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NOTICE OF CLAIM PURSUANT TO A.R.S. § 12-821.01

Sergio Chavira and Luz Encinas, a married couple, hereby submit their notice of claim against Flowing Wells Unified School District No. 8 of Pima County, Arizona (hereinafter referred to as “FWUSD”) pursuant to A.R.S. § 12-821.01¹ for the wrongful death of their minor daughter, Arlette Chavira, as a result of the negligence of FWUSD, Centennial Elementary School, and their employees, staff and agents.

I. LIABILITY

As the Board is deeply aware, on November 17, 2023, nine-year-old Arlette Chavira and her seven-year-old sister, Jane Doe Chavira, had just finished school for the day at Centennial Elementary School (hereinafter referred to as “Centennial Elementary”). As was their usual routine after school, they met up with each other and began walking across the courtyard toward Flowing Wells Junior High School (hereinafter referred to as the “Junior High”) to meet their mother, Luz, who worked at the Junior High with special education students. What began as a regular Friday afternoon turned into a parent’s worst nightmare, a sister’s perpetual horror, and the last day of young Arlette’s life.

Arlette and her seven-year-old sister liked to help out at school. They would frequently give the maintenance staff a hand with all sorts of tasks.

On November 17, 2023, at approximately 2:15 P.M., as they were leaving school, the little girls saw Centennial Elementary’s Maintenance Supervisor/Manager, Ramon Gonzalez, outside near the rolling metal gate near the dumpsters on the west side of the school. Seeing that the gate was still open, and knowing that the gate was supposed to be closed after school, young Arlette and her sister asked Mr. Gonzalez if they could help him close it, as they had done many times before. Mr. Gonzalez accepted their offer to help and had them pull on the heavy gate with him to roll it closed.

As Mr. Gonzalez, Arlette and her sister were pulling on the metal gate, it rolled past the “stop bar,” came off its tracks and violently fell on Arlette, striking her in the face and head and crushing her skull. Arlette’s sister was able to jump out of the way just in time to avoid getting hit by the gate, as she watched the gate crush Arlette’s head. Upon information and belief, Mr. Gonzalez was not injured by the gate.

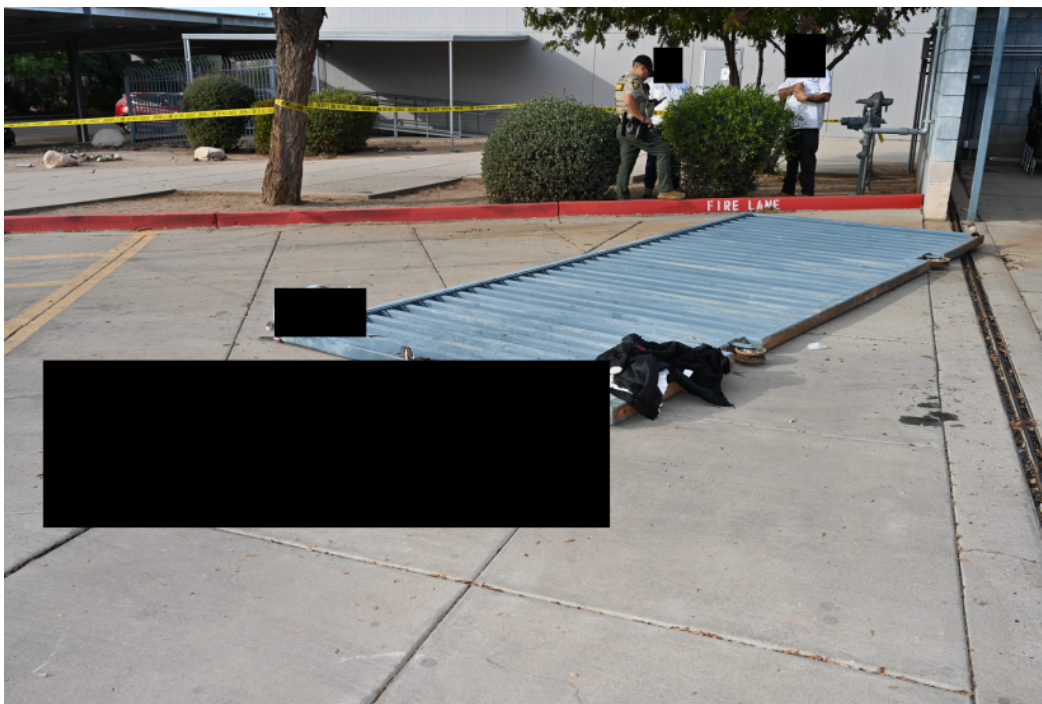
The Pima County Sheriff’s Department (hereinafter referred to “PCSD”) responded to the scene. A redacted copy of the PCSD Incident Report (hereinafter referred to as the “PCSD Report”) is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Exhibit “A”

Below are photographs obtained from PCSD depicting the scene of the incident and the subject gate laying on the ground after Arlette had been removed from the scene:



The PCSD Report indicates that Mr. Gonzalez told investigating deputies that he tried to lift the gate off of Arlette but was unable to do so by himself. The PCSD Report also indicates that Mr. Gonzalez asked nearby fathers of other students for help lifting the gate off of Arlette while someone else called 911.

