

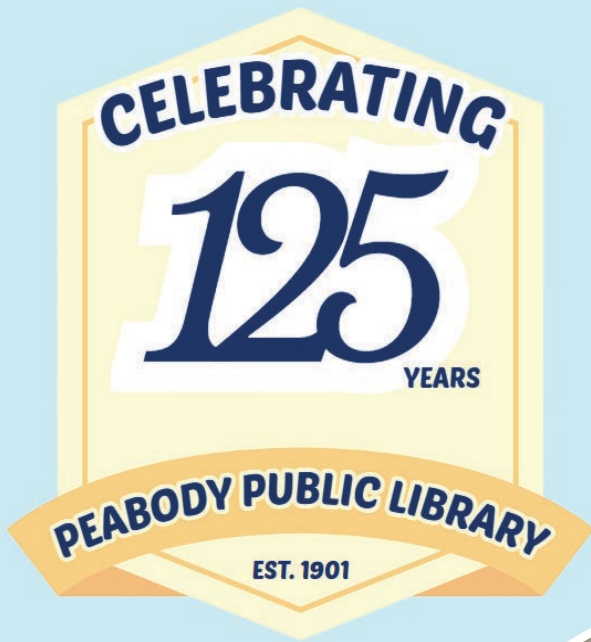

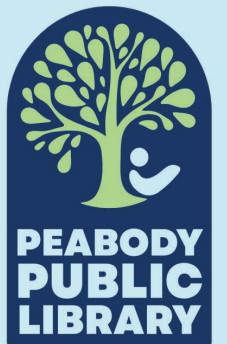




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The Post & Mail office is in the Whitley County Chamber of Commerce & Visitors Center at 128 W. Van Buren St., Columbia City.

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Whitley County History

A Whitley County History ...

It was around 1838 that Europeans began to settle into the area. Whitley County officially became a county on April 1, 1838.

But where did its name come from? It might be surprising to know it was named after a man who never set foot in the area.

For decades, Colonel William Whitley led military groups and efforts. He came from the area that would become Kentucky. Whitley is predominantly remembered for his expeditions against the Native Americans to establish a European presence in the area. He also built the first brick home west of the Appalachian Mountains.

Whitley was a sportsman and a prominent public figure.

Whitley County is also remembered as the home of Miami people, the most notable of whom being Little Turtle. He was a warrior who fought many battles in Whitley County.

In 1780, he massacred a group of U.S. troops led by Col. Augustine de la Balme and, 10 years later, defeated Col. Hardin in a battle at Heller's Corner, located just off today's U.S. 33 at Carroll Road, three miles from Churubusco.

Later in his life, Little Turtle became more of a diplomat and had the distinction of visiting three presidents – George Washington, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson,

His son, Black Loon, and many other Miami Indians were killed in a battle near present day Paige Road, just outside of Columbia City.

A Columbia City History ...

On Oct. 16, 1839, Columbia City got its start out of 443 acres of land that belonged to Elihu Chauncey, a man from Philadelphia.

It was first named "Columbia," but its name would go on to be a topic of great debate.

In May of 1842, a post office came to be established as the seat of justice in Whitley County. With the post office came a need to name the city. Upon hearing the name "Columbia" the postal department said there was a post office in Indiana already with that name, and it would have to change.

Kaler & Maring in their "History of Whitley County Indiana," published in 1907, wrote: "A few straggling settlers who came in were invited to assist in naming the new town and it was done before adjournment that day. Asa Shoemaker, whose wife was named Elizabeth, wanted it called 'Elizabethtown.'

"Richard Collins wanted it called 'Beaver' in honor of the Indian who once owned the nearby reserve. 'Little Turtle' was also suggested. Finally at the suggestion of Abraham Cuppy, ably seconded by Jacob Vanhouten (who later became an associate

judge in the first organized government in Whitley County), the name of 'Columbia' was adopted. The new town was given that name of record on Nov. 25, 1839 before any survey had begun and the board adjourned."

Richard Collins would later renew his effort to call it "Beaver" but during the dispute the department named it "Whitley County Court House," and changed the already existing "Whitley" post office to "South Whitley." From 1842 through 1853, people residing in Columbia had a mailing address of "Whitley County Court House."

This change, as well as having a "South Whitley" in Whitley County, caused a great deal of confusion and plenty of mail being misaddressed.

A caucus was held at the Whitley County Courthouse on Dec. 16, 1853, to establish a new name for the Columbia post office. Richard Collins once again renewed his effort to name the post office "Beaver" but Dr. William Swayzee prevailed with "Columbia City." If it could not be "Columbia" because that name had been taken, then he reasoned it could be that name with "city" attached.

Kaler & Maring wrote in their history:

"(The new name) would give the place a big name. Considerable acrimony was manifest before and during the Caucus, but 'Columbia City' won out, was certified to the department at Washington

as the choice of the people and on the 16th day of January 1854, the day Lewis Dowell took the office (of postmaster), the name changed.”

Despite the mailing designation, the “town” of Columbia City did not officially become the incorporated “city” of Columbia City until 1888.

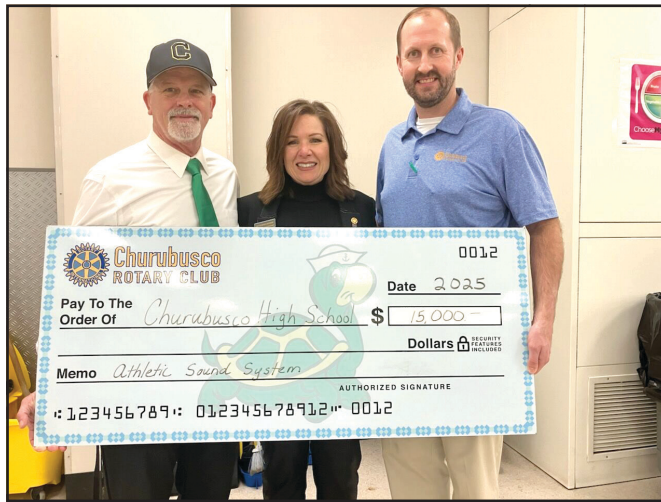
A Churubusco History

... The area that would become Churubusco was a thriving trading community in frontier times. It officially got its start in 1847 after a small group of local residents met in the town log store. Their purpose was to decide a name to put on the application for a post office, thus formally making the town.

