he 44th edition of the Los Altos Arts & Wine Festival is scheduled 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday in downtown Los Altos.

Presented by the nonprofit Los Altos Village Association (LAVA), 2023 also marks the 60th anniversary of the organization founded by local merchants and property owners to promote downtown businesses.

What began in 1979 as a much smaller version of the current event, the festival has now grown to include more than 250 artist and craft booths, seven wineries, two food courts and three stages of live entertainment.

Since 2006, Pacific Fine Arts (PFA) of Pine Grove has been tasked with selecting and managing the festival's participating artisans and craftspeople. Aided by LAVA's Arts & Wine Festival Committee, PFA's owners Dana and Troy Hale-Mounier aim to bring a wide variety of artwork, jewelry, crafts and creativity to the festival.

Musicians perform on the Main Stage (located in Central Plaza) and Community Stage (Veterans Community Plaza) throughout both days of the festival. Saturday's LAVA-sponsored concert featuring The Megatones is set for 5-7 p.m. on the Main Stage. >>

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The Kidzone Stage, offering family-friendly entertainment, can be found near the center of the festival off State and Fourth streets. Longtime masters of ceremonies Lori and RJ are known for getting kids up and dancing.

Seven boutique wineries – including festival newcomer Qvevri Wine of Georgia – host booths at which representatives pour and discuss their varietals. Beer



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aficionados can find popular brands and selections from local craft breweries at beer booths.

Commemorative beer and wine glasses are available for purchase at five booths, where attendees also will receive a "proof of drinking age" wristband required before being served alcohol. Those who leave the festival but plan on returning later that day or the next are asked not to remove their wristbands.

Support from many organizations and businesses is crucial to the success of the festival, according to Scott Hunter, LAVA's executive director, who cited the generosity of Main Stage sponsor Star One Credit Union and Community Stage sponsor HyperSpace for their continued support of the Los Altos community.

An array of local groups and organizations also help make the festival happen, including Together We Can, the Service League of Boys, the Rotary Club of Los Altos and local Community Emergency Response Teams and ham radio operators. Hunter said LAVA is also grateful for the continued support and guidance of the city of Los Altos, the Los Altos Police Department and the Santa Clara County Fire Department.

Those who drive to the festival are encouraged to park at the Los Altos Community Center, 97 Hillview Ave., and walk the short distance to downtown. Rideshare drop-off and pick-up at the festival is offered on Edith Avenue, next to shady Village Park. Please leave pets at home.

Funds raised at the festival are used for community events and programs promoting downtown businesses. Additionally, funds raised support LAVA's downtown beautification efforts, including decorative plantings, colorful banners and twinkle lights that adorn more than 250 trees along Main and State streets and in the adjacent parking plazas. *

ood and beverages will be plentiful at this year's Los Altos & Arts Wine Festival.

Attendees can find more than a dozen food vendors, offering Indian dishes, fresh-squeezed lemonade, Thai street-food specialties, crab rolls, Philly cheesesteaks, local craft beers and more.

The two food courts - one on Second Street between Main and State streets, the other along Third Street – include several returning festival favorites. The Rotary Club of Los Altos again hosts a booth serving Chef Chu's famous Chinese chicken salad. Aroma Concessions offers fried artichokes and zucchini, along with corn dogs and garlic fries. Gourmet Faire features its crab rolls and beerbattered garlic fries, while Thai Street Food sells satay chicken, Pad Thai and Thai tacos, among other dishes.

Looking for something different? Check out Lin's Dim Sum for potstickers, moo shu wraps and pickled kimchi. Joining the festival from Freedom in Santa Cruz County, Curry Express offers lamb wraps, chicken tikka wraps and samosas, among other fare. B Foods International sells gyros, Philly steak sandwiches and

falafel. Festival favorite Koko's Korean Teriyaki is back with its chicken skewers, veggie lo mein and teriyaki chicken rice bowls. Los Altos' own Willie D's cooks up sweet and savory crepes, baked potatoes and churros.

Pre-packaged specialty foods to take home can be found along the Third Street food area. They include Nan's Gourmet Foods (aged and infused balsamic vinegars, olive oils and





handcrafted pasta), Mike & Niki's Honey (a selection of honey, honeycomb and honey sticks) and Primo's Gourmet Food (spices and rubs, tapenades and savory grilling sauces).