A witness who tried to help before paramedics arrived reported that Arlette was bleeding profusely from her nose and mouth and was making “a choking type of noise as if she was choking on the blood that was in her mouth.” *See* Exhibit “A,” PCSD Report, page 24 of 32. Arlette’s mother Luz quickly arrived at the scene, as she worked next door at the Junior High.

Paramedics arrived at the scene of the incident and urgently transported Arlette by ambulance to Banner-University Medical Center Main Campus (hereinafter referred to as the “hospital”). Luz rode with her dying daughter in the ambulance and was reported as being in hysterics as the paramedics tried to save Arlette’s life. While on route to the hospital, Arlette is reported to have coded and the paramedics had to shock her three times with negative response. The paramedics gave chest compressions and continued performing chest compressions even while wheeling her on the gurney into the Emergency Room.

Once Arlette was being taken inside the hospital, Luz called her husband Sergio to give him the horrific news. Sergio rushed to pick up his traumatized seven-year-old daughter, who was still at the school, and then raced to the hospital to be with Arlette and Luz.

Sergio would not make it to the hospital in time to see Arlette before she passed away. Arlette was declared dead at approximately 3:06 P.M., less than an hour after trying to help Mr. Gonzalez close the gate.

When Sergio met his wife at the hospital, he was given the devastating news that Arlette had died from her injuries. The couple went into the hospital room to be with their deceased nine-year-old daughter, with her face and head still covered in blood.

This deadly, devastating event was entirely preventable. Mr. Gonzalez clearly knew that the subject gate’s stop bar was in disrepair and posed a hazard, as he had submitted a maintenance request to repair the gate on November 8, 2023 – *nine days* before the deadly incident. A copy of said maintenance request is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit “B”.

Mr. Gonzalez confirmed to PCSD that “he saw there was a weld that had a crack on it, so he submitted a work order to the main district since that was not inside his capable realm It had not been completed yet. He did not realize it was that bad.” *See* Exhibit “A,” PCSD Report, page 23 of 32. Mr. Gonzalez further indicated to PCSD that “he did

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not even hear or see the stopper hit the stop area, it just went past the stop bar when the incident happened.” *Id.*

Below are photographs obtained from PCSD taken at the scene which depict the bent stop bar on the gate:



The significant rust on the stop bar as depicted in these photographs demonstrates that the gate and stop bar were clearly in disrepair for a significant amount of time before the date of Arlette's death.

FWUSD was negligent and careless by failing to repair the subject gate and its stop bar before it became a deadly hazard and/or by failing to order that the gate not be used while it was in disrepair. In addition, Mr. Gonzalez was negligent and careless by failing to ensure that the subject gate was repaired and in safe working order before allowing Arlette, her sister or any other students near the gate.

Mr. Gonzalez should have told Arlette and her sister to stay away from the subject gate. Mr. Gonzalez should have stopped the little girls from going anywhere near the gate, as he knew it was in disrepair. Instead, Mr. Gonzalez encouraged Arlette and her sister to pull on the heavy gate, which put them directly in harm's way as the gate came off its tracks and crushed Arlette's skull.

The negligence and carelessness of FWUSD, Centennial Elementary and their employees, agents and staff, including, but not limited to, Ramon Gonzalez, as described herein and in the attached documents, proximately caused Arlette Chavira's wrongful death and the resulting damages.

II. DAMAGES

FWUSD has many responsibilities, but its main duty is to protect its students. FWUSD egregiously failed to protect nine-year-old Arlette Chavira.

The magnitude of the loss to Sergio and Luz when Arlette was killed is virtually impossible to comprehend. Their loss can only truly be understood by someone who has lost a young child.

Arlette was the second-youngest of Sergio and Luz's five children, who ranged in age from seven to sixteen years old on the date of Arlette's death. Arlette always looked up to her older sister, and eventually got to experience the joy of being a role model when she, herself, became a big sister to the family's youngest child – the little girl who watched the gate crush Arlette's skull.

The Chaviras were always a very close-knit family. Although Sergio and Luz make a modest living, Arlette and her family loved going on vacations, sightseeing, playing in the snow when they would travel somewhere experiencing winter weather, dressing up for special events, and celebrating holidays and birthdays together. Sergio and Luz taught Arlette to be active in their church and community, as they have taught all their children.

Sergio and Luz met over 20 years ago and instantly fell in love. Ever since their first child was born they have been completely devoted to their growing family. Sergio has worked construction for several years and was the family's sole breadwinner while Luz raised their children.

Luz started working again a few years ago once their youngest child, Arlette's seven-year-old sister who was helping close the gate when it crushed Arlette, became old enough to go to school. Luz first took a job working in the cafeteria at the Junior High because it allowed her to walk with her two youngest children – Arlette and Arlette's younger sister – to and from school each day, since Centennial Elementary is next door to the Junior High. Luz eventually got a promotion at the Junior High and started working with special needs students as a teacher's aide, which gave her a great sense of fulfillment.

After Arlette's death, Luz and Sergio decided to take their seven-year-old daughter who witnessed the traumatizing incident out of Centennial Elementary. Now Luz walks to and from work at the Junior High alone and is reminded every day about the utterly horrible way in which her nine-year-old daughter died.

