## Football Opens Home Season With Western Oregon

The Texas A&M-Kingsville football team opens its home season Saturday night when it hosts Western Oregon.

Kickoff time will be 7 p.m. in Javelina Stadium.

The Javelinas opened last weekend with a 13-9 setback to Saginaw Valley (Mich.) in University Center, Mich.

Western lost its opener to Colorado Mines, 42-3, in Golden, Colo.

This will be the sixth meeting of the Javelinas and Wolves and Western holds a 4-1 advantage. The Wolves took a 26-14 victory in 2019 in Kingsville.

In the opener, the Javelinas amassed 313 total yards, 175 rushing and 138 passing. The defense gave up 326 total yards, 90 rushing and 236 passing.

Shane Johnson, 6-2, 205-pound grad quarterback from Houston (Reagan), completed 16 of 29 passes (.552) for 138 yards. He had one interception.

Johnson is in his first season with the Javelinas after transferring from Texas A&M.

Josh McGowen, 5-10, 240-pound senior running back from McAllen, led the rushing with 53

yards. He averaged 2.9 yards a carry and scored the Javelinas' lone touchdown on a one-yard run.

McGowen is a transfer from S.F. Austin State.

Ryan Martinez, 5-8, 185-pound senior wide receiver from Kingsville (King), had six receptions for 59 yards.

Kirkland Joseph, 6-1, 220-

# Javelina Hash

**JAVELINA FANS SHOULD** have been around last weekend to sense the excitement with the start of what is hoped to be a regular-schedule in 2021-22.

On Thursday, former Javelina defensive back Al Harris was inducted into the Green Bay Packer Hall of Fame.

Friday, Javelina Stadium was buzzing in the morning when the football team and the cross country squads were departing for their opening action of the fall.

The football team had a caravan to the Corpus Christi airport that included the team buses and vans with Javelina administrators and staff.

At about the same time, the Javelina indoor volleyball team was opening the fall season with a 10 a.m. match in San Angelo.

It was enough to get the old blue and gold blood flowing.

**WHEN FORMER JAVELINA** defensive back Al Harris was inducted into the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame last week, it was a special event for Packer fans.

It was the 50<sup>th</sup> induction for the club.

The hall is located on the Lambeau Field Atrium.

Harris, who was an All-Lone Star Conference honoree while playing for the Javelinas in 1995 and 1996, was drafted in the sixth round in 1997 by Tampa Bay.

After one season with the Buccaneers, he went to the Philadelphia Eagles where he played in 1998-2002.

Green Bay acquired him in 2003 and he was there through the 2010 season.

He finished out his playing career at Miami in 2010 and St. Louis in 2011.

Harris started his coaching career with Miami in 2012 as an intern and was the assistant secondary and defensive assistant at Kansas City in 2013-18.

He became the secondary coach for the Dallas Cowboys in 2020 and is in his second season with the Texas program. He is on the staff of Cowboy head coach Mike McCarthy, Harris' former head coach in Green Bay.

Harris was in the Pro Bowl twice while at Green Bay and was a second team All-Pro player in 2007.

He became a Packer favorite in 2003 when he returned an interception 52 yards for a game-winning touchdown in overtime in an NFC wildcard game against Seattle.

It was the first time that a playoff game had been won in overtime with a defensive touchdown.

Harris suffered a knee injury in 2009 and was listed in 2010 as a "physically unable to perform" player. He was waived by the Packers that season.

The Packers won the 2010 Super Bowl and the club gave Harris a championship ring.

As a member of the Packer Hall of Fame, Harris joins such NFL greats as Donnie Anderson, Brett Favre, Paul Hornung, Jerry Kramer, Vince Lombardi, Max McGee, Ray Nitschke and Bart Starr.

**THE NCAA HAS** released its guidance for fall training and competition during the pandemic.

The Fall Training and Competition document includes testing, quarantine, isolation and other athletic and non-athletic activity considerations for unvaccinated and fully vaccinated Tier 1 individuals.

