And things ratcheted up quickly for the Hornet cagers (14-10 last season, including 8-2 in the Northeast Corner Conference) after the Angola volleyball team fell in the Class 3A state championship match to Indianapolis Roncalli on Nov. 9.

Six girls transitioned from volleyball to basketball after a short break. Panning had his full team for its first practice on Nov. 13. Angola is in an opening stretch

ANGOLA — Bryan Weber returns to the Angola High School boys basketball program and will try to get the Hornets back in a winning direction.

Weber is a 1998 AHS graduate and coached in Ed Bentley and Greg Holmes' Hornet programs before stepping away to focus more on family as four children were growing up. Weber's oldest son Cru is now a freshman.

Bryan Weber returned recently to be an assistant coach for the eighth grade boys basketball team at Angola Middle School. He replaced Brandon Appleton as the varsity boys coach at AHS in May.

"I'm looking forward to it,"

Weber said. "The guys have bought in, and I think it starts to build excitement. We want to get the youth involved."

"We want a staple to be our defensive intensity. We want to play an aggressive style, and effort level is very important. We want teams to adjust to us and not us adjust to them."

The Hornets return nearly all their key players from last season, when they went 8-16, 6-4 in the Northeast Corner Conference. Their biggest losses were the graduations of Cam McGee and leading scorer Dane Lantz.

Angola's last winning season was the 2019-10 campaign when it went 14-9 under Bentley and

ALBION — It's been awhile since Central Noble had a younger, inexperienced varsity boys basketball team.

Despite having seven seniors, the Cougars will try to grow up quickly.

CN graduated six players from a team that went 16-8 last season, including 7-3 in the Northeast Corner Conference. Five of those six graduates played a lot last season.

"We'll fill in those spots with some other seniors," second-year Cougar coach Ben Lemmon said.

"I think we will grow everyday," he added. "This group enjoys being around each other. They don't care

who scores. They want to win."

Central Noble also lost forward Simeon Gard. The junior forward would have taken a valuable varsity role this season, but he and his family moved out of state.

The big addition for the Cougars is senior 6-foot-4 swing man Colt Kirkpatrick. He was homeschooled and lives in the Central Noble district. He plays inside and out.

CN's leading returners are senior guards Redick Zolman and Jayden Tilley.

Zolman was a KPC Media All-Area selection last season, averaging 10.4 points, 4.5 rebounds, 1.5 assists and 1.2 steals per game. He is in his third varsity season, and was on the bench as a freshman

when the Cougars were in the Class 2A state championship game in 2022.

"Redick is super-athletic and plays above the rim," Lemmon said. "He can go score on his own, but is also happy to make the right play. He is stepping up more into a leadership role."

Tilley will take on a bigger role after playing around several minutes per game last season.

Also taking on a bigger role will be senior point guard Carmine Shoda. However, he will share time at the point with freshman Marek Malcolm, the son of Cougar girls basketball coach Sam Malcolm.

"Marek is a true point guard and a smart kid,"

Finding right combo challenge for CN girls

ALBION — The potential is there for Central Noble to be one of the area's top girls basketball teams in 2024-25.

Some assembly may be required.

The Cougars have a deep roster with plenty of experience. Finding the right combinations for success will be the main task for third-year coach Sam Malcolm.

"We're deep and we're competing at practice, and we hope those dividends pay off later in the year," Malcolm said.

"If I have a concern it's how do we get 12, 13, 14 deserving girls the playing time that they've earned? We have so many girls that are similar in their skill sets. It will be a challenge for us to put together those combinations that can succeed on the floor."

The Cougars have a strong nucleus of four seniors back from last year's 14-11 club, including Kierra Bolen, Megan Carnahan, Taylor Custer and Kennedy Vice.

Juniors Abby Pliett and Grace Swank were KPC Media Group All-Area picks last year. Katie Forker, Austen McGlothlin and Whitney Replogle are also back as juniors.

"We have a lot of weapons," Malcolm said. "How we put them together is going to be the challenge. We've got experience, we've got depth at all of the positions. We go three or four deep in our bigs and six or seven deep in our guards."

"If you were to take the top 14 players in our program, line up and count off 1-2, 1-2, 1-2, and put those girls against each other and play 10 games, I think it

New coach to guide experienced ‘Busco girls

CHURUBUSCO — For the second straight season, the winds of change are blowing through Churubusco High School’s basketball program.

