

Rebels are Polar League-Big Conference Champions

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Moose Lake Willow River boys' basketball team (14-3) finished their regular season games on Friday, March 12, with an 84-66 victory over Chisholm on "Senior Night". On Tuesday, March 9, they defeated Wrenshall 71-45 and celebrated Parents' Night with roses and hand-written letters to their parents.

Ten Rebels scored in the Wrenshall game and two team members, Brady Watrin and Duane Broughton, were not in uniform that night because of injuries. At half-time the Rebels were in the lead, 58-15. In the second half, Phillip Sheetz added four more threes to his two in the first half and was the scoring leader finishing with 22 points. Mason Olson sunk five threes and finished with 21. Logan Orvedahl sunk two threes, Sam Dewey and Jimmy Walker each had one for a team effort of 15 threes. Scoring for the Rebels were Landin Kurhajetz 14, Alex Watrin 12, Orvedahl 10, Dewey 5, Walker 3, Zach Youngs, Drew Danielson, and Carter Johnson each with 2. The team was 4 for 5 from the line, with Alex Watrin making all four. Rebels won 71-45.

The Rebels started out slow in the game against Chisholm. With 10 minutes left in the first half, the Rebels were trailing 18-14. Carter Johnson and Duane Broughton were on the bench in street clothes because of injuries. Chisholm's starter, junior Jude Sundquist, ended the game with 35 of their 66 points. At the first half buzzer, the Rebels led 44 to 36. The Rebels made five out of six at the line. They had 15 threes once again. Olson had six, Sheetz four threes, Orvedahl, Dewey, Danielson, Brady Watrin and Chance Lunde each got one. Leading scorer for the night was Olson with 28, Watrin and Sheetz finished with 12 points. Orvedahl had 10, Lunde 8, Danielson and Sam Dewey had 5 each, and Kurhajetz with 4. Rebels won 84-66.

The Rebels' JV team defeated Wrenshall, 68-45, and won over Chisholm 71-45.

The Rebels won the Polar League-Big conference, followed by Esko, South Ridge, Two Harbors, Barnum, and Cook County. In Section 7AA, Pequot Lakes is first with 128.6 QRF ranking points, Duluth Marshall is second with 102.9 points and MLWR is third with 108.1 points, Esko fourth with 101.4 points. The Section 7AA

playoffs start on Wednesday, March 17 against Greenway at 6:00 p.m. MLWR will have a home game because they are the higher seed. If they win

Wednesday's game, they will have another home game on Friday, March 19 against the winner of the Pierz vs. Virginia game. MLWR is number one

in the state in points scored in the regular season games with an average of 87.8.

Plans for summer events move ahead, tentatively

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Power in Moose Lake has been returned to normal operations after a transformer failure earlier in the month. The transformer has been fully replaced at the Moose Lake Northern Substation of the Moose Lake Power Plant.

The Moose Lake Chamber is tentatively beginning to plan summer events. Considering how other cities are proceeding is helping them make decisions about what shape events are taking. Fireworks for the annual Fourth of July display are being purchased by the City of Moose Lake. This year the city has decided to contract with Pyrotechnic Display Inc. for \$10,000 to have them fire off the display. Usually the city purchases fireworks from Precocious Pyrotechnics and has volunteers shoot them off. A bid was requested from Precocious Pyrotechnics for both fireworks and the service of firing them, this bid was

\$14,000. The city determined that the Pyrotechnic Display Inc. bid was more appropriate and went with their services. A brief discussion about planning a fundraiser to cover the increased cost for the city took place. More plans for this will be coming during future meetings.

TRAIL GRANTS

The Trunk Highway 73 Trail/School Connection project design is 90% completed. A full report on the project design is expected at the next meeting after the Minnesota Department of Transportation and Minnesota Department of Natural Resources approves the final submitted design. City Administrator Katie Bloom is working on acquiring the necessary easements for the project to begin.

Trees will be removed along Trunk Highway 73 for the beginning of construction of the Trunk Highway 73 trail project. Due to Minnesota Department of Transportation permitting

the work will be completed by March 31.

An increased price tag for the Soo Line Trail Reconstruction project was presented to the council. Increased fees for labor and equipment raised the price \$10,950. This still falls within the projected overall budget of \$200,000. The update was caused by a change in timeline from Fall of 2020 for the project construction to a new date of Spring 2021. Department of Natural Resources grant funding is being used to pay \$150,000 of the project, with a required contribution of \$50,000 from the city.

