Willow River considering annexing property from Kettle River Township

A possible property annexation from Kettle River Township into Willow River was the subject of a public hearing at the June Willow River City Council meeting.

A public hearing is the opportunity for the

public to raise concerns or questions about a decision being considered by a city council or government.

Zoning for the property was discussed at length, with no clear decision made by the end of the meeting. A further consultation between the city attorney and the council needed to take place for clarification. The zoning for the property would need to be changed from residential to multi-use.

The property in question would be annexed into Willow River from Kettle River Township. At this point the property owner is using the location for 17 unit sites for recreational vehicles. They do not allow tent camping.

Discussion of the conditional use permits also took place. If a conditional use permit is granted then it would stay with the property if it was sold as long as all of the conditions of the permit are continued by the new owners.

Information about the annexation and conditional use permit was sent to the council in an email from the city attorney, but the council felt they needed more time to review before making an official decision.

Country Side Loop and Walter's Road maintenance has been an issue of discussion between Willow River and Kettle River Township. Mayor Brent Switzer had a discussion with the council and both the Township and mayor agreed it would be mutually beneficial to sign a three year contract between both parties. This discussion was also tabled pending the property annexation determination after more review of the city attorney's recommendation.

WILLOW RIVER DAM

Currently the city has the property around the Willow River Dam signed as a construction zone and no trespassing. The city and Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) are working together to protect the vegetation planted around the site of the dam. Switzer asked Councilmember Vicki White-

house what residents who see people down by the area of the dam should do. "Are they sup posed to call 911?" asked Switzer.

Whitehouse recommended that they should. In a call to Pine County Sheriff Jeff Nelson, he said, "We would certainly assist the DNR and city if called upon in enforcing that," referring to the joint effort between the Willow River City Council and Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

Former Shopko could become surgery center

The Moose Lake City Council has approved rezoning the the former Shopko building from a commercial property to medical, opening the way to a possible new day surgery center on the site.

St. Luke's approached the council with the intention of purchasing the building and leasing portions of it to medical practicioners and other health related businesses

The main reason for the purchase of this property would be the creation of a day surgery center in partnership with Gateway Family Health Clinic. The property would still remain

on the tax rolls. The council approved the rezoning based on the rec-ommendation of the Moose Lake Planning Commission. The council included condi-

tions on the approval of final

sale of the building and a sunset clause of June 1, 2023 for progress to be made.

WATER TOWER PROJECT

Once the water tower project has begun it should take approximately three months. Half of this project will have the water tower out of commission. Taking the tower down for service has never been done in Moose Lake. If the city loses power while the tower is down the city will lose

Barnum and Kettle River have been notified of this project and will be on standby in case of fire.

Part of this project also involves pressure reducing valves being installed on hydrants. These valves will release water if the pressure reaches a certain level. If water is being released from these hydrants it is normal.

Area soldier brings dog home from Afghanistan

United States Army Specialist (P) Curley Elliott, has always loved animals, and has been known to find them and rescue them, something that is definitely passed down from his parents, Jennifer and Wayne

When Elliott, who is the great grandson of Melvin Elliott Sr., first arrived in Afghanistan he didn't think there was any way to get a dog home, so he tried his best not to get attached. It didn't last long, especially

after meeting Chunda.

In February of 2020 his Commander and First
Sergeant went for a run and saw this little puppy laying near the fuel point, no big dogs or other puppies around. Then the maintainers for the Apache helicopters brought her back up to the base.

"She was maybe a month old, she was small enough to fit in our hands," said Elliott.

Chonk, her original name, given to her because she was a chunky little puppy, became a community dog, they all took care of her and she became part of the medevac unit. Since they had no dog food over there, she ate what the soldiers ate. Anything from green beans to bacon and eggs, even prime rib on occasion.

"She loved bacon. She would follow the guys, knowing what the to-go plates from the chow hall looked like and what they meant."

BRINGING CHUNDA HOME

The process of bringing Chunda and Charlie, another dog that was adopted by the unit, home to the states began in April of 2020. One of the pilots had fallen in love with her and wanted to take her home. She lived in an apartment near Fort Drum in New York and realized it probably wouldn't be the best environment for Chunda. When Elliott heard they were looking for a home for her he said he would ask his parents.

"I sent a picture of her to mom with no context, just the photo and asked if she was busy. She knew right

away exactly what I was asking," said Elliott. They worked with a non-profit organization located in Kabul called Nowzad. Nowzad works with soldiers

to help them bring home the companions they grow to love while serving overseas. Nowzad helps with the necessary paperwork, shots, microchipping and even spays or neuters them.