The Eagle girls have a new coach in Dawn Kock, a longtime Carroll assistant.

Gabe Garman, also a former Carroll assistant, took over the Eagle boys program last year.

Key returning players for the Eagles in 2024-25 start with talented senior guards Brooklyn Sinclair and Bridget Timbrook.

Sinclair averaged 9.9 points per game last season and Timbrook chipped in with 9.3 points per contest.

Junior guard Patty Wiggs returns. She scored 6.3 points per game and led the team in rebounding last season.

Senior forward Lilly Rinker is also back to form part of a strong returning core for the Eagles.

Churubusco has room to grow and improve in Kock’s first year. The Eagles were 5-18 in 2023-24, including 2-8 in the Northeast Corner Conference.

Kock said the Eagles’ strengths this season are speed, physicality and senior leadership.

The Eagles are hungry for a winning season, Kock said, and the ball is in good hands with seasoned senior guards like Timbrook and Sinclair leading the way.

“Both are capable of having a hot hand at scoring,” Kock said.

Kock said the Eagles will capitalize on their speed and physical strength by playing an aggressive style of defense.

“Our ability to have a successful season will be determined by our desire to stay together, commit to work, and keep the faith,” Kock said.

The Eagles’ last winning season was in 2014-15 when they posted a 14-10 mark and won their sectional opener.

The Eagles are off to a 1-3 start, with the win coming Nov. 9 over Hamilton 65-9.

A new-look NECC is now set. Hamilton has left to join the Hoosier Plains Conference.

Koch is assisted by varsity assistant Cassidy Yant and junior varsity head coach Abi Erwin.

DeKalb boys small in size, big on effort

WATERLOO — DeKalb will have to find other ways to be big this season.

The Barons boys are not blessed with a lot of size, but hope they have the resources to make up for being smaller and compete hard.

"We have probably the deepest group we've had," fourth-year coach Marty Beasley said. "They're extremely hard-working. We have guys who really, truly want to be good."

"They're getting it done in the weight room. They're getting it done in skill development. We're excited to see them continue to develop. They're not overly talented but they make up for that with hard work, dedication and a little bit of grit. That goes a long way."

The Barons return a large junior class with varsity experience from

last season's 9-14 club.

The depth and quickness should help in playing more of a full-court game, Beasley believes.

"With our quickness we have to turn the other team over a little bit," Beasley said. "In the full court we have to be able to put pressure on people to a) wear them down a little, and b) make them play a little faster, and maybe they'll throw a few passes our way."

"We're deep enough that we have to be able to play 84 feet and make up things on that end of the floor to where we can't just get destroyed rebounding. We're going to give up some offensive rebounds no doubt, because we're not very big."

DeKalb is working to improve problem areas. Beasley said several players come in and take extra shots before school in the mornings. The Barons have

shot 32.7% and 31.9% from three the past two seasons, and are looking to get into the high 30s.

"Everybody wants that quick result," Beasley said. "I worked out three days and I should be good." No. You've got to do it consistently over a period of time.

"The results may still not be what you want them to be. When you achieve something, you have the tendency to get complacent. Now you've got to keep working harder."

The team's shooting approach also has to be right.

"Maybe we've got to take fewer shots," Beasley said. "Maybe we have to have the right guys shooting it. Hopefully with the number of guys we've got coming in and shooting, they're going to be confident and be able to make shots."

Baron girls look to continue strong defense

WATERLOO — At the end of last season, DeKalb held Huntington North to one field goal in the first half of that game.

The Barons' intense zone defense often frustrated opponents, but the seniors who left were its heart and soul. Getting the defense back to that point is the main task for the Barons as they look to the 2024-25 season.

"We've got to find ways to stop other teams from scoring," said Noah Stuckey, beginning his fifth year with the Barons. "The girls

that graduated last year, defensively they were very tough and physical, and rebounded well. They did everything the right way."

"Skill-wise offensively we'll be better than we were a year ago. We just have to find that defensive toughness."

The main scoring threat will be KPC Media Group All-Area Prep of the Year Ashley Cox, a two-time All-Northeast 8 Conference pick who averaged a shade under 20 points a game last year. She also led the team in rebounding, assists and steals.

Abbie Harris averaged

nine points a game and provided needed ball handling as a freshman, and had a strong offseason, Stuckey said. The Barons also bring back a valuable role player in Bree Fordyce.

Sophomores Reese Schmidt and Grace Pfister could also provide scoring punch, while freshmen Ellington Sparkman, Mollee Sonnenberg and Kyla Kjendalen will provide depth.

