n almost any Monday, Los Altos Hills resident Karen Smith can be found surrounded by roses, daisies, baby's breath and a variety of other flowers. She's often accompanied by a handful of other women, most with flowers in hand; she and her colleagues are part of local group Blossom Buddies.

The Blossom Buddies create floral arrangements and deliver them to multiple local health facilities in an effort to bring patients joy and encourage positivity during their journeys.

Smith learned about Blossom Buddies on Nextdoor, when the group was part of a national nonprofit known as Random Acts of Flowers.

"I have, for many years, done the centerpieces at the (Kiwanis) tree lot. So I had some things that I knew I wasn't going to use at the tree lot, and I saw on Nextdoor that (Random Acts of Flowers) was looking for donations," she said. "So they came and picked it up and I said, 'I want to join'."

She filled out an application, but after months of waiting, they never got back to her. She figured they didn't need her help, but she later learned it was because Random Acts of Flowers Silicon Valley, the local affiliate group of the main Random Acts of Flowers site, which was established in 2008 in Tennessee, had closed.







But many women who had been part of Random Acts of Flowers were set on continuing the work the nonprofit provided the community, and soon Blossom Buddies was formed.

Smith said that she somehow found the new group – she couldn't recall where she learned about Blossom Buddies – and requested to join.


Blossom Buddies has operated in the Los Altos, Los Altos Hills and Mountain View area since it was founded in spring 2018. During a hiatus in 2020, as the Coronavirus pandemic forced health facilities to enact strict restrictions to prevent the spread of illness, Blossom Buddies volunteers instead penned

greeting cards to patients in an effort to boost their spirits.

It wasn't until December 2021 that the group resumed bouquet designing and their weekly floral arrangement deliveries; since then, the group has continued to spread happiness through floral arrangements.

Every Monday, Smith and other volunteers put together intricate, masterfully designed bouquets from the driveway of one of the members using recycled flowers and vases, given to the group by local grocers, like Ava's Market in downtown Mountain View and the Trader Joe's locations in Mountain View and Los Altos, and even private donors.







She mentioned that earlier in August, a newly married couple had dropped off the leftover flowers from their wedding.

"This couple that came on Monday, it was so cute. The groom said, 'Well, I just went online and to see where I could donate flowers, and Blossom Buddies showed up,'" she said. "And I like that."

Many of the women then take the floral arrangements the group put

together and deliver them to different health facilities in the surrounding area, including the Los Altos Sub-Acute Rehabilitation Center, Palo Alto VA Hospital, Mountain View Healthcare Center, Palo Alto Commons and Grant Cuesta Sub-Acute and Rehabilitation Center.

Many of the women are Filolitrained, Smith said, and the group can put together more than 100 floral arrangements in around two hours,

she said. In 2023 alone, the Blossom Buddies delivered more than 2,500 bouquets.

Smith said the best part of Blossom Buddies is the process of putting the arrangements together.

When asked what her favorite part of volunteering with the group was, she responded, "Creating and working with great folks. They're the best."

Blossom Buddies is not looking for more volunteers – the group is at its limit – but they're always open for flower and vase donations.

Hills bring color, variety to Los Altos home

he word "exuberant" describes the riot of color alongside the brick walkway leading to the Los Altos home of Judy and George Hill and is a metaphor for the home itself.

It's lively, livable, luxurious and surrounded by lush landscaping. However, it had a somewhat humble beginning.

It replaced a one-bedroom, two-bath house formerly owned by the late Sam Kahn, who founded Kahn's Corner Pharmacy when Main Street still had hitching posts. The only feature that remains is the living room fireplace, which the Hills love. It has been joined by two more in what's now a three-bedroom, three-bath, 2,483-square-foot home.

In the late 1970s, the Hill family was living in Cupertino and looking to relocate in Los Altos to be closer to friends. George, a San Francisco fireman and part-time realtor, also would benefit from a lesser commute.

"George discovered our dream house on one of his real estate open house tours and it just happened to be right around the block from my college roommate's home," Judy said. "It was a spec house built by an imaginative builder."

It was love at first sight – much like their meeting as a bachelor and a widow with a young son – and it became their home in 1980.

The façade of what appears to be a "cottage" of either English Tudor or French Country origin is deceiving. Step over the threshold into the living room and you're surprised by an expansive view through the house to the garden. >>

os Altos resident Dr. Kingstone Shih has ridden camels in Jordan, run with the bulls in Spain and gone glacier trekking in Argentina all activities that undoubtedly require careful planning and forethought.

