Comets kicked off on right foot

Turned back Bucks to snag season-opening win for 1st time since '14

Solid clock control in the opening half? Check.

Taking advantage of the opponent's miscues? Check.

Season-opening win for the first time in five seasons? You know it.

With a 19-13 nonleague victory over Conestoga Valley — on the road, no less — Penn Manor got off on the right foot this Aug. 23 as another year of Lancaster County football kicked off.

"It's a big step in the right direction and it's starting to vindicate what we've been preaching," Penn Manor fifth-year coach John Brubaker said.

Brubaker picked up his first seasonopening victory as the Comets' skipper as his team matched its previous year's win total right off the bat.

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Turned away game Tide to open Section 3 play

It wasn't always pretty. But a win is a win is a win.

And Lancaster Catholic gladly accepted it.

Jeff Harley returned a punt for a touchdown, Alex Cruz broke off a pair of TD runs and Gavin Sullivan, who spent a good part of the evening running for his life from his quarterback spot, added a late score, helping Catholic fend off Columbia 35-19 in a Lancaster-Lebanon League Section Three opener Aug. 30 in Columbia.

"Columbia is a very good team," Sullivan said. "They fought really hard and they came out with a lot of heart, and we came out flat. But we were able to settle

The Comets opening-night performance wasn't a total surprise, though, given that they entered the 2019 campaign with eight starters back on both sides of the ball.

Among them? Bruising senior running back Josh Gibson, who gathered 86 of his 101 rushing yards in the first half, often brought down by multiple tacklers after he busted through holes opened up by junior linemen Peyton Suydam, Austin Miller, Nick Baker and Benjamin Weaver and sophomore Pe-

"This is the first time for me where I've went 1-0 at Penn Manor," Gibson said. "This is amazing."

The Buckskins' second drive of the game appeared promising until they fumbled the ball away deep in Penn Manor territory. The Comets proceeded to go down the field with a 12-play, 81-yard scoring drive capped by junior quarterback Luke Braas (16 for 28, 176 yards, 2 TDs) connecting with senior wideout Logan Legenstein in the front, right corner of the end zone for a 19vard strike.

CV answered on the next play from scrimmage when senior QB Bradley Stoltzfus (11 for 20, 169 passing yards, 2 TDs, 48 rushing yards) found junior wideout Zach Fisher wide open down the right sideline for a 70-yard TD bomb to tie the score 7-7.

This is where this year's version of the Comets grew from last year's version,

according to Gibson.

"Last year, we would be doing well and then the other team would have a big play and we'd be flat the rest of the game," Gibson said. "This year, the atmosphere is totally different. We bounced right back and went down and scored again."

Penn Manor's next drive was kept alive when a Comets punt was muffed by the Buckskins and recovered by Penn Manor around midfield. Ten plays later, Gibson skirted around the left side and found paydirt on a 19-yard rushing TD to put the Comets back up

After fumbling away its kickoff return to open the second half, the Buckskins made good on their next possession with a 15-play, 86-yard drive finished off by a Stoltzfus 22-yard TD pass to senior

speedster Eddie Hernandez to even the score at 13-13 in the third quarter.

A Buckskins penalty on the ensuing kickoff set up the Penn Manor offense around midfield, and nine plays later the Comets went back up for good on a 11-yard TD throw from Braas to junior wideout Isaac Hostetter with 10:34 re-

"We lost it on the special teams tonight and that was the difference of the game," veteran CV coach Gerad Novak

CV's final drive stalled around midfield with 1:59 left.

"We still have a long season ahead," Brubaker said. "Next week we have L-S, which is a fantastic team. So that'll be a big challenge again. But these guys have some fight in them and love playing the game. It makes it fun to coach."

into the game and do what we do and we executed plays. Then we got rolling."

The Crimson Tide, fresh off a win over Eastern York and a 1-0 start for the first time since 2013, grabbed a 7-0 lead on Matt McCleary's 20-yard TD flip to Demetrius Diaz-Ellis with 8:33 to go in the first quarter. Columbia also dropped Sullivan four times for losses in the first half.

Columbia grabbed a 13-7 lead when Diaz-Ellis scooted 6 yards for a TD run midway through the second quarter. But Catholic, now 2-0, scored four of the game's next five touchdowns, and the Crusaders won going away.

"I told our guys, 'Hey, this is the team that was picked to win the section," Columbia coach Bud Kyle said. "I'm not a fan of moral victories at all, but at the end of the day, I don't see many teams beating Catholic this year. We got the short end of the stick tonight, but overall, I thought we really hung tough. Adversity hit us, and now we'll see how we respond from this."

