WATERTOWN — From music festivals, to boat shows, to plays, there are no shortage of events taking place during the last full month of summer.

"August brings a mix of those longtime annual festivals that have been going on for decades, but then we also see a few new ones show up on the calendar when it gets a little softer, if there is an opportunity for that," said director of the 1000 Islands International Tourism Council, Corey Fram.

One of the many events include Thompson Park's Brew at the Zoo on Aug. 6.

Pirates Weekend will take place in Alexandria Bay from Aug. 12-14, which has recently been a popular event drawing people to the Bay.

AnchorCon, which dubs itself as being "the north country's largest ComiCon," will be back for their second yearly event at the end of the month on Aug. 20 and 21.

Mr. Fram said the end of the month is a good time for newer events, such as Alex Bay's Rockin' the Bay event because he

SLC gears up for fair

Gouverneur week opens Aug. 2 with Sawyer Brown

GOUVERNEUR — The Gouverneur and St. Lawrence County Fair returns Aug. 2 to 7 with rides, exhibits, a Sawyer Brown performance, a talent show, harness racing, a demolition derby and other events.

"Opening night is our Sawyer Brown concert, a country and western group popular back in the '90s," said Fair President Donald A. Peck.

Tickets for the Aug. 2 grandstand performance at 8 p.m. are \$30 for festival seating and \$50 for reserved seating. Strollers aren't allowed on the grandstand. Tickets are available through a link on the fair's website, www.gouverneurfair.net, under the events/ tickets tab. They can also be purchased by calling 315-287-3010 and leaving a message if no one picks up. The grandstand seats about 1,800 people.

The carnival portion of the fair, with rides and games, opens Aug. 3. The carnival opens at 2 p.m. Wednesday to Sunday.

"There's the same amount of rides, about 18 to 20 rides for adults and children. There's games. There's going to be 15 to 18 food vendors. There's a lot of commercial exhibits," Mr. Peck said.

The commercial exhibits are hosted by any business, political group or indepen-

dent contractor who wants to have a display. Entry forms are in the exhibitors' guide, found under the info tab on the fair website, which also includes a page for vendors.

There will also be daily "ground acts," including a petting zoo and three to four pig races per day

The exhibition barn will have "one of the largest dairy shows in New York state," Mr. Peck said, along with horse shows and 4-H youth exhibits. People who want to sign up for the exhibition barn can click the exhibitors' guide option under the info tab on the fair website, or sign up at the fair office.

At the grandstand on Wednesday will be a marching band and firefighters' parade

at 2 p.m., followed at 6 p.m. by the 95.3 The Wolf Country Showdown Finals. Admission to both events is free.

On Thursday, harness races start at noon and a local talent show is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Both events are free. Anyone who wants to sign up for the talent show can go to the fair website and click the option under the info tab.

The big grandstand event for Friday will be Hot Farms truck and tractor pulls. Admission is \$15.

Rides and games are assembled at the Coleman Brothers Midway at the 2018 Gouverneur and St. Lawrence County Fair. Christopher

On Saturday, there will be two free grandstand concerts. Local band The New Revolution performs from 4 to 7 p.m. At 8 p.m., a boy band tribute concert by Larger Than Life will perform hits by New Kids on the Block, Back Street Boys, NSYNC, Boyz II Men, The Jackson 5 and others.

The closing day, Sunday, starts at 1 p.m. with the final grandstand show, a demolition derby. The rules and entry form are on the fair's website under the events/tickets tab.

Daily admission to the carnival grounds is \$35. Saturday is military day with \$30 tickets for those with a military ID. Pre-sale wristbands are \$25 daily and are available on the fair's website under the fair schedule tab.

Horror film shot in Watertown set to premiere Aug. 19



Civil War Weekend set for July 30-31 at Fort Tribute

MADRID — Step back in time on July 30 and 31 when Fort Tribute hosts its annual Civil War Weekend on the grounds of the St. Lawrence Power and Equipment Museum on Route 345.