The cost to send each dog back to the states is approximately \$5,000. "They never asked for anything from us," said Elliott. A Go-Fund me page was set up by the Medevac unit to help get Chunda and Charlie back to the states, the funds were donated directly to

According to the Nowzad website, over 1600 dogs or cats have been reunited with soldiers all over the world including USA, UK, Australia, Belgium, Canada, France, Germany, Holland, Italy, Spain, Jordan Thailand and South Africa.

Due to COVID-19, Chunda and Charlie would end up spending about seven months in the kennel in Kabul before their flight to the states. Chunda stayed in New York until coming to Pine County in December of

LIFE IN THE STATES

Chunda is a very smart dog, Elliott said. "She knows the cats aren't supposed to be on the counters and will bark at them. She knows the chickens aren't supposed to eat the outside cat food and she barks at

Her new best friend is one of Elliott's horses, if she is on her chain by the house she will bark and the horse will come to visit.

She seems to have adjusted well to life over here. The only noticeable thing is a facial tick that she developed sometime between the kennel and her new home in Rock Creek. "It's very noticeable when she gets stressed out," said Elliott.

One can obviously see the connection that Chunda has with the Elliott family. She is very loved. Charlie, the other dog that came home with Chunda is living a great life with one of the unit medics at Fort Drum.

NO FUNDING FOR 4TH STREET

Moose Lake did not receive Local Road Improvements Program funding for the 4th Street project. This street is the first on the list for road projects, it was deemed as the highest priority for street repairs in a priority list created by and independent consultant. City Administrator Katie Bloom is going to request updated estimates for the project to present to the City Council. The

Council is considering using sales tax funds for the project.

OFFICES REOPENING

Senior dining has requested reopening the dining hall on July 6. The council has determined that this is a good decision.



Foster grandparents wanted in northeastern Minnesota

Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota (LSS) is expanding its Foster Grandparent service, in partnership with AmeriCorps Seniors, a national service agency, to offer guidance and encouragement to children in northeastern Minnesota.

Foster Grandparent volunteers are older adults who traditionally offer one-on-one mentoring in classroom and other settings to children who may be experiencing academic or social challenges. Their presence and reassurance help children improve self-esteem, social and emotional development and literacy and math skills. And, the rewards go both ways, enriching the lives of Foster Grandparents as well.

"Becoming a Foster Grandparent changed my life," shared Peggy Schaffer, Foster Grandparent in Hibbing. "It makes me happy! I make friends. I love the teachers. I get hugs all over the place. It's so fulfilling. You learn you can do things you didn't think you could do."

Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota began operating the Foster Grandparent Program in 2020 in St. Louis, Cook, Carlton, Lake and Pine Counties. With the COVID-19 pandemic, the program has virtually been on hold over the past year. Now that the pandemic is

winding down, plans are to have Foster Grandparents back in the classroom in the fall.

Statewide, Lutheran Social Service operates the Foster Grandparent Program in most of Minnesota. The organization is currently seeking volunteers who are age 55 years or older and can commit to at least 10 hours per

"Our Foster Grandparents build personal relationships with children they support and make a huge difference in their lives," said Ron Urbanski, program director with LSS Companion Services. "Personal attention from a caring adult helps keep children motivated, engaged and inspired."

In Minnesota in 2019, 273 Foster Grandparents spent nearly 163,350 hours supporting children at 142 schools and other sites throughout the state. The Foster Grandparent service offers volunteers an hourly stipend, as well as a meaningful opportunity to make a difference in the lives of young people.

"Supporting students gives our Foster Grandparents great satisfaction in knowing they help kids succeed in school and have a better chance at life," Urbanski said.

Steve's parents, Arlan and Della, moved back to the farm in 1954 and bought from Fred and Lydia. Arlan and Della ran a dairy operation on the farm with their six children.

Steve attended the University of Minnesota-Waseca, then moved back to the farm in 1986 and began dairy farming with his parents.

Steve married Estelle in 1994, and together they have a son, Joshua. Steve and Estelle are the current owner-operators of their farm, while Joshua, who works off the farm as a security officer, helps out the family when needed.

The Martin family currently own 320 acres and rent another 20, all of it used for grass hay and pasture. The Martins milk 51 Holstein cows in a step-up flat parlor, and the cows are housed in a sand bedded freestall barn. The family raises their own replacement heifers and sell their bull calves.

If I am transporting an item that is sticking out beyond the back of my pickup box, at what length do I need to mark it with a flag?