Columbia sacked Sullivan six times and had Catholic teetering a couple of times in the first half. But a red zone fumble was a stinger for the Tide, and Harley's electrifying punt return TD sparked the Crusaders and put them right back in the game.

Later, Harley added a 21-yard TD dash to cap the scoring with 7:59 to play. Catholic also had an 83-yard TD pass called back in the first quarter on a penalty.

Ahead 14-13 at the break after Cruz's 3-yard TD run with 4:40 to go in the first half, Catholic picked up speed behind some inspired offensive line play. Cruz took advantage, bolting 49 yards for a TD with 10:23 to go in the third, giving Catholic a 21-13 edge.

Columbia immediately punched back, converting a fourth-and-goal play when McCleary lobbed a 1-yard TD pass to Phillip Acosta to make it 21-19. But McCleary's 2-point pass was broken up, and the Tide failed to tie it.

Sullivan's 20-yard keeper right up the gut with 1:06 to go gave Catholic a 28-19 edge, and Harley's TD romp later in the fourth iced the game for the Crusaders, who had to rally past Camp Hill last Friday for a 39-25 seasonopening victory.

"There wasn't a person in our locker room — coaches or players — who didn't think this wasn't going to be a fistfight," Catholic coach Todd Mealy said. "We're still trying to find ourselves. I'm concerned about our mental approach. Our youth outweighs our experience. So the priority we have to make now is keeping our guys round-

Harley ended up with 64 rushing

yards on 12 carries and Cruz had 62 yards on seven totes as Catholic had 203 total yards. Meanwhile, McCleary went 19 for 41 through the air for 211

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yards for Columbia, which was held to minus-3 rushing yards, as the Crusaders' defense came up big in the trench-

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Warriors topped Barons for 1st time since '83

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Warwick got a clutch interception from senior Conor Adams late in the first half of its Sept. 6 nonleague crossover game against visiting Manheim Central.

Nine plays later, the Warwick offense completed its march down the field with a touchdown just before

A year before, Manheim Central had done the same to Warwick, and the Barons eventually posted a comeback in that game.

But this time around, Warwick had all the momentum going into halftime and

kept the Barons from rising back up in the second half en route to a monumental 37-7 victory over the 2018 District Three Class 5A champion Barons.

It was the first time since 1983 that Warwick (3-0) had beaten Manheim Central (2-1). And it snapped the Barons' 27-game regular season unbeaten streak.

"Last year we let (Manheim Central) put up a big score before halftime," Warwick junior lineman Nolan Rucci recalled. "That was a big thing this year. We knew we had to deal with that. It (the TD late in the first half) was a good swing of momentum to get that scoreboard back up."

The 6-foot, 8-inch Rucci was a key cog in an offensive line also made up of seniors Jeremiah High, Hayden Benner and Hunter Diebler and junior Owen Campbell, along with junior tight end Thatcher Miller.

That unit kept junior QB Joey Mc-Cracken (14 of 25, 293 passing yards, three TDs) clean most of the night while opening holes for junior workhorse back Colton Miller (28 attempts, 128 rushing yards, one TD).

Meanwhile, the Warriors' 3-4 defense kept Manheim Central QB Evan Simon (11 for 28, 126 passing yards, one TD, 10 rushing attempts for 54 yards) scrambling and stifled the Barons' rushing game. Simon was sacked numerous times, and the rest of the Manheim Central backfield produced 6 rushing yards on 10 carries. Manheim Central was also without starting linebacker Clay Bedi, who spent the game in a walking boot recovering from a right ankle injury he'd suffered a week earlier.

"We don't have a run game. We don't have a pass game. We're not a very good team right now," Manheim Central coach Dave Hahn said. "We're just going to keep working. ... We've got kids. Some of the kids are young and it shows. We're just like everybody else.

"Everybody expects us to win by 50. We're not there yet. We'll get back there. It might not be this year but we'll get back there."

Warwick went 59 yards on eight

plays in its opening drive, getting an 11-yard scoring throw from McCracken to Caleb Schmitz on fourth down to go up 6-0.

Later, on the first play of a new drive to start the second quarter, McCracken found Justin Gerhart wide open over the middle for an untouched 70yard scoring throw to push the Warriors' lead to 12-0.

Manheim Central (2-1) followed with a 10-play, 65-yard drive that was capped when Simon found Wes Herder in the back corner of the end zone for a 10-yard passing TD to cut the deficit to 12-7.

After the Adams interception, Mc-Cracken later scored on a 1-yard keeper with 27 seconds left in the first half to push the Warriors' advantage to 19-7 going into the break.

On its third play of the third drive of the second half, Warwick's McCracken connected with Adams for a 76-yard scoring strike that pushed the lead to 27-7 after a successful 2-point conver-

Section Three victory over visiting Ephrata.