Arlette was a bright young girl who got good grades and was on the honor roll. She also loved athletics and ran on the school's cross country team.

Arlette loved to help others and took pride in her school. Not only would she help the maintenance staff with tasks such as lowering the American flag, moving traffic cones and closing the gate that ultimately took her life, but she would also help her teachers tidy up the classroom.

Arlette's funeral was held on Thanksgiving. The holiday season will forever be a painful reminder of what their family has lost, instead of a time of joyful celebration.

Put simply, the Chavira family will never be the same after losing young Arlette.

In addition to Sergio and Luz's tremendous losses and the compensatory damages to which they are entitled as a result of Arlette's wrongful death, Sergio and Luz have both also sustained economic losses and "special damages" for which they are entitled to reimbursement. These special damages include each parent's respective loss of earnings for the time they were unable to work as a result of Arlette's death. Sergio has sustained lost earnings of approximately \$20,000.00. Luz has sustained lost earnings of approximately \$25,000.00. Sergio and Luz's special damages also include Arlette's funeral and burial expenses, which are approximately \$10,000.00. Their special damages also include Arlette's medical expenses related to the incident, the total of which is still unknown, but which includes \$1,721.23 billed by Northwest Fire District for the paramedic and ambulance services provided.

III. SUM CERTAIN DEMAND

Because the statute requires a sum certain to be set forth, and based upon the entirely preventable nature of this horrific incident were it not for the egregious, negligent conduct and failures of FWUSD and its employees, agents and staff, we hereby demand Fifteen Million and no/100 (\$15,000,000.00) Dollars to settle Sergio Chavira and Luz Encinas' claims against FWUSD for the wrongful death of their daughter, Arlette Chavira.

Obviously, Jane Doe Chavira has an independent claim for her own personal injuries and damages, including emotional distress, caused by FWUSD's negligence described herein. Because she is a minor and is still receiving mental health treatment, it is premature and inappropriate to present a demand for her at this time. Settlement of her parents' claims related to Arlette's wrongful death does not affect Jane Doe Chavira's future claim.

It is our understanding that FWUSD is fully aware of this incident. It is likely that FWUSD has additional information and evidence that supports their culpability. Please also let this letter serve as continued notice to FWUSD to immediately identify, preserve, and not alter or destroy, any documents, tangible things, information, data, and electronically stored information ("ESI"), and public records in your possession or control that relate to any of the matters raised in this notice of claim letter, including personnel and disciplinary records for any and all employees, agents and staff involved in the subject incident, including, but not limited to, Ramon Gonzalez. ESI includes but is not limited to emails, instant messages, texts, videos, photographs, surveillance, voicemail messages, and social media posts/messages. Failure to protect and preserve any relevant information and ESI could result in a jury instruction regarding spoliation of evidence.

If you do not think the information provided in this notice, or the manner in which it was served upon you, meets the requirements of A.R.S. §12-821.01, please advise the undersigned no later than May 6, 2024, so that we can correct any deficiencies.

This claim is being executed pursuant to Rule 80(c), Ariz. R. Civ. P., and is being made under the penalty of perjury to comply with any rule requiring that "a matter to be supported, evidenced, established, or proved by a sworn written declaration, verification, certificate, statement, oath, or affidavit."

On 11/17/23, at approximately 1423 hours, while on patrol in the Foothills District, I responded to the area of

at [REDACTED], in reference to a rescue follow-up call. The call text stated a panicked female was on the line requesting an ambulance for an unconscious female child, who was bleeding from her face.

With the information I received, I advised Communications I would be responding Code Three, with my emergency lights and sirens.

Upon my arrival to the school, we were being flagged down on the west side of the school. Deputies rushed to the crowd of people, and Northwest Fire District (NWFD) also arrived on scene.

There were numerous people around the child, and I observed a large puddle of blood and a younger female, unconscious, with what appeared to be a severe head injury.

I began asking everyone to stand back if they were not medical personnel, to give the paramedics space to assess the situation.

I began taking deputy photos of the surroundings. I observed a large, heavy-scale gate on the ground.

I was on scene for approximately five minutes, when the paramedics loaded the child into the ambulance.

As they were doing that, the mother arrived on scene. I asked if she was the mother and she stated yes. She was later identified as Luz Encinas (DOB *****

She provided me with a phone number at a later time of

*****.

As the ambulance was taking off, Ms. Encinas rode in the ambulance with the child, who was later identified as Arlette Chavira (DOB *****

The ambulance responded to Banner-University Medical Center main campus, riding Code Three as well, with their emergency lights and sirens. I followed behind the ambulance, and arrived at Banner-University Medical Center main campus at a later time.

As we arrived, the ambulance was taking the child out of the ambulance, and Ms. Encinas got out as well.

I went over to Ms. Encinas and gave her a hug for comfort, and walked her into the emergency room.

Banner-University Medical Center hospital staff directed us to a separate room, which appeared to be a conference room, keeping the mother separate from the child, as they were attempting life recovery methods to save her life.

I spoke with Ms. Encinas, and she stated she was on the way to pick up her child from the school, and stated she also had another child who went to the school.

