of Daytona Beach, in the first Daytona 500 and was track champion at Bristol Motor Speedway.

King made 97 starts in the NASCAR Cup Series and finished fifth in the 1959 Convertible Division standings, just one spot behind Richard Petty. He was also the 1962 Sportsman Division track champion at Bristol Motor Speedway when the track hosted a weekly racing series.

Now 91, King reflected on being the track champion at the "Last Great Colosseum."

"Back then, we ran the Modified and Sportsman cars together," King recalled. "I was driving a 1958 Ford Sportsman car. The closest competitor was a guy running a 1936 Chevrolet coach. I was running that car like they used to run years ago."

King was just one of 19 drivers to race in the final NASCAR Cup Series race on the old Daytona Beach course and in the first Daytona 500 on the 2.5mile superspeedway. He was honored at the 2017 Daytona Back to the Roots celebration with the Pioneer Award and appeared on "Lost Speedways" with Dale Earnhardt Jr.

"I was running a Chevrolet for Jess Potter at the first Daytona 500 and it was originally a hardtop," King said. "The race was supposed to have half convertibles and half hardtops. They came around and offered Jess \$100 to cut the top off. That's what we did, but it ended up slowing the car down."

He explained they didn't know much about aerodynamics back then. The drivers would notice, however, it would sometimes be like running into a wall when they'd try to pass a car.

Outside of racing, King worked in service and later sales at the Johnson City Chevrolet dealership for 40-plus years. In 1976, he opened B&B Auto Repair in Johnson City with Brad Teague, for whom King served as a crew chief after hanging up his helmet.


Teague had become friends with King in 1965 and he credits King for giving him his break in racing and being meticulous with his work.

"You liked for him to work on the car because he made sure everything was checked out," Teague said. "No matter what Brownie did working with a car, whether it was a race car or a street car, it was done right."

King was also a scratch golfer. He made six hole-in-ones and won the club championship at Pine Oaks Golf Course in 1968 and 1977.

in racing as a teenager and started hanging out and working on cars at Jess and Clyde Potter's garage in Johnson City. After saving his money, he and Jess Potter bought a 1932 Ford and made a race car out of it — which they towed to Asheville-Weaverville Speedway.

When the driver they hired didn't show up, King lied about his age so he could get a NASCAR license and race the car himself.

He was a natural behind the wheel, finishing fifth out of 36 drivers. Just months later, he won his first race in Richlands, Virginia. King made his NASCAR Cup Series debut in 1956 at Columbia, South Carolina, where he finished 18th, one spot ahead of three-time champion Lee Petty.

King posted two top-

five and 27 top-10 finishes in his NASCAR Cup Series career and finished ninth in the 1957 points standings. Still, he said the competition he faced at Bristol on a weekly basis was as tough as running against the top drivers in NASCAR. His biggest win at Bristol was a 400-lap race that featured both Sportsman and Modified cars.

"I raced against a lot of good drivers both around East Tennessee and in NASCAR," King said. "In East Tennessee, there were some real good race car drivers like Bill Morton, Gene Glover and the Utsman brothers. If they've had factory backing, they could have won some NASCAR races."

King fondly remembers that 1958 Ford he won Bristol's

Sportsman division championship with. Bill Morton won the Modified crown in a yellow 1936 Chevrolet that King also recalls. King later won 14 of 21 races one season at Johnson City's old Sportsman Speedway.

As far as his favorite race track, it was definitely Bristol, "It has always been the perfect half-mile race track," he said. "Back then, the banking was only about 15 degrees compared to the 30 it is now. There was plenty of room to race on and if your car was good enough, you could pass anywhere you wanted to on it."

BMS comes through in times of need

Bristol Motor Speedway is the largest sports and entertainment venue in the state of Tennessee. It served an even more important role following the devastation of Hurricane Helen.

BMS was designated the Northeast Tennessee Disaster Relief Center in coordination with the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency. It served as home base for recovery efforts and a major distribution center in the aftermath of the devastating flooding.

Amanda Delp, who served as director for the relief center, told why it was so important to have a place like BMS to handle supplies. Flash flooding had ravaged parts of Unicoi, Carter, Washington, Johnson and Greene counties in Tennessee.

In the days following Helene, a

truck was delayed for an extended period of time trying to get relief supplies to Unicoi County High School. The usual two-minute drive from Main Street in Erwin to the high school took over 45 minutes with traffic backed up. With other tractors and trailers stalled trying to get water and other supplies to the high school, things got so crowded that emergency vehicles got blocked in.

Others saw the same gridlock in other counties. The 80,000-square foot South Building, which often serves as a spot for the drivers' meetings, was turned into a warehouse to store supplies. It turns out it wasn't near enough room.

Delp said they had to move nearly \$5 million worth of water underneath Gate 7 at the speedway. Gate 6 was filled with paper times. She estimates they turned the South Building over 6-8 times with \$40 million of donated supplies.

The relief center was open 14 hours a day, seven days a week through October as staff worked closely with organizations like Samaritan's Purse. Donations came from every state within the continental United States. Volunteers traveled as far away as Florida, New York and northern Ohio to help.

"Some of them drove eight, 10-12, hours to help us," Delp said. "We had one couple that just got in the

car and started driving and didn't even know where they were there. People had that heart that they just wanted to come help."

Besides a major donation and collection site, BMS provide workspace for the logistics and search and rescue teams in a central staging area. They housed a regional disaster relief hotline.

The campgrounds on property were also opened. In the week following the storm, we interviewed some of those staying at the campground. It included a family of nine in a camper, and an Army veteran

staying in his tent after his home along the Nolichucky River was washed away.

The family of nine had been camping at Green Mountain, N.C., and had to evacuate. Returning to their upstate South Carolina home wasn't an option as they had no power or water. The mother talked about the folks at BMS coming by frequently to check on them.

They weren't ideal conditions, but the showers at the dragway were opened. With a good internet connection at the speedway, the kids were able to do homework. The family were surprised when some of the staff brought presents and a cake to help a couple of the younger kids celebrate their birth-days.

Bristol Motor Speedway has also served as host to the RAM clinic, providing thousands of uninsured people with free medical and dental services. From January through early March 2020, BMS served as a COVID-19 vaccination location.

Even when it's not a disaster.

BMS has been an outstanding community partner.

Speedway Children's Charities has raised more than \$20 million for nearly 100 local children-based organizations in Northeast Tennessee and Southwest Virginia.

The Pinnacle Speedway in Lights, long heralded as the premier holiday lights display in the region, encompasses a four-mile route with over 2 million lights. It's the primary fundraiser for the Bristol chapter of Speedway Children's Charities, which raises money for agencies in the surrounding 18-county region.

"What began as a simple signature fundraising event has evolved into a tradition-rich holiday treat for thousands of visitors each year," said Claudia Byrd, executive director of the Bristol chapter of Speedway Children's Charities. "The Pinnacle Speedway in Lights provides an opportunity to get together with loved ones for an evening of amplifying the holiday spirit."
