

Fahtima Avila, junior from Brownsville (Veterans Memorial), had the low score for the Javelina women's golf team this week in a tournament in Amarillo. She was named the IBC Bank female athlete of the week.

Four individuals and the 1995 baseball team have been selected for induction into the 2021 Texas A&M-Kingsville Javelina Hall of Fame.

The induction will be Feb. 18. There was no induction in 2020 because of the pandemic.

The individuals selected for induction are former football player Al Harris, former football coach Don Pittman, former softball player Kassie Rezza and former

athletic administrator Vivian Scholz.

Harris was first-team All-Lone Star Conference his senior season.

He had eight interceptions in his two seasons with the Javelinas.

With Harris on the team, the Javelinas had a 19-5 record in two seasons and reached the NCAA Division II semifinals in 1995. The Javelinas won LSC championships both of his years with the team.

Harris was a sixth-round draft choice of Tampa Bay in 1997 and was claimed by Philadelphia in 1998. He was traded to Green Bay in 2003.

He finished his NFL career at Miami in 2010 and St. Louis in 2011.

He has been selected for induction into the Green Bay Hall of Fame.

Harris was a coaching intern with Miami in 2012 and was the assistant secondary/defensive

assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs in 2013-18.

He has been secondary coach for the Dallas Cowboys since 2020.

He was selected to the Pro Bowl twice and was second team All-Pro in 2007.

Harris ended his career with 468 tackles and 21 interceptions. He scored three defensive touchdowns.

The Texas A&M-Kingsville indoor volleyball team hosts Texas Woman's and Dallas Baptist in Lone Star Conference matches this weekend in the Steinke Center.

Friday's match with TWU is set for 6 p.m. and Saturday's match with DBU will be at 1 p.m.

The Javelinas are 8-2 for the year and 3-2 in the LSC standings.

Tammy Jo Grohman, 6-0 sophomore middle blocker from San Antonio (St. Anthony), has a .268 attack percentage and Jackie Alanis, 5-9 sophomore outside hitter from McAllen (Rowe), has a .267 attack percentage and averages 3.69 kills a set.

Emily Witt, 6-0 junior setter from Rose Hill, Kan., averages 9.2 sets and Nicole Murff, 5-7 junior defensive specialist from San Antonio (Antonian Prep), averages 6.06 digs.

Ayanna Jackson, 5-9 sophomore middle blocker from

San Antonio (Harlan), averages 0.94 blocks a set.

TWU is 7-9 for the year and 3-3 in the LSC.

Trixie Oche, 5-9 senior middle blocker from Richardson (Berkner), has a .255 attack average and Jessica Freehill, 5-11 freshman right side from Gibson City, Ill., averages 1.90 kills a set.

Bailey Wozniak, 6-1 junior setter from Seguin (Navarro), averages 5.25 sets and Sydney Stroh, 6-1 sophomore outside hitter from Frisco (Wakeland),

# Football Travels to Meet Midwestern State

The Texas A&M-Kingsville football team returns to action this weekend and will face Midwestern State in Wichita Falls.

Kickoff time will be 7 p.m. in Memorial Stadium.

The Javelinas were open last weekend while MSU stepped out of Lone Star Conference play and dropped a 30-20 decision to Central Washington.

The Mustangs were ranked No. 11 nationally going into the game.

Midwestern holds a 14-7 series lead over the Javelinas and took the last meeting, in 2019, by a 70-35 score.

The Javelinas are 2-2 for the year and 1-1 in the LSC standings.

They are averaging 298.5 total yards a game, 171.8 rushing and 126.7 passing.

Defensively, the Javelinas are allowing 280.0 total yards an outing, 102.8 rushing and 177.2 passing. (Continued on Page 21)

Al Harris has been an outstanding professional football player since finishing with the Javelinas and he is currently the secondary coach for the Dallas Cowboys.


His credentials are such, he could be a candidate for the fourth Javelina in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

He recruited players such as Johnny Bailey and Heath Sherman, two of the Javelinas' all-time best.

After the recruits hit campus, he was a friend and willing to help them out whenever needed.

He had a program where a player could receive aid if they

In the 2003 NFL wildcard playoff game, he returned an interception 52 yards for the game-winning touchdown in overtime.

It was the first time a playoff game had been won by a defensive touchdown.

Despite being injured, he was given a championship ring when the Packers won the Super Bowl in 2010.

Pittman was on the Javelina football coaching staff for 18 years. He was offensive coordinator for three seasons and the running backs coach the remainder of the time.

He recruited several of the top Javelina players of all time.

Pittman played for Javelina Hall of Fame member Ron Harms at Adams (Colo.) State and was on Harms' staff while at Texas A&I and Texas A&M-Kingsville.

Pittman was the offensive coordinator at Albany (Ga.) State from 2002 until 2008.

He became the head football coach at Fort Valley (Ga.) State in 2009 and was there through the 2012 season.

