



## Gingersnaps:

### A CLASSIC FALL AND WINTER TREAT

o me, nothing says fall and winter like the spicy scent of ginger wafting from the oven. Gingersnaps were apparently first created by German monks around 1296. They made their way around Europe and came over to America with the English colonists and have been popular ever since. An interesting bit of trivia: Zu Zu Ginger Snaps were first manufactured in 1901 by the National Biscuit Company, which later became Nabisco. The cookie's mascot was the "Zu Zu Clown," which was featured in ads, signs, costumes and dolls. In the 1946 film "It's a Wonderful Life," one of George Bailey's

daughters is named Zuzu. Towards the heartwarming end, when George rushes up the stairs and embraces his children; his little daughter joins them and he exclaims, "Zuzu, Zuzu, my little gingersnap!"

This recipe – modified slightly from a decades-old Yankee Magazine (to which my New England-born mother faithfully subscribed) – never disappoints. Crispy but with a bit of chewiness and full of dark flavor, this cookie is a favorite wherever I share it. An added bonus is that they're easy! Young children will enjoy being involved in rolling the dough into balls and coating them with sugar.




#### INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ginger
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 3/4 cup Crisco vegetable shortening
- · 1 cup sugar plus more for rolling
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup molasses (I use Grandma's)

#### DIRECTIONS

- Sift together flour, ginger, cinnamon, salt and baking soda.
- In another bowl, cream the shortening and sugar. Add egg and molasses and mix well.
- Add the dry ingredients to the wet. Mix thoroughly.
- Divide dough into two mounds; wrap in foil or waxed paper and chill at least two hours.
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a baking sheet with shortening.
- Roll dough into 1-inch balls (or, as my grandmother's cookie recipes say, "the size of a walnut").
- Roll balls in a bowl of sugar until lightly coated all over. Place at least 2 inches apart on greased cookie sheet.



- Makes approx. 30 cookies.
- Arrange a few on a decorative paper plate and share!

### TOYS FOR TOTS

guarantees children toys during the holidays



very child deserves a gift during the holidays. It is a magical experience to open a present and the feeling of getting something unexpected creates the best memories.

Many children, however, may not be able to receive every wish list item this year – that's where organizations such as Toys for Tots step in. Toys for Tots, a not-for-profit public charity created by the U.S. Marine Corps in 1991, assists children from economically disadvantaged backgrounds and allows loved ones to request a doll, stuffed animal or toy set for their child in times of need.

Every year, community coordinators who are in the Marine Corps Reserve put together the Toys for Tots annual Holiday Program. The Marines oversee outreach and work with corporations and local community members to organize toy drives. Staff Sergeant Ronkirby Deano, an event coordinator with the San Jose Toys for Tots and an inspector-instructor staff with the Marine Corps Reserves, said the toy drives alleviate stress from parents who are trying to make ends meet. It is a sigh of relief for them while living in an environment with high living costs, he said. The event is ongoing and will last until the middle of December.

SSgt. Deano said there are more than 15 Marines stationed at his site where they serve over 400,000 children in the county. In his position, he works closely with individuals who file event requests either on their website, by email or over the phone. He helps them with fulfilling their donation goals, learning about the type of toys they are seeking from people and where they want to donate their toys. Each request is different and varies in the number of toys donated.

"Apple has an end-of-the-year Christmas party and since 2022 they have been the biggest organization that has contributed to the cause," he

said. "In 2022 they gave roughly 25,000 toys and then 2023 I think was 40,000 out of the 235,000 that we collected last year."

He said Toys for Tots recommends people bring unused, wrapped toys. Organizations may sometimes accept used toys, but that is rarer, he said. Other items such as books or clothes are sometimes collected, but they usually contact other organizations and local libraries, respectively, to handle the items.

When a toy drive has too many toys for a charity organization to accept, Toys for Tots handles the overflow and stores them in its warehouse. He said there were more than 2,000 toys left from last year's events. The leftover toys provide them a safety net in case there is ever a shortage of donations from community members or even bad weather, but it is not enough to help serve the entire county. >>

"In 2023, we had more toys than the year prior - maybe more people felt like giving," he said. "I can't say this year is going to be great, just because anything can happen financial hardships or layoffs. In 2022, it was the worst year for Christmas in the Park, because that day it was just a downpour. It was an outdoor event, so the weather does affect if people want to go out or not."

