I also covered a Defiance, Ohio, native in Greg Kampe about 10 years into a coaching run that is still ongoing at the very same school in the Detroit suburb of Rochester, Mich. At the time, the only good shots in his mind were beyond the arc and in the paint. Now,

he loves the zone defense as much as John Chaney did and loves making relentless non-conference schedules for paydays and lifetime experiences.

I'm glad to see Brooks Miller move up to the NCAA Division I ranks to another alma mater of mine, Central Michigan University. He is the associate men's basketball coach for the Chippewas and new head coach Andy Bronkema. I enjoyed covering him and his Trine University men's basketball teams over his 14 seasons in Angola, consistently developing quality young men as well as quality basketball players.

What's "Yes 'Cers" to many of you is "Yessirrr!" to me. The earlier phrase is an Indiana Pacers thing, and this state had very good reason to be excited about the Pacers making The NBA Finals. 

## Young Cougar girls hungry to compete

ALBION — It will be the voungest Central Noble girls basketball team coach Sam Malcolm has had in his four seasons at the helm. However, he thinks his Cougars has a lot of fight in them.

"We just want to be competitive," Malcolm said. "Like Remember the Titans, we want to let other teams know that they played us.'

CN went 13-11 overall last season, including 8-2 in the Northeast Corner Conference. It opened this season with a convincing 45-25 win at Bishop Luers on Nov. 8.

The Cougars only bring back a couple girls with significant varsity experience in 6-foot senior Grace Swank and 5-9 junior guard-forward Kavdintz Bales.

Swank averaged 9.7 points and 9.4 rebounds per game last season in earning KPC Media All-Area honors.

"You can't ask for a better person than Grace Swank," Malcolm said. "The sky is the limit with Kaydintz."

The rest of the Central Noble rotation includes 5-11 senior Austen McGlothlin, 6-foot sophomore guard-forward Jaylee Slone, sophomore guard Suryha Steele and freshmen Cora Mault and Gwen Swank, Grace's sister.

Slone had 18 points in her first varsity start against Luers. She can play inside and out. Bales added 14 points in the victory over the Knights.

'The younger girls are very enjoyable to coach," Malcolm said. "Cora is a track athlete who loves basketball. She's very dedicated."

"McGlothlin will be a good role player for us."

McGlothlin has been home-schooled and is a talented actress. She will play Cinderella in CN's musical.

## Central Noble boys making progress

ALBION — A younger Central Noble boys basketball team has made a lot of progress in the offseason in hopes of having a second half similar last season.

The Cougars won 11 out of 12 games after playing in the Northeast Corner Conference Tournament last season, then battled Westview in the Class 2A Westview Sectional final before losing to the Warriors 52-44.

CN finished 14-11, and 5-5 in the NECC. Coach Ben Lemmon's Cougars have moved on from losing four starters from that squad.

"It'll be a tough year in the conference. But we have a chance to make surprises," said Lemmon, whose third season at the helm starts on Wednesday night at Woodlan. "I like how we play.

"We had fun this summer learning how to play together," he continued. "I think this team is pretty unselfish. I like how we move the ball.

"We have some size, but not much. We have to box out and rebound as a

The lone returning starter is senior guard Nick Freeman, who averaged a little over eight points per game last season. He played football for the first time this fall and had 36 receptions for 715 yards and six touchdowns.

"Nick had fun with it (football)," Lemmon said. "He showcased his skills. He can really jump and we're excited to use that on the court."

A couple other key guys had good fall seasons running cross country in seniors Kyle Knafel and Keegan

Knight. Knafel ran in the Indiana High School Athletic Association State Finals in Terre Haute, and Knight also helped the Cougar boys qualify for the New Haven Regional as a team.

"Kyle spent a lot of time on his game and spent a lot of time shooting," Lemmon said.

Other Cougars taking on key varsity roles are senior guard Landen Burkhart, junior guard Jerrick Deter and sophomore guard Marek Malcolm.

"Landen is a feisty guard. He gets after it defensively and can shoot it," Lemmon said. "Jerrick is a kid with a motor. He rebounds well, plays with physicality, and is a good passer."

## Young Churubusco girls hope to improve

CHURUBUSCO — Big changes are coming to the Churubusco High School girls basketball team in 2025-26 as the Eagles adjust to the loss to graduation of two longtime standouts.

Guards Bridget Timbrook and Brooklyn Sinclair were four-year starters and accounted for more than half of the Eagles 39.2 points per game last season.

Second-year coach Dawn Kock, a former Carroll assistant, is working on changing the culture in Turtle Town and has several key returning players back from last year.

Busco was 8-14 in 2024-25 (2-8 Northeast Corner Conference) and advanced to the Class 2A Sectional 35 final before losing to a loaded Eastside team that lost in

the semi-state finals to Rensselaer Central.

Senior guard Patty Wiggs returns. She averaged 7.5 points per game a year ago and will anchor the Eagle offense. Kailin Foote is the other returning senior. She was somewhat limited last season due to an injury, missing about half the year.

Key returners for the Eagles include sophomore guard Phoenix Smith, junior guard Nola Bianski and freshman guard Brynn Lortie.

"We're young and inexperienced at the varsity level," Kock said. "We'll continue to build."

This group hasn't played together, Koch added, so the development of team chemistry will be a work in progress for awhile.