Churubusco is in Smith Township, the northeast corner of Whitley County. The east edge of the town is the Allen-Whitley county line.

History tells us the name “Churubusco” came from a suggestion by Mr. Jackson. He was trying to settle an argument that had arisen between a German, an Englishman and Irishman. They each preferred the names “Brunswick,” “Liverpool” and “Maloney.” The Irishman, insisting that his town should be burdened with a “foreign” name jerked off his coat and it appeared the fight was at hand.

But Mr. Jackson remembered a battle that had recently taken place in Churubusco, Mexico, one of which he had lost a

relative in the battle. The Americans were victorious there on Aug. 20, 1847, in the War with Mexico, and Mr. Jackson thought it would be patriotic to name the town “Churubusco.” The Irishman, although he could not pronounce the name, was for it if it was patriotic.

An application was made for a post office and a permit was granted in November 1847.

It would be just over 100 years later that Churubusco would gain national attention for a huge turtle that was believed to have been seen in a nearby lake. This was in 1949, and the owner of the farm the lake sat on was determined to prove its existence to naysayers. They called this turtle “Oscar,” and the hunt for this turtle brought thousands to area, including reporters and photographers

The turtle, seen by a number of people, was reputed to be as big as a tabletop, but this is now thought to be an exaggeration. In any case, Oscar eluded all efforts to capture him, even to draining the lake nearly dry.

Oscar remains a mystery to this day, but his legend inspired the nickname “Turtle town” and this is remembered each year in June with the celebration of Turtle Days.

South Whitley History

... South Whitley is located along the banks of the Eel River. Before it was formally established at a town, Native Americans called this river Kenapocomoco (“snakelike fish”). White men who came to the area called it the Eel River.

Joseph Parrett Jr. brought his family and settles near where Huntington and Goshen Road (Ind. 5) crosses the river. This was in 1835.

Other settlers, including Palmer Cleveland, James Chaplin, Isaac Swyhart, John Collins and Samuel Obenchain, soon followed and the town of South Whitley was born.

South Whitley was the first town in the newly formed county of Whitley. It is located in Cleveland Township in the southwest corner of Whitley County.

Cleveland Township and unorganized areas of Whitley County were originally attached to Huntington County for legal purposes. Jesse Cleveland would meet with Huntington County

officials in May of 1837 with the purpose of getting permission to do business with Whitley County. His request was granted, and the township was named after him as he was elected the first board president.

Soon after, it was approved to locate a post office in the area and name it the “Whitley Post Office.” The original name for the town was “Springfield,” but this was rejected because Indiana already had a town of that name. This was further complicated based on the post office being established in the county seat, then named “Whitley County Court House.” In the end the confusion was relieved by residents who named their town “South Whitley.”

County Firsts

First School — “Let There Be Light” is the title on the site marker where David Parrett, one of the first settlers, started his subscription school in a log cabin in 1837. The site is located to the right of Ind. 5 as one travels south, just before the State Street bridge in South Whitley.

Whitley County History

First Jail — The first public building in Whitley County was the jail, a 16 by 18 foot log structure located on the southwest corner of the courthouse lawn built in 1841. The marker is located at the corner of Washington and Market streets in Columbia City.

First Settler — Andrew Mack was the first white settler in Whitley County. He built a log cabin on what is now U.S. 33, near CR 650 East, about three miles northwest of Churubusco prior to 1827.

First County Seat — A marker is placed at the original of the county seat, chosen June 18, 1838. The original site is on the county road directly east



of the present-day Oak Grove Church of God, located at 2426 S. Raber Road.

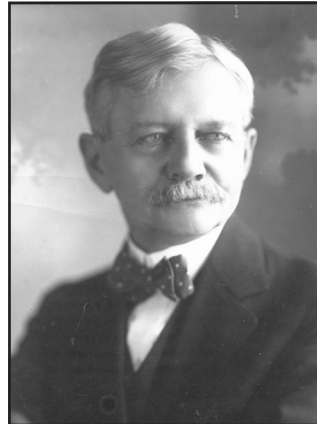
First Town — South Whitley was the first town in the county, platted and named "Springfield" by Joseph Parrett on May 1, 1837. A marker is at the entrance to the town park.

First House — David E. Long built the first house in Columbia City in 1840. It was located at the northwest corner of Van Buren and Main streets, near Star Financial Bank. It was a one-story structure used as a hotel and tavern with a sign that read "Entertainment for man and beast." A bronze plaque was above the bank's front inside entrance door prior to its remodeling.

First Courthouse — The county's first courthouse was located where today's City Hall stands in Columbia City. It was a two-story frame house that was later moved to 108 S. Whitley St.

First Church — The Concord Methodist Church was first built in 1839 of logs on land donated by Jacob VanHouten. The marker is located on CR 150 North in Section 34 of Smith Township, near the Concord Cemetery.

First County court and First Mill — The first court and the first mill were located on 240 acres obtained by Richard Baughan, first sheriff of Whitley County. The first circuit court was held in his home on April 9, 1839, and he built the mill in 1841. The commemorative

marker is at the intersection of Cider Mill and Widman roads (north and east of Columbia City off Ind. 9).

