## **Thanksgiving Recipes for** Food 'N' Friends

Thanksgiving may be taking on a new look for many of us this year; why not try a new recipe this year too?

### **HOT APPLE CIDER**

2/3 c. brown sugar 1 tsp. whole cloves 1 tsp. ground allspice 3 cinnamon sticks-3" long 1 gal. apple cider

Heat in a big coffee pot. Put a coffee filter in the basket and the first 4 ingredients in the coffee filter. 16-20 servings. I have also used a crock pot. Put the sugar and cider in the crock pot. I wrapped the spices in cheesecloth and tied it shut and floated it in the cider.

### ITALIAN HOLIDAY CREAM SALAD

2 medium-sized firm bananas, peeled and sliced 1 c. sliced seedless green 2 c. (16 oz.) sour cream

1 c. coarsely chopped Maraschino cherries

1 c. coarsely chopped wal-

nuts, optional 1/2 c. sugar 1-1/2 tsp. grated fresh lemon

Combine all ingredients in large bowl; mix well. Pour into 2-quart shallow casserole dish or mold lightly coated with nonstick vegetable spray. Freeze overnight. Let stand at room temperature for 15-20 minutes before serving; unmold it onto a serving plate if desired. Makes 8-10 servings. A friend told me she keeps this in her freezer year-round especially in the hot weather in Arizona. She freezes it in muffin tins. After it is frozen she transfers it to a freezer bag and can take out just one or two for supper as needed. (Very refreshing)

## **SWEET POTATO CARAMEL**

6 large sweet potatoes 4 Tbsp. butter 1/2 c. brown sugar 1 tsp. vanilla 1/2 c. butter 1/2 c. granulated sugar 1 c. heavy cream Pecan halves Mini-marshmallows

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cook sweet potatoes in microwave; remove peels when cooled (or peel, dice and boil until tender). In large mixing bowl, using electric mixer, mash potatoes while hot. Whip in butter, brown sugar and vanilla. Set aside. To make caramel sauce, combine butter, sugar and cream in a large skillet. Cook over medium heat until sauce is somewhat reduced and the color of honey. Remove from heat; pour into potato mixture and beat on low speed until thoroughly mixed. Pour into deep, buttered casserole. Bake uncovered for 30 minutes. Top with pecan halves and mini-marshmallows and bake an additional 5 minutes, or until marshmallows turn golden. Yield: 10 servings.

1-3/4 c. graham cracker crumbs 3 Tbsp. light brown sugar 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

## **Probation Committee** recommendations approved

Movement by the Carlton County Board to end their participation in the Sentence to Serve (STS) program and hire a probation officer to be responsible for an Intensive Pretrial Release (IPTR) effort high-lighted the Regular Meeting on November 10. Commissioners Peterson and Theil were present with Brenner, Proulx, and Chairman Bodie lives-treaming the meeting.

A Probation Committee has been working for some months on an overview of the County probation program as it affects the number of inmates in the Carlton County Jail. A current letter of their early recommendations were presented by County Attorney Lauri Ketola to the County Board on November 2.

The committee is made up of representatives from the local courts, the jail staff, and the Sheriff's Office. Those members listed are: Judge Robert Macaulay,

Judge Rebekka Stumme, County Attorney Lauri Ketola, Jeffery Boucher, Sheriff Kelly Lake, Paul Coughlin, Heather Giancola, Brian Stevenson, Dawn LeDoux, Kelsey Swanstrom, Darren Juntunen, Fred Petite, Derek Randall, Dan Law, Nicole Hoppe, and Mark Muhich.

County Attorney Ketola presented the recommendations. She noted that there has been considerable time and money spent in an effort to understand and reduce the jail population. One of the efforts to reduce the jail population was to use Intensive Pretrial Release (IPTR). In this program offenders on probation are closely supervised by designated staff. Staff members handling this work have seen notable success. It was recommended by the committee to hire a probation officer to handle a strong, supervised release program to help curb penal repeaters.

The County Board moved to hire a probation officer to oversee the IPTR with Proulx voting nay. He said he

voted no because he had only heard about the proposal at this meeting.