Concerns over the conflict of the MS150 bike race coinciding with construction on this project were put at rest. The MS150 will end at Hinckley and be in the southern portion of the state this year due to COVID-19 concerns. If the project and race were to have coincided bicyclists would have been rerouted down Arrowhead Lane.

Moose Lake School finances latest pandemic victim

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At times this year, the Moose Lake School District financial situation has looked grim.

"COVID-19 has had a significant impact on us," said Billie Jo Steen, superintendent. She explained that schools need to estimate their budgets several months in advance for the following school year, including the number of students. "We don't know what our revenue will be for the school year until the kids show up at our door," Steen said.

The June 15, 2020 preliminary budget estimated a \$89,000 balance in the general fund based on 600 students. But due to the drop in enrollment as a result of COVID, the budget was revised in October, 2020 for 575 students. It showed a drop of \$153,644 in the general revenue budget and a \$14,981 drop for the expenditure budget.

The result was a projected general fund deficit of \$79,479.

"The purpose of a healthy fund balance is to weather large fluctuations in student enrollment, state funding or unforeseen events such as a flood or global pandemic," Steen said.

She clarified that the general fund is separate from the building fund, which is funded by the sale of voter approved bonds.

"We had a budget surplus in 2019-2020," Steen said. "But we did not have a healthy fund balance."

Moose Lake School District is not alone.

The Minnesota Department of Education released data for the 2020-2021 school year enrollment. Parents across the state made tough choices about their children's education due to the pandemic. The changes led to a roughly 2% decrease or

Ice deteriorating quickly with recent warm weather

MINNESOTA DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources urges people to be extremely cautious on and around the ice, as recent warm weather has deteriorated ice conditions across the state. Some lakes already have large areas of open water and there have been reports of vehicles breaking through.

Ice thickness varies widely across the state. In some places south of the Twin Cities, DNR

conservation officers already are warning people to stay off the ice. Ice conditions near shorelines and public access sites are particularly poor. All across Minnesota, ice conditions become highly variable when the weather is warm and the sun gains strength.

"Take extra safety precautions around the ice right now," said Lisa Dugan, recreation safety outreach coordinator for the DNR Enforcement Division. "Just because a

particular spot was safe yesterday - or even an hour ago - doesn't mean it is now."

Minnesota has had three ice-related fatalities so far during the 2020-2021 ice season. Nearly every year, late-season ice results in dangerous fall-throughs when people try to enjoy the ice as the weather warms.

The most effective way for people to stay safe on the ice or open water is to wear a life jacket. Anyone who

ventures onto late-season ice should wear ice picks, use a chisel and check the ice thickness frequently. They also should double the DNR's ice thickness recommendations, which apply to new, clear ice. Ice thickness varies even on the same body of water, but particularly hazardous areas tend to be around bridges, channels, culverts and streams.

PUBLIC WORKS

Despite warmer temperatures last week a reported six homes in town are being asked to continue running water to prevent pipes from freezing. Frost depth is reported at four to five feet. The Public Works Department is working to gear up for spring, they began patching potholes town.

MOOSE LAKE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The owner of the former Moose Lake School building has been working with the Moose Lake Police Department to seal the building. Chief of Police Darren Juntunen has been working with the owner to prevent more vandalism from happening at the building. According to Juntunen during his last inspection of the building with the owner an estimated \$1 million in damages have already been done to the building.

Juntunen asked that anyone observing lights on in the building at

night to report it to the Police Department.

Community engagement calls in the month of February increased while the number of service hours at both Minnesota Sex Offender Program and the Department of Corrections have decreased.

SANITARY SEWER LINING

Another sanitary sewer lining project is going out for bids from the city. An estimated 105 feet of clay piping with both 21 and 24 inch diameters is to be the focus of the upcoming project.

Previous lining projects have saved the city significant funds.

OTHER NEWS

Fees for peddlers licenses and farmers market rentals have been changed to a daily fee of \$20, a monthly fee of \$40 and an annual fee of \$75.

Roof repairs for the community center were approved, costing \$5,960.

Roof repairs for the Moose Lake Arena were approved, costing \$2,855.