Notable Natives

Whitley County has many native sons and daughters who have accomplished significant social and historical feats. These include:

Government

Thomas R. Marshall, vice president of the United States and first governor of Indiana elected from Whitley County.

Ralph F. Gates, Indiana's governor from 1945 through 1949.

Meritte W. Ireland, once surgeon-general of the U.S. and friend of Gen. John Pershing.

Jill Long Thompson, a Larwill native, served more than six years as a U.S. Congresswoman representing the 4th District. She was the chair of the congressional rural caucus and was vice-chair of the Democrat leadership council. Long was also a candidate for governor.

F. Dale Barnett, was

elected to the Indiana State Senate in 1958 and was instrumental in bringing a post office and an American Legion Post to Churubusco.

James S. Collins, was elected to the senate in 1860. He was a stalwart Republican.

Marilyn V. Cook, a Union Township resident, was the first woman in the State of Indiana to be elected trustee, serving as Union Township Trustee and on the Whitley County School Board for 12 years. She was also the first woman to join the Optimist Club.

Law

Leigh Smith Hunt, a lawyer and philanthropist.

B.J. Bloom Sr., attorney, was a leading pillar of Columbia City. His sons and grandsons practice law today in Columbia City.

Isaiah McDonald, was the prosecuting attorney on the 1900s in Whitley and Noble counties. He was joint senator for Allen and Whitley counties in the late 1800s.

Leta Herran Stickler, is believed to have been the first and only female deputy

sheriff in Indiana, in the 1930s.

Judge Lowell Pefley, elected to four consecutive terms in the history of the court. He died in 1963.

Judge Phil McNagny, was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States and in 1976 was sworn in as judge, United States District Court, Northern District of Indiana.

Judge Rob R. McNagny, was a judge, attorney and designer of Old Settlers postcards for 60 years. He also was an author.

Judge Joseph Adair, was elected to the 33rd judicial court in 1890. He was a Noble County native and a staunch Democrat.

Robert E. Gates, began practicing law in Whitley County in 1949. He was 4th District Republican Chairman and was a member of the Indiana University Foundation and was a trustee of the university. He also served as state commander of the American Legion.

Alex and Ruby Campbell, developed the Civil War mansion of John Mossman

in Coesse. Mr. Campbell was a Fort Wayne attorney, former assistant U.S. Attorney General and hosted former President Harry S. Truman, a friend, at his Coesse ranch. Mr. Campbell died in 1968 while enroute home from riding one of his beloved Palomino horses in the Rose Bowl Parade.

D.V. Whiteleather, 1800s attorney and courtroom lawyer with strong Democratic ties and court manner.

Edward J. Meyers, served five consecutive terms spanning nearly four decades as judge of Whitley Circuit Court. His career as a circuit court jurist began in 1963.

Charles White, a 1935 CCHS graduate, is remembered as clerk of the circuit court and license branch manager. His will established nursing scholarships for Whitley County students.

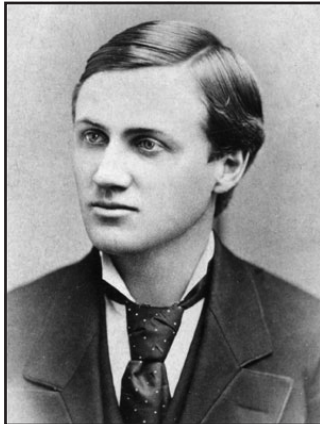
Land/Community

Lois Gross, was a spokeswoman for agriculture for 46 years, and served as chairman of the Farm Bureau Women's Department and second vice president of Indiana Farm Bureau.

Jay Crawford, a Columbia Township resident, gave much time to civic endeavors and was an advocate of Whitley County farmers.

Ferdinand F. Morsches, founder of Morsches Builders' Mart and donator of the land now known as Morsches Park.

B.V. Widney, was an

extension agent in Whitley County for 34 years; under his leadership 4-H was organized, as was the Neighborhood Extension Organization.

Elihu Chauncey, owned the land that later became Columbia City while living in Philadelphia. He bought the land sign-unseen and then sold it to developers.

Margaret Rosentrader, retired in 1976 after years as a home extension agent in Whitley County.

Logan Staples, developer-owner of Tri-Lakes Resort.

Keller Beeson, a Columbia City native, was considered one of the chief developers of the soybean growing industry in Indiana. He died in 1965.

Grace M. Karst, originated Renaissance Village, overseeing everything from construction to staffing, policies and procedures, etc. until her retirement in 1990.

Newspaper

John W. Baker, publisher of the Whitley County Commercial Mail, and postmaster in the late 1800s.

Wallace M. Williamson, owner of The Mail newspaper which was merged into the Columbia Times and printed as the official voice of the Republican Party.

James Kirtley, was Indiana's youngest newspaper owner when he purchased the Churubusco Truth in 1940. He sold the paper in 1981.

John Q. and Hester Little Adams, publishers of Whitley County newspapers for 30 years and generous benefactors to the community.

James D. Adams, a Columbia City native, was associated with the Columbia City Post for 40 years. He was one of the first men from Whitley County to enlist in WWI. He was a promoter of Columbia Woolen Mills, helped develop Columbia Theatre, was instrumental in the chartering of Citizens State Bank and served as president of Whitley Products until 1951. Adams died in 1966.

Education

Hazel Pittman Munns, long-time music supervisor

and teacher in Columbia City schools.

A.R. Fleck, Whitley County superintendent of schools and South Whitley schools superintendent.

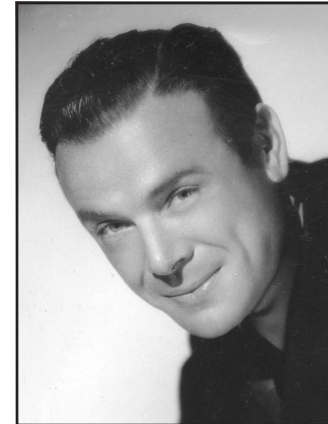
Marguerite Stultz, retired in 1963 after 50 years of teaching in Whitley County.