She called her husband on the phone, letting him know what happened. I spoke to the husband for a brief moment. He mainly spoke Spanish, so I was only able to give him clear and concise facts on what was currently happening at the hospital. He advised me he would be at the hospital in approximately 30 minutes, after he was done picking up the other child.

The hospital allowed Ms. Encinas to go to Trauma One, where her daughter was being operated on.

As we were waiting outside Trauma One, a doctor, Doctor Adam Nelson, advised Ms. Encinas they had been conducting cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) for approximately 20 minutes with no pulse, and she had dilated pupils. They had to stop due to the brain not having enough oxygen, and she would be brain dead if they were to bring her back.

The time of death was at 1505 hours, pronounced by Doctor Adam Nelson.

As medical staff cleared out of Trauma One, I advised Forensics to come to the hospital to take pictures.

Please see other deputies' and Detective's reports for their involvement.

Afterwards, I remained outside, but did not receive any more information. I later cleared from the scene.

This concludes my involvement in this case.

NARRATIVE:

On 11-17-2023 at approximately 1545 hours, I responded to Trauma Room 1 at Banner Main Medical Center in reference to a hospital follow-up for a dead body. Upon my arrival I met with Deputy McEuen #9340 and Detective Gieron #1255. I began by taking photos of the victim's clothes, which had been cut off of the body. Then I took overall photos of the front and back of the body and closeups of the face. Then I took photos of the back of the head where the apparent injury was located. I cleared from the scene at approximately 1620 hours. NFI.

On 11/17/23, at 1421 hours, I was working as the School Resource Officer (SRO) at [REDACTED]. I was parked in a patrol car in the [REDACTED] parking lot, when I observed a rescue follow-up call come out at

which is [REDACTED], that is next door to the [REDACTED].

The reportee, from what I could understand, was Detective T. R. Reed #8138, who stated there was an unconscious female child with no pulse, bleeding from her face.

I immediately left the school parking lot and drove to [REDACTED], getting there within less than 30 seconds.

Upon arrival, I observed several people running toward the west side of the parking lot, which is on a back road, that has access to the back of both schools. I then observed a crowd of people gathered around the blue metal gate, which was now on the ground, by where the dumpsters area located for the school.

I observed a large amount of blood pooling, and several females kneeling over a student. I went to the three of them, and at that point I heard the Northwest Fire District (NWFED) engine was in the area.

I noted there was a massive amount of blood loss coming from a head wound on the student, who was later identified as Arlette Chavira.

I then ran back to my patrol car to get a compression bandage and ran back to the victim; however, at that point, Northwest Fire Department had arrived on scene in the parking lot, and I let them do their medical care first, before I did anything further.

Northwest Fire took over on scene and the victim, who had a massive head wound, was transported to Banner-University Medical Center main campus shortly after.

I was notified that her mother, Luz Encinas, was an employee at [REDACTED]. She had been notified, and was en route over to the school.

When Luz arrived on scene, Northwest Fire was in the process of getting Arlette

loaded up into the ambulance, and they then transported Arlette to Banner-University Medical Center main campus.

I then made a telephonic advisory to Sergeant J. E. Janes #7331 in reference to the incident. I also notified Sergeant E. C. Curtin #1154 from the Traffic Unit, due to the fact that it was an industrial accident.

I stood by and spoke with the Principal, Doctor Saulvy, to get information. From what he could determine, the Custodian was pushing the gate closed, when a part malfunctioned and it then fell over and struck Arlette in the head, causing the injury. The metal gate itself was very, very heavy, and extended for at least 15 to 20 feet in length.

I stood by until Sergeant Curtin arrived on scene, and once he and the Traffic Unit Investigators took over, I was no longer needed on scene, and I then left.

On 11/17/2023 while working as a Patrol Unit in the Foothills District I had responded to a call for service reference a Rescue Follow-Up at

█; █ within Pima County

The call text had advised that a female child was bleeding from her face and that CPR was started.

I arrived on scene after the subject had already been transported, at 1432 hours. I had then assisted with interviewing one of the staff members, as well as establishing the crime scene. I blocked off the immediate area using caution tape and a patrol vehicle, and began conducting scene security. I observed a large pool of blood underneath a large metal gate that looks like it had fallen, as well as a bloody backpack nearby.

After the scene had been secured, I had requested for Forensics to respond and process the scene. During that time I spoke with a staff member at the school who identified herself to me verbally as Christine McGee DOB *****. Christine stated that she had heard a loud crash, and when she went to investigate saw multiple people attempting to lift a large gate that had fallen, off of a juvenile female. She described the Juvenile as having a large amount of blood coming from her head, and I had observed that Christine also had blood on her hands. As for what had initially occurred, Christine was unsure.

After speaking with Christine I had stood by as scene security until I was informed that my assistance was no longer needed.

I had then cleared from the area. This concludes my involvement. NFI.

On 11/17/23 at approximately 1423 hours, I responded to a report of a rescue follow-up at [REDACTED] located at

The call text indicated that a panicked female was requesting an ambulance for an unconscious female child who was bleeding from the face; advised that there was no pulse and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) had been started.