Toys for Tots is also allowed to purchase toys for community members with a limit of \$35. He said it is easy to spend that amount on a young child, but a teenager makes the money tight - many of them ask for items such as Legos or videogames. Toys for Tots relies "heavily on the community and various technology companies" participation in the toy drives to help fulfill people's wishes.

SSgt. Deano said it is important to note that the Holiday Program allows anyone to fill out an application to receive a toy. The application does not require a first and last name but requires the applicant to include their age and gender. An applicant can also put comments on their request.

"We don't base it off demographics," he said. "It doesn't matter how, much you make - if you put in a request, we will fulfill it to anyone. There's no verification for an ID or a kid's birth certificate." \*





Their unique still was smithed and installed by third-generation French still makers whose coppersmithing has been recognized as a cultural treasure in France.

I learned from Dave Classick, Jr, a chief distiller, that stills are as distinguishable as fingerprints, each producing a truly bespoke bottling. The alembic pot still of Essential Spirits is what Classick, Jr. refers to as the "Rolls-Royce of stills."

Sergeant Classick Gold and Silver Rum borrows its name from master distiller and co-founder of Essential Spirits, Dave Classick, Sr., who is a highly decorated Vietnam veteran. here have been a few exceptions to the normally mild Bay Area winters over the decades, notably – as shown in these photos of Los Altos and Los Altos Hills – in 1962, 1976 and 1978.

Snow angels, anyone?

A Los Altos orchard, shown in 1978, looks especially peaceful with a dusting of snow. This photograph was donated to the Los Altos History Museum by artist Anna Knapp Fitz, who lived on Los Altos Avenue and whose family had a farm and orchard. It's not known whether this was their orchard.

Robin Chapman and her sister Kimberly Chapman play in the snow in Los Altos on Jan. 21, 1962. "That pose suggests I just threw a snowball, while my sister holds one above her head, ready to go." – Robin Chapman

In her blog (robinchapmannews.blogspot.com), Chapman continues: "... Snow covered the ground on the San Francisco Peninsula (one of only 10 such days since 1852, according to the U.S. Weather Service). I remember the day so clearly. 

#### SPECIAL TO THE TOWN CRIER

he 48th annual Los Altos Festival of Lights Parade, arguably the community's most popular event, is scheduled for 6 p.m. Dec. 1 in downtown Los Altos. The parade features colorful floats, costumed holiday characters, marching bands, dance groups and other performers. Thousands attend the event, which usually runs under an hour.

Organizer Nancy Schneider said this year's parade will have 62 entries, including eight marching bands and 23 floats (including a new one this year based on "Alice In Wonderland").

The Festival of Lights Parade was the creation of three downtown Los Altos merchants, Hope Higbee, Marion Jackston and Jack Huston along with friends Bob Grimm, Ed Hilton and Ted Johnston who were inspired by the Disneyland light parade. In 1977 these merchants and community members convinced the Los Altos Village Association to stage a parade Thanksgiving evening that would promote good will and begin the holiday spirit in the village.

Soon the parade grew so large that a group of community members took over the management of the parade and formed the Los Altos Festival of Lights Association, an allvolunteer, nonprofit group that would produce the parade for our community each year. The parade now is presented on the Sunday night after Thanksgiving. >

















Seeing what a community building event the parade is, the Los Altos City Council designated the parade as a Heritage Event and, as such, provides police, infrastructure, and waste management services that we could not do without.

The theme of the parade, "A Child's Holiday Fantasy," takes more than 125 behind the scenes volunteers to help put the parade together on the Sunday after Thanksgiving each year. They transport floats to the staging area, repair

lights, maintain our costumes, dress, and apply make up to our costumed characters, orchestrate the parade's entrants, push, or drive the floats in the parade. In addition, there are hundreds of volunteer performers which include the local high school bands, dance groups and entertainment.