It was the Crusaders' 14th straight regular-season victory, and Catholic (3-0 L-L, 4-0 overall) remained in a first-place tie with Donegal, which held off Lebanon in the night's other Section Three first-place showdown.

"Everyone wanted this game," Atkinson said. "We all knew what was on the line. And we knew we had to play our best to beat that team."

Ephrata (2-1, 2-2) had a 14-7 firstquarter lead that night, compliments of a pair of short TD runs by Miracle Wratto. But Catholic answered with a 32-yard field goal by Daniel Mueller, and the Crusaders were on their way.

Catholic got a fumble recovery TD from Andrew Nicklaus, Atkinson's pick six and then a second interception return for a score, when Henry Gartley capped the scoring with 11:17 to go with a 17-yard pick six.

The Crusaders had two penalties for 10 yards, they didn't punt, and Catholic held Ephrata to 110 rushing yards a week after the Mounts singed Annville-Cleona for 648 total yards and 58 points.

"I thought we matched up well with them," Catholic coach Todd Mealy said. "So I thank our coaching staff for working well together and putting together a great game plan, and getting the kids to play well together. And I tip my cap to our players. We had a tough week with some injuries."

Catholic was back at full strength against Ephrata, and the Crusaders used all their weapons. Alex Cruz rushed for 87 yards, and his 3-yard TD

run gave Catholic the lead for good, 17-14, with 6:26 to go in the first half.

Jeff Harley rushed for 69 yards and his 32-yard TD bolt on the last play of the third quarter gave the Crusaders a 36-14 cushion. And QB Gavin Sullivan was efficient in the pocket. He completed 7 of 8 passes for 86 yards, including a 9-yard TD flip to Andrew Miklos, and he added 63 yards on the ground, as Catholic churned out 325 rushing vards and 411 total yards.

"It's taken us a little while to find our identity as a team," Mealy said. "This was certainly a good performance. Now we'll see if it continues."

Wratto had TD runs of 6 yards and 1 yard in the first quarter. His first score was set up by Kyle Raudenbush's 67yard kickoff return. But after Wratto's 1-yard TD dive, Catholic's defense put on the clamps.

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Ephrata

"We started out strong and did some good stuff," Ephrata coach Kris Miller said. "We had some opportunities but we couldn't sustain it long enough. At the end of the day, it's a bump in the road, because I still think we're a good football team. To be where we were two years ago to this point, it's another step in our journey. Unfortunately we didn't get the job done here. But we'll be better because of this game."

The matchup between a pair of undefeated teams looked like it in the first 12 minutes of a Sept. 20 nonleague game between Manheim Township and Cocalico.

Each team had scored a touchdown and traded a couple punts. But after a slow start, the Blue Streaks exploded for three second-quarter TDs and pushed the scoreboard to a running clock in the final minutes of the third quarter in an eventual 56-7 victory on the road in Denver.

"We came out tonight and they scored and we couldn't hang our heads," Manheim Township running back Jaden Floyd said. "We just started moving the ball and got a push off the line."

Floyd finished with 89 rushing yards on 10 attempts with two rushing scores to go along with 100 receiving yards on two TD receptions.

The win pushed Manheim Township to 5-0 heading into the following week's Lancaster-Lebanon League Section One showdown at undefeated Wilson (5-0).

Meanwhile, Cocalico (4-1) was left to face healing in time for its Week 6 L-L Section Two bout at rival Manheim Central.

The Eagles lost Austin Vang early in the first half Sept. 20, and the fullback was on crutches with his right knee wrapped the rest of the night. Leading rusher and senior quarterback/safety Noah Palm and fourth-leading rusher Ronald Zahm left the action early in the second half and were both seen limping after the game, and Zahm's right knee was wrapped.

The Eagles' vaunted veer offense was instead held to 89 yards on 38 attempts, an average of 2.3 yards a carry. Palm was kept to minus-7 yards on nine attempts.

"How do you regroup? You go back to the fundamentals," veteran Cocalico coach Dave Gingrich said. "We're going to go back to the basics. We're going to work simple schemes offensively and defensively and special teams and try to get healthy in time for (Week 6)."

Cocalico fumbled the ball away on its first possession, setting up Man-

heim Township with an easy fourplay, 21-yard drive capped by Floyd's 5-yard run to the right side to make it 7-0. The Eagles answered two posses-

sions later, when Palm connected with Zahm on a 15-yard pass to the right side, with another 15 yards tacked on due to a Manheim Township penalty. Two plays later, Zahm busted loose for a 31-yard run down the right side, and Palm followed that with a 4-yard keeper to make it 7-7 at the 1:42 mark of the first quarter.