Shih, who specializes in root canals for the Peninsula Endodontic Group in Mountain View, estimated he has submitted 20 photos of himself on vacation with a copy of the paper to the Town Crier since 2014, bringing the latest Los Altos news to more than 12 countries and several U.S. states.

"The reason I bring the Town Crier with me on my vacations is because I'm proud to be a Los Altos resident and I've known (Barton) for a long time," Shih said.

Since 2014, Shih has posed with the Town Crier in front of several famous monuments and locations, including the Tower of Pisa, the 2024 World Cup in Brazil and the 2024 Super Bowl in Las Vegas.

A personal journey into my vinyl collection

y first memory of vinyl is from home. I was a kid the first time I heard Nat King Cole's smooth voice singing in Spanish on my dad's vintage console record player. The album: *Cole Español*. I was too young to fully appreciate the magic of vinyl, but something about that moment stayed with me. The warmth of Cole's voice, the subtle crackle sounds of the needle moving across the grooves, and the feeling of nostalgia it evoked created in me a sense of home, comfort and connection. That's how listening to music on vinyl became a unique, immersive listening experience for me. It was this longing for home, my passion for music and the appreciation for the album cover art that started my journey into my vinyl record collection.

AN IMMERSIVE LISTENING EXPERIENCE

My first record was a gift: Fleetwood Mac's Rumors. I was already a fan of the band, and owned their greatest hits album on CD, but listening to Rumors on vinyl was a different, compelling experience. When I first heard the crackle of the needle touching the record, it immediately reminded me of my dad's vintage console. Although now I take great care to clean my records, that nostalgic sound still evokes a sense of home. Listening to Rumors in its entirely showed me a different side of the band I knew from their greatest hits album. Unlike digital formats, with vinyl you can't skip tracks. Vinyl records require you to listen to the entire album from start to finish. This immersive experience allows you to listen fully to the artist's intended narrative. This is what makes vinyl so special. It allows you to appreciate the album as a cohesive piece. Behind a great album there is a compelling story, and vinyl provides the perfect media to experience that story in its entirety.

BUILDING A COLLECTION

As a collector, I try to own the complete discographies of my favorite artist. After listening to Fleetwood Mac's *Rumors* on vinyl for the first time, I decided to collect all the Fleetwood Mac records I could find. To this day, I have most of their discography on vinyl. Over time, my collection has grown significantly, and now includes around 2,000 records, thanks in part to the generous gifts from friends and my own dedicated searching. For instance, my dear friend, Mr. Barry Anderson, generously gave me his small collection once he knew I was into vinyl. It included about 40 records, mostly The Beatles and Bob Dylan, and most of them were first editions. That's how collecting has led me to end up with the complete, or nearly complete, discographies of The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Queen, Madonna, Janis Joplin, Sufjan Stevens, Pearl Jam and many others.

A PASSION FOR ART AND MUSIC

As a graphic designer, I'm drawn to the artistry of record covers and packaging. There's something captivating about a well-designed album cover, like the magical cover of The Beatles' Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band, the surreal illustration on the gatefold cover of King Crimson's In the Court of the Crimson King, or The Clash's London Calling that evokes Elvis Presley's first album cover. These covers aren't just packaging; they're an integral part of the listening experience. Receiving the physical format of a vinyl record enhances my

appreciation for the artwork, from cover to the insert with the lyric to the back cover. The whole package deepens the immersive vinyl experience. I especially love when the artists go the extra mile with their packaging. For instance, Led Zeppelin's *III* was released in a die-cut gatefold featuring a rotating wheel in the front; the Rolling Stone's *Licky Finger* cover comes with a real zipper; and the 2018 special edition of John Fogerty's *Centerfield* gatefold cover features a pop-up of a baseball stadium.





As my vinyl collection got bigger and evolved, so did my taste in music. I expanded from rock and pop to jazz with artists like Miles Davis, Kamasi Washington and Samara Joy. I dove into the funky grooves of George Clinton and Funkadelic, the rebellious energy of punk with The Ramones and Green Day, the poetic rhythms of hip-hop with Lauryn Hill and Nas, the sensuality of R&B with Sade and Al Green, the vibrant sounds of Latin music with Celia Cruz and Hector Lavoe, and the international melodies of Ofra Haza, Andy Lau and the Gypsy Kings. My vinyl collection became a reflection of my eclectic tastes and musical journey.