Max Gandy, a Noble County native, was principal of Columbia City High School for 24 years.

Eudolph "Doc" Holycross, taught 42 years. His former pupils regard him as an expert in civic affairs and he carried that to his retirement years.

Mary Raber, taught primary grades for 56 years before retiring in 1939. Mary Raber school is dedicated to her.

Bernice Carver, was an instructor of high school students in Columbia City for 41 years. She founded the GJL and the Sunshine Society and headed the CCJHS math department for 12 years. Bernice served as Whitley County historian for many years. She named Indian Springs Middle School and was honored to have

the cafeteria at the school named after her in 1997.

Mary Hallowell, is credited with being the first woman superintendent of schools in Indiana.

Newell Rice, for Whitley County teacher, implemented the first textbook rental at CCHS.

Alexander Knisely, county superintendent of schools in 1885.

Entertainment

Lloyd C. Douglas, author, was born in Columbia City. Some of his works were reproduced on the silver screen.

Janie Fricke, a South Whitley native, is a well-known country singer.

Dean Jagger, a Larwill High School graduate, was an Academy Award-winning actor who starred in a movie based on a book by Lloyd Douglas, "The Robe" and many others.

Ghost Towns

The following are names of former places in Whitley County, some of which have been lost to time. These were first published in The Post & Mail in 1982. They represent pioneer settlements, Native American villages, post offices, schools, etc., each of which came to be identified under the following names:

Beaver Run

Beaver Run was located southwest of Wartburg College and was the site of the famed "Schoolhouse on the Hill."

Buzzard's Glory

Loran, later changed to Lorane, was sometimes referred to as Buzzard's Glory. Legend has it, in

its heyday, Lorane had two competing saloons on either side of the street.

Bedbug Row

Bedbug Row was a name given to a row of plank houses constructed for workmen at the Bull Town handle factory. It was situated on what is now the vacated east end of County Road 1000 South in Jefferson Township.

Blee Catholic Church

A brick home, the residence of the Blee brothers, served as an early worship place for Catholics in Jefferson Township. Chapel exercises were held monthly at the Blee residence by Father Fowler, of Fort Wayne.

Bloomfield

Bloomfield was located in northeast Thorncreek Township. It consisted of a small grocery and dry goods store run by Abraham Friend.

Brimstone

Brimstone was located at what is now the intersection of County Road 800 South and County Road 700 East. The church was on the northwest corner of the intersection, while the Brimstone School was on the southeast corner.

Buckpatch

The northern quarter in Jefferson Township was referred to as Buckpatch at one time. History doesn't

tell us where the name comes from – whether Native American or for a deer.

Bull Town Farm

Bull Town Farm was located along the mile running from County Road 700 East to the Whitley-Allen county line on County Road 1000 South, or the Fenian Road as it was called. At its height, Bull Town had a grocery store, a sawmill, a handle factory and a blacksmith shop.

Carpenter Tract

In 1842, Carpenter Tract was named. It was located one quarter mile west of the Charles Hess homestead on the Yellow River in Union Township.

Cresco

The Cresco Post Office was established June 10, 1888 in Thorncreek Township. It also had a general store.

Forest

Forest was established in 1854 one mile north of Maring Corners at the site that is now Laud. The village began with a sawmill built by the Miller brothers.

Fuller's Corner

The Fuller's Corner post Office was located in Smith Township. This is near the present section of County Road 450 East and Burd Road.

Franklin and Union

Franklin and Union were two adjacent tracts, neither of which was acceptable to the Postal Service. On Sept. 12, 1848 the name Churubusco was chosen.

Hecla

The Hecla Post Office was located in Etna from its naming until it was discontinued.

Hell's Half Acre

The swamps and woods of southeast Columbia Township and extending into Richland Township was known as Hell's Half Acre. The area, named Hell's Half Acre around 1840, had a reputation as a perilous area to venture into. Township committees were established to clear up the criminal element there.

Huntsville

Huntsville became Larwill, primarily because the Postal Service already had a Huntsville in another part of the state. The name Larwill was selected on April 8, 1866, honoring the railroad surveyor instrumental in bringing the railroad to the town.

Maring Corners

Maring Corners was located at the southeast corner of the Maring settlement at the present junction of County Road 900 South and County Road 200 East. In the fall of 1847, an 18 by 20 foot log school house was built at Maring Corners.

Maring Settlement

In the southeast section of Washington Township was the Maring Settlement. In 1845, Maring Settlement consisted of six families. By 1847, there were 11 families.

Millersburg

Millersburg became Collamer. In 1882, it had

a population of 150, while its businesses consisted of a grist mill, two general stores, a boot and shoe factory, a drug store, a doctor's office, a Christian church and a post office.

Saturn

The Saturn Post Office had two locations. The original post office was located at the southeast corner of section 22 and was operated by William T. Jeffries. Later, it was renamed Broxon Post Office and relocated on Liberty Mills Road in northwest section 25 of Jefferson Township.

Sawdust Hill

Sawdust Hill became Luther with the advent of a post office. The Luther Post Office, in southern Washington Township, was established Feb. 2, 1894, and was discontinued Feb. 29, 1904.

Sells

The Sells Post Office was located half mile west of the present Eberhard Church. It was established June 25, 1898, and discontinued with free delivery Oct. 23, 1899.

Sodom or Licksillet

Sodom or Licksillet were the names used by local residents when referring to the town that later became Forest. In 1870, a convention was held for the purpose of naming the place. An oyster supper was one feature of the gathering.

Springfield

Springfield became South Whitley. As of 1882, the official town name had

not yet been changed from Springfield to South Whitley.

