MOUNTAIN VIEW PUBLIC GARDENS GROW IN POPULARITY

hile the COVID-19 pandemic shuttered schools, restaurants and retail, it never completely subdued Mountain View's public gardens; the city's Latham, Willowgate and Senior Center community gardens stayed open throughout lockdown, albeit with new requirements such as mask wearing, social distancing and directives against the sharing of tools.

The public demand for plots remains high, and garden staff maintain extensive waitlists for each of the three sites. Hopefuls interested in the Willowgate garden, for example, have a three- to four-year slog ahead of them. \gg

The Latham Community Garden, the 0.8-acre, city-owned property at the corner of Latham Street and Shoreline Boulevard, opened in August 2019 following direction from the Mountain View Parks and Recreation Commission. It features 84 6-foot-by-18-foot plots, some of which are offered for rent to low-income families at reduced fees. Town Crier freelance photographer Eric Davidove spent a recent Sunday morning with the green thumbs of Latham.

As of June 14, gardeners had staked claim to all 248 of Mountain View's community garden plots.



Jomen's dignity is not always front and center in traditional garment drives. The Bay Areabased nonprofit organization Be a Dear and Donate a Brassiere (BAD) offers a solution for that unmet need. Since its founding in 2009 by Eileen Hunter, Lisa Collins and Beverly Williams, BAD has collected more than 35,000 bras, donated directly to local women and nonprofit groups serving women and homeless shelters.

BAD's mission is to impact women's lives and help give women self-assurance by providing new and gently used undergarments. The group does it in an eco-friendly manner by having women donate, share and recycle their pieces.

"We are making sure that every woman has a bra that fits, and that she can feel self-dignity, go to (job) interviews and just be healthy," Hunter said.

Hunter credits BAD's sponsor, the San Jose Women's Club, which took them under its wing in 2014, with how far they've come. Through the Women's Club, BAD expanded its network of women willing to host fundraising events and drives.

Over the years, BAD has partnered with businesses and women's and girls' organizations to promote bra drives and organized fundraising and service events, including Communi-Tea, OktoBRAfest, Comedy Unhooked, the Makeover Day Project (where homeless women received a full makeover treatment including outfit and bra selections), as well as a Bra Bank. The Bra Bank collects donated funds for BAD to purchase two bras for any woman who has special fitting needs. BAD also currently has five drop-off locations, including Eco-Fash at 251 Main St. in Los Altos.

to a luncheon to share their stories, receive support and "shop" from the donations.

"Communi-Tea provides a safe space with other women experiencing similar traumas for an afternoon of respite and nurturing," Hunter said. "We want all of the women to come away with a bra that fits, joy and increased dignity."

MOBILIZING OTHERS

BAD has inspired other local residents to join the effort in supporting women. Los Altos Hills resident Lyn Rogers became familiar with underprivileged women's needs through her past work with Project Homeless

"They were lacking bras for years, and Eileen really inspired me to start doing bra drives," Rogers said. "I felt that doing this helps women feel more confident and empowered. Many women have unused bras sitting in their drawer, and it's such an easy and great thing that people can donate."

Over the past month, Rogers has sought out donations by using the online Nextdoor network; she's collected more than 100 items to donate to Eco-Fash.

Another volunteer, Elise Mullen from Presentation High School, rallied the support of her high school peers by organizing 2019 OctoBRA and 2020 NovemBRA drives, at which students collected a total of more than 1,300 undergarments.

"Many of the women who receive the bra and undergarments from Be a Dear and Donate a Brassiere are women faced with numerous hardships and often uncertainty," Mullen said. "A proper, well-fitting bra has the power to promote feelings of dignity and confidence in women of all ages."



ootle through a Silicon Valley residential neighborhood and you're bound to eventually spot one hugging a street or sidewalk: a brightly colored box one might easily mistake for an oversized mailbox. Peek inside. Instead of letters and packages, the glass door reveals biographies, murder mysteries, young adult novels and pulp fiction. They're all free. Take one. Leave one.

Inspired by existing Little Free Library (LFL) "branches," residents within the Los Altos-Los Altos Hills-Mountain View community have constructed more than 50 of their own. Cathy Harkness of Los Altos dedicated her Queensbury Avenue branch to "anyone who doesn't consider themselves a 'reader' yet." Mountain View resident Erin Brownfield's branch, on Hamilton Avenue, was a birthday gift to her 4-year-old son because he wasn't tall enough to reach into those built for adults. >>

Approximately nine years ago, Los Altos resident Jen McGuigan's family admired an LFL in Palo Alto. Her daughter, Kate, told her grandparents about the discovery.

"Lo and behold, that Christmas, my parents showed up to our house with a fully built-from-scratch Little Free Library," McGuigan said. "And it's hands down one of the most memorable gifts that my parents have given their grandchildren."

Although the McGuigans stocked their LFL with an initial donation of reading material geared toward young adults, it has largely operated autonomously since then with contributions from neighbors and random passersby. Among the more recent additions are former First Lady Michelle Obama's memoir "Becoming," "The Sun Also Rises" by Ernest Hemingway, a tour guide for Provence and the Côte d'Azur and a book about the sharks and rays native to California coasts.