Upon my arrival to the incident location, the victim had already been transported to Banner-University Medical Center. I positioned my patrol vehicle right in front of the crime scene, utilizing my patrol vehicle to wrap around caution tape, to mark off the crime scene for people to stay out of the area.

I then spoke to faculty members in order to look for victim's family members, due to the fact that there was still a family member present at the school. I then made contact with a school member who was identified verbally as Schreen Roboza-Davis. She pointed me out to one of the family members who was still at the school; in order to find a transport for that individual to go to the hospital with her family. Myself and Deputy G. M. Moseley #8695, escorted her outside of the school. Schreen was able to get in contact with other school members and advised me that there were two other boys at a high school, and another juvenile in the middle school, that needed to get picked up as well.

At that time, I was going to take the individual that was still at the elementary school, to go to the hospital. However, we were able to make contact with Sergio Chavira, who was the father of the victim, and the other children who still needed to be picked up. Sergio advised that he could pick up all of the children in the wife's vehicle that was still at the school.

At that time, I waited for Sergio to arrive. I then identified him by his Arizona driver's license. Sergio had all of the children accounted for and placed them into his vehicle. He then began to go to Banner-University Medical Center.

I then went back to the scene. I stood by as scene security, until Deputy R. Padilla #9436 was relieved of duty, where he was performing the crime scene log. He then passed the crime scene log over to me, where I documented people coming in and out of the crime scene. That crime scene log has been submitted into Evidence at the Pima County Sheriff's Department (PCSD) Foothills Substation under Evidence #JB1, being a Crime Scene Log.

I stood by on scene until my assistance was no longer needed.

reference a call with a child unconscious and bleeding from the head.

Upon my arrival, the paramedics were arriving on scene. I went to a large crowd of people. I observed a large gate, made completely of metal, on the floor, as if it had derailed. I also observed a student bleeding heavily from the head. The paramedics rendered aid.

I immediately started asking people that were around if they saw anything on how it happened. Everybody that I spoke to, stated that they had just heard the screaming of the child, and for somebody to get help. They all pointed to a maintenance worker in a white shirt that was already being talked to by another deputy. I then asked if we had contact information for the student and for the parents. I was told by staff, that the mother was already on her way. Once the mother arrived, I tried to calm her down, however, they were transporting the student to the hospital at that point and she went in the ambulance with them.

I was then advised that the student had a sister and a friend that were also present when the incident occurred. At that point, with the help of staff, I went to locate the sister by the name of [REDACTED]. Once with [REDACTED], I confirmed the mother's information and was tasked with getting her to the hospital with her mother. However, during that time, I was told that there were multiple other brothers and sisters who all went to a junior high, and high school, and that the father would be picking them up. I left D [REDACTED] with another deputy, who waited for the father to arrive on scene.

I made advisories to my on shift supervisor, Sergeant J. P. Siress #7341, and another deputy made all other advisories.

While on scene, I gathered that the two sisters, and friend, both helped the maintenance worker with putting up the flag and closing the gates to the school. However, today, they were closing the gate with the maintenance worker, and the gate had somehow gotten off of the tracks, and had fallen on the child. They had to lift the gate off of the child to begin to render aid.

I relayed all of that information to Sergeant E. C. Curtin #1154, once he arrived on scene. Shortly thereafter, I was relieved.

On 11/17/23, at approximately 1439 hours, while off duty, I was contacted telephonically by the Traffic Unit Supervisor Sergeant E. C. Curtin #1154. At that time, I was advised there was an industrial accident at [REDACTED] where a young female was injured by a steel gate and was seriously injured. She was being transported to Banner-University Medical Center, Main. Detective D. A. Caballero #7969 was going to the hospital and I was being directed to meet with Sergeant Curtin and Detective D. F. Mosman #6723 at the scene.

While en route to [REDACTED], I heard on the radio that the child was pronounced deceased at 1505 hours. The decedent was identified as Arlette Chavira
(DOB *****

Upon my arrival to the school, I was advised by Sergeant Curtin that there were multiple people standing by that may have witnessed the incident. Detective Mosman was interviewing a male subject that was manipulating the gate with the child. There was a group of staff members located near one of the school doors. I went and made contact with this group of people. Alexandra Davis
(DOB *****
advised she was the only one in this specific group of individuals that had any contact with Arlette. For exact details and verbiage, please refer to my body worn camera.

Ms. Davis advised me that she is a Physical Education (P.E.) teacher at the school and knew Arlette and her siblings very well. She also advised Arlette's mother works at [REDACTED] adjacent to the elementary school. She also advised that Arlette and her sister, who was also at the elementary school, would meet up when the school got out at approximately 1400 hours. They help the custodian with lowering flags and closing the gate.

Ms. Davis did not witness the incident and advised that Roxanne Martinez and the principal, Dr. Leslie Saulsby, were walking quickly from the front office through where she was located in the hallway, advising that a student was injured. The three of them went to help but the gate was already removed off of Arlette's body. Ms. Davis advised there was a lot of blood coming out of Arlette's mouth and nose. She believed there were gurgling and bubbling sounds where Arlette was unconscious and not speaking.

Upon Ms. Davis' arrival to the incident location, Arlette was lying on her left side and [REDACTED] was conducting cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) until paramedics arrived on scene. Once paramedics arrived on scene, Arlette was placed on a gurney. Her mother then arrived and went in the ambulance with her to the hospital.