• According to Minnesota State Statute • (M.S.S.) 169.52, "When the load upon any vehicle extends to the rear four feet or more beyond the bed or body of such vehicle there shall be displayed at the extreme rear end of the load, at the times when lighted lamps on vehicles are required in this chapter, a red light or lantern plainly visible from a distance of at least 500 feet to the sides and rear. The light or lantern required under this section shall be in addition to the rear light required upon every vehicle. At any time when no lights are required there shall be displayed at the extreme rear end of such load a red, yellow or orange flag or cloth not less than 16 inches square."

I'd also like to mention for anything that is sticking over the sides of the vehicle according to M.S.S. 169.80 Subd. 3, "No passenger-type vehicle shall be operated on any highway with any load carried thereon extending beyond the line of the fenders on the left side of such vehicle nor extending more than six inches beyond the line of the fenders on the right side thereof."

Remember that no vehicle shall be driven or

moved on any highway unless such vehicle's load is secure. Please make sure that whatever you are hauling is tied or strapped down where it will not shift over the sides or rear of the vehicle within the legal limits or come out onto the road.

OD death leads to murder charge

Brandon Daniel Davis, 50, of Sandstone has been charged with felony third degree murder after allegedly selling the illegal narcotics that caused a man's death in Hinckley on March 29.

A single charge of third-degree murder was filed in Pine County Court on May 13 against Davis. The charge carries with it a maximum penalty of 25 years in prison, a \$40,000 fine or both.

According to the criminal complaint, on March 29, at approximately 11:33 p.m., deputies from the Pine County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to a residence on Southfork Road in Hinckley on a report that a male was overdosing on controlled substances.

A woman met the officer and directed him to a bedroom where a male, identified as Joshua Matthew Bloom, 26, was found to be laying on his back on the bed while another man was attempting to revive him with CPR. The man said that they had already administered Naloxone. The deputy determined that Bloom was not breathing and had no pulse. He moved him to the floor and took over CPR. A second deputy arrived and assisted with CPR and administering additional Nalaxone until the ambulance crew arrived and took over his

Bloom was unable to be revived by the paramedics and was declared deceased at 12:14 a.m. on March 30.

The deputy spoke to the man who said that Bloom had used heroin and must have had about \$20 worth of heroin. He denied knowing where the heroin came from. The man said he and the woman had been out in the garage, then he went inside and found Bloom face down on the bed. He recognized it as an overdose so he administered Naloxone, called 911, and started CPR.

A deputy recovered a baggie containing a white powdery substance consistent with controlled substances from Bloom's pocket. This was later determined to contain .327 grams methamphetamine. The deputy saw a roll of tinfoil on the nightstand and a small piece of tinfoil with a black

residue consistent with burned controlled substance on the edge of the bed. A pen snort tube was located on the bed. There was a green lighter next to it.

Investigators began to review the location data and social media accounts of Bloom. Two locations of interest stood out, the first being a Brook Park business Bloom was at the afternoon of March 29. The second was a location on 1st Street in Hinckley where multiple people had been living, including Davis. Bloom was there the evening of March 29.

A Pine County investigator re-

A Pine County investigator reviewed Bloom's Facebook records and noted several conversations of interest that occurred on March 29.

In one of those conversations described in court documents, Bloom says to Davis, , "need some slow you still over there." Davis responds, "yep, how much, I got u." Bloom responds, "I got 40.cpl fat pts." Davis responds, "I got u." Bloom then tells him he'll be there in about five minutes.

Bloom also has conversations with other people asking about who has "slow"

who has "slow."
The investigator was aware through his training and experience that the context of these conversations showed Bloom and others were looking to obtain controlled substances. The investigator was familiar with Davis through his work with the East Central Drug and Violent Offender Task Force, and believed he has been known to sell controlled substances in the Pine County area.

On April 2, a search warrant was executed at Davis' Hinckley residence. From the bedroom identified as being where Davis had been sleeping, officers located a digital scale next to Davis's car keys, a digital scale on the headboard of the bed, and a Sony camera case containing two bags of suspected heroin. The substances were submitted to the BCA for testing. The analyst identified one bag as containing .675 grams heroin and the other bag contained .296 grams Fentanyl.

The man who had been giving Bloom CPR on March 29 told investigators that he and Bloom had smoked heroin together earlier that day. The man then gave Bloom \$80 to get more heroin. He said they went back to the Hinckley residence and Bloom purchased heroin from Davis in the kitchen. He got two different kinds – one kind of heroin was the same as Bloom had purchased previously that day and the other, bigger, purchase was a different kind. He said he and Bloom also smoked some methamphetamine.

An autopsy was performed and Bloom's cause of death was determined to be mixed drug toxicity from Fentanyl, heroin, and methambhetamine.