For the present STS program, St. Louis County will not use the service this next year. Over the past five years the number of people going through the Carlton County jail system using the STS service has decreased significantly. The average crew size is one supervisor and one worker. New guidelines have male staff unable to supervise female offenders. The high cosf of staffing STS far outweighed any benefit.

Commissioner Tom Proulx asked why there so few offenders in the STS program. County Attorney Ketola responded, "At this time few offenders are referred to the program by the Judicial system, and a major problem is that those offenders assigned to the program fail to show up for their work."

A motion by Commissioner Brenner and supported by Commissioner Peterson to withdraw from the STS

1 stick melted salted 3 pkgs. (8 oz.) cream

cheese at room temperature 1 can (15 oz.) pureéd

pumpkin 4 eggs (3 eggs plus 1 yolk

1/4 c. sour cream 1-1/2 c. sugar 1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg

1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1/8 tsp. ground cloves 2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour 1 tsp. vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350

degrees. For crust: In medium bowl, combine crumbs, sugar and 1/2-teaspoon cinnamon. Add melted butter. Press down flat into a 9-inch springform pan.

Set aside. For Filling:

Beat cream cheese until

smooth. Add pumpkin pureé, eggs, egg yolk, sour cream, sugar and spices. Add flour and vanilla. Beat together until well combined. Pour into crust. Spread out evenly over crust in pan. Place in oven for 1 hour. Remove from the oven and let sit for 15 minutes. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for four hours. To serve top with whipped cream and drizzle with salted caramel ice cream topping. Serves 25 small slices.

## **ORANGE CRANBERRY BREAD**

2-1/4 c. flour 2 tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. baking soda 1/4 tsp. salt

1-1/4 c. sugar 1/2 c. applesauce 3 eggs

1 c. fresh, chopped cranberries Grated peel (zest)from 1 medium orange 1/4 c. orange juice 1 tsp. vanilla extract

In large bowl combine flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt; set aside. In large bowl, mix together remaining ingredients. Add flour mixture and stir gently to blend. Pour mixture into a prepared 9x5x3inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Test for doneness with toothpick. Remove bread from pan, cool 10 minutes and serve warm. Makes 1 loaf.

## **CRANBERRY BUTTER**

1/2 c. dried cranberries, Craisins 1 c. orange juice

1 cup butter, at room temperature 5 Tbsp. confectioners' sugar

In a small saucepan, combine the cranberries and the orange juice and bring to a simmer over medium heat. Remove from the heat and allow to soak for 30 minutes. Drain the cranberries in a sieve and chop them finely. When they are cool, combine with the butter and the confectioners' sugar and beat with a wooden spoon until completely combined. Pack into small ramekins or roll into a tube in heavy plastic wrap. Refrigerate until needed, then remove from the refrigerator 15 minutes before serving. Makes 1-1/2 cups of butter.

program passed with Proulx voting nay.

The Probation Committee will continue to meet and present their recommendations in the near future. Changes in Restorative Justice, reduction of probation caseloads and a new

program called Dosage Probation will be studied by the group.

In other County **news:** A joint powers agreement between WLSSD and the Counties of Northeastern Minnesota was approved to hire a consultant to develop a plan for a regional solid waste management plan

over a ten year planning period. As required by the MPCA, the plan will evaluate the alternatives to landfills and provide an assessment of regional waste disposal alternatives. Carlton County's share is about \$20,000.

Land Commisioner Greg Bernu got approval for a timber sale in December. He said the price per cord ranges between \$24 to \$28 throughout the area and even into Wisconsin which has seen mill closures. It will be a sealed bid and he feels that the base price will rise during the bidding project.

Commissioner Dick Brenner continues to serve as Carlton County's representative on the Arrowhead Regional Corrections Board and is currently their Board chairman.

The County Attorney received permission to hire a paralegal to replace her office's legal secre-

Auditor/Treasurer Kathy Korteum will be able to move her staff's excess vacation time to the new budget year. She noted that the impact of covid19 and heavy election duties left staff unable to use their vacation time.

Recorder Kris Basillici can hire a new Chief Deputy Recorder after the present employee gave just a two week notice. Documents recorded in 2019 were at the 5700 level but has increased in 2020 to 6100 recordings as of this date.