Tier 1 individuals are those with the highest exposure, for example athletes, coaches, athletic trainers, physical therapists, medical staff, equipment staff and officials.

The NCAA guidance was developed in consultation with the NCAA Medical Advisory Group, American Medical Society for Sports Medicine Working Group and Autonomy 5 Medical Advisory Group.

The Lions are the only Lone Star Conference team in the top 10. Two of the three games listed as “worth watching” this week have LSC teams involved.

One is the Texas-Permian Basin matchup with West Texas A&M. The Falcons will be trying to win their eighth straight decision.

The other is Angelo State’s game with Chadron (Neb.) State in Nebraska.

**WHEN THE NCAA** Division II preseason basketball polls come out later this month or in early October, the Javelina men’s team could be among the top-ranked.

The Javelinas finished No. 24 in the final D2Sports Information Directors Association final poll last season.

The Javelinas were one of four Lone Star Conference teams in the final poll. West Texas A&M was No. 6, Lubbock Christian No. 10, Dallas Baptist No. 21 and the Javelinas No. 24.

The Javelinas’ games with West Texas A&M were cancelled because of the pandemic. They didn’t have an opportunity to play LCU or Dallas Baptist.

The Javelinas were bypassed by the selection committee for the NCAA Division II South Central Region tournament.

The Eagles currently have four men's sports and four women's sports.

They have men's and women's basketball, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's soccer, baseball and softball.

They are in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics and compete in the Red River Athletic Conference.

The program would have to begin transitioning into NCAA Division II in order to be accepted into the LSC.

TAMUT is a member of the Texas A&M University System and LSC schools in the system are Texas A&M International, Texas A&M-Commerce, Texas A&M-Kingsville and West Texas A&M.

**ANGELO STATE WILL** begin selling beer and wine at home football games this fall, beginning with the home opener Sept. 18.

An ASU official said Angelo State's goal is "attempting to enhance the experience for our fans and generate more attendance."

The Texas Tech board of regents approved the sale of alcohol at all home contests during an August meeting.

ASU will start with football, basketball, baseball and softball and will work on logistics for all other sports.

The school will operate on a temporary license until the primary license is approved.

...Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association members that cannot play due to COVID will forfeit the contest with a win awarded to the team able to play.

If both teams are unable to participate due to the virus and mutually agree to cancel the contest, both teams will be awarded a loss.

Officials said that one attempted reschedule per cancelled contest will be permitted.

At the same time, the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference will attempt to reschedule contests that cannot be played due to the COVID protocols.

If the contest cannot be made up, the conference may rule it a no-contest, meaning neither team will be awarded a loss.

The RMAC will continue to require unvaccinated athletes to be tested weekly ahead of contests.

Officials will be required to be vaccinated, test weekly or be masked at all times on campus.

weighted index formula to determine fall conference standings and seeding. Eighty percent of a team's winning percentage and 20 percent of the team's total number of contests played will be used.

Programs will have to complete 50 percent of scheduled contests in order to be eligible for regular season championship and qualify for MIAA postseason play.

...The Montana State-Billings athletic department plans upgrades to Yellowjacket Field.

Improvements will be made to the press box, ticket booth, equipment storage areas and areas that will enhance the work environment for athletic training, game-day operations and media relations staff.

A local bank was a key financial contributor to the project.

...The Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference has announced the dates, formats and locations for the 2021-22 league championships and post-season tournaments.

The league sponsors 18 sports with teams advancing to post-season tournaments in volleyball, men's and women's basketball, baseball, softball, women's tennis and men's and women's soccer.

Championship meets are held in men's and women's cross country, women's swimming and diving, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field and men's and women's golf.

Football and wrestling regular-season championships are based on regular-season standings with no NSIC post-season tournaments.

The Texas A&M-Kingsville women's golf team returns to action Monday and Tuesday when it takes part in the Swan Memorial Tournament in Thornton, Colo.