Over time, I've been fortunate enough to acquire some rare and hard-to-find editions. Among my prized possessions are the first edition of Bob Dylan's *Blonde on Blonde* with the picture of Claudia Cardinale before it was removed, and The Rolling Stones' *Some Girls* first edition with the photos of Marilyn Monroe, Lucille Ball, Raquel Welch, and others who didn't give permission, leading to a cover change. I also have some rarities, like an out-of-print box set of Jimi Hendrix records that includes 13 of his studio albums, an album by the dark European group Someone's Band and a promotional, white label/test pressing copy of Bob Dylan's *Blood on the Tracks*.

THE JOY OF VINYL COLLECTING

Vinyl collecting can be incredibly rewarding if you're into music and art. Each record is a piece of history, a work of art, and a reminder of why I fell in love with music in the first place. As my collection continues to grow, I'm always looking ahead to what's next. Even though I've become more selective in my purchases, there's still so much to explore. Looking back, my vinyl journey has been incredibly rewarding, and I can't wait to see where it takes me next. Whether I'm adding a rare find to my collection or simply enjoying an old favorite, vinyl continues to bring joy to my life in ways that still amaze me, just like the very first time.

"Life's tough, and then you die."

For a while, that saying my mom would respond with when I'd complain because life was particularly hard or frustrating as a child, would echo in my mind. Of course, she didn't say it when I was actually sad or had complaints worthy of a thoughtful response – she'd say it when I talked about seemingly endless piles of homework or silly friendship quarrels – but it stuck with me regardless.

But as an adult with depression, those words were prevalent in my day-to-day life. While my mental illness is under control, regulating ruminance – when I focused on and obsessed over negative thoughts – was hard. I accepted that life was simply "tough" and I'd just have to stick it out until it got better (or I kicked the bucket), but I learned that way of thinking was dangerous.

I found my often internally pessimistic view of my circumstances and place in the world was, understandably, worsening my mental health. In March I decided I wanted to do everything I could to change the way I approached life. One of the major changes that worked the best for me was changing how I viewed the world, and life itself.

Instead of believing that life was constantly hard and focusing on the negative aspects of life, I decided to switch my point of view and focus on the good; instead of fixating on how, for a lack of better words, life sucked, I chose to see the beauty in life.

I began romanticizing my existence, seeing the good and the beauty and the joy that was around me. All it took was a little searching.

Though romanticization, the act of recalling or seeing something in a positive or romantic light, may often have negative connotations related to illusionment and aloofness, romanticizing life is about finding joy in the in-between. It's seen in the act of admiring and appreciating the small moments, the smiles, conversations, meals, connections and slice-of-life interactions that bring joy.

Romanticizing life is about acknowledging that life can be hard, but it can also be rewarding. Life is a gift, and happiness can be found everywhere.

I learned about romanticization from slow-living YouTubers – often women who've been burnt out and had their mental health deteriorate



from the fast and stressful lives they led – and determined I wanted to live slowly, too.

I was intrigued by the slow-living lifestyle, which encourages intentional and meaningful existences by slowing down and living in the moment, and soon I realized romanticization goes hand-in-hand with slow living. To live slow, it's important to romanticize what may seem abysmal to someone else.

In my eyes, appreciation at its core is the basis of romanticization. The heart of romanticization comes from acknowledging the positive that comes from the mundane.

I started off small; I took a look at my day-to-day life and found what made me happy. My friends, from those I've known since high school to those I work with at the Town Crier, were some of the first parts of my life I took the time to appreciate. I get to be silly with them, complain to them and learn from them; those connections are so special and make life much more fun.

Even small interactions – like walking down State Street and receiving (and reciprocating) a warm smile from someone brushing past me – can bring joy. There's something >









beautiful about being kind to someone you don't necessarily have to be kind to.

Going outside, sitting on my back porch as the sun sets and watching the leaves of my walnut tree dance with the breeze after a hard day at work help me remember that there is more to this life than what we see. Someone who's longgone admired small aspects of nature in the same way I did. Nature's a constant that's been here before I came to this world, and it'll continue long after I'm gone, but it connects us all.

The passage of time has always been something I had a hard time grappling with. I've often felt that I'm moving slower than I want to, and as someone who tends to be impatient, it's also been hard waiting for milestones and change. But instead of focusing on how I feel like I'm missing out to some degree, I focus on the now. I focus on how the idea of time is an illusion, and if I'm going to feel any emotion related to it, it's going to be joy.

With autumn closing in, I grow giddy thinking of the leaves I'll get to crunch along Main Street. I'm looking forward to cool weather and the smell of rain filling my senses, reminding me the season will be over almost as quickly as it began.

Romanticizing life has made me happier than I've been in my adult life. It's amazing how appreciating the small things can make such a large impact. §
