
INTRODUCTION

STEPS TO CHOOSING QUALITY CHILD CARE



Start early! Finding the best child care for your family takes time. There are many types of child care programs to meet the diverse needs of families such as Center, Family, Group, After School, Preschool, and Family/Friend/Neighbor Care (FFN).

When considering your child care options, look for child care programs with the following qualifications on Pages 4-5:

Best Beginning STARS to Quality Program:

A voluntary quality rating improvement system that aligns quality indicators with support and incentives for early childhood programs and professionals. This quality improvement program promotes strong early childhood education in Montana.

STEPS TO CHOOSING QUALITY CHILD CARE

<u>Licensing and Registration Requirements:</u>

Centers, Group, Family and Family/Friend/
Neighbor Care (FFN) are required to be licensed, registered or certified. See more information at: dphhs.mt.gov/qad/Licensure/Become-a-Child-Care-Provider



Provider to Child Ratios:

Center: 13 or more children with ratios based on

the ages of the children.

Group: Two adults care for 7-12 children with a

limit of 6 under 2 years.

Family: Up to 6 children with no more than 3

children under 2 years.

Family/Friend/Neighbor: All the children of one

family or up to 2 unrelated children.

FINDING HELP WITH CHILD CARE

5 Steps to Finding Help with Child Care

- 1. Contact Family Connections about financial assistance to help pay for child care.

- 2. Contact Family Connections for profiles of child care providers who meet your needs.

3. Check online for complaints and licensing violations for potential child care providers.

- 4. Contact potential child care providers to schedule visits to observe the program, ask questions and check references.

Do you Background Check ALL staff?
What is your system for knowing where my
child is at all times?
Do you participate in the USDA sponsored Child
and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)?
How does the program support children's
education and learning?
Are children able to choose what activities they
want to do and who to play with?
Do the children help plan activities?
How do you accommodate children with specia
needs?
WARNING SIGNS
All parent visits must be planned in advance
There are few planned activities or guidance
The child care is not licensed or registered
There are too many children for adequate care
and supervision
Caregivers are physically rough, abusive or yell
at the children
There are licensing deficiencies for Health and
Safety requirements