## Eagle boys look to take steps forward

CHURUBUSCO — As Churubusco High School head boys basketball coach Gabe Garman starts his third season guiding the Eagles, a culture change has taken root.

Now Garman and his staff want to see those changes start manifesting themselves in wins on

The Eagles were 9-16 in 2023-24 and 9-15 a year ago. They advanced to the Class 2A Westview Sectional title game in 2023 before falling to the Warriors, 51-39.

The Eagles are buoyed in 2025-26 by four returning letterwinners: seniors Carson Tonkel, Manny Serrano and Christian Behling and junior Miles Pommer.

Weston Ott, a key player for the Eagles the past two seasons who provided both scoring and defensive muscle, elected not to come out for basketball as a senior.

Ott, a state runner-up in both the shot put and discus, officially signed to compete in track and field at Notre Dame on Nov. 12. He will compete in the throwing events for the Fighting Irish.

Ott provided 8.2 points and 7.7 rebounds per game last season, so replacing his scoring and rebounding will be a tall task for the Eagles.

The 2025-26 Churubusco roster also includes juniors Colt Singleton and Caiden Malcolm and

Josiah Morales, a senior transfer guard from Carroll, will be a newcomer for the Eagles.



"We want to put ourselves in position to compete for championships consistently. Last year was a good year

The Railroaders are more battle-tested.

"The experience last year playing in two championship games (East Noble holiday tournament, Northeast Corner Conference Tournament) and the sectional semifinal, we hope the experience pays off," Traylor said. "The moments were too big for us. They were new to us, we'd never been there.

"Our guys are hungry for it. They know there are expectations, but we've told them that pressure and expectations are a privilege and not a right. These guys understand that and they need to strive for that."



# Warrior girls want to take next step

EMMA — Last season was a pretty good one for the Westview High School girls basketball team.

The Warriors took some major steps forward, improving from 5-19 in 2023-24 to 11-12 a year ago.

Warrior coach Ryan Yoder, in his sixth season, has his entire team back and is optimistic about the 205-26 campaign. Westview was off to a 2-1 start at press time.

The Warriors lost just two seniors off last year's team: Morgan Riegsecker (3.6 points per game) and Karis Weinberg (6.9 ppg).

Westview returns a good, solid core in 2025-26, led by junior forward Maddie Grossman (8.9 ppg last season), senior forward Bre Cory (8.6 ppg), senior forward Janissa Lehman (7.5 ppg), senior guard JJ Whetstone (5.7 ppg), and junior guard Olivia Boontrager (5.7 ppg).

"We have a level of experience we haven't had in the past," Yoder said. "This past summer looked a little different because we already knew a lot of what we were doing, so we were able to start making adjustments."

The Warriors will have inside

depth with Grossman and Cory. Having two posts is going to be a new experience for Yoder, but it's one he's ready to embrace.

"They work well together, both pass and rebound well," Yoder said.

Cory is averaging about 13 points per game early and Grossman is scoring about 10 points per contest.

Cory can step out and knock down a jumper when called for, Yoder said.

"We also have some girls who can get to the basket," Yoder said. "That's the dance we're figuring out right now"

Morgan Grossman, a sophomore and Maddie's younger sister, is a key newcomer who will see significant minutes off the bench, as will sophomore guard Gloria Miller.

Yoder said the key thing for his team to figure out is how to knuckle down in the closing minutes of games.

"It comes down to a couple of key possessions late," Yoder said.

The Warriors were 5-6 in the Northeast Corner Conference a year ago, so Yoder would like to see his team improve that mark and get into the top tier of the league with teams like Eastside, Angola and Central Noble.

# Westview boys loaded for another run

EMMA — For prep basketball excellence and consistency here in our little corner of northeast Indiana, it's hard to beat the Westview Warrior boys.

The Warriors have won three sectional titles under current head coach Chandler Prible, who's now entering his fourth season guiding the Warriors. Prible is 55-23 in Emma.

Not a bad start to a career for any Indiana high school boys basketball coach – let alone a Westview coach.

Prible's Warriors look to be primed for another run in 2025-26, with a key core back from last season, including senior guard Daniel Yoder, junior guard Austin Schlabach, senior forward Kaden Grau, junior forward Kaine Reinhold and senior Brett Springer.

Schlabach is the Warriors' leading returning scorer.

Hudson Yoder, a sophomore guard, will be one of those guys along with freshman guard Bryce Yoder. Cooper Schwartz, a freshman guard, will be another player who will split time.

"We're in a really good place right now," Prible said. "We want to build on that this year."

Winning a regional is a major goal this season for the Warriors, who fell to Jimtown 56-40 in the Class 2A Triton Regional last season.

Prible likes this year's Warrior squad's balance.

"We're guard heavy," Prible said. "But this is probably the best combination we've had of guys who can attack the basket and guys who are good shooters."

Defense will be an area for the guards to work on, Prible added.

As far as the Northeast Corner Conference, the Warriors were 9-1 to go with their 18-8 overall mark last season, winning both the regular season and conference tournament hardware.

Prible said he expect Fairfield and Garrett to both be strong, along with Angola.

"We'd like to think we're going to be in that mix to compete for another conference championship," Prible said.

The Warriors open the 2025-26 season Wednesday night in their annual lidlifter with Bethany Christian at the Menno Lands just outside of Goshen.