I am not one of the infected, yet. But I am now part of a care giving duo for the rest of the ill folks that are isolated in the house. Any area that the pair of us are safely hiding out from our new care taking responsibilities is now being called the Quarantine Clubhouse.

When schools began to need to switch to distance learning I did not really understand the amount of WORK 24 hour seven day a week care giving meant for parents. After just a few days I am now not sure how parents, especially of young

children, are functioning.

In the Quarantine Clubhouse we have been meal planning, cooking, cleaning, cooking, cleaning, cooking, cleaning, cleaning, cleaning and cleaning. Between meal making and making sure that the house is sanitized there has been little time for anything else. I can't imagine trying to do all of this with a child underfoot.

I also can't imagine trying to do all of this while helping someone five days a week go to school. Math for me is hard enough without needing to do it on the fly between meal time and clean up. The phrase "it takes a village" now clearly makes sense. COVID-19 is hurting those "villages" though.

With the holidays quickly coming up, our "villages" traditionally gather around us. These large gatherings are not recommended by health officials. There is a rise in the number of COVID-19 cases in our area, in our state and our country. Our "villages" aren't safe together, our families are stressed and folks are tired of hearing about wearing masks, staying home and COVID-19. But people are still getting sick.

It is still important, more important than ever even, to follow health guidelines. Wear a mask in public. If you are sick stay home. Get tested if you have symptoms or were around someone with symptoms. Our kids, parents, essential workers, communities and "villages" need us to be safe. We need things to get back to some form

Most importantly if you don't have one already, make a plan for what to do if you need to stay at home for 14 days! Find out who can get you groceries. Have someone assigned to check in on you via the phone. Pick out a quarantine space in your home in case only one person gets sick. Determine how you are going to get medications

or household supplies.

Caregivers, please take some time to take care of yourself! Even if you have to lock yourself in the bathroom for a five minute cry, you won't hear any judgment from me.

## Grandparents have special status

Most of us can agree that the relationship between a child and a grandparent is very special. Grandparents are role models, mentors, and supporters. But this relationship also enjoys a special

status in the court system. This applies to several different situation.

First, if a child's parent dies, a grandparent can seek court ordered visitation rights with that child. Second, during any divorce or custody proceedings, a grandparent may make a request to the court for reason-

able visitation rights. If this type of motion is heard and denied, another motion cannot be filed for at least six months. Third, if a child has resided with the grandparents for at least twelve months and is subsequently removed from the home by the child's parents, the grandparents can petition for visitation rights. Finally, the grandparent of a child adopted by a stepparent may also petition for a visitation order.

In all of these situations, the

court must find such visits would be in the child's best interests and would not interfere with the child's relationship with the parents. In determining whether the visits are in the child's best interests, the court must consider the amount of previous contact between the child and the grandparents. The court is not required to make detailed findings on the other best interest factors as it would in a custody case, and a full evidentiary hearing is not necessarily required. The court must also consider the underlying circumstances and fairness of the situation. In one case, the child had lived with the maternal grandmother for several months following the death of the child's mother, which the court was required to consider. However, the Court of Appeals held that the District Court also should have considered that the grandmother had gained that temporary custody through some questionable "procedural maneuvering" that essentially kept the child away from the father. If the court finds visitation to

be in the child's best interests, the amount of contact is up to the court. A parent has the fundamental and constitutionally protected right to make parenting decisions, including who gets to spend time

with the child. In contrast, a grandparent's right to visitation is a limited one created by statute. The grandparent must prove by clear and convincing evidence that interference with the parent's rights will not occur. The District Court has considerable discretion in determining how much visitation a grandparent will receive. In one case, the Court of Appeals upheld a visitation schedule of one weekend per month to the child's grandparent, even where that grandparent only saw the child for approximately 8 hours per month while the parent was alive. In another case, however, the Court of Appeals found that an order granting a grandparent 52 overnights per year as part of a rigid weekiy scheaule that would have interfered with vacations, holidays and religious services was excessive. The Court of Appeals made clear that a grandparent visitation schedule should not look like a shared custody calendar between two parents.

The statutes and case law surrounding grandparents' rights are fairly complicated. A grandparent pursuing visitation should first consult with an attorney if at all possible.