"We had some sloppy tackling,"

Manheim Township coach Mark Evans said. "Some guys were upset. That's the makeup of this football team. Just like the Central Dauphin game, when it's close these guys are like, 'Let's go, next play.'" Manheim Township answered with

an 8-play, 75-yard drive finished off by a 33-yard Harrison Kirk TD pass to Jon Engel. It was the first of four TD throws

from Kirk (9 for 16, 201 yards). His longest throw came two possessions later when he found Floyd over the middle, with Floyd wrestling for a re-

ception, stripping a Cocalico defender and rumbling the rest of the way for an 80-yard score.

It was the third time in the teams' last four meetings that Township defeated Wilson — including the 2017 regular-season victory in Neffsville that snapped the Bulldogs' 68-game Section One winning streak.

Meanwhile, Wilson (1-1 L-L, 5-1 overall) suffered its first home loss in a Section One game since Sept. 21, 2007, when Warwick posted a 14-12 win at John Gurski Stadium.



Township (3-0, 6-0) remained atop the section standings, tied for first place with Warwick, which remained undefeated with a 34-14 victory over previously unbeaten Cedar Crest the same night.

The wins set up a Township-at-Warwick showdown for first place on Oct. 4

"It was a big game and it was important game," Township coach Mark Evans said of the victory over the Bulldogs. "And it was against a really good opponent, where we could find out how good we really are. We thought there were some things we could exploit, and we did. It's a great win. And now we can focus on Warwick."

Ivey, a sophomore who missed the first five games this season with a nagging injury, was Township's hero against Wilson. He made a triumphant season debut against the Bulldogs, hauling in TD catches of 83 yards and 76 yards. He snapped the previous L-L League mark of 260 receiving yards in a game set just last season by Warwick's Trey Glass — also against Wilson

Ivey actually snapped the record by

halftime, when he had 280 yards on seven grabs at the break.

Ivey came up short of the PIAA record. Colin Read from DuBois Area had 355 receiving yards in a game in 2015. But Ivey's 292-yard effort is a league mark.

"He came back tonight and he set an L-L League single-game record, and that's insane," said Kirk, who passed for 387 yards and three scores. "That kind of says it all right there. That's just puts."



Up three scores at halftime, Manheim Township returned to Warwick's Grosh Field for the third quarter Oct. 4 to find a new spectator on the sideline.

Penn State coach James Franklin had arrived minutes before the second half got underway.

And although the Blue Streaks were nearly held scoreless the rest of the night, they took care of business in holding off Warwick in a 28-7 Lancaster-Lebanon League Section One victory.

With the win, the Blue Streaks (3-0

L-L, 7-0 overall) took over sole possession of first place in Section One, in front of second-place Warwick (3-1, 6-1) and Wilson (2-1, 6-1). Manheim Township also completed the final chapter of a three-game gauntlet with road victories at Cocalico, Wilson and Warwick, opponents with a combined record of 17-3.

Also of note was the Lancaster Catholic defense — which had previously struggled in defending the pass — keeping a lid on Donegal 1,000-yard passer Trent Weaver (4 for 10, 32 yards, one interception). He was also sacked five times.

"The defense we put together is designed to defend this kind of offense," Lancaster Catholic coach Todd Mealy said. "So we were confident with the defensive effort we'd get tonight. We didn't think we'd shut them out. We thought we'd keep them to two scores. ... We had done a poor job of defend-

ing the pass this year, until recently. We changed some things defensively, both in the personnel and teaching proper techniques."

With the victory, the Crusaders

posted back-to-back shutouts for the first time since 2006.

On the flip side, the Indians (5-3, 5-4) found themselves losers of three in a row for the first time since the

start of the 2017 season.

Harley's first TD came on Lancaster Catholic's opening drive, when he found paydirt down the left side on a 31-yard rushing score.

Crusaders linebacker Tony Cruz intercepted Weaver on the Indians' second play from scrimmage, and Lancaster Catholic needed eight plays to go 50 yards, with Alex Cruz's 5-yard TD scamper pushing the advantage to 13-0.

Crusaders sophomore kicker Daniel Mueller made it 16-0 with a 32-yard field goal in the second quarter. A few minutes later, Alex Cruz pushed the lead to 23-0 on a 3-yard rushing score. After a scoreless third quarter,

Weaver fumbled from his 14-yard line, with the ball rolling backward into the end zone, where Indians receiver Jacob Shoemaker batted the ball through the back of the endline for a safety.

On the ensuing kickoff, Harley snagged the ball while on the run at the Lancaster Catholic 44-yard line, broke through some arm tackles and rumbled to the end zone to push the lead to 32-0.