Ms. Davis advised there were several people standing around them trying to help but she was unable to know who exactly witnessed the incident. Ms. Davis had no further information to add.

I then made contact with Roxanne Martinez, who verbally identified herself with a date of birth of [REDACTED].

Roxanne advised she works in the front office and she had received a phone call from Ramon, who is a custodian and maintenance supervisor at the school, stating that a student was injured and a gate had fallen on her. She grabbed the principal and went from the front office down the hallway where she asked Ms. Davis to come assist and they got to the incident area. She advised that Arlette was bleeding from the left side of her head. She was also lying on her left side at that time and blood was coming out of her mouth.

Once these interviews were conducted, I stood by with Detective Mosman while he operated the Small Unmanned Aircraft System (SUAS) to conduct flight mapping. I then used the Global Navigation Satellite System (GNSS) Leica to take Global Positioning System (GPS) coordinates of the four placards placed in the scene. After this, Forensics was conducting scans of the scene.

Another individual approached me. He verbally identified himself as [REDACTED]

(DOB *****)

He was a Spanish speaker and was having difficulty communicating with me. I contacted Detective Caballero by telephone and he placed him on speakerphone to speak with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] advised that he was picking up his son from school and heard a male yelling for help. He, along with several other parents, went to help lift the gate off of the young girl. He also advised that his son, [REDACTED], was next to him and was worried that they were a little traumatized. Peer Support was on scene and was able to speak with [REDACTED]. They exchanged contact information in case [REDACTED] needed to contact them for himself or his son.

Once all scans were completed on scene, I emptied the contents of Arlette's backpack which were photographed by the Forensic technician. I then placed them in a brown bag including books, nicknacks, supplies, a cell phone, one dollar bill, and some other miscellaneous items. The backpack itself had blood on the

exterior as well as the black puffy jacket that Arlette had been wearing which appeared to have been cut off, which was blood soaked. The black jacket and backpack were placed in a separate brown bag.

I went to Banner-University Medical Center, Main, Trauma #1, to deliver these items to Arlette's family. Upon my arrival, I was advised by hospital staff that they had already left the hospital. I had a phone number for Arlette's mother of *****.

A male answered the phone and advised he was Sergio, Arlette's father, and that they had just arrived home. I asked if it was okay for me to come deliver her belongings to their house in which he stated it was. I verified that they were at *****.

I then responded to their residence. Sergio was outside of the residence with several other people. He came to my patrol vehicle as I pulled up. I explained to him that I had collected and showed him the cell phone. He thanked me for bringing them to his house and took custody of all the belongings. He had no further questions for me at that time. I then cleared from the area.

NOTIFICATIONS:

- I was notified by Sergeant E. C. Curtin #1154 at approximately 1400 hours, about a fence that fell on a juvenile, located at [REDACTED] off of [REDACTED]. It was being called an industrial accident. Therefore, that fell under the area of the Traffic Unit. So, the Traffic Unit will be responding to investigate the scene.

INTERVIEWS:

- I interviewed Ramon Gonzalez
 - * I spoke to Ramon Gonzalez and I could clearly see that he worked for Flowing Wells Maintenance, as it said it on his shirt. Also, he informed me that he was the manager of the maintenance unit at Flowing Wells, specifically at that school, [REDACTED].

I talked to Ramon about what happened. He said typically the two girls, they were sisters, helped him after school. Their routine that they do was that the maintenance guy gets help closing those blue gates. The gate was a metal construction with vertical metal bars welded into the in seam with heavy metal for the frame. It was on a track system where it rolled in a groove on the ground designed to keep it in place. There were also two posts designed as stopper bars to stop the gate from going too far to go off track, and there were guide ways mounted on the wall, also on one side of the gate to guide it as the gate was closing, and they were painted blue.

Ramon said the little girls would help him close those gates. They had done it many times before with him. They would help him take down flags from the flag post, and they would then go inside, for him getting help from the two little girls, and they would get a snack. He would watch them walk to [REDACTED] where the mother worked and that was where they met up with the mother. They go across the court yard.

This day, what happened was that they were closing the gate. The two girls were helping to close it. They were going a little fast. Ramon did have his hands on the front to try to slow the pace down so they were not going so fast, so quickly. When he noticed that the gate went past the stopper bar and it was coming off the tracks, he started to yell get out of the way. The sister was able to get out of the way, but unfortunately, the other sister was not able to

get out of the way and the gate fell on top of her. The way he described it was that the gate was partitioned through the center of her body. So, as she was holding the gate, walking it closed, half the body was on the outside of the gate, and half of the body was on the inside, underneath the gate, when it fell on top of her.

Ramon tried to help out by lifting the gate, and was unable to. He started asking for help. He stated there were a few fathers who came over and helped him out in lifting the gate to get her out of there. At that point, life saving measures were being performed. Someone was already on 911, getting 911 started.