"I love it because I've seen delivery people who have dropped off a box at my house run over to see what's in there," McGuigan said. "Or guys who are doing construction in the neighborhood use it. And that just

warms my heart. I get the biggest kick out of seeing people enjoy it."

WORLDWIDE EXPANSION

LFL founder Todd Bol of Hudson. Wis., built the first official branch in 2009. He constructed his library in the shape of a schoolhouse to honor his mother, a teacher who loved to read, stocked it with books and installed the structure on a post in his front yard. His project garnered the support of his community, which appreciated the "take-a-book-leave-a-book" concept, and it attracted the attention of Rick Brooks, a University of Wisconsin-Madison outreach program manager. Together, Bol and Brooks grew the LFL network and registered their endeavor as a nonprofit in 2012.

Madison and Minneapolis hosted the first LFLs, the cities serving as testing grounds to determine whether the idea would "strike a chord with people," said Margret Aldrich, LFL director of communications.

It did.

There are now more than 100,000 LFLs located in all 50 states as well as within 110 countries. Annually, they facilitate the exchange of more than 42 million books. ➤



LFL reached an impressive milestone just last year: In December, Russell Schnell, a Boulder, Colo., resident and atmospheric scientist for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, helped the nonprofit

LFL reached an impressive reach all seven continents by erecting nilestone just last year: In December, charter No. 115933 at the South Pole.

"Books with photos of colorful trees, warm deserts, water, beaches, wheat fields and animals and birds are popular at the South Pole," Schnell said, according to an LFL blog post. "Everything else is white for hundreds of miles in all directions."

EXPRESS YOURSELF

Approximately half of LFL stewards purchase official kits from the organization, and the rest do it themselves. Homemade versions include libraries shaped like roosters, Victorian mansions, VW buses and gingerbread houses. Some feature planters for flowers, and at least one McGuigan has encountered is fashioned from a wine barrel.

In North Saint Paul, Minn., steward Trudy O. created a library using an antique clock and stationed it outside a historical home built in 1887. There's a designated children's section on the lowest shelf and a secret compartment in the base.

When asked to describe their favorite LFL designs, both McGuigan and Aldrich mentioned Sharalee Armitage Howard, a librarian, artist and bookbinder living in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. When city officials told Howard the dead 110-year-old cottonwood tree in her front yard posed a safety hazard and required removal, she instructed the arborists hired for the job to leave behind a stump approximately the height of a singlestory home. A glass-paneled door fringed by miniature replicas of classics like "The Hobbit," "Little Women" and "Call of the Wild" invites visitors to a carved-out interior. Multiple illuminated shelves within house the ever-changing collection.

"That was pretty spectacular," Aldrich said.

PANDEMIC-FUELED GROWTH

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, stewards like the McGuigans have reported a significant increase in activity around their LFL, and the organization noted an uptick in the number of charters established as well, Aldrich said. She attributes demand both to the temporary closure of traditional libraries and schools and to the feelings of isolation some people in lockdown experienced.

"Little Free Libraries and sharing books through Little Free Libraries with your neighbors was really one way to feel like we're still all in this together even when we have to be apart," Aldrich said.

The McGuigans discovered their LFL presented a means for staying connected.

"People would show up at the Little Free Library, and we would have an excuse to go out there, keep our distance, stand in our yard and have a chat with people," McGuigan said. "So that was really nice. And, as a joke, I put toilet paper and hand sanitizer in the Little Free Library, and it was taken."


LINUS AND LUCY, 8 years old







Death of Giant

oak stood tall, a silent sentry greeting all who entered and departed Los Altos Hills along one of the town's most trafficked arteries. The slope of earth beneath the heavy boughs created an illusion of the trunk bowing to Moody Road as it shunned Old Snakey Road above. Gravity and powerful winds proved formidable foes, and the oak finally surrendered its burden June 7. The force of impact splintered limbs.


Open Space Committee chairperson Kit Gordon encountered a fellow mourner when she arrived on scene to inspect the damage.

"There was a young woman standing amongst the branches nearly in tears," Gordon said during the committee's June 9 meeting. "She said she drives by that tree every day, and she was totally heartbroken to see it fall."

Photos Gordon shared of the fallen tree elicited melancholic "ohs" from the rest of the committee.

"I had a very similar tree in my backyard that toppled, and I thought it was going to continue to live, but it took several months before it finally got brown," George Clifford said. "So I would say just looking at this, I don't have a lot of hope for it."

Per Los Altos Hills municipal code, the tree's sizable girth likely granted it designation as a heritage oak tree, protecting it from removal >>>

and human-inflicted damage without prior approval of the city council. But a sleeping giant represented a fire hazard; the town maintenance crew reduced the oak to logs.

Since September 2016, the oak had sheltered a plaque commemorating Rex Gardiner, a celebrated founder of the town who died in 2015 at the age of 93. John Harpootlian, when he served as mayor, presided over the plaque installation ceremony.

"With our thanks and appreciation, we dedicate this open space to Rex Gardiner's vision, determination and leadership and hope that all of us present and generations moving forward can cherish this space and the town that he helped to create that we call home," Harpootlian said at the time.

Gardiner's plaque will remain at the site, Gordon said. Eventually, it might be joined by a native tree or shrub.