The Barons have the makings of a more diverse attack this season.

"That's where we've changed offensively,

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Hamilton girls learning with new coach

HAMILTON — Hamilton's girls basketball team started the season a few steps behind.

Most of the players were involved in fall sports. New coach Kris Tadsen was not hired until Aug. 15 and he did not have any chance for offseason work with the team.

It's the first head-coaching opportunity for Tadsen, who was an assistant in the Eastside boys program last year under David Prokop. Prokop is now Hamilton's athletic director.

Hamilton has a roster of eight, and Tadsen likes what he sees so far.

"The eight girls we have are extremely hard workers," Tadsen said. "They get along well. They're eager to learn. I couldn't ask for a better group of girls for my first head-coaching gig."

Tadsen started at square one.

"Right now we're working on getting them to play as a team," he said. "We had issues in the past with a lot of drama. We've been working on relationships."

"We've been working on conditioning so we can run with the other teams, and then just back to the basics. Not being scared of dribbling the ball, don't be scared to shoot the ball."

The Marines have a mixture in game knowledge. They have some first-time players and they have others who haven't played basketball since junior high. It will take time to learn and come together as a unit.

"The more the girls get to play together, and once they kind of learn each other and what they're doing, we're going to get a lot better with knowing where girls have to be," Tadsen said.

The Hamilton program hasn't had a great deal of success in recent years. Building confidence is necessary for moving forward.

"The first thing I talked to the girls about is confidence, just keeping your head up," Tadsen said. "There are going to be missed shots, there are going to be turnovers. We're all learning the game together."

"If you miss a shot that's two seconds out of a 32-minute game. Don't worry about it. Get back on defense, keep you head up and move on."

Tadsen knows progress will come in small steps.

"I get very excited over little things," he said. "When we had a scrimmage at South Side, I had one of the guards bring the ball upcourt. I told her to go left. She went left twice and it was two turnovers, but I

Marine boys must take care of ball

HAMILTON — Chase Holden welcomes back a group of six seniors as he begins his second season as Hamilton boys basketball coach.

"It's been nice to have everybody back from last year," Holden said. "They're more acquainted with me and I'm more acquainted with them and what they can do."

"We're way farther along than when I started last year. We understand our plays a lot better. They understand what I expect out of them."

The Marines begin play in the Hoosier Plains Conference this season. The school made the move from the Northeast Corner Conference last spring.

Holden, a star player on Hamilton's regional championship team in 2001, feels two areas will be crucial if the Marines are to improve on last season's 2-15 season.

"We've got to be better rebounding," Holden said. "I remember preaching that a lot at the end of last season. There were times we just didn't want to go rebound and go after those loose balls."

"(Another area for improvement is) taking care of the basketball. If we can clean up those two areas, we'll be in more games and have an opportunity to win more games."

Turnovers caused Hamilton to give up several easy baskets last season.

"We gave away way too many easy layups," Holden said. "We'd make one or two passes then we'd turn the ball over and the other team is going in for a wide open layup."

"If we got back and played defense, we did a great job of slowing teams down. When we turned the ball over and they got easy layups it just killed the swag of our guys. Their heads dropped. It's not easy when your heads start dropping."

The rebounding comes down to want-to.

"Their biggest thing is they've got to want to go get the basketball," Holden said. "They can't let the basketball come to them. We're not the most athletic group, but we've got guys that can go up and get it. We've just got to go get it."

"When I played a long time ago, I wasn't the most athletic one but I wanted the basketball more than somebody else wanted it."

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New coach, new outlook for Laker boys in 2024-25

LAGRANGE — The new Lakeland High School boys basketball coach didn't need to do much work to get up to speed on the Lakers' program.

T.J. Schneider, a former assistant to late Laker coach Tim Sirk, is preparing for his first season as a head coach. He takes over for Chris Keil, who stepped down at the end of the 2023-24 season.

The Lakers were 17-7 last season and made it to the Class 3A Lakeland Sectional semifinals, where they fell to NorthWood 46-43.

The Lakers lost standout guard Nate Keil to graduation. The son of the former head coach, Nate was the Lakers' leading scorer with 22.6 points per game last season.

Nate Keil is now playing at Glen Oaks Community College in Michigan, where he's averaging 3.3 points and 1.7 rebounds per game through his first three games.

