Lilya gets FAA clearance

Danny Lilya is a 2019 graduate of Moose Lake Community High School in Moose Lake, Minn. In the fall of 2019, he was accepted and chose to attend the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks. His brother, Michael, is studying to become a commercial pilot at UND's John D. Odegard School of Aerospace Sciences based at the Grand Forks Airport. Danny and his brother, Michael, are also brothers in the Sigma Chi Fraternity at UND.

Danny was born with a broken back, uses a wheelchair to get around and has had a multitude of surgeries. His handicap has not held him back. He was the first paraplegic high school football player to hold for field goals and extra points on a varsity football team. Danny was Class A state champion in wheelchair shot put and discus, and a National Wheelchair Softball

County Board postpones Enbridge yard approval

Concerned neighbors on the Bromfield Rd., Atkinson Township, voiced concerns about the proposed Enbridge staging yard at the Carlton County Board of Commissioners Regular meeting on October 13. The Atkinson Town Board approval of Enbridge's use of the road for access and the Carlton County Planning Commission's clearance for the yard site had seen little public input until now.

Alex Omar has property on the Bromfield Rd. which has been leased by Enbridge for the staging yard and has a proposed access road about 500 feet from CR 61 off Bromfield. The proposed use of the Omar property is requested in the permit for three years and during the height of construction can see truck traffic 24 hours a day. Atkinson Township Board had given their approval for the use of the Bromfield Rd. the evening of their October 12

meeting.

Northern Natural Gas has been doing some line work during this summer. Residents feel the noise and disruption from that work has been tolerated because it is occurring for just a short time. Activity at the Enbridge construction yard for a three year period is a concern.

"Such activity would impact a peaceful neighborhood," commented Mr. and Mrs. Robert Calhoun. "We have not chosen to live on the Bromfield Road and be affected by a construction zone." The group from the Bromfield Rd. area asked for another hearing to voice their concerns.

Zoning Administrator Heather Cunningham said that there were no phone calls or letters to her office after letters were sent to any residence and landowner within a quarter mile of the construction yard site and no input was given at the Planning Commission hearing after official notice

was published in the local newspapers.

Cunningham cautioned the Board, "We have followed process and no concerns were voiced until the last few days. Please do not de-legitimize a process we use regularly and I believe is fair. If there are issues let Enbridge call for a meeting to address these issues."

Enbridge responded that their firm will meet with each of the affected parties on an individual basis and a County Commissioner and an Atkinson Township official can be included.

"Hearing the concerns over the weekend and the input today," stated Commissioner Mark Thell, "I make a motion to table the decision for the October 26 meeting until all the input is in from the township and the people affected." The motion to table passed with only Commissioner Proulx abstaining without comment.

Covid costs...

School Districts in our area are being financially impacted by COVID-19. Moose Lake Community School Board looked at their preliminary budget and added approximately \$200,000 in additional cuts. The district is projected to experience a \$346,000 projected revenue decrease in the upcoming fiscal year.

Board members raised concerns about the budget already being "bare bones" before the additional cuts, which included a 50% reduction in board salary and a \$6,000 reduction in board travel expenses. Working meetings to review district goals, discuss the addition of

a Volunteer of the Month and student of the month and to propose other ideas for additional cuts or funding were set for future dates.

November 4, 2020 at 10 a.m. the district set a Truth in Taxation meeting. The board discussed the need to have public input and wanted to allow for additional time to review. Usually the meeting is in December. This meeting is an opportunity for the public to receive a formal presentation of the school budget, to ask questions, raise concerns or make suggestions. After this meeting the board will move forward with the process to approve the official budget, which can potentially raise or lower tax levies for community members.