The meet will be held on the Todd Creek Golf Club course and is hosted by Colorado Christian.

The Javelinas opened their fall campaign Tuesday in a 32-hole, one-day tournament in Grand Prairie. Dallas Baptist was the host.

The Javelinas finished 10<sup>th</sup> in the team standings with a 655 score.



## AL HARRIS

Cornerback Al Harris was selected in the sixth round of the 1997 NFL Draft out of Texas A&M-Kingsville by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, and after spending his first season on the practice squad, played the next five seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles.

In 2003, the Green Bay Packers acquired Harris in a trade, and he spent the next eight seasons in Green Bay, racking up 14 interceptions and 108 passes defended. He earned back-to-back Pro Bowl selections in 2007-08 after receiving alternate recognition the previous three years. Known as an intense man-to-man specialist, Harris earned a reputation for shutting down opposing teams' top wideouts with his physical play at the line of scrimmage. A dedicated and durable player, he started 83 straight regular-season games from 2003-08.


In one of his most memorable moments as a Packer, he returned an interception 52 yards for a game-winning touchdown in overtime against Seattle in an NFC Wild Card contest on Jan. 4, 2004. The next season, he broke the Packers' single-season record (since 1982) for passes defended with 28 in 2004. During the latter years of his Packers career, he formed one of the most dynamic and experienced cornerback tandems in the league along with Charles Woodson.

Harris spent time with the Miami Dolphins and St. Louis Rams during the last two years of his playing career before officially retiring as a Green Bay Packer in 2013.



# 2021 Javelina Tailgating Guidelines

**PURPOSE:** Texas A&M University-Kingsville tailgating compliments the Javelina gameday experience by providing a social gathering area prior to home football games. Javelina alumni, students, fans and supporters can enjoy the tailgating traditions of food, fellowship and fun as a prelude to home games and all Lone Star Conference and NCAA playoff games.

The University alcohol policy prohibits the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus except in designated areas. Tailgating activities are permitted in Lot G (Southeast corner). To ensure our tailgating tradition provides a safe and positive game environment, the following guidelines will be enforced by the University Police Department and Home Events Staff.

1. One tailgate space per group.
2. Tailgating spaces **CAN NO LONGER BE PRE-MARKED**. Marking of any spaces with spray paint, stakes, rope, ribbon, etc. **IS PROHIBITED**. Setup starts at 7 a.m. Saturday, the day of the game.
3. Tailgate areas must be completely setup on **GAME DAY ONLY**. Your area **CANNOT BE LEFT UNATTENDED AFTER SETUP**. Tailgate spaces are available on a first-come, firstserved basis and must be consistent with the lane markings and other signage. Please honor and be respectful of the reserved areas. Tailgate spaces marked or setup prior to 7 p.m. on Saturday or any unattended areas are subject to removal by authorized University representatives and will not be replaced.
4. **IMPORTANT...The Department of Athletics does not guarantee tailgate spaces and is now responsible for any spaces at any time.**
5. Javelina athletics and TAMUK are not responsible for any lost, stolen or damaged personal property.
6. Parked vehicles are not allowed in the tailgate area. **ONLY DROP OFF** of your tailgate items is allowed by vehicle—**NO EXCEPTIONS!** No non-University golf carts or ATV vehicles are allowed in the tailgate area or adjacent game-day areas. Entrance by vehicles will be through Avenue C and exit will be by the electronic marquee.
7. **Pets are NOT allowed!** Service animals are an exception to these guidelines.
8. The possession and use of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with all state, county, city, Board of Regents and University laws and ordinances. Individuals of legal age—21 or older—may consume alcoholic beverages in the

tailgating area. It is also illegal to provide alcohol to minors. Alcohol is not permitted outside the tailgating area.