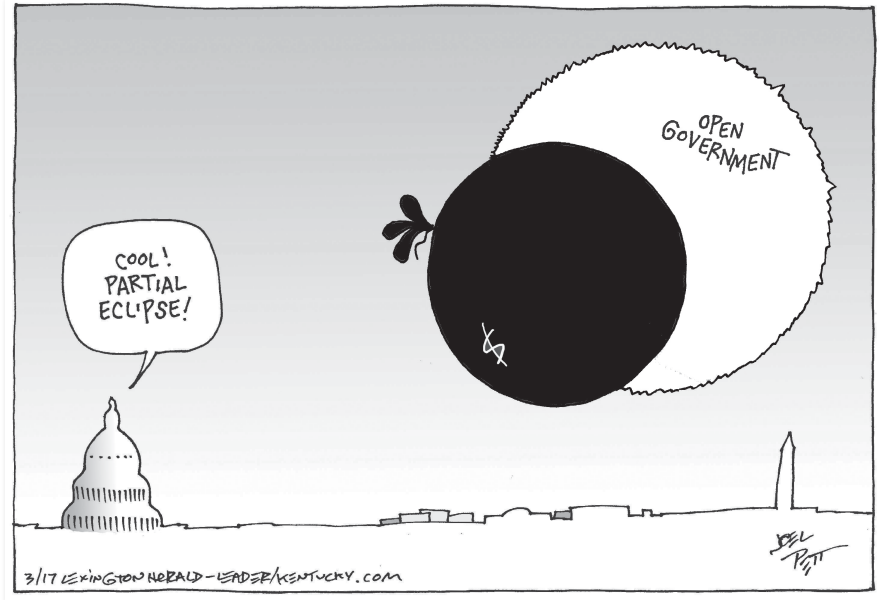
Every month my calendar is filled with meeting links, my email full of copies of agendas and my "go bag" is packed with spare pens, notebooks and masks. Staying safe and being present at these meetings is always a balancing act. They are always the place I go to check the pulse of the communities that the paper covers, so attendance is important.

If you haven't attended your local government meeting before I would always encourage you to attend. With the number of ways that meetings are available in these COVID times attendance has never been easier. I would encourage you to grab a snack and call in to the next meeting virtually!

Remember that the sun is always shining with your local paper, even during the storm of COVID-19.

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Let government know who's boss

When government fails, it's the rare public official who says, "Oops. My fault."

That's human nature, particularly for officials in the public eye who may have to run for office again. No one wants to be held directly responsible for letting the public down.

Case in point is the recent catastrophe in Texas, when unexpected winter storms left 4 million homes without power, ruptured pipes and tainted the water supply for many.

Texas' energy grid essentially collapsed. While Texas Gov. Greg Abbott was quick to blame frozen wind turbines, the cause was much more complex than that. To truly understand how things went so terribly wrong will require time, study and research.

So, too, with the coronavirus vaccine distribution. In this state and others, residents are frustrated with the slow rollout of vaccines. Is it poor distribution? Politics? A flawed strategy? These are literal matters of life and death.

But how do you get to the truth when public officials so rarely step up to take direct responsibility for failures?

The answer is public records. And public meetings. And access to the information that taxpayers deserve.

States throughout the country have laws that guarantee access to government records and meetings. But the details vary widely and there are many statutory exceptions. New challenges to access emerge every year in virtually every state.

The need to fight for government transparency is reaffirmed each year during Sunshine Week, a national awareness event overseen by the News Leaders Association and keyed to the March 16 birthday of James Madison. The fourth president of the United States

drafted the Bill of Rights – including the guarantee of a free press – in 1791.

That journalism connection reflects the role news media play in the free flow of information, but it unfortunately can also leave the public with a sense that Sunshine Week reflects the concerns of a single industry.

To the contrary, access to government information is critical to every American who cares about the quality of his or her community, state and nation.

It's important to see government employees – including elected officials – as the people we hire through our tax dollars to do a good job for all of us. If you run a business or hire a contractor, you wouldn't hesitate to demand a full understanding of how something went wrong. That should be exactly our relationship with government.

Getting that information, though, requires public meetings where residents can ask

Local woman fends off scam caller

The voice on Judy's voicemail message was friendly, but that was just part of the trick.

A person calling himself Roy claimed that he was reaching out from Amazon customer support. He gave an employee ID number, and said the call was regarding a purchase made on Amazon for \$909.99. He gave an order number for the supposed purchase.

"If you have made this online purchase ... then simply hung up the call and your order will be shipped shortly to Los Angeles," he said. "But if you have not made any such transaction then immediately call [the] billing and fraud prevention department."

