




Statewide Overview
Total TN Households: 2,852,754

The cost of living for a Hamilton County family of four with two children in child care rose by \$8,200 in just one year.

The latest ALICE data from 2023 provides a clearer picture of financial hardship across the Greater Chattanooga region. This report includes an overview of:

STATEWIDE INSIGHTS

In both Tennessee and Georgia, many of the most common jobs don't pay enough to cover basic needs.

TENNESSEE

32% of workers in TN's 20 most common jobs lived in households that couldn't afford basics.

Occupations with the largest share of workers in households below the threshold included:

- Personal care aides (62%)
- Fast food and counter workers (48%)
- Cooks (47%)
- Janitors and building cleaners (46%)
- Waiters and waitresses (45%)

GFORGIA

35% of workers in GA's 20 most common jobs lived in households that couldn't afford basics.

Occupations with the largest share of workers in households below the threshold included:

- Fast food and counter workers (56%)
- Cooks (54%)
- Cashiers (50%)
- Janitors and building cleaners (48%)
- Waiters and waitresses (47%)





Many families with children are struggling to make ends meet, especially single-parent households.

TENNESSEE

Among all families with children, 38% were below the threshold. And longstanding disparities in financial hardship by household type remained. Families below the threshold:

- 78% of single-female-headed families
- 66% of single-male-headed families
- 19% of married-parent families

GEORGIA

Among families with children, 40% were below the threshold. And longstanding disparities in financial hardship by household type remained. Families below the threshold:


- 78% of single-female-headed families
- 61% of single-male-headed families
- 23% of married-parent families.

WHEN ENOUGH ISN'T ENOUGH


The charts below illustrate the mismatch between costs, wages, and official measures of financial hardship.

They include the ALICE Household Survival Budget for a family in Tennessee and Georgia with two adults, an infant, and a preschooler, along with the combined full-time wages of two common occupations—a personal care aide and a stock worker. The charts also compare these costs and incomes to three governmental measures of financial hardship.

2023 **GEORGIA** SURVIVAL BUDGET




HAMILTON COUNTY SNAPSHOT

In 2023, 10,961 households with children lived below the ALICE threshold in Hamilton County, a 15% increase from the previous year. While the percentage of ALICE households overall remained steady, poverty rose by 2%, meaning more families are falling deeper into crisis.

Survival budget hourly wage - Single adult: \$16.93 (increase of \$1.79 from 2022) Survival budget annual total - **Single adult: \$33,864** (increase of \$3,588 from 2022)

Survival budget hourly wage - 2 adults, 1 infant, 1 preschooler: \$41.97 (increase of \$4.11 from 2022)
Survival budget annual total - 2 adults, 1 infant, 1 preschooler: \$83,940 (increase of \$8,220 from 2022)




CATOOSA COUNTY SNAPSHOT

In 2023, Catoosa County saw a 2% drop in households below the ALICE threshold, while median income rose and more residents joined the workforce.

Survival budget hourly wage - Single adult: \$16.93 (increase of \$2.26 from 2022) Survival budget annual total - **Single adult:** \$33,852 (increase of \$4,512 from 2022)

Survival budget hourly wage - 2 adults, 1 infant, 1 preschooler: \$39.76 (increase of \$1.19 from 2022) Survival budget annual total - 2 adults, 1 infant, 1 preschooler: \$79,512 (increase of \$2,364 from 2022)




DADE COUNTY SNAPSHOT

In 2023, Dade County saw little year-over-year change, but financial hardship remained high, with 50% of households living below the ALICE threshold.

DADE COUNTY OVERVIEW:

Total Dade County households: 6,178 Households below ALICE threshold: 3,105 Median household income: \$58,936 Labor force participation rate: 56.5%

DADE COUNTY SURVIVAL BUDGETS:

Survival budget hourly wage - Single adult: \$16.80 (increase of \$2.64 from 2022) Survival budget annual total - **Single adult:** \$33,600 (increase of \$5,280 from 2022)

Survival budget hourly wage - 2 adults, 1 infant, 1 preschooler: \$37.66 (increase of \$1.46 from 2022) Survival budget annual total - 2 adults, 1 infant, 1 preschooler: \$75,312 (increase of \$2,904 from 2022)




WALKER COUNTY SNAPSHOT

In 2023, Walker County saw a 6% drop in ALICE households and a rise in median income, but poverty increased by 3%, signaling mixed progress as 52% of households still struggled to make ends meet.

Survival budget hourly wage - Single adult: \$16.85 (increase of \$2.47 from 2022) Survival budget annual total - **Single adult: \$33,696** (increase of \$4,944 from 2022)

Survival budget hourly wage - 2 adults, 1 infant, 1 preschooler: \$37.79 (increase of \$1.44 from 2022) Survival budget annual total - 2 adults, 1 infant, 1 preschooler: \$75,576 (increase of \$2,508 from 2022)