Summit

Summit was located half mile west of Larwill, or Huntsville as it was named until 1866, at the crossing of the Huntington-Goshen and Warsaw-Fort Wayne roads.

Taylor's Station

Taylor's Station Post Office, later shortened to Taylor was located on Section 19 in Columbia Township, along the Vandalia Railroad. The Taylor Post Office was established April

14, 1876 and discontinued April 28, 1881.

Tousley Crossing

Tousley Crossing was located one mile east of Coesse.

Raccoon Road

Raccoon Road started in 1840 and was completed in 1843. It ran almost directly from Columbia City to the southeast corner of the county, to the site of Raccoon Village. Later, when miles sections were established, Raccoon Road was either absorbed into section roads or abandoned.

Raccoon Village

Raccoon Village was a major town in Whitley County at one time. It was located directly astride the Whitley-Allen county line, on what later became the north bank of the Wabash Canal, and still later Ind. 24.

Popano

The Popano Post Office was established April 11, 1848 and later moved to Etna on Oct. 7, 1851. Since the Postal Service already had a post office with a name close to "Etna," it would not accept Etna as a name, so the name changed to Hecla May 22, 1852.

Wartburg College

Wartburg College was established by Rev. Jacob Wolf in 1854, near present-day Coesse. The college only operated for two years due to the lack of interest on the part of young men in the community.

Wynkoop

The Wynkoop Post Office was established at Taylor 17 years after the Taylor Post Office had been discontinued. Wynkoop was established June 25, 1899, and discontinued at the beginning of free rural delivery Nov. 15, 1901.

Whitley County EDC

The Whitley County Economic Development Corporation was organized in 1992. This non-profit serves Whitley County including Columbia City, Churubusco, Larwill and South Whitley. Its purpose is to assist all existing manufacturers while also attracting new businesses to the area. The goal is to maintain a strong and growing economy, creating high-quality jobs, increasing the tax base and decreasing citizen property tax rates.

County Auditor

The county auditor and staff wear many hats. The biggest of those is to be the financial manager of the county. The office sees that bills are paid and does payroll for all county employees. They are also responsible for preparing the tax statements that reflect the value of property and the taxes assessed to each taxpayer.

The auditor's office also oversees the county general fund, and other county department funds and grants.

The auditor serves as secretary for the County Commissioners, Council and Redevelopment Commission.

The Whitley County Auditor is Tiffany Deakins. The office is located in the

County Engineer/ Surveyor

The job of the engineer/surveyor is to address matters related to drains, bridges, small structures, section corners, verifying addresses, public way vacations and more.

They serve on various boards, both as voting and non-voting members. These include the Whitley County Drainage Board, Plan Commission, Joint Advisory Board, GIS Task Force and others.

The County Surveyor is Dane Drew. The office is located in Suite 203 in the Whitley County Government Center. Phone: 260-248-3107.

County Recorder

The County Recorder's office records mortgage releases, contracts, mortgage assignments, power of attorney and mechanic's liens. They also store plat books, detailing Whitley County's subdivisions and additions. They scan all documents on computers for permanent safekeeping.

The recorder's office has books, detailing every property transfer, dating to when Whitley County was declared in 1838.

Not everything the recorder records has to do with property. The office also makes certified copies of discharge papers for veterans or their widows when the papers have been lost.

County Treasurer

The treasurer's office collects county money and invests it. They are the bookkeeper for the county checkbook, and are responsible for balancing that register.

The county takes in money through a variety of taxes. It collects personal property, real estate, drainage assessments, mobile home taxes, inheritance tax and all the excise taxes.

The treasurer's office is also charged with distributing those monies collected in to the budgets of the various county departments. This occurs in June and December after the taxes are received.

The Whitley County Treasurer is Kay Gatton. The office is located in Suite 208 of the government center. Phone: 260-248-3105.

Building and Planning

The Columbia City/Whitley

County Joint Planning and Building Dept. plans land and building use. It plans zoning and makes sure the county residents follow the plans.

The department also issues construction-related permits and is responsible for building inspections.

Many requests the department handles – like special exemptions to the zoning ordinance – are decided during monthly meetings of the city and county plan commissions and boards of zoning appeals.

The department is unique to Whitley County in that it is partially funded by Columbia City, Churubusco and South Whitley.

The Planning and Building Director is Nathan Bilger. The office is located in Suite 204 of the government center. Phone: 260-248-3112.

Clerk of Courts

The clerk's office does the paperwork for Whitley County Superior and Circuit courts. Circuit Court jurisdiction includes probate cases and juvenile and criminal cases.

Superior Court includes civil and criminal cases. All judgement ordered by the courts go through the clerk's office.

The other major responsibility of the clerk's office is elections. Those duties include taking care of voter registration, preparing voter lists, preparing the ballots, overseeing absentee-voting and making sure election officials are trained.

The clerk's office is also the place where people go to apply for marriage licenses and pay traffic fines. It's where they make payments on civil judgements and make child support payments.

The county clerk is Cindy Doolittle. The office is located in the Whitley County Courthouse. Phone: 260-248-3102.

Superior Court

Whitley Superior Court is one of two courts in the county. Judge Douglas Fahl hears criminal misdemeanor and felony cases. A large part of those are due to alcohol or drug-related incidents.

Superior Court also decides

marriage dissolutions and holds bench trials resulting from traffic infractions.

Superior Court decides civil cases. Small claims cases are those when the dollar amount is \$6,000 or less; the docket consists of cases with dollar amounts exceeding \$6,000.

The Superior Court office is located in the courthouse. Phone: 260-248-3119.

Circuit Court

Circuit Court is a court of general jurisdiction. It handles any and all kinds of cases. Common practice, however, is to file more serious criminal cases in Circuit Court.