And then he left a phone number. Of course, Judy knew she had never placed such an order. Something was wrong. But the story seemed like it could be possible, even though she was immediately suspicious of what the caller was saying.

"It was elaborate," Judy said.

However, she knew better than to call a number that an unknown caller claimed was billing and fraud prevention. Instead, she did the smart thing. She checked her Amazon account herself online. And of course, there was no record of any transaction like the one described on the call.

But just to be sure, she also got a hold of her credit card company.

"The gal said there had been no activity on the credit card, and the number he gave me was not an Amazon number," Judy said.

This scam has been confirmed on sites like calldetective.net and nomorerobo.com - and the phone number that "Roy" gave Judy has been reported 56 times to the Federal Communications Commission and Federal Trade Commission.

SIGNS OF A SCAM

The Federal Trade Commission says there are four clues that a call might be a scam.

1. Scammers pretend to be from an organization you know. They might use a real name, like the Social Security Administration, the IRS, or Medicare, or make up a name that sounds official. Some pretend to be from a business you know, or even a charity asking for donations. They use technology to change the phone number that appears on your caller ID, so the name and number you see might not be real.

2. Scammers say there's a problem - or a prize.

Scammers might say you're in trouble with the government, you owe

money. Or someone in your family had an emergency. Or that there's a virus on your computer.

Some scammers say there's a problem with one of your accounts and that you need to verify some information.

Others will lie and say you won money in a lottery or sweepstakes but have to pay a fee to get it.

3. Scammers pressure you to act immediately.

Scammers want you to act before you have time to think. They might tell you not to hang up so you can't check out their story. They might threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your driver's or business license, or deport you. They might say your computer is about to be corrupted.

4. Scammers tell you to PAY in a specific way. They often insist that you pay by sending money through a money transfer company or by putting money on a gift card and then giving them the number on the back. Some will send you a check (that will later turn out to be fake), tell you to deposit it, and then send them money.

The FTC offers these recommendations:

- Take steps to block unwanted calls and to filter unwanted text messages.
- Don't give your personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect.
- If you get an email or text message from a company you do business with and you think it's real, it's still best not to click on any links. Instead, contact them using a website you know is trustworthy. Or look up their phone number. Don't call a number they gave you or the number from your caller ID.
- Resist the pressure to act immediately. Legitimate businesses will give you time to make a decision. Anyone who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is a scammer.
- Never pay someone who insists you pay with a gift card or by using a money transfer service. And never deposit a check and send money back to someone.
- Before you do anything else, tell someone - a friend, a family member, a neighbor - what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.

Judy said she wanted to tell her story to let others in the community know what was going on so they would know

"Hopefully nobody else got scammed by this," she said.

Pine County has announced that the Blandin Foundation has chosen Pine County to participate in a 15-week program for a community team to study the broadband problem and learn the pros and cons of possible solutions.

Pine County is ranked 84th out of 87 counties in the state for broadband speed and access according to a Blandin Foundation report - better than only Yellow Medicine, Redwood and Kanabec counties.

"Much of Pine County

is served by one large national provider," the report states. "That may be a bottleneck to better access in those areas, because ... lack of competition can impact the drive for improvement."

The Pine County Board of Commissioners has made broadband one of its top priorities for 2021. Pine County Administrator David Minke pointed out that the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the disparity in broadband coverage and left many in the community without a reliable way to attend school remotely, work from home, or participate in their community.

On Feb. 23, a special county meeting to discuss broadband with interested community members. Over 50 com-

munity members joined the meeting, and State Rep. Nathan Nelson and State Senator Jason Rarick offered their comments and support for better broadband in Pine County.

Nineteen community members have signed up for the group, including county, Mille Lacs Band, city and township officials, school staff, business leaders, media and residents.

questions. It also means access to the documents that led to a poor decision. Words on paper can be much more forthright than the dissembling of politicians.

It's critical that we hold government accountable, for better or worse. (It's also important to acknowledge when government leaders are doing a good job.)

How can you help? I have two suggestions.

First, keep doing exactly what you're doing at this moment. Read and

support your local newspaper. Local journalists, more than anyone else, will stand up for your right to information. Facebook will not be going toe-to-toe with your mayor.

Second, when you believe government isn't doing its job, demand an explanation. Ask to see the documents. Attend public meetings. And above all, support legislative efforts to make government more transparent.