The volunteers love helping put on this parade, and delight in the fact that as the parade time nears the route is lined with chairs and blankets of families marking their favorite viewing location. At 6 p.m., the parade begins on First and State Street traveling down to State Street to Main Street, across First Street, down Whitney Avenue and across Third Street.

During the year preceding each year's parade the board of directors of the Festival of Lights Association organizes the next parade. It raises money to put on the parade, repairs, and refurbish floats and costumes. Through contributions and grants we raise

the almost \$45,000 it costs to put on this free event for the community. The board of directors is always looking for new volunteers to work on this community event.

# Miniature Christmas towns bring families together

Create new heartwarming memories with this Christmas town guide



don't remember exactly when my biological father left my family – I only know it was around the time I was 5 or 6 years old – but I can recall the impact his absence had on my family.

My mom, essentially left by herself to provide for four of her five children who still lived at home, had responsibilities and mounting worries. But one thing I remember was her dedication to still making the holidays special and memorable for us.

That is, of course, for me, mostly. All my siblings who still lived at home were in their mid-to late-teens and Christmas wasn't as magical to them as it was for little me. I still believed in Santa, and I still lit up as brightly as the pine in my living room on Christmas morning as we all opened gifts and drank hot cocoa.

But my mom knew that was going to change. I don't remember what the first Christmas without

my biological father felt like, but I remember the excitement I felt when my mom unveiled a new holiday project we were going to work on: A miniature Christmas town.

One of the first buildings we added to the town was a toy factory. The miniature, which topped out at about 15 inches tall and 10 inches wide, lit up and had a conveyor belt of toys that went in circles, a jack-in-the-box who moved up and down, and a sound box that called out to the people of the village to "Come and see the most amazing toys in all the world."

Then we added an ice-skating rink, which came with ice skaters that moved around the rink with the use of magnets.

It started off small, only taking over the length of a small desk we used to have in the kitchen. But as the years progressed, my mom, her husband (he raised me and I will refer to him as my dad throughout the rest of this story) and I added to the collection.  $\gg$



One of the best aspects of collecting over the years is how there's always a chance a new release will connect to your life in some way; a few years into building our collection, we found a store with my sister's name on it, "Melissa's Pet Shop." My grandfather Ronald loves fishing, and we were delighted when we found "Ron's Fish and Tackle." My favorite find of all, though, was "Christina's Christmas Shoppe."

Currently, we have around 15 houses and buildings that take up a whole corner of the space between the kitchen and living room.

My dad, the ultimate enabler, created a town table that we keep in a shed outside. Every year he puts the 2-foot-deep, 13-foot-long L-shaped table together, and every year my mom and I serve as city planners and decide the town layout.



#### How to start

If you've been thinking about getting into building miniature Christmas towns, this is your sign. It's my second-favorite holiday tradition (after cutting down our own Christmas tree) and will bring any family as much joy as it brought mine. If you're interested in starting your own town, here are a few tips:

- Start early. Collectibles start appearing in Michaels Stores and home improvement stores like Lowe's and Home Depot in October; while it's a niche collection, collectors are dedicated and the number of buildings sold are limited. You can also check out what they'll be debuting online to prepare in advance.
- Lemax and Carole Town are two of the biggest Christmas town manufacturers. While we have both, Lemax is our preferred brand. In my experience, Carole Town has bigger pieces that aren't to scale with Lemax and while they can coexist, they don't necessarily mix well in the same town for the more picky collectors.
- Know how you're going to store them. The packaging can be bulky as the buildings are made of ceramic, so knowing where they can be stored safely after the season is something to keep in mind before starting.
- Have fun with it! It's supposed to be exciting, and you can personalize a town however you like.

I'm just as giddy and excited about the town now as I was when growing up. My mom knows how to make the holidays bright, and of the traditions I intend to take with me when I start my own family, starting my own Christmas town will be one of them. A

The holiday season is fast approaching, and the jingle bells and jolly choruses of Christmas music are coming right along with it.


But such music can often range in quality from "Merry Christmas to All" to "Bah Humbug."