At that part, I noticed that there was a bar that was supposed to stick out horizontal from the vertical gate. I noted it appeared that either the welding or the metal crack were busted, and it was bent in a different position. I asked him about that since he was the maintenance person. He stated he noted it a couple of weeks ago, it would probably be about two to three weeks ago. He saw there was a weld that had a crack on it, so he submitted a work order to the main district since that was not inside his capable realm. They would have to get a specialist out to the school to have it done. It has not been completed yet. He did not realize it was that bad. He only noticed it was bent a little bit. He said he did not even hear or see the stopper hit the stop area, it just went past the stop bar when the incident happened.

- Another male
 - * Another male spoke broken English, where we needed a deputy who spoke Spanish to translate to get a good conversation started with him, and we did not want any misunderstandings between what we were asking and what he was telling us, so Detective D. A. Caballero #7969 spoke to him over the phone.

The brief conversation that I had with him, in trying to understand what he was saying, he was one of the fathers who went and helped with the gate to lift it up off of the little girl. The maintenance man was asking for help. Him, a friend, and a few other people went to go help. They were able to lift the gate up, and again, life saving measures were being performed. From my understanding in talking to him, he did not see the incident, he only heard what happened. Once he identified what exactly happened, he started to go over to help render aid. For further information about what he said, please refer to Detective Caballero.

- I interviewed [REDACTED]
 - * [REDACTED] stated she was at school picking her daughter up. She had a three year old, and she also had an older daughter with her. She heard a loud bang, and when she looked she also heard a kid screaming too. She then saw that

the little girl was underneath the gate, and a maintenance man asking for help as he was trying to lift the gate off.

████ informed me there were numerous people who were assisting in getting her out from under the gate. She stated the girl was bleeding profusely. She was bleeding from her nose and her mouth pretty badly. At that point, she was not responsive. She started performing life saving measures, cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), and she started having a choking type of noise as if she was choking on the blood that was in her mouth. Shortly after that, paramedics arrived on scene and took the little girl to the hospital.

I asked █████ if she knew that the little girl had passed, as it had already been released to the media, and the family already knew about that. She stated she did. I specifically asked her if she saw those two little girls helping the maintenance guy with the gate. Which she did not see that, she only heard the sound and then went over to help out. She had her three year old daughter with her, since her daughter was three years old, she tried to keep her daughter near, but tried to keep her oldest away since she said her oldest daughter was sensitive to that type of stuff. After everything, █████ then took her kids back home.

RESOURCES:

- Peer Support was on scene, and asked all involved individuals if they needed any type of help or assistance at that time. Phone numbers were passed out just in case Peer Support was needed for either department personnel, staff with the school, or any of the individuals who helped out. But from my understanding, the school had a mechanism in place to assist anyone who needed help, to help them out with that.

ON SCENE ACTIVITIES:

- When I arrived on scene, I interviewed witnesses who needed to be interviewed.
- I placed placards onto the ground to fly the drone to take overall photos of the scene. Once that was done the drone landed and the SD card was taken out. The photos were processed at a later time.

SCENE:

- When examining the scene, there were two what appeared to be heavy gates made out of metal. The two gates were on a track system. Each gate on the east side of a brick wall had two metal posts painted blue. Again, those acted as the

stoppers for the gate so they cannot go any further in or any further out. On both gates, there was a stopper bar that was horizontal to the gate, since the gate was vertical. It had wheels reset inside of them, so it could roll on the tracks that were imbedded into the concrete. The track looked like an angled iron metal that was reset into the concrete.

Both gates were almost identical. They had a ridge, or a guide to guide the gate that was bolted onto the wall. On the inside of the gate, it had a similar piece of metal that slid into the guide between the brick wall and that metal shelf to slide back and forth. Both gates were painted blue. On the backside they had a loop where a lock gets placed on it, and that was how the gates were locked. Just on the west side of the gate, there was a decline going downwards from that area, it was not a flat area.

SCENE CLEAN UP:

- After the scene was released, property was picked up and brought to the family. The fire department was also called back to do what was called a wash down. What they would do was that they would come back with their high pressured fire truck hose and spray down the blood area to try to cleanse the area. They would also use peroxide to try to dissipate the blood and then wash that area down. Once the fire department was done washing the area down, I went over and looked and could not see the area where it happened. They also moved the fence to try to get underneath it as well. The principal stated they were going to be taking care of the fence as well, getting that either inside or somewhere where it would not present a hazard to anyone walking by.

reference a rescue follow-up.

Call information indicated that an unconscious female child was bleeding from the face.

I immediately responded from the area of Ruthrauff Road and Interstate 10. I activated my emergency lights and responded in an urgent fashion, due to the proximity of my location.

Upon arrival, I observed additional deputies near the scene of the incident, towards a driveway, at the west area of the school. I exited my marked patrol vehicle and subsequently activated my body worn camera. I made contact with deputies on scene, who were processing the scene and speaking with several other persons who were there.

I immediately made contact with two unidentified females. I asked them who had witnessed the incident, reference the juvenile who had been injured on scene. One of the unidentified females pointed to a male, wearing a white in color work shirt, who was standing at the side of the scene, by the gate where the incident had occurred.

I walked over to the male, who was later identified as Ramon Gonzales (DOB *****

I could see that Ramon was visually distraught. He was shaking and appeared to be teary-eyed. I asked him to give me the best information that he could, reference to what had occurred, or what he had seen.