Pittman has a bachelor's degree from Adams State and a master's degree from Texas A&M-Kingsville.

Rezza became the became the first Javelina softball player to receive All-America first team honors in 2006. She was on the National Fastpitch Coaches Association team.

A second baseman, she set a school record with a .434 batting average her senior season. She had held the record .392, set as a junior.

Her 79 hits as a senior set a school record. Her 108 total bases were the second best ever, her 20 stolen bases were the third best and her .593 slugging percentage ranked fourth.

She played in a record 212 games in her career. Other career marks were most hits (260), batting average (.375), triples (24), runs scored (133) and total bases (343).

Rezza was named the Lone

Star Conference South Division hitter of the year, she was first-team All-LSC, made the NCAA Division II All-South Central Region team and she was named All-LSC first team as a senior. She had been on the All-LSC team for four seasons.

Scholz was a long-time athletic secretary and later was secretary for the Javelina Booster Club. She kept the records and did an outstanding job in helping run the club.

She was an away-from-home mother to the athletes and enjoyed giving the former players hugs when they returned to campus.

She was with the University for years before moving to athletics.

Her term in the athletic department was from 1970 until she passed away in August of 2013.

#### LONE STAR CONFERENCE notes:

...Arkansas-Fort Smith's women's basketball team has scheduled an exhibition game Nov. 5 with the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville.

It will be the first exhibition between the schools, located 62 miles apart in Northwest Arkansas.

UAFS is a part of the University of Arkansas System.

...Four Lone Star Conference men's and women's cross country teams entered the Chile Pepper Festival meet last weekend in Fayetteville, Ark.

The conference teams were Eastern New Mexico, St. Edward's, Texas A&M International and Arkansas-Fort Smith.

There were 37 women's teams and 327 runners in the meet, and the same number in the men's division. It is one of the largest, if not the largest, cross country meets in the country.

Host University of Arkansas won the women's title and NCAA Division II Colorado Mines won the men's championship.

Division II schools finished in the top four spots in the men's division, beating out such NCAA Division I schools as Arkansas, LSU, Nebraska and Texas Tech.

...Sixty-four golfers competed in the Eastern New Mexico homecoming golf tournament.

Funds raised at the event are used for athletic scholarships.

#### **NCAA DIVISION II** notes:

...Double L Consulting has partnered with the South Atlantic Conference to create and develop a new five-year strategic plan.

Double L Consulting's director is former Javelina athletic director and head women's basketball coach Jill Willson.

...Mount Olive (N.C.) will add women's wrestling to its program in 2022-23.

The school is in Conference Carolinas but will participate as an independent.

...A story last week listed several schools that may be contemplating a move to NCAA Division I.

These are some of the most successful teams in Division II. They include Central Oklahoma, Grand Valley (Mich.) State, Lincoln Memorial (Tenn.), Lindenwood (Mo.), Queens (N.C.), Valdosta (Ga.) State, West Florida and West Georgia.

When moving from Division II to Division I, there is a fouryear reclassification period during which time the teams aren't eligible for NCAA playoffs.

...Newberry (S.C.) hosted a home cross country meet last weekend and has five other meets at the state, regional and national levels scheduled.

The meets include USA Track & Field events.

...Emporia (Kan.) State has opened the first indoor tennis complex in the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

The complex includes four outdoor courts, a spacious patio, two indoor courts, a viewing deck, an athletic lounge, a coach's office and locker rooms.

Construction on the building started in October 2020.

...Fort Valley (Ga.) State has unveiled its renovated football and track and field stadium.

The track has been replaced with a state-of-the-art, eight-lane track with chutes on both ends.

A new turf has been installed for football along with new goal posts and netting for field goals.

...Wayne (Mich.) State continues to improve each of its athletic facilities and the latest to be completed is a golf swing room.

...Livingstone (N.C.) has begun \$1.3 million in renovations, including a new track, video scoreboard and a blue turf practice field.

The improvements are expected to be completed in 75 days.

# Former Javelina Athletes To Be Honored at Tejano Awards Banquet

Two former Texas A&I athletes will be among those honored at the Tajano Heritage Awards Banquet Oct. 14.

The 7-9 p.m. event will be in the Memorial Student Union Building on campus.

The athletes are Oscar Gonzalez, long-time coach, educator and politican in South Texas who was one of the early Hispanics to play football for the Javelinas, and Roberto Gonzalez, long-time educator and public school administrator in South Texas who was a record-setting distance runner for the Javelina track and field team.

Oscar attended Texas A&I in 1949-51.

Roberto, from Falfurrias, was on the Javelina teams in 1969-72.

The 1969 and 1970 squads won Lone Star Conference championships, the first for the school since joining the league in 1954.

As a freshman, Roberto had the Lone Star Conference all-time best performances in the mile run with a 4:08.1 and the 880-yard run with a time of 1:50.3.