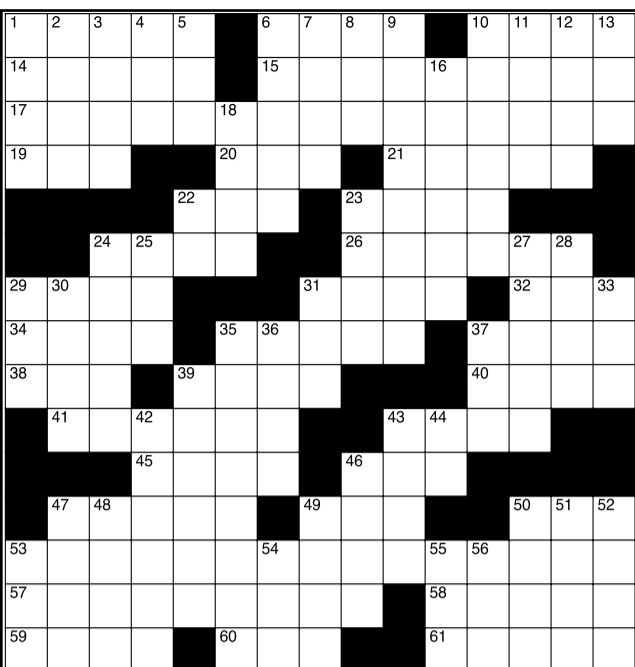

Association player for the Rolling Twins. He is also a member of the Minnesota Wild Sled Hockey team.

In 2017, Danny won the Section 5 and the National High School Spirit of Sport Award presented by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS). The 2018 Courage Award was presented to Danny, from the Minnesota Chapter of the National Football Foundation. In 2018, the Vikings invited him to a practice of their field goal unit. The Vikings asked him, "Are you ready to hold for some kicks." On the last kick, their long snapper said to him, "This one is to win the game and go to the Super Bowl." The Vikings gave him tickets to the Super Bowl in Minneapolis.

Danny, in his second year at UND, decided he wanted to be an air traffic controller. He has taken several aviation classes. He applied for entrance into the program at UND. The first thing he had to pass was the physical, even though he would not be flying. The doctor said he can't flunk him or pass him and deferred him to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) because he clearly has a physical disability. The doctor saw no reason he would not be accepted. Danny was denied by the FAA. Danny was not accepting this and wanted to appeal the decision. He had to change one of his medications, get a doctor's letter and mail an appeal letter within 30 days asking the FAA to reverse their decision. Unfortunately, just after

his flight physical there was a nationwide government shutdown. He waited months to hear back from them. Two weeks before class sign-up, he got FAA clearance. He is the first wheelchair student in the air traffic control program at UND. This is ground breaking and hopefully Danny will be an inspiration to other young people who may be interested in aviation.

Air Traffic Management requires a four-year degree (120 credits) to gain the specialized technical knowledge and the broad-based aviation knowledge to thrive directing aircraft through the National Airspace System (NAS). The training is done in state-of-the-art virtual tower and radar simulators.

Air traffic controllers includes tower controllers, approach and departure controllers and en-route controllers. They monitor and direct the movement of aircraft

on the ground and in the air, issue landing and take-off instructions to pilots, control all ground traffic at airport runways and taxiways, inform pilots about weather, runway closures and other critical information and alert the airport response staff in the event of an aircraft emergency. They use radar, computers and visual references to direct the movement of aircraft. Controllers usually manage multiple aircraft at one-time and must make quick decisions to ensure the aircraft's safety and must maintain maximum concentration. Approach and departure controllers work in semi-dark rooms in order to see the aircraft moving across the radar screens.

The largest employer of air traffic controllers is the Federal government. Their work can be stressful because maximum concentration is required at all times. According to

the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics the median salary for an air traffic control specialist is 122K. During the next decade, a significant number of air traffic controllers will be forced to retire due to the FAA mandatory retirement age of 56, so the job market is promising.

Danny stated "The piece of advice I would say to new aviators is that the sky is the limit! If you have any interest in aviation go out there and do it!" In a previous interview, he said "A wheelchair doesn't define you. If you want to do something, but you're disabled, if you have the right mindset you can still go out there and do it." This is a huge statement to kids with disabilities. Paving the way for others, to never quit trying. By the way, Danny was on the Dean's List last semester and maintained a 4.0.

