FEROUS STORM SWEEPS NEW JERSEY COAST

P. R. R. OFFERS TO SELL OLD SITE TO LANCASTER

Tracks from Queen to Shippen Streets, Will be Abandoned If Plan is Approved.

ACCORD SEEMS CLOSE City Will Get New Station On Cut-Off by Agreeing To Extend Service Free.

The fate of Lancaster's proposed railroad station hinges mainly on an agreement involving purchase of an abandoned property between Queen and Shippen streets by the municipality. It has been learned that the railroad will abandon this stretch, if plans are approved.

May Use Property for Market, Subway

In the event that representatives of the city and of the railroad agree on mutually satisfactory terms for the purchase of the right of way from the west side of North Queen to Shippen or beyond Plum street, it is a question whether the city will buy the property, or will ask business men to take it over and simultaneously give the city an option for purchase within a year after the title to the property is transferred.

Since that time F. C. Swanton and J. G. Forney have held two conferences for the purpose of awaiting the property and the railroad to agree that there is not a wide variance in their estimates.

Mr. Swanton was in Lancaster on Friday and conferred with Mr. Forney in an attempt to reach an approximate figure.

Members of the Mayor's committee, it was explained, were not aware that the conference Friday between Swanton and Forney was arranged primarily for the purpose of arriving at a final estimate, and they attended the meeting.

Nothing warranting their immediate consideration was discussed, they remained.

Le Raub, Jr., city solicitor, said the Mayor had been under the impression that engineer Temple and other executives of the railroad would present to close the agreement.

Judge Lewis made the statement yesterday in hearing an appeal from a magistrate's judgment in fining an alleged reckless motorist driver.

Asserting that democratic government is necessary in this country, he broke down, Judge Lewis declared any driver and careless drivers and others would obey the law the minority will have to set up a dictatorship. They had it in France when the people refused to pay their taxes and in Italy when the people refused to work.

"I don't think any man whose car kills another should be innocent on his own. He should stay in jail until he is tried even though he is released. I sit here indignant but I can't do much about it. I don't want to be a dictator but to have respect for the law we should have a dictator," a Mussolini.

113TH INFANTRY CAMP HIT WITH CYCLONIC FURY

Tents Torn Up, Trees Uprooted, But No Loss of Life Among Troops at Sea Girt.

MANASQUAN HOUSES UPTURNED

Darkness Denser Than Eclipse, Shrouds Ashbury Park, Which Is Destroyed by Rain.

NEWARK, N. J., July 24.—(A. P.)—A storm of reported cyclonic proportions fell upon the camp of the 113th Infantry, New Jersey national guard at Sea Girt today.

Wire communications were paralyzed and it was impossible to ascertain the extent of the damage. First news however, had all tents torn up, trees uprooted and an automobile carried 100 yards by the wind. No loss of life or serious injury was reported among the soldiers in camp.
