1.) The sheriff received a \$5.5 million budget from the board of supervisors this fiscal year — almost twice what the previous administration had. He says he needs \$7.3 million. Do you support his budget increase, and why?

Baker: The sheriff needs the support of the board to do his job regardless if it's Alex Hodge or one of the other candidates. We in the county need to have the comfort knowing we can trust the sheriff's department to be there for us. Seems like there is a struggle between the board of supervisors and the sheriff. 



1.) What are the most pressing issues in the office you are seeking?

Allen: The justice court needs a drug court for families and veterans. Therefore, I am proposing a family and veteran drug court as an additional plan to aid in the reconciliation of families. Our veterans are the forgotten treasures in our communities and we need to operate as our brother keepers, as we lend them a hand of recovery. Although some might fear that drug courts drain valuable government funds, they actually save taxpayers money. In the United States, for every \$1 invested in drug courts, taxpayers save as much as \$3.36 in criminal justice costs alone. Mississippi House Bill 1352 expanded the concept of drug courts to include mental health courts, veteran courts, and other type of intervention courts. These programs can help people with mental health issues receive treatment, or connect veterans with services.

Blakeney: As a Justice Court Judge I am an employee of the people as well as for the people and this office needs to solve the problems of the individuals whom are brought in front of me. It's a terrible situation we are in that all the law enforcement and justice system wants to do is help themselves and their friends and not the people in general. We need to Quail the growing recidivism rate for it is growing at an alarming rate.

Hedgepeth: We need highly qualified judges at all levels. The law only requires a Justice Court Judge to have a GED and be a registered voter. The people deserve much more. The Judge should be well versed in the law. He should be well versed in the

proper procedures required of a judge. He should be experienced in handling the cases he is being hired to handle.

Musgrove: The most pressing issue for any judicial position is to maintain and uphold the integrity of the judicial system by keeping social status or prominence a non-existent element of ALL cases, and making an unbiased decision in ALL cases that is directly supported by the evidence presented according to law.

Rogers: Justice Court is often called "small claims" court and is for cases valued at \$3,500 or less. Justice Court is also where misdemeanor criminal cases and any traffic offense that occurs outside of city limits is heard. Justice Court judges conduct bond hearings and preliminary hearings in felony criminal cases and they also issue search warrants. Many, if not most litigants in Justice Court do not have an attorney and it is important to see that these litigants are treated fairly and with respect. Justice Court judges also have a duty to make a determination of probable cause before issuing search warrants, which is the foundation of insuring that the State of Mississippi has a case that can be properly prosecuted and not dismissed on some preventable legal technicality.

Saul: There is no particular issue that stands out as a "pressing matter" on a Justice Court docket because the matters are considered small claims, but the caseload considered as a whole is quite important; it is the nuts and bolts of everyday life for the average citizen. The Justice Court hears civil matters under \$3,500, misdemeanor criminal matters, game and

While these are small issues compared to what other courts hear, how they are handled is what will make or break a community. It is critical that we elect sensible people to serve as Justice Court judges so they will keep things running smoothly and fairly for our community. 2.) Outline your goals for the office.

Allen: My goals are to restore integrity and fairness, establish family drug courts, establish veteran drug courts, utilize state and federal funding to rebuild family infrastructure and extend a helping hands to our veterans who fought for us to have freedom in these United States of America. The goals of drug courts are to reduce recidivism, reduce substance use, reduce the costs of drug-involved crimes, and decrease prison crowding. Graduates have lower rates of recidivism and substance use, and the treatment is far more cost effective than incarceration. I choose to run as a candidate for Justice Court Judge as a proud American Citizen wanting to see our laws enforce fairly for all. The constitution of the United States and its' amendments regulate governmental powers with basic written principles. The principles preserve our liberties and create justice for all.

Blakeney: My office will try its best to help with the young and old citizens alike. Our young citizens needs help and supervision with drugs alcohol and poverty in everyday life. What they don't need is to be arrested and thrown away in jail where they are much worse than they already are. We need to work with schools and churches in the community. I drove a school bus route for some years and I had a rough route to boot and instead of throwing kids off my bus for small infractions I help them stay in school. The children respected me and would even fight for me today. They knew I was there to help them and not to drag them down and not get them expelled from school. I knew they needed to be in school every day and ask for anybody I'll help them in every way I can.

Hedgepeth: I want to bring to the bench. Experience in criminal law will help ensure that guilty criminals don't slip through the cracks due to technicalities. It will also help to ensure that innocent people are not wrongfully arrested. I also want to help reduce the overcrowding in the County Jail and help reduce the "revolving door" of repeat offenders.

Musgrove: My goal for the office of Justice Court Judge District 1 is to bring fairness, honesty and integrity as a public servant. In 1984, I began serving the citizens of Jones County as a volunteer firefighter (at the age of 16) and "retired" from active fire service in 2014 after serving as Vice President of the Jones County Volunteer Fire Council, District 1 Fire Chief and 10 years as Fire Chief of Soso Volunteer Fire Department. I also served as a police officer in the Town of Soso. I am no stranger to public service and am unwavering in my dedication. I am seeking this office because I understand the importance of an unbiased decision — a decision made without regard to race, sex, social or political status, etc. I will serve with honesty, fairness and integrity not only because it is what is expected, but because it is a way of life for me.

Rogers: If elected Justice Court Judge for District 1, my goal will be to see that each and every person is treated fairly and with respect, no matter the person's age, gender, social status or race. I

am running for Justice Court Judge because I feel I can offer voters a choice of someone who already has years of legal training and experience and will apply the laws of our great State of Mississippi to all people equally and fairly.

Saul: I will be impartial to everyone and will be fair but firm in dealing with matters that are brought before the Court. Common sense and fair-mindedness will govern my actions. After retiring from the MHP, I remained drawn to public service. I prayed and soul-searched about how I could give back to my community. My training and experience made Justice Court the obvious choice. The bulk of my career was spent in the MHP Enforcement Division; knowing first-hand what happens on the side of the road will be a benefit to anyone exercising judgment over traffic-related issues. I have more courtroom experience in Justice Court than some lawyers, having served on the prosecution and defense side of traffic and DUI cases and as an expert witness. Furthermore, I have painted houses, hot-shotted, and worked other jobs that provide a generalized knowledge base that will be instrumental in Justice Court.

3.) Why should voters cast their ballot for you?

Allen: As a leader with strong faith values I believe in leading by example therefore I ed record of service in the community. The community has always been an intricate part of my life. I was awarded the Dr. King Drum Major for Justice and The Federation of Democratic Women Community Leader Awards. Hedgepeth: I have more courtroom experience than all of my opponents combined. I've prosecuted and defended all manner of criminal cases ranging from traffic offenses to capital murder cases, and I've handled complex civil litigation cases. That experience allows me to evaluate and analyze cases from a fair and impartial point of view, favoring neither the prosecution nor the defense. A fair and impartial judge makes sure that the cases are decided fairly on the facts and the law rather than on partiality or favoritism. An experienced, fair-minded judge simply makes the system work as it should for everybody.

Musgrove: Any voter that knows me personally can answer that question! Whether or not doing what is right is popular, doing what is right is required. Integrity is doing the right thing, even when no one is looking. I will serve the people of Jones County with the same dedication with which I have served since 1984.

Rogers: 1) As a resident of Ellisville, I am the only candidate who has a law degree and lives in District 1. Two of the four Republican candidates for this office do not reside in District 1 and will not be able to vote for themselves.