Whitley County Circuit Court Judge Matthew Rentschler also hears juvenile cases. He also deals with such civil matters as probates, guardianship, adoption and dissolution of marriages.

The Circuit Court office is located in the courthouse. Phone: 260-248-3115.

County Prosecutor

In Indiana, the county prosecutor is considered the top law enforcement official in the county.

D.J. Sigler, Whitley County's prosecutor, decides what charges are filed against Whitley County's accused. He or a deputy prosecutor then takes the case into court.

Nearly as much time is spent supporting or assisting the victims of crimes in the county. The prosecutor's office oversees three victim assistance programs. In the program, a staff member answers victims' questions, explains their legal rights and how the court system works. The victims do not decide what punishment is sought against their perpetrators, but their opinions are considered.

The prosecutor's office is located in the courthouse. Phone: 260-244-3000.

Probation Department

Persons arrested for drunk driving, minor in possession of alcohol, contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and others are the types of crimes that often land a person in the probation department.

Chief Probation Officer Edward Beber and the rest of the department work closely with the courts,

prosecutor's office and sheriff's department.

For the judges, probation department officers do pre-sentence investigation reports and gives the judges their recommendations. That entails checking into the defendant's family history, schooling, health and criminal record.

When probation is the condition of a sentence, the officers monitor the individual's progress on the job, or drug/alcohol programs the probationer is completing.

Probation can be given in lieu of jail time, in addition to a jail sentence or after the person has already served time.

County Sheriff

Sheriff for Whitley County is Jason Spencer.

A county law enforcement officer is an officer of the court. Everything that comes to the court system is handled by the sheriff and his deputies. One of those functions is serving warrants, and another is serving civil papers.

The sheriff also conducts auctions to satisfy civil judgements and enforces court-ordered protective orders.

The county sheriff is responsible for running the county jail, where not only police officers, but dispatchers, jail officers, cooks, secretaries and maintenance people work. Transporting prisoners is also a large part of the sheriff's job.

Then there's the job of enforcing the law. Sheriff's deputies respond to any call within the county limits.

The Whitley County Jail is located at 711 Opportunity Drive in Columbia City. Phone: 260-244-7119.

Emergency Management

The emergency management agency takes on the responsibility of planning for emergencies. More specifically, the job of the Emergency Management office involves coordinating resources in the event of an emergency, such as a tornado or severe thunderstorm.

The department is led by Edward Scott. Emergency Management keeps a county emergency plan, which includes phone numbers of doctors, chemists, excavators – anyone whose services might be needed in the event of an emergency.

All information is made available to fire service personnel and other government agencies.

The office also keeps on hand a supply of emergency equipment such as generators, floodlights,

pumps and hazardous material protection suits. Another function of the office is keeping an inventory of all the hazardous chemicals in the county.

The office is located at 101 W. Market St. in Columbia City. Phone: 260-248-3167.

County Coroner

The primary role of the coroner is to identify the body; determine the cause of death; and determine the manner of death.

If autopsies are needed, the coroner orders autopsies be performed in Fort Wayne. An autopsy is a detailed examination of a dead body to determine the cause of death. In Indiana, only a certified pathologist is allowed to perform autopsies.

Enhanced 911

Whitley County's 911 system is handled by dispatchers. Janelle Schmitt is the director of the communications department/dispatch center.

Dispatchers are able to direct the call to the appropriate agency within seconds so emergency aid can quickly be provided.

The enhanced part of the system amounts to a computer that automatically tells the dispatcher information about the household where the call was placed.

Highway Department

The Whitley County Highway Department is in

charge of the upkeep for 640 miles of roads.

Workers plow snow and drop sand and salt in the winter. They'll find potholes in the spring and chip-and-seal roads in the summer.

Whenever the highway department employees have time, they'll clean up brush alongside roads and do berm work.

Veterans Service Officer

The job of the veterans service officer is to serve as a liaison between veterans and the state and federal agencies.

They advise and help veterans or their dependents in presenting disability, insurance or pension claims for benefits; evaluates and determines validity of claims by reviewing legislation, regulations and precedents and studies the veteran's medical report and service history; obtains the claimant's power of attorney and prepares claim forms and briefs and assembles pertinent evidence; requests a hearing before government boards and presents a brief and he reviews the board's decision for grounds for appeal; advises veterans on insurance, vocational and other matters, working in cooperation with the Veterans Administration and other government agencies; and participates in civil functions, such as panel discussions to inform the public of services rendered and rights and benefits of

Cooperative Extension Service

The Whitley County Cooperative Extension Service is one of 92 offices in Indiana, one in each county.

Todd Geiger is the County Extension Director. John Woodmansee is the Purdue Extension Educator in Whitley County.

The offices are a partnership of federal, state and county funds and are the extension of Purdue University, the state's land grant.

Whitley County pays for office space and general operating expenses and signs a contractual agreement with Purdue University for Extension Educators. Purdue University provides a computer line, access to specialists nationwide and research based educational materials.

The purpose of Purdue Extension — Whitley County is to provide educational programs and resources in the areas of community and leadership development, health and human sciences, agriculture and natural resources, 4-H youth development and family nutrition program.

Purdue Extension and their engagement programs help the people of Indiana, the nation and the world improve their lives and

livelihoods.

The office is located on the lower floor of the Whitley County Government Center, 220 W. Van Buren St., Columbia City. Phone: 260-244-7615.

Health Department

The department keeps accurate records of all births occurring in Whitley County and records adoptions.

Death certificates are also filed with the health department.

The county's sanitarians are responsible for restaurant and food service inspections and the county's environmental health.

The Health Department issues permits for new wells and septic systems, or for

repairs of existing systems.

Sanitarians also work with other agencies on matters of environmental concern.

The county immunization clinic is open to all residents of the county, regardless of income. Whitley County children can receive free immunizations for a number of diseases, including diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, measles and mumps. The department also conducts adult travel immunizations.