We decide To the Editor,

Mr. Gerdes on September 24 made it sound like there was a perfect hometown healthcare system and now "the big bad wolf" has come and blown it all away. Nothing could be further from the truth!

The fact is, a small, independent, community hospital—even with the important critical access status Mercy had—cannot exist without supportive physicians and patients who choose it. The hospital was then, as it is now, a public, non-profit enterprise. Gateway Clinic is now, as it was then, a private for-profit enterprise. Reality continues to prove that these two entities rarely co-exist and the patient is lost!

My recent experience brought this home. My husband has long received his basic care at Gateway and been satisfied. When he needed specialist care, he had his surgery and aftercare at Mercy and we were both delighted with the level of care. Fast forward, and he is once again in need of care.

This time, we were referred by Gateway to St. Luke providers. It was as if there was no hospital just across the parking lot!

I was never offered a choice by Gateway. I had to call and make my case for getting care we needed where we wanted. It took 24 hours to get an answer back. By end of business the next day, our referral was switched from St. Luke's to Essentia-Moose Lake. Now we can remain in our chosen system, get all the care we can at our local hospital, and go to Duluth when we must. My husband can continue to see his providers at Gateway. WE DECIDE.

Instead of looking at Essentia as "taking over", it is more like Essentia threw OUR hospital and all its employees and patients a lifeline. Without it, there may be no staff at all, and no jobs. Some of it is just a sign of the times for rural healthcare, but a lot of it has to do with the fractious nature of the relationship between a non-profit (hospital) and a for-profit (Gateway).

It is WE who must take responsibility for getting the kind of health-

care we want, WHERE we want it. We must be advocates on our own behalf. The entire US healthcare system is a fractious mess. We are not immune from it right here.

Instead of accusing the hospital of making matters worse, we should see who has done the most to keep sustainable and patient-centered healthcare here.

INSURANCE: Carlton County reviews costs

Gallagher Benefit Service reported on the progress the County's Insurance Committee has made in the last three years. Kroeger heads that committee and negotiates directly with the insurance companies to get the best coverage at the most reasonable price. The committee is made up of County administration and union representatives to get input from all parties.

The average medical cost savings for the years 2018 to 2021 is \$280,562. Dental savings for 18 months is \$35,600. Total life and accidental death/disability savings for the last four years is \$60,000.

Kroeger also explained that

the committee has studied whether the County should begin a self-insurance program, but it has been decided that this move is not advisable at this time because of the Covid situation.

In other County news: County Engineer JinYeene Neumann was given the authority to charge \$85 per sign for any new 911 signs that are installed. Sign replacement with the landowner installing the sign themselves will be at a lower price.

Carlton County Highway Department has been working with the MNDOT to establish a detour using CR 123 Four Corners Road and CR 120 for car traffic. Work will be done on the intersection of Highway 73 and 210 in Cromwell this next season. Truck traffic

will take another route. Part of the cost of upgrading CR 123 will be covered by the MNDOT.

Approval was given for a shut off valve installation at the Barnum shop involving the sewer line from Barnum. It has been known for some time that the old septic system for the old shop had failed. The only other alternative to hooking up to the Barnum sewage system would have been to install large holding tanks. So much water is used for cleaning the County equipment that a tank system would require pumping out every two weeks and be quite costly.

Sam Huhta and Byron Kuster were reappointed to the Carlton County Planning Commission for their last three year term.

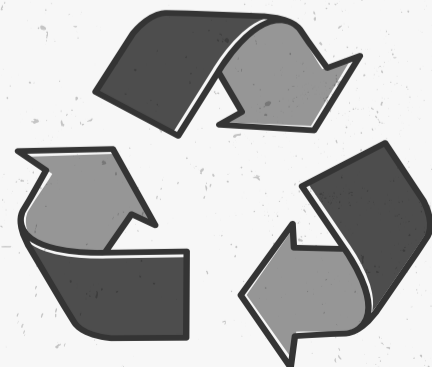