It's too easy for officials who have failed us to point fingers, blame the

media and wait for their side of the partisan fence to rally to their defense. We deserve better. We all pay taxes to support the work of government. We should get our money's worth.

Pandemic redefines 'public' access to government meetings

It wasn't long ago when a "public meeting" of the city council or state legislature meant the general public could show up to watch and, quite often, speak about proposals and perceived problems.

The coronavirus pandemic has put an end to that in many places, perhaps permanently altering the way the American public interacts with government.

A year after COVID-19 triggered government shutdowns and crowd limitations, more public bodies than ever are livestreaming their meetings for anyone to watch from a computer, television or smartphone. But in some cases, it's become harder for people to actually talk with their elected officials.

An Associated Press survey of state legislatures found that most no longer allow people inside their chambers to observe, and some still do not allow people to testify remotely at committee hearings where legislation is shaped. At some city council meetings convened remotely, the only avenue for public input is a written comment.

"In a way, this is kind of helping move us toward a country where citizens can be more involved in their government through Zoom, and that's a good thing," said David Cuillier, an associate journalism professor at the University of Arizona who is president of the National Freedom of Information Coalition.

But overall, he said, the pandemic "has created more problems" for public oversight of government.

All 50 state legislatures already provided video or audio of their floor

sessions before the pandemic. The Missouri and North Carolina senates currently are the only chambers offering just audio, which can make it difficult for listeners to recognize the speakers.

As a result of the pandemic, all legislative chambers now also provide live audio or video feeds of at least some committee hearings. A growing number are archiving those files for people to access on demand, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

But the AP survey found that 13 legislative chambers in eight states — Alabama, Arkansas, Iowa, Indiana, Louisiana, Missouri, Nebraska and Ohio — still do not allow people outside the Capitol to testify remotely by phone or video during committee hearings.

Most of those chambers let the public attend hearings in-person, but some people have been reluctant to do so because of COVID-19.

"I won't send any person into that Capitol right now, no matter how important the issue is. It's just not safe," said Jen Bersdale, executive director of the nonprofit advocacy group Missouri Health Care for All, which scrapped its in-person lobbying day at the Capitol.

Bersdale helped organize a letter from about three dozen organizations urging Missouri lawmakers to allow remote testimony at hearings and make themselves available for video or phone calls with people who do not want to enter the building.

The Republican-led Missouri Senate does not allow remote testimony. The GOP-led House adopted a rule this year

leaving the decision to each committee. But approval must be granted at least one committee hearing in advance, which could be a full week based on typical schedules. So far, only a few of the four dozen House committees have used the option.

Democratic state Rep. Tracy McCreery said she fears the lack of remote testimony is "shutting down public voices."

"It feels like it's just legislators and lobbyists, and I really miss just talking to Missourians that aren't getting paid to be in that building," she said.

The Arizona House also leaves it up to committee chairs to decide whether to allow remote testimony. But anyone wanting remote access to hearings first must go to the Capitol to register.

Republican Rep. John Kavanagh, chairman of the House Government and Elections Committee, initially refused to let the public testify remotely at his hearings because he feared getting overloaded with witnesses from other states. He later allowed it after he saw that virtual testimony worked fine in other committees.

But Kavanagh remains concerned that interest groups could game the system by lining up scores of people to provide video testimony.

"The problem, of course, is not hearing what people have to say. It's getting a grossly distorted representation of people's views because certain organized groups totally dominate the input," Kavanagh said.

When the coronavirus emerged last year, some local governments and court systems struggled with how to allow public access while still complying with orders that prohibited or significantly

limited in-person gatherings. The result was that some initial actions were taken in secret.

Many courts have since expanded their use of virtual hearings, especially for pretrial motions and bail determinations. Inmates have appeared by video from jails and attorneys from their offices or homes. The remote hearings have saved travel time for lawyers and jail staff.

"If tomorrow COVID were cured, would we still continue with virtual hearings? Well, probably, yeah," said Bill Rafferty, a senior analyst at the National Center for State Courts.

Though some states already allowed officials to participate remotely in meetings, most states had to change or suspend their open-meeting requirements to accommodate coronavirus precautions.

Washington Gov. Jay Inslee, for example, prohibited in-person government meetings

unless they limit capacity, keep attendees at least 6 feet apart and require masks. The Democratic governor's order also requires the public to be able to listen remotely by telephone.