Health Officer is Dr. Mark Burkett, M.D. Director and Environment Health Specialist is Scott Wagner. The office is located in the government center. Phone: 260-248-3121.

Soil and Water Conservation

The function of the district is to provide information about what water and related natural resource conservation; identify and prioritize local soil and water resource concerns and connect land users to sources of education, technical and financial assistance to implement conservation practices and technologies.

The mission statement is "to promote soil conservation and water quality in Whitley County both rural and urban land. To educate people of the county about water quality issues and motivate them to adopt the use of soil and water conservation practices."

Staff members include Jon Gotz and Nadean Lamle. The office is located at 788 W. Connexion Way, Suite C, in Columbia City. Phone: 260-244-6266 Ext. 3

Township Government

Trustees in Whitley County have three main duties. They maintain cemeteries, administer township relief funds and are the fiscal body of the township.

Each township advisory board approves the annual report and budget, and is the fiscal body of the township. There can be no fire stations built, property purchased or large equipment purchased without the board's approval.

Township levy property taxes to fund the township programs. Many township provide recreation opportunities and help pay for such things as 4-H leaders, park programs and community buildings.

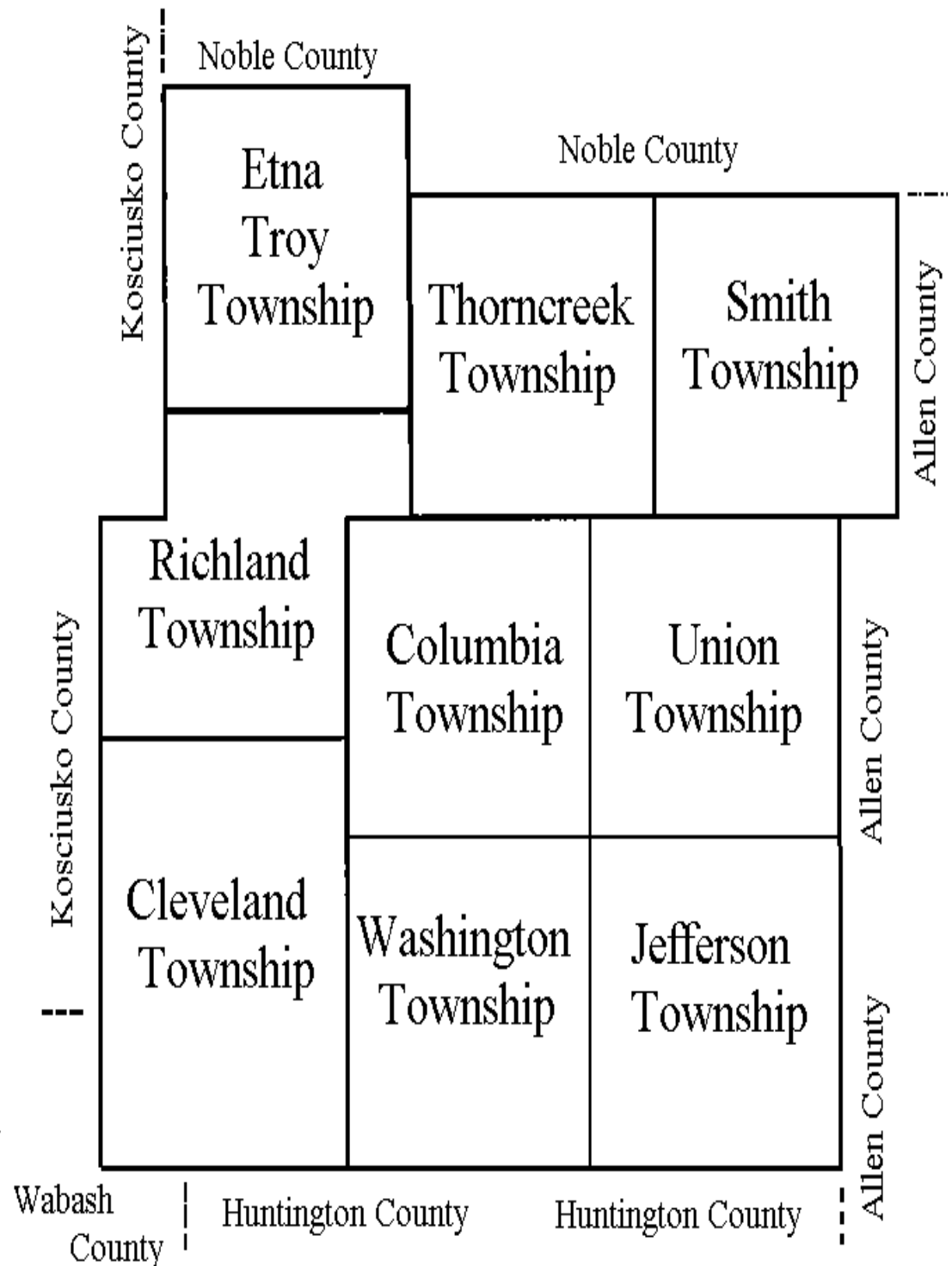

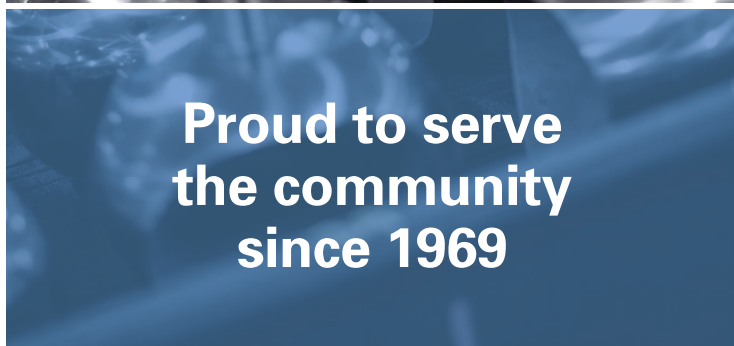

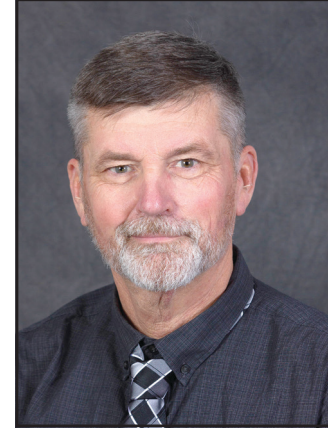

Columbia City Common Council

The Columbia City Common Council is the governing body of Columbia City. It has the power to enact ordinances, set tax rates, run the city utilities and make appointments to city boards.

