get close to nature without having to go far

hildren in the Bay Area are often surrounded by the hustle and bustle of urban life and forget that nature is outside their doorstep.

A nonprofit summer camp snuggled in the verdant preserves of Los Altos Hills is a reminder of that.

Hidden Villa is a 1,600-acre property with historic buildings and a farm that offers an outdoor summer program for youth in elementary school through high school. There are day camps for those in grades K-4 (for \$850), overnight Community Camps for students in grades 4-7 (\$1,025-\$2,050), Farm & Wilderness camps for kids in grades 8-10 (\$1,025-\$2,050)



and backpacking trips for high schoolers (\$1,050-\$2,200).

Financial aid is offered to students who cannot afford those prices, according to Hidden Villa Summer Camp Director Ben King.

While at Hidden Villa, campers participate in activities such as archery, swimming, hiking and arts and crafts.

"Hidden Villa focuses on helping kids make connections with nature, with each other and with themselves," King said. "It's a place where we celebrate kids being kids, give them the opportunity to unplug from technology and connect to the world around them."

He added that day campers usually arrive at about 9 a.m. and gather for a morning circle. Afterward, they break off for choice activities - such as exploring the ranch or taking care of animals - then dive into the pool for a swim before gathering to eat their packed lunch. After an afternoon siesta, campers break off into another round of choice activities. The day closes off with a group activity and then campers are picked up at 4 p.m.

Overnight campers do these activities as well but also have more responsibilities, such as taking care of the animals on the farm, King said.

Jessica Zuckerman DuVal, director of development and communication, said the hardest program is the 12-day Bay to Sea backpacking trip. Campers hike over the Santa Cruz Mountains to the Pacific Ocean, averaging approximately 5 miles a day, she said. The strenuous trip gives campers noticeable confidence and a greater appreciation for nature once they complete it, according to DuVal.

"After coming back from their backpacking trip, a group of teenagers were so proud and you could tell this group of young people just connected," she said. "There was this group of teen boys in particular, and I remember asking them for a highlight from the trip and they (said) 'The sunset at Black Mountain; everyone should go see it because it was so peaceful and touching.' To hear these young people appreciate a sunset they shared together is beautiful and that's what I love."

Programs like the Bay to Sea backpacking trip have a long history. It's been around about as long as the camp, founded in 1924.

In that time, traditions have been established. One of them is float night, when campers create floats and launch them in the pool. King said they hold hands and sing a pop song with ad-libbed lyrics that describe their experience at camp. Then they make two wishes, one for Hidden Villa and one for the world.

"What blows me away the most is the similarities of what (high school seniors) and (fourth graders) wish for, just in different words," King said. "That

shows me that there is this incredible energy that people feel when they are here. These cares and desires in kids, they really are discovering it here." ">



**Wavelength.** Two teams compete to read their teammate's mind by guessing where a concept falls on a spectrum. For example, the spectrum might be "Useless Invention" to "Useful Invention" and the clue giver provides a word like "napping pillow." This game requires teamwork, communication and a shared understanding of concepts, often leading to surprising and engaging gameplay.

**Codenames.** Two teams compete to see which can be the first to identify their secret agents. Spymasters give one-word clues that can relate to multiple words on the board and teams must carefully consider the clues to avoid contacting the assassin, which ends the game immediately. Codenames is suited for large groups, encouraging creative thinking and collaboration.

**7 Wonders.** Players lead ancient civilizations by drafting cards to build structures, develop technologies and gather military might. This fast-paced card drafting game is played simultaneously, with all players competing at the same time.

**Azul.** The abstract strategy game requires players to draft colorful tiles to decorate their palace walls. Points are awarded for creating specific patterns and completing rows and columns.

Next Level Board Game Cafe is open 5-10 p.m. Tuesdays and Wednesday, and 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Thursday through Sunday. It is located at 888 Villa St., Mountain View. For more information, visit nextlevelboardgamecafe.com.

# DON'T BE SCARED. BE PREPARED

he recent wildfires in Los Angeles County may have you thinking about emergency preparedness. Here in the Los Altos area, we primarily face risks of earthquakes and wildfires, although other disasters are also possible. You can take steps that will help you prepare your family for any disaster. Review our Five Principles of Preparedness to check your family's current status and take steps to strengthen your preparedness.

#### 1. REGISTER FOR EMERGENCY NOTIFICATIONS

Take a moment now to sign up or update your registration with AlertSCC (or your home county's emergency notification system). Register at the website alertscc.org to get the AlertSCC emergency notifications in Santa Clara County, sending out alerts via phone calls, emails and text messages. Visit AlerttheBay.org to register for alerts in other Bay Area counties (e.g. where family members work, live, attend school).