Legislation by Rep. Gerry Pollet, a Democrat, would put the remote public-access provisions into state law, require more entities to post their meeting agendas online and require that the public be given a chance to comment at any regular meetings — remote or live — where final actions are taken.

"It's been very much of a surprise to people to learn (during the pandemic) that there is no right under the state open-meetings act for the public to comment at public meetings," Pollet said.

The California city of Redlands, east of Los Angeles, used to allow people attending its meetings to publicly speak about issues. Since the pandemic, the council has held virtual meetings that

are livestreamed on its website. The public can watch but can no longer speak. Instead, the city clerk reads aloud any written public comments received at least 24 hours in advance of a meeting. Late comments are added to a packet of materials for council members but not audibly shared.

The written-only format often has drawn more commenters than the in-person meetings did, said City Clerk Jeanne Donaldson.

But Ross French's comment, which criticized the "temper tantrum" of a councilman, wasn't read aloud because he sent it several hours after the deadline. That left him disappointed. Tone, inflection and emotion often get lost when thoughts are not personally spoken, he said.

"When someone else is reading your copy," said French, a digital communications manager at a local university, "it's never going to be exactly how you intended it."

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Public notices are a real victory for county residents

Welcome to this joint publication of the delinquent tax list by the Pine Knot News and Moose Lake Star Gazette, which comes to you courtesy of Carlton County and our two locally-based newspapers.

Although the Star Gazette and Pine Knot are not owned by the same company, we do share resources sometimes and have bid on the county's public notices and legal advertisements together for the past two years. I'd like to think that the arrangement has been a win-win-win the county, the newspapers and our residents.

Why?

One: Maximum transparency
Public bodies are required to publish notice of certain actions in a local newspaper. Although our bid costs the county more because it includes two papers — the only two papers that office here and pay property taxes here — the Carlton County commissioners have decided it's worth it to make sure readers across the county know what's going on. Choose just one paper and it's like deciding who's more important: the residents in northern or southern Carlton County. By choosing both, readers across the county have access to meeting notices, law changes, minutes and more.

Two: Maximum coverage
Our two newspapers are delivered to far more people around the county than any others. In addition, the Pine Knot also publishes the county public notices — along with every public notice in our paper — to a statewide database (mnpubnotice.com) that is searchable by anyone with internet access.

So, why should you care about public notices? After all, these dry accounts of meetings and court hearings aren't always the most stimulating or entertaining reading. Yet, they contain information of vital importance.

While a newspaper story — by design — will often only focus on what the reporter deems the most important actions taken by a public body, meeting minutes give a summary of everything

that transpired.

Notices of upcoming meetings give residents the opportunity to attend and give input on an issue, whether it's a fee the city is going to charge for road and sewer repair, making chickens legal or unfolding plans for the future of the county jail.

People often post court notices for probate or parental rights when they can't otherwise reach people, or to reach people they may not even know exist.

Legal notices have been around since the early days of our country, and are required to be disseminated by an independent third party. Governing bodies are required to post proposed changes to code or statute, zoning changes, meeting minutes, meeting notices and more. Of course that doesn't prevent the county, city, township or school from posting legal notices to their own websites or a bulletin board, but requiring that the notice also be published in a local newspaper means it can't be hidden in a hallway, or removed from a website, or its text altered after the fact.

The beauty of printing public notices means readers can clip it out of a printed newspaper and keep them for all eternity. And historians can find the notices in the future. What might be insignificant today could be a key to unlocking mysteries later.

We encourage readers to peruse the public notices when you read the paper each week, because you never know what you might find.

And next time you see a county commissioner, thank them for choosing to share their public notices with the entire county.

Whether it's knowing that your boss didn't pay her property taxes, or that a baby was brought to a local firehall, public notices contain important local information.

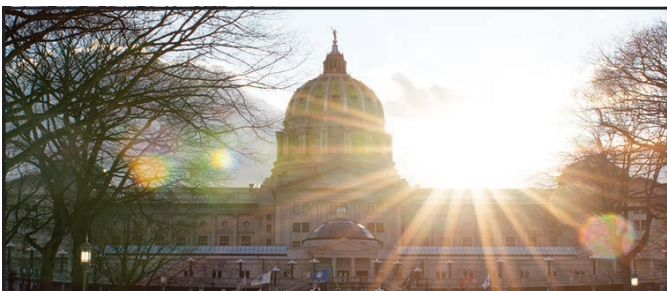
It's worth the time to read them.