Most importantly it is the city's fiscal body. The council sets the city budget each year, determines the tax rate and spends the tax money once the state approves the rate.

It votes on such matters as new programs, street name changes, asks for grants, asks for utility rate changes or forms new advisory boards.

The Common Council meets the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6 p.m in City Hall.

Board of Public Works and Safety

A much smaller governing

body than the Common Council, the Board of Public Works is the manager of the city's affairs and projects.

A three-member board, one of whom is the mayor, meets to consider such things as personnel matters, work on city facilities, study for city programs and claims for outstanding city bills.

The board consists of Mayor Ryan Daniel, Councilman Dan Weigold and resident Lisa Smith. It meets the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 5 p.m. in City Hall.

Columbia City has a Plan Commission, Board of Zoning Appeals, Housing Authority, Tree Board, Park Board, Utility Board Redevelopment Commission and Arts Commission.

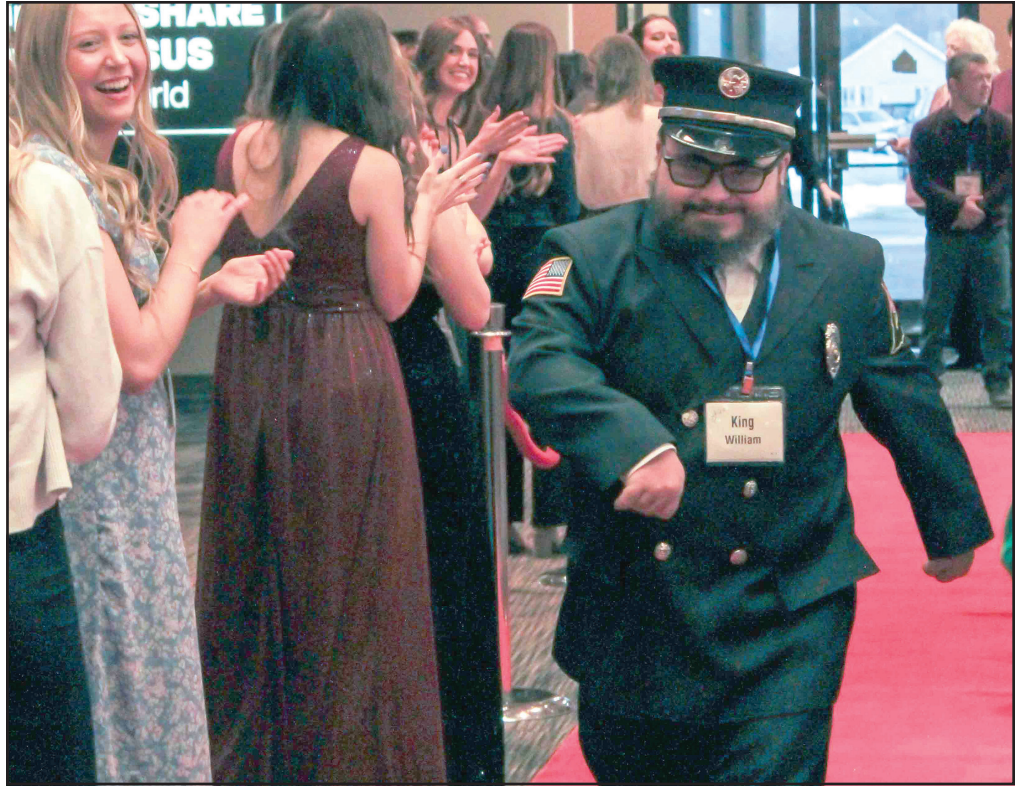

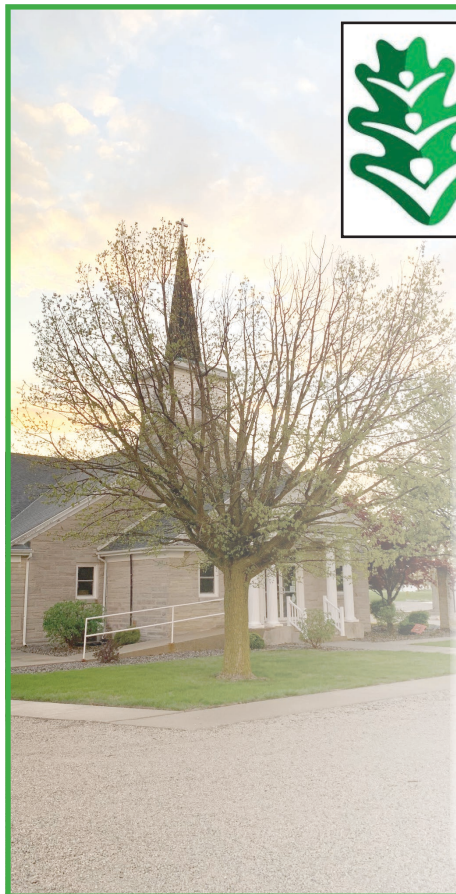
