CIRCUMSTANCES OF DEATH

On September 11, 2025, Border Patrol agents located skeletal remains in a desert area. Tohono O'Odham Police Department recovered the remains on October 1, 2025.

IDENTIFICATION

The decedent is identified via dental and circumstantial information.

The remains are received in an unsealed white pouch.

EXTERNAL EXAMINATION

Available for examination on October 2, 2025 is a completely skeletonized incomplete set of skeletal remains as well as brown hair. The remains are soiled with dirt and plant debris. The skeletal remains consist of cranium, mandible, vertebrae, long bones, clavicle, scapula, sternum, pelvic bones, ribs, patella, and ankle bone. The remains are sunbleached. There is surgical hardware in the mandible as well as dental work of the mandibular teeth. There is surgical hardware in the maxilla as well as dental work of the maxillary teeth. The teeth are incomplete. See separate Forensic Anthropology report for further information.

Additional recovered remains are examined on October 14, 2025. These additional remains consist of sacrum with articulated lumbar vertebra, long bones, metatarsal, scapula, ribs, hair, clothing, and Mexican currency (5 peso coin). The remains are soiled with dirt and plant debris. See separate Forensic Anthropology report for further information.

SPECIMENS

At the time of the examination, no specimens are retained.