Those looking to beat the heat can keep cool with hand-shaken lemonade from Barrett's Lemonade. Tropical Hut offers nonalcoholic pina coladas served in either a pineapple or a coconut. Olde Tyme Kettle Korn returns to the festival as well.

Expect to find plenty of tables and chairs with umbrellas for shade adjacent to each food area and near the Main Stage.

Festival wineries add an INTERNATIONAL element

or many years, the Los Altos Arts & Wine Festival has been known as one of the few Bay Area festivals to feature wines from the area. That tradition continues, with six of the seven wineries returning from previous years.

However, there's also an international aspect this year. Qvevri Wine Georgia will present wines from the country of Georgia. Many local residents may already be familiar with Qvevri; it is a regular vendor at the Downtown Los Altos Farmers' Market.

Information on all seven vintners pouring wine this weekend follows.

BASS NOTE SANGRIA

Bass Note Sangria specializes in sangrias made with California wine, blended with fresh fruit juice, cane sugar, herbs and/or spices.

Representatives of Bass Note Sangria are pouring a Watermelon Basil Sangria, along with Raspberry Hibiscus, Blackberry Sage and Peach Tarragon sangrias at the festival. Find Bass Note Sangria's booth in Parking Plaza 6, near the corner of Fourth and State streets.

BYINGTON VINEYARD & WINERY

Situated in the Santa Cruz Mountains, Byington Vineyard & Winery sits on 95 acres surrounded by redwood forests with a view of Monterey Bay. The postcard-perfect site is where Byington produces award-winning Pinot Noir, Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay and other varietals. Along with producing its premium Byington Estate Pinot Noir on 8 acres in the Santa Cruz Mountains, Byington's other small-production wines come from 36 acres of Tin Cross Vineyards in the Alexander Valley.

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DOMENICO WINERY

Domenico Winery, named by Dominick and Gloria Chirichillo as a reflection of the commitment to their Italian heritage, returns to the festival for the seventh year.

The history of the Domenico Winery is rooted in family; in 1955, Dominick was introduced to wine traditions by his nonno (grandfather), Domenico Giovinazzo. Nonno showed Dominick the wine press in the basement of their New York home, and Dominick said that began his generational love of handcrafting wine.

Dominick moved to California so that he could select his grapes from vineyards in Napa Valley, Sonoma's Central Coast, Alexander Valley, the Russian River Valley, Amador County and the Lodi District. He is a member of the Santa Cruz Mountains Winegrowers Association, where he sources Chardonnay and Pinot Noir grapes.

Domenico representatives are pouring a 2022 Rosato, a 2022 Sauvignon Blanc and their proprietary Mambo Italiano Italian Red.

THOMAS FOGARTY WINERY

The story of Thomas Fogarty Winery is an example of the innovation and entrepreneurship that has existed since the start of Silicon Valley.

In the early 1970s, Dr. Thomas Fogarty, who was working as a cardiovascular surgeon and inventor, tried at-home winemaking in a cabin high above Palo Alto. He planted his first grapes in 1978 on what is now home to the 325-acre Thomas Fogarty Winery and Vineyards.

NAUMANN VINEYARDS

Naumann Vineyards returns to the festival for the 16th year. The Naumann vineyard is located in Cupertino on Montebello Road, 2,000 feet above the Silicon Valley floor. All work in the vineyard is performed by hand, with the goal of producing lowyield, high-quality fruit.

Vintner Don Naumann's most successful wine may be his Tre Rosso Cali, which won a Silver Medal in the San Francisco Chronicle Wine Competition and Gold Medal in The Finger Lakes International Wine Competition.

Naumann representatives are pouring a 2012 Tre Rosso Cali, a 2019 Merlot, a 2021 Rosé and a 2019 Chardonnay at the festival.

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PAGE MILL WINERY

Page Mill Winery has participated in the festival since its start in 1979, just three years after Dick and Ome Stark founded the winery in the large cellar below their Los Altos Hills home.

For 28 years, the winery was located on Page Mill Road, just a short drive from Los Altos. It has since moved to Livermore. Page Mill representatives are pouring their 2022 Sauvignon Blanc, a 2021 Chardonnay, a 2021 GPS Rhone Blend and a 2020 Cabernet Sauvignon.

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tradition of viticulture and winemaking. In fact, cultivated grape pips were discovered that indicated Georgia has been making wine for some 8,000 years, leading experts to believe Georgia is the birthplace of wine. The Qyevri Method (clay vessel used for fermentation of wine) is listed as part of UNESCO Intangible Heritage.

