EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Cobb County residents consistently identify traffic congestion as their primary concern, with residents in the south and southeastern areas of Cobb County more likely to support the M-SPLOST proposal and underscoring the importance of the program to address the needs of each community. In response to the identified concerns and variations, 63% of residents indicate support for M-SPLOST, suggesting widespread recognition of the urgency to invest in infrastructure improvements and the proposal as a whole.