The Lakers were regular season champions in the Northeast

Corner Conference last season, and Schneider can look forward to a strong returning core in his inaugural season.

That core includes a number of returning letterwinners, including senior point guard Justin Carlson, senior guard Anthony Khanchareun, senior forward Chuck Schackow, junior guards Keyan Arroyo, Levi Cook and Kyle Hartsough, junior forward Keegan Merrifield and sophomore guard Cole Riehl.

Hartsough is the top returning scorer for Lakeland as he averaged 8.8 points per game last season. Arroyo averaged 7.9 points per game and Merrifield was at 7.7 points per contest.

Replacing both Nate Keil's production and leadership won't be easy, Schneider said, but one guy won't be expected to fill those big shoes.

"Collectively replacing the output of a player like Nate Keil will be important," Schneider said. "It won't be one person stepping into that

The Warriors under third-year coach Chandler Prible have won the past two Class 2A Sectional 35 titles.

Last year, they were eliminated from the Class 2A regional by Wabash, a team led by guard Izaak Wright, who is now on the defending NCAA Division III national championship Trine University men's basketball team.

Westview was 20-6 overall last season (8-2 Northeast Corner Conference). The Warriors were runners-up in the NECC Tournament.

Zepp is now a member of the men's basketball team at Concordia-Ann Arbor, where he saw 20

minutes of action in the Cardinals' 83-78 season-opening victory over Goshen College Oct. 29. Zepp scored two points, grabbed three rebounds and dished out a pair of assists.

Zepp also had 11 points in 22 minutes in Concordia-Ann Arbor's 111-46 exhibition loss to Valparaiso on Nov. 8.

Westview in 2024-25 features a mature, experienced core that includes six returning letterwinners: seniors Owen Brill and Kamden Yoder, juniors Kaden Grau and Milan Miller, and sophomores Austin Schlabach and Daniel Yoder.

The Westview roster also includes junior Brett Springer and sophomores Pierce Yoder and Kaine Reinhold.

Prible is assisted by Russ Yoder, Collin Barker and Karl Grau.

Despite the loss of experienced players like Zepp and Helmuth, Prible is still optimistic about the impending 2024-25 season and the expectations haven't changed.

At Westview, they never do.

"We will be younger, but excited about the talent within our younger group," Prible said. "We are hoping to compete for championships again this season."

Durnell feels the Knights have the capability to score. He wants to see continued improvement at the other end. Last season, East Noble allowed just less than 52 points a game after surrendering 62 on average the year before.

"Defensively we made a huge jump from two years ago to last year and I think there's still another jump that we have to make if we're going to be one of the better teams in the area, which we think we can be," Durnell said.

"We have some offensive firepower. Are we going to get after it defensively like we're capable of. We have the athletes to do it. Are we going to be committed to that end of the floor as well?"

East Noble will strive for that improvement playing mostly man-to-man.

"We'll be man a lot. I'm not a huge zone guy but we'll mix it in," Durnell said. "We'll be pressuring the ball like we did all last season. Hopefully our help side can come up another level, and hopefully we're more on the same page this year than we were last year."

The Knights won't have much size, and will have to find ways to compete on the boards.

"We will be small," Durnell

said. "Our center's 5-11, Kobe Ritchie, but he gets the job done. He can jump out of the gym. He plays like he's 6-6."

"That's an area that may also be a concern. We have some lengthy guards and hopefully we can use that to our advantage. We'll have to be super physical on the glass."

Another key is how long the Knights can make their bench.

"That's a big key. Are our bench guys and our role players going to take it up another notch? If they do we're going to have a lot of options and that's going to make us super dangerous," Durnell said.

Durnell is rooting for the Knights' football team, but is confident his club can create some excitement of its own.

"We're super excited. We've had this group since day one," Durnell said. "Yes, there's some pressure with that because this is one of the better teams we've had. Once football gets over we can have our whole roster committed, and I'm excited to see what this team will do with the expectations and goals."

"Even with some of the adversity we've dealt with, nothing changes. We still want to fulfill our goals. We still think we can compete for the conference and the sectional."

threes.

"I've seen a lot of improvement in our one through five, and some of the younger girls are shooting it better, too."

The Knights also want to show their quickness on defense and force the issue with enemy ball handlers.

"We'll be a very fast team that gets after it," Isaacs said. "We switched some things defensively this year to match a guard-heavy rotation. A lot of our defense is going to lean heavily toward pressure, and hopefully cause turnovers and get some steals."