Traditional Georgian grape varietals are less known in the world. Even though the country has nearly 400 types of grapes, only 38 are grown for commercial winemaking.

Similar to French wines, Georgian wines are also named according to the source region, village or district. Also like French wines, Georgian wines are mostly made from the blend of two or more grape varietals.

Georgian transplants Giorgi and Tatiana are pouring from Georgian Winery Koncho & Co. a Saperavi Rosé, a Mtsvivani Kakhuri Qvevri and a Saperavi Qvevri.

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ARTIST PROFILE

Longtime Los Altos resident and *STAINED-GLASS ARTIST* makes festival debut

ulia Kahan has visited the Los Altos Arts & Wine Festival multiple times, but this will be her first year doing so as a vendor. The stained-glass artist will be displaying and selling her work both days of this weekend's event.

"I was really excited when I got notified (about being in the festival), and then I was, like, 'Oh, no, I have so much to do," she said. "Polishing everything, making sure everything is labeled, all the little things to have to do to get ready."

The longtime Los Altos resident created KahanArts alongside her husband, musician Norman Kahan, so they could have a shared business despite having different artistic mediums. This way, she said, they could grow their brand together and formalize their work.

Julia has always been artistic – first as a photographer and now as a stained-glass artist.

For three years, she worked on large projects at a stained-glass studio, where she refined her techniques. Soon, she set up a home studio and made her own pieces, which she said people really enjoyed.

Julia did not let her photography skills go to waste, however. She uses her photos as a basis for her stainedglass designs, which are mostly of wildlife and landscapes. Los Altos resident Julia Kahan works on her stained-glass art. PHOTOS COURTESY OF JULIA KAHAN

PURSUING THEIR PASSIONS

Making a stained-glass piece is a multistep process that requires precision, according to Julia. She first selects one of her photos or a scene that inspires her, sometimes combining multiple ideas. She then puts that on a computer, decides how she will cut the piece and uses a glass program to decide what colors to feature.

After planning, Julia goes to a glass factory to shop for colors.

"I don't go to the factory without a plan, because I buy too much," she said.



"It's like a kid in a candy store – it's fantastic. Then I cut pieces of paper, decide what color each thing is going to be and glue it on the glass. Then I cut the glass and start to refine it, which is almost like putting a puzzle together."

After weighing her work, grinding it together and laying it out, Julia wraps each piece in copper foil. Then she solders and frames it.

Julia noted that she loves to incorporate her love for animals into the business.

"I'm very passionate about animals and I decided that if I sell my stuff or a charity needs a piece for an auction, we'd like to give it to different animal rescue societies," she said.

Her love for animals is showcased through her work, with designs featuring giraffes, bears and her dogs, Callie and Bear.

Similarly, Norman said he loves animals, especially because he grew up on a farm until age 18. He also discovered his love for music in his childhood, he added. >>




"Both of us have always been very much together with our (artistic) practice and taking care of people and animals," Norman said. "And, as we're transitioning, we're looking for ways to stay relevant and keep the passion in our life. Julia evolved to making glasswork with her pictures, and I've evolved by making music."

The couple bounce ideas off one other and provide feedback because they work together. Prior to being artists, they worked in different areas of the medical field, where sometimes they could trade ideas from different perspectives, Julia said.

"KahanArts is another vehicle for us to do it together instead of two different (businesses)," she said. "Some people said we should do two different things, but we didn't want to do that. I'm not sure success was the priority here; it was more enjoying and keeping the passion."



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FESTIVAL HISTORY

FESTIVAL HAS GROWN INTO ONE OF THE BIGGEST IN BAY AREA





ver the 44 years of its existence, the Los Altos Arts & Wine Festival has grown from a small summer festival into one of the largest on the Peninsula.

It began in 1979 when a group of merchants and business owners in downtown Los Altos decided that the city needed a popular summer festival to introduce people to the downtown area. Organizers staged the first festival in the city's South Parking Plaza in July 1980. The inaugural event drew 150 exhibitors and 30,000 attendees.

By 1983, Main and State streets were closed to accommodate the festival. By 1985, the number of exhibitors had doubled. In 1993, festival attendance topped 100,000, and since 1997, it has attracted more than 150,000 to downtown Los Altos each summer.

Today, the festival encompasses all of downtown Los Altos. Of >

the approximately 1,000 artists and artisans who apply each year, fewer than 400 meet the exacting criteria for selection and the opportunity to showcase their work.