- · Register your home address and contact information for all your phones, in order to receive alerts tailored for your neighborhood.
- Put the contact numbers in your phone's address book so you recognize it as an emergency alert:
- 408-808-7871 (alerts sent by Santa Clara County).
- 650-947-2800 (alerts sent by the City of Los Altos).
- Set the ringtone for these numbers to "emergency bypass" so it rings even when your notifications are silenced.

#### 2. KNOW HOW TO GET OUT

Make a plan with your household for how to get out in an emergency.

When you're out in public (e.g. at a store, your faith community, work or school), know how to get out of the building or to find a place to take cover.

At home, know two ways out in case of a house fire.

And, make a plan in case you need to evacuate from your home:

You already know your "usual way" to the freeway.



- Identify another route out of your neighborhood, in case your usual route is blocked by emergency equipment or by traffic.
- Look on a map to find a "back way" to go that may be quicker in an evacuation.
- Identify a route you could walk or bicycle, just in case.
- · Practice your plan! Load up your household (including pets) and drive your evacuation routes. Discuss where you could go after evacuating (e.g. a friend or family member's home, or a hotel). Talk about where you could meet if you're in different places.

During a wildfire or other event, you should evacuate if you are concerned about your safety in your home. Local authorities may give an evacuation warning, telling you to be ready to go; or an evacuation order, when you must go. However, your family may need more time to evacuate (e.g. small children, pets, people with mobility restrictions or special needs, limited evacuation routes) or you may feel unsafe - go early, don't wait!

#### 3. KNOW WHAT TO DO

When an earthquake occurs, you need to know: Drop, Cover, Hold On. You drop to the ground (or lock your mobility device) so the earth movement doesn't make you

fall, and then you crawl under a sturdy piece of furniture and hold on.







After any disaster, you need to know how to help yourself, your family, or a neighbor. Learn what to do:

- · Get trained on basic first aid skills.
- Take Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training to learn how to help while keeping yourself safe.
- Take skills training such as CPR or Stop the Bleed.

#### 4. MAKE A PLAN, MAKE A KIT

Build your emergency supplies kit or update it. You can find websites with good recommendations for what to put in your kit.

- Food and water: store at least 1 gallon of water per person, per day, plus extra for pets. Store shelf-stable foods (like canned goods) that your family will regularly eat so that you can rotate them back into your daily menus and replenish with fresh cans. (How many days depends on your risk tolerance and storage space, but store a 7-day supply.)
- Medications: store a supply of any prescription medications needed by your household (including pets), along with commonly used over-the-counter medications like ibuprofen.
- · Maintenance: an annual event (such as New Year's Day, a special birthday, a national holiday) can be a good reminder to refresh the water, food, medications, batteries, etc. in your kit. Review the kit contents against the needs of your family and pets as they change over time (diapers, tampons, foods, medications.)
- Storage: Your kits will need to be accessible, yet put out of the way in a cool, dry, shaded spot (e.g. in an interior closet, or outdoors in a shed.)

#### 5. KNOW HOW TO COMMUNICATE WITH YOUR HOUSEHOLD

Review your communications plan so that your family members will be able to contact each other after an emergency event:

- Is your communications plan up to date with correct phone numbers? Does it have an out-of-state contact who can relay messages between family members?
- Do you know how to access your voicemail from someone else's phone? How to change your outgoing voicemail message from a different phone? That can help you pass messages to each other.
- Does your family have a meeting point in case an event happens when not everyone is home? Make a reunification plan.
- If you have children: Are the emergency contacts and phone numbers that you gave the school all up to date? (and - did you tell those contacts you listed them? Do your children know who these contacts are?)



#### **CODING WITH ROBOTS**

Code for Fun is offering a class called Coding with Robots: The camp on computer science and robotics will allow for hands-on learning through an interactive robot on topics like loops and algorithms, according to the city. Kids will work together on projects like choreographed robot dance routines. The class runs July 7-11, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The cost is approximately \$612 for residents and \$687 for non-residents.

#### ROBOPETS ROBOTICS

Snapology will have RoboPets Robotics, a class about creating, engineering and icon programming. The week will allow kids to build robot friends based on types of animals. The class is June 30-July 3 at the Los Altos Community Center. It is \$267 for residents and \$318 for non-residents.

#### **CHESS CAMP**

Chess Wizards will offer a Chess Camp with all materials provided, including lessons, games and prizes. Two camps are available the week of Aug. 4-8 at the Los Altos Community Center, one in the morning from 9 a.m. to noon and the other in the afternoon from noon to 3 p.m. Class cost is \$354 for residents and \$422 for non residents.