Ramon provided me with the following summarized statement:

He indicated that at approximately 1415 hours that afternoon, he had walked up

to the gate with the assistance of two of the students, one of them who was identified as the injured female student, Arlette Chavira. He stated that they were securing one of the gates. As they were pushing passed the gate, the gate had continued forward, while Ramon was pulling. He told them to stop, but it had been too late, and the gate continued. The gate continued to slide out, from behind the brick wall, and had fallen over, hitting Arlette.

I asked Ramon if he had any additional information. He had also described that Arlette, and her sister, would usually help him out with the flag at the school, and picking up the cones. Shortly after, during the contact, he did point at two cones, and clarified that they had just picked up the two cones, placed them by where the gate was, and then subsequently proceeded to pull the gate off of the rail, to which it would slide out.

I proceeded to complete my contact with Ramon shortly after. I remained as scene security and accompanied Ramon, until the point where detectives arrived on scene to take over the investigation.

This concludes my involvement in the incident.

On 11/17/23 at 1431 hours, I was off duty and received a phone call from Deputy N. Phaneuf #1446. He advised that he was at [REDACTED], *****

I contacted Det. D. Mosman #6723, who was already on duty. I directed him to respond to the scene. I contacted two on call Traffic detectives. I directed Det. J. Levinsohn #8880 to respond to the scene and Det. D. Caballero #7969 to respond to Banner Main. I responded to the scene. While en route, information was broadcast on the radio that the child had died of her injuries at the hospital.

When I arrived at the school, I located the scene on the northwest side of the campus. The scene was in front of a storage area surrounded by a bloc wall. The gate provided access to the area. A large metal gate laying on its side. A backpack was next to the gate and a jacket was on top of it. A large amount of blood was on the ground and the backpack. I noted a piece of metal welded to the lower corner of the gate that was broken. It was still attached, but angled out and part of the weld had come apart. The gate was manual and ran on a track blow it. The broken piece was designed to stop the gate from going beyond the block wall.

I remained on scene while detectives conducted the investigation. After they were done, Northwest FD was requested for a wash down. I left the scene as they were arriving.

On 11/17/23, I was in the area of 22nd Street monitoring North radio traffic in reference to FX Tactical. During that time, I did hear, and see, on the CAD screen, and over the radio, a rescue follow-up call being dispatched at

The information was reference a juvenile who was bleeding from the face, and there appeared to be serious life-threatening injuries. The juvenile was being transported to Banner-University Medical Center main campus.

Due to that fact, I responded to Banner-University Medical Center main campus to give the Criminal Investigations Division (CID) assistance, contacting Sergeant M. Rios #6316 and Sergeant J. J. Brown #4289 reference the incident as well. I advised them of my response and the information in the call text, reference the life-threatening injury to a juvenile.

I arrived at Banner-University Medical Center main campus prior to the juvenile arriving. The juvenile in this case was identified as nine year old Arlette Chavira.

When I arrived at Banner-University Medical Center main campus, they were prepping Room #1 for her arrival.

When she arrived, I observed her coming in on the gurney. Paramedics were straddling on top of her, giving her chest compressions. She was brought in to Trauma Room #1, and immediately medical staff was working on her.

Deputy J. T. McEuen #9340 and Sergeant J. P. Siress #7341 had come in with the paramedic unit. Also, the juvenile's mother had ridden in the ambulance. The information was that she was hysterical. Contact was made by support staff from the hospital, to take her to a quiet room, while medical staff worked on her daughter.

I stood by Trauma Room #1, observing doctors working on the nine year old. I overheard paramedics advise that the nine year old coded in the ambulance, and they had to shock her three times with negative response. They gave compressions, and continued to give compressions.

During that time, I updated both Sergeant Brown and Sergeant Rios as I could.

I stood by, observing doctors working on the nine year old child in Trauma Room

#1.

About 10 to 13 minutes in, the mother was brought outside of Trauma Room #1, and sat down, surrounded by hospital crisis staff. Doctors continued to work on the child for 20 minutes, before declaring her deceased. That was at approximately 1515 hours. I had Deputy McEuen get the exact time, and the doctor's name.

I also had Deputy McEuen start a Forensics Unit, and information was relayed to Sergeant Siress, who was also at the hospital.

It was determined that this case would be investigated by the Traffic Unit. That information was also disseminated to Sergeant Brown and Sergeant Rios.

I stood by until a subject with the Traffic Unit arrived on scene.

After that point, my assistance with this case was to assist with manipulating the deceased nine year old's body for photographs by the Forensics Unit, and documenting her injuries.

The Office of the Medical Examiner (OME) was contacted by the Traffic Unit.

Deputies who responded coordinated with the hospital.

The father of the child responded to the hospital as well. Both the mother and father were able to come into the room and be with their deceased daughter.

They were explained the course of the investigation, and that the daughter would be taken to the Office of the Medical Examiner to determine the cause of death.

The information was, that a large, heavy metal gate fell on the nine year old's head, causing head trauma, which resulted in her death.

After that point, I responded to the incident location to make sure there was nothing else that was needed of me, or any assistance from CID by the Traffic Unit.

After that point, I concluded my involvement in this incident at this time.
