DUELING DRUGGISTS

This front page features notices from not one, but two competing Philadelphia druggists who were seeking customers in Lancaster County. Both offered a long list of herbs and medicines available over the counter, including chamomile, castor oil, camphor, sarsaparilla, arrowroot and, of course, opium. Additionally, Robert Harris listed several of the many "patent medicines" he sold, including Lee's Patent Antibilious Pills, Worm Destroying Lozenges, Jesuit's Drops, Gout Cordial, Gowland's Lotion and Rawson's Bitters and Pills. On the other hand, Stephen North listed fewer of his wares but did suggest an alternative method of payment: "To accommodate his country friends, he is willing to receive country produce at the market price, in payment for articles in his line."

A NEW MOTTO?

Astute readers might notice that with a new century came a new motto at the top of this front page. The space formerly occupied by the newspaper's motto, which was something of a mission statement for the paper ("Not too rash - yet not fearful - open to all parties, but not influenced by any"), is changed to contain slogans taken from Thomas Jefferson's first inaugural address. The line "We are all Republicans - we are all Federalists" is widely regarded as a call for unity in the wake of the bitter partisanship of the 1800 election.
