Make The Most Of Your Transfer

Talk to the transfer advisor at CTC about your plan, and request information from a few possible transfer destinations that have the program of study you're looking for.

Starting at a community college like Central Texas College (CTC) and transferring credits to an upper level institution is a smart choice—you'll save money and enjoy smaller classes. But before you plan your schedule, do your homework to make sure your credits will transfer.

RESEARCH YOUR DEGREE

Ideally, you should have some idea of where you want to transfer and what you would like to study. The earlier you know that information and share it with your CTC advisor the better! Use the Central Texas College "tools for transfer" webpage to research university transfer policies and degree plans. Talk to the transfer advisor at CTC about your plan, and request information from a few possible transfer destinations that have the program of study you're looking for.

KNOW YOUR 123S

Transferring courses is easier in Texas than it is in many other states because Texas has a Common Course Numbering System (TCCNS). That means similar courses that are taught at public colleges and universities in the first two years of college are identified by common numbers.

STICK TO THE "CORE"

The Core Curriculum is a set of courses in liberal arts, humanities, sciences and political, social and cultural history that undergraduates of a public higher education institution in Texas are required to complete before receiving a bachelor's degree. You can take all or part of the core curriculum at a community college and transfer the block of courses to another Texas public institution of higher education, fulfilling all or part of that institution's core curriculum requirements.

FIND OUT WHAT THE EXCEPTIONS ARE!

Simple as it sounds, the core curriculum doesn't ALWAYS transfer as you might intend it to! That's why it's important to decide WHERE you want to transfer early in your college career. There are three



specific areas where exceptions apply:

• Out-of-state public institutions don't share the same common numbering system, and may not require the same core classes.

• Private institutions, especially liberal arts colleges, have completely different degree requirements—and they vary between colleges!

• Some specific degrees within a Texas public university may require a different core or different sequences of courses. This is often true with very technical degree plans like engineering.



GET STARTED at Central Texas College. Attend your first two years, take your freshman and sophmore-level courses and leave with an associate's degree. FINISH your bachelor's degree at Texas A&M University-Central Texas. Attend your last two years, take your junior and senior-level courses and earn a four-year degree.

ACADEMICS

UMHB has been blessed with significant growth in its enrollment and academic degree programs while continuing to offer students the personal attention that has been a cornerstone of the UMHB experience for 174 years. UMHB also completed construction of a new design lab this year for one of its fastest growing programs, Engineering. The facility includes labs for the fabrication of electrical and mechanical engineering projects as well as design spaces and workshops where students can work in teams to brainstorm and create engineering solutions.

STUDENT LIFE

UMHB students take active roles in spreading the good news of Jesus Christ across the world. In 2018-19 nearly 300 students, faculty, and staff members took part in mission activities in 33 countries. In addition, more than 500 students were regularly involved in missions and service projects in Central Texas.

In April, UMHB held its 80th Annual Easter Pageant, a student-led production depicting the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The performances, which drew a live audience of more than 6,000 spectators, were also streamed online, where they were watched by more than 11,000 people around the globe.

ATHLETICS

The 2018-19 school year was one of the greatest in the history of UMHB athletics. For the second time in its 21-year history, the Crusader football program won the NCAA Division III National Championship. The team closed out the season with a perfect 15-0 record to tie school and American Southwest Conference records for single-season victories. Additionally, the university's men's soccer, volleyball, and women's golf teams also won American Southwest Conference (ASC) championships. Twelve of the Cru athletic programs went on to compete in postseason playduring the year.

• OPEN A CHECKING ACCOUNT: You can open a checking account by filling out an application online or in person, usually in just a few minutes, as long as you have the necessary documentation banks require. The bank will issue you a debit card, allowing you to pay for items using funds from your account. Monitor the flow of funds by checking your account online frequently.

• MONITOR CREDIT SCORES: There are three national credit bureaus that may have a credit report file for you once you start using credit. What's in your file is what is used to calculate a credit score that lenders look at to determine if you're a good candidate for credit. You can obtain a free credit report annually at annualcreditreport.com. If you're responsible for your cell phone bill and utility bills, consider using Experian Boost – a free online tool – to add these accounts to your Experian credit file and potentially increase your credit score instantly. A consistent history of on-time payments may increase your credit score. • **BUDGET:** Learning to budget is essential, teaching you to set goals, live within your means and manage your money responsibly. Create a spreadsheet and review it on an ongoing basis.

• USE NEW TECH TOOLS: Unfortunately, the topic of money management doesn't always appeal to young people. Only 38 percent of those surveyed find personal finance topics interesting. Luckily, tech-driven tools like apps and YouTube tutorials are making financial education more interesting and accessible to generation Z.