9. All beverages must be in cans or plastic containers. Alcohol drinking games, funneling or any other games are prohibited. *Alcohol drinking game apparatus, kegs, beer pong balls or other common source containers* are prohibited. **NO GLASS BOTTLES ALLOWED!**

10. If alcoholic beverages are served, tailgateres must also serve an adequate amount of food or alternative beverages in the same location as alcoholic beverages.

11. Individuals are encouraged to have designated drivers who do not drink alcoholic beverages to monitor their tailgating party throughout its duration.

12. **Disruptive behavior:** Individuals who interfere with the rights of others by the use of loud, abusive language, music and/or behavior, or who may prevent others from enjoying tailgating will be asked to cease and desist and may be directed to leave the event if necessary.

13. ALL tailgate parties will **CONCLUDE** 15 minutes prior to kickoff and all participants will depart the tailgate area no later than 15 minutes after kickoff.

14. Tailgate parties may not resume at halftime.

15. Advertising banners or corporate sponsor signage are not allowed without prior written approval from the Texas A&M University-Kingsville athletic department. No distribution of advertising flyers/promotional materials allowed.

16. Participants and organizations are prohibited from selling food, products and/or raffle tickets, campaigning for office, distributing petitions and/or lobbying for votes.

17. No live bands or loud speaker systems are permitted on the premises. All music must cease whenever the live entertainment at the Javelina Main Stage area begins.

18. All trash, equipment and debris must be removed from the tailgate area by the tailgating members prior to post-game departure and no later than 45 minutes following the completion of that game. Please deposit all aluminum items in the recycling containers.

19. No open pit fires are allowed. Fire must be contained to a grill.

20. Violation of any of these guidelines may result in immediate termination of tailgating privileges, criminal prosecution and/or disciplinary action.

21. RV owners need to make prior arrangements by calling (361) 593-2493.

## Lone Star Conference, Founded in 1931, Begins 90th Year of Competition

The Lone Star Conference began its 90<sup>th</sup> year of competition last week with the start of the 2021-22 football, volleyball, cross country, tennis and golf schedules.

A public service announcement, by former Javelina football and track and field athlete Darrell Green, was released.

The LSC is one of the oldest and distinguished conferences in NCAA Division II. There are currently 18 schools in the league, making it the largest in NCAA.

The anniversary celebration will include online features recognizing the achievements of athletes, coaches and administrators. The conference will highlight important days and games in LSC history, commemorate some of the 76 team national champions, commend top performances in conference

history and feature several of the nearly 60 LSC Hall of Honor members.

Founded in 1931, the LSC has grown from a five-team conference of Texas-based schools to its current membership that has schools in Arkansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

Member schools have won 76 NCAA team titles since the league joined Division II in 19082.

The LSC's mission is to foster student participation and success among member institutions in Division II athletics as an integral part of each institution's total educational program.

The LSC pursues athlete development with the highest regard to the principles of academic excellence, graduation success, sportsmanship, ethical conduct, resourcefulness, community service, gender equity and diversity.

Only Texas A&M-Commerce (East Texas State), is an original member of the LSC. Texas A&M-Kingsville (Texas A&I) joined in 1954 and Angelo State in 1968.

Eastern New Mexico became the first non-Texas member in 1984.

Cameron became a member of 1988 and Texas Woman's in 1989.

West Texas A&M joined in 1986 and Midwestern State entered in 1995.

In 2016, Texas-Permian Basin and Western New Mexico joined with Dallas Baptist, Lubbock Christian, Oklahoma Christian, St. Edward's, St. Mary's, Texas A&M International, Arkansas-Fort Smith and Texas-Tyler joining in 2019.

The LSC conducts conference championships in 18 sports, nine men and nine women.

The men's sports are football, soccer, cross country, basketball, baseball, indoor and outdoor track

and field, golf and tennis.

Women's titles are determined in volleyball, soccer, cross country, basketball, softball,

indoor and outdoor track and field, tennis and golf.

The conference headquarters is in Richardson.