The festival has ranked among the top 75 summer festivals in the nation for its quality and variety of exhibitors. Bay Area Parent Magazine has rated the festival "Best of the Best."

The more than 400 volunteers who keep the event running in an efficient and orderly manner heavily influence the festival's character. Volunteers range from Fortune 500 executives to local students and grandparents, giving the event a friendly, multigenerational, community-oriented flavor. Organizers strive to personalize the festival and make it a celebration where friends and family can bond.

The Linden Tree Books Kids Stage, launched in the early 1990s, has expanded into the popular Kidzone, a separate venue featuring entertainment geared exclusively to children.

For the past 20 years, the festival has included an array of international foods and a full two-day program of free music and entertainment. Festival organizers have added a free Bike and Stroller Valet Parking area.



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

The city of Los Altos boasts a long and rich history. The native Indians, Ohlones, or "people of the West," settled here for thousands of years before the arrival of the Europeans. In the late 1700s, Father Junipero Serra began the colonization of California for Spain by building a chain of missions from San Diego to Sonoma. In the attempt to "civilize" the Ohlones, the European intrusion resulted in the near eradication of the natives.

In the 1800s, most of the acreage that is now Los Altos and Los Altos Hills was included in two Mexican land grants: Rancho La Purisima Concepcion and Rancho San Antonio. The grazing lands of the large ranchos gradually were divided into smaller holdings of predominantly 40- to 100-acre parcels, planted in wheat and vineyards.

During that period, Sarah Winchester, widow of the inventor of the Winchester rifle, owned the 100 acres that later became the town site of Los Altos. The Peninsula Interurban Railway purchased her land in 1906.

One year later, the Southern Pacific Railroad bought the land for a right-of-way for its commuter trains to operate from San Francisco through the west valley and connect with a branch line from San Jose to Santa Cruz. \gg





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Paul Shoup, who later became Southern Pacific president and is known as the "Father of Los Altos," helped define the future town when he joined others to form the Altos Land Co. In 1908, the company hosted a free barbecue to entice San Franciscans to ride the train down to the country and purchase lots (starting at \$250) in the downtown triangle.

The Shoup family built several summer homes along University Avenue that still stand today.

In 2000, the Los Altos Town Crier named Paul Shoup "Los Altan of the Century."

The town developed rather slowly, with hitching posts down Main Street, the first school class held above the grocery store and the post office located in the hardware store. The wheat fields and vineyards gave way to orchards of apricot, cherry, walnut, prune and plum trees.

With the mild climate, the train for transportation and the number of businesses increasing, families began moving to Los Altos in greater numbers.

Residents voted to incorporate in 1952 due to fear of intense development and the possible annexation of some lands by surrounding communities.

Shortly thereafter, in 1956, voters in Los Altos Hills approved their incorporation to protect their 1-acre zoning.

Today, Los Altos and Los Altos Hills serve as hometowns to many of the high-tech executives working in Silicon Valley.

SUGGESTIONS FOR ENJOYING THE FESTIVAL

Following are some quick tips to help make this weekend's 44th Los Altos Arts & Wine Festival easier to navigate.



Restrooms. Festival organizers provide more than 40 portable restrooms for the weekend, located on the numbered streets (First, Second, etc.) near the entrances to the parking plazas in downtown Los Altos. Handwashing and sanitizing stations are located near each restroom area. Please refrain from asking to use merchants' bathrooms.

Parking. Parking is available in and around downtown Los Altos and at the Los Altos Community Center, 97 Hillview Ave., a short walk from downtown. Use caution when crossing San Antonio Road and only cross at the marked crosswalks.





Bicycles & Strollers. Every year, hundreds of local residents leave their cars at home and ride bicycles to the festival, where they park them for free at the Bike and Stroller Valet Parking area, a guarded corral that ensures bicycles remain safe. Strollers may be parked there as well. The bike/stroller corral is located in the Plaza South area, just off Third Street near Main.

Pets. Heat, small children, strollers and pets are not a good mix. Festival organizers request that attendees leave their pets at home.

Street Closures. The downtown Los Altos triangle is scheduled to close to all street traffic beginning 5 p.m. Friday and will not reopen until 10 p.m. Sunday. The closures include Main and State streets, Central Plaza, and Second and Third streets between Main and State.

Rideshare. Designated rideshare drop-off/pick-up is next to Village Park on Edith Avenue near the corner of San Antonio Road and Main Street.