He set school records in the 880-yard run and mile run and was on the two-mile relay, sprint medley relay and distance medley relay units that set school records.

Roberto won several LSC gold medals in his four seasons with the Javelinas.

The banquet is a part of the Texas A&M-Kingsville's Hispanic Heritage Month events. It is sponsored by the Division of Student Affairs, the College of Arts and Sciences and the Department of Art, Communications and

The other honorees are Antonia Alvarez, Texas A&M-Kingsville administrator who retired earlier this year after serving in several positions since the 1970s, and Alicia Arredondo Clarke, South Texas educator and one of the first Hispanics to graduate from Texas A&I when she attended in the 1940s.



# 2021 Javelina Tailgating Guidelines

**PURPOSE:** Texas A&M University-Kingsville tailgating compliments the Javelina gameday experience by providing a social gathering area prior to home football games. Javelina alumni, students, fans and supporters can enjoy the tailgating traditions of food, fellowship and fun as a prelude to home games and all Lone Star Conference and NCAA playoff games.

The University alcohol policy prohibits the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus except in designated areas. Tailgating activities are permitted in Lot G (Southeast corner). To ensure our tailgating tradition provides a safe and positive game environment, the following guidelines will be enforced by the University Police Department and Home Events Staff.

- 1. One tailgate space per group.
- 2. Tailgating spaces **CAN NO LONGER BE PRE-MARKED**. Marking of any spaces with spray paint, stakes, rope, ribbon, etc. **IS PROHIBITED**. Setup starts at 7 a.m. Saturday, the day of the game.
- 3. Tailgate areas must be completely setup on **GAME DAY ONLY**. Your area **CANNOT BE LEFT UNATTENDED AFTER SETUP.** Tailgate spaces are available on a first-come, firstserved basis and must be consistent with the lane markings and other signage. Please honor and be respectful of the reserved areas. Tailgate spaces marked or setup prior to 7 p.m. on Satuday or any unattaended areas are subject to removel by authorized University representatives and will not be replaced.
- 4. IMPORTANT...The Department of Athletics does not guarantee tailgate spaces and is now responsible for any spaces at any time.
- 5. Javelina athletics and TAMUK are not responsible for any lost, stolen or damaged personal property.
- 6. Parked vehicles are not allowed in the tailgate area. **ONLY DROP OFF** of your tailgate items is allowed by vehicle—**NO EXCEPTIONS!** No non-University golf carts or ATV vehicles are allowed in the tailgate area or adjacent game-day areas. Entrance by vehicles will be through Avenue C and exit will be by the electronic marquee.
  - 7. **Pets are NOT allowed!** Service animals are an exception to these idelines.
- 8. The possession and use of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with all state, county, city, Board of Regents and University laws and ordinances. Individuals of legal age—21 or older—may consume alcoholic beverages in the

tailgating area. It is also illegal to provide alcohol to minors. Alcohol is not permitted outside the tailgating area.

- 9. All beverages must be in cans or plastic containers. Alcohol drinking games, funneling or any other games are prohibited. *Alcohol drinking game apparatus*, *kegs*, *beer pong balls or other common source containers* are prohibited. **NO GLASS BOTTLES ALLOWED!**
- 10. If alcoholic beverages are served, tailgateres must also serve an adequate amount of food or alternative beverages in the same location as alcoholic beverages.
- 11. Individuals are encourages to have designated drivers who do not drink alcoholic beverages to monitor their tailgating party throughout its duration.
- 12. **Disruptive behavior:** Individuals who interfere with the rights of others by the use of loud, abusive language, music and/or behavior, or who may prevent others from enjoying tailgating will be asked to cease and desist and may be directed to leave the event if necessary.
- 13. ALL tailgate parties will CONCLUDE 15 minutes prior to kickoff and all participants will depart the tailgate area no later than 15 minutes after kickoff.
  - 14. Tailgate parties may not resume at halftime.
- 15. Advertising banners or corporate sponsor signage are not allowed without prior written approval from the Texas A&M University-Kingsville athletic department. No distribution of advertising flyers/promotional materials allowed.
- 16. Participants and organizations are prohibted from selling food, products and/or raffle tickets, campaigning for office, distributing petitions and/or lobbying for votes.
- 17. No live bands or loud speaker systems are permitted on the premises. All music must cease whenever the live entertainment at the Javelina Main Stage area begins.
- 18. All trash, equipment and debris must be removed from the tailgate area by the tailgating members prior to post-game departure and no later than 45 minutes following the completion of that game. Please deposit all aluminum items in the recycling containers.
  - 19. No open pit fires are allowed. Fire must be contained to a grill.
- 20. Violatiion of any of these guidelilnes may result in immediate termination of tailgating privileges, criminal prosecution and/or disciplinary action.
  - 21. RV owners need to make prior arrangements by calling (361) 593-2493.