According to the Minnesota
Department of Health, fentanyl-related overdoses increased
81% in 2020 compared to 2019 and
Fentanyl was involved in 82% of
all opiod- involved deaths.

On Aug. 12, 2020, a Confidential Reliable Informant under supervision by officers from the East Central Drug and Violent Offender Task Force purchased suspected heroin from Davis in Sandstone. The substance that was purported to be heroin and sold to the informant by Davis was sent to the BCA for testing and was determined to actually be .15 grams of Fentanyl.

On Sept. 23, 2020, Davis was found in possession of suspected heroin in Pine County. The substance was submitted to the BCA for testing and determined to be 30.336 grams of Fentanyl.

The East Central Drug and Violent Offender Task Force has received information that Davis continues to be involved in the sale of controlled substances, with a credible report received within the week of May 10. A warrant was requested due to the significant public safety risk Davis poses.

'Your Shot to Summer,' the state's COVID-19 vaccine incentive campaign encourages Minnesotans to roll up their sleeves and get their COVID-19 vaccine during the next

The campaign aims to get 70 percent of Minnesotans 16 years of age and older vaccinated by July 1. The first 100,000 Minnesotans who get their first shot between now and June 30 will be able to choose the reward of their preference from a wide-ranging list of options, including state parks passes, fishing licenses, and tickets to various summer attractions and events.

"Summer is here vaccines are working, and we are still going full steam ahead finding ways to keep our communities safe," said Governor Tim Walz. "We've had great success in our state so far with more than 2.5 million Minne sotans fully vaccinated, and we want to build on that success and get the broad community protection needed for everyone to have the fun, safe summer they want. Whether it's fishing, exploring our state parks, taking the family to a ball game or the Minnesota State Fair, we want to help get you there safely. So roll up your sleeves, make that vaccine appointment, and pick your reward,

redeemed by July 30. 2021. Recipient must be eligible to hold a Minne sota fishing license. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the Department of Natural Resources which will reach out to Minnesotans to complete their fishing license applica-

· Minnesota State Parks Pass: Eligible for one Minnesota State Parks annual pass. Minnesotans will receive the pass in the mail from the Department of Natural Resources. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the Department of Natural Resources which will mail the State Parks pass

· Minnesota Zoo Admission: Eligible for one adult admission at the Minnesota Zoo through September 8. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the Minnesota Zoo which will email information in order for their admission.

 Northwoods Baseball League Tickets: Eligible

to attend a Northwoods League baseball game during the 2021 season. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the Northwoods League and Minnesotans will call the ticket office of the team they select and provide their full name and address for verification to reserve their ticket. Tickets are based on availability at the time of calling. Participating teams include the Rochester Honkers, Willmar Stingers, Mankato MoonDogs, St. Cloud Rox and the Duluth Huskies.

 State Fair Tickets: Eligible for two admission tickets to the 2021 Minnesota State Fair. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the State Fair which will email tickets no later than July 16, 2021.

 Valleyfair Single-Day Admission: Valid for one Valleyfair admission ticket and the chance to purchase additional tickets for the same date at a discounted rate during the 2021 season. The Minnesota Department

of Health will provide a unique code via email in order for Minnesotans to redeem this offer.

• Visa Card: Eligible for a \$25 Visa Card to be used anywhere Visa is accepted. Minnesotans will receive the cards by mail or email from the Minnesota Department of Health or a State of Minnesota Vendor.

In order to be eligible for the vaccination rewards, Minnesotans 12 years of age and older must receive their first dose between May 27, 2021 and June 30, 2021 Beginning June 1, 2021 Minnesotans can verify their first dose and indicate their preferred vaccine reward at mn.gov/ covid19/summer.

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



We're engaging with Minnesota Tribes and creating opportunities for their citizens and communities to benefit.

How are Tribes being involved in this project?

At Enbridge, we are proud of our relationships with Indigenous communities, and see them as mutually beneficial—economically, socially and culturally. Our Line 3 replacement marks an unprecedented level of Tribal engagement, inclusion and economic participation.

As part of the Line 3 replacement, we've committed \$100 million for Tribal-affiliated work opportunities, and we're engaging with Minnesota Tribes on training, contracting, procurement and hiring.

A Tribal-led Cultural Resources Survey was completed along the project route. With representatives of nine Tribes doing direct survey work, and more than 30 Tribes involved via government-to-government consultation with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, this has been the largest such survey ever attempted in the energy industry.

Most importantly, we've been listening. From the start, we respected the wishes of the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe to route the new Line 3 around their reservation. We've also signed a 20-year easement renewal with the Fond du Lac Band and made further route changes.