The event is sponsored by the St. Lawrence Power and Equipment Museum and the St. Lawrence County Historical Association.

Scott A. Wilson, Fort Tribute volunteer coordinator and a re-enactor who holds the rank of lieutenant colonel, said visitors will be able to enjoy battle skirmishes, demonstrations and other activities from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. July 30 and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. July 31.

On day one, the camps open to the public at 10 a.m. with infantry, artillery and cavalry drills, along with blacksmithing demonstrations. A medical demonstration at a field hospital will be held at 10:30 a.m., followed by a period cooking demonstration at 11 a.m., a talk on women's fashion in the 1860s at noon, Songs of the Civil War by Linda Russell at 1 p.m., an artillery demonstration at 2 p.m. and a battle re-enactment at 4 p.m. The camps close at 5 p.m.

On day two, the camps open to the public with infantry, artillery and cavalry drills, along with blacksmithing demonstrations at 10 a.m. That's followed by a medical demonstration at a field hospital at 10:30 a.m., Songs of the Civil War at 11:30 a.m., and battle re-enactment and closing ceremony at 1 p.m.

Mr. Wilson said this will be the second Civil War Weekend held at Fort Tribute after 19 years of staging the event on Barnhart Island.

"We had the grand rib-

bon-cutting in September of 2020. (Rep.) Elise Stefanik came out and cut it. Then we had our event last year," he said. "I'm very pleased with change we've seen for this."

Union units that will be represented this year include 12 U.S. Infantry, 157th New York Volunteer Infantry Co. G, 118th New York Volunteer Infantry, 115th New York Volunteer Infantry, 140th New York Volunteers, 148th New York Volunteer Infantry, 1st New York Light Artillery Reynold's Battery L, 2nd Vermont Cavalry, and 117th New York Volunteers Field Hospital.

On the Confederate side, units that will be represented include 15th Alabama Volunteer Infantry Co. E, 2nd Mississippi, 61st Georgia volunteer Infantry Co. A, 55th Virginia Volunteer Infantry Co. A, 27th Virginia Infantry Co. M, Alexander's Battery, Middlesex Battery, Ashland Battery, and 55th Virginia Volunteers Field Hospital.

Also part of the unit representation is Miss Susan's Sut-

lerv.

Mr. Wilson said the grounds around Fort Tribute are perfect for the skirmish battle re-enactments.

"The nice thing about that is we have a good-sized field for it, and we have our own bleachers that we use at the museum for tractor pulls and horse pulls and stuff. So, we're able to move those over there," he said. "Dallas Robinson from Massena does the narration of the battle for us. He's been a re-enactor for a long time. So, it gives the public a general idea of what's going on."

Appearing this year for the first time is balladeer Linda Russell from New York City. Accompanying herself on hammered and mountain dulcimers, guitar and penny whistle, she will bring life to the 19th century with tunes of the era.

"She's had appearances at the Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall. She's recorded eight albums and has had popular music in the past. She does

music from the period. Hers is called New York Volunteer Songs and Stories from the Civil War," Mr. Wilson said. "She's going to put on a concert Saturday and Sunday. She'll also intermingle with the kids. Saturday night she's going to do a concert just for the re-enactors."

Visitors will also enjoy Civil War medical demonstrations, a period cooking demonstration called food of the enlisted soldier, infantry drills and artillery demonstrations.

"There'll be a children's muster drill where the kids get toy rifles," he said. "We get them out there and they do marching around and stuff like that. We get a pretty good crowd for that with the kids. They like that."

The blacksmith shop will be open, as well as the period schoolhouse and the 1800s log cabin.

"Anything that belongs to that period of time, we open those buildings up," Mr. Wilson said. "Blacksmithing was very key, especially for artil-

lery and cavalry. The log cabin will have a talk on women's fashion in the 1860s, the lavers of women's fashion."

It's also an opportunity to talk to living historians who will be present over the weekend.

"We encourage people to enter the camps and talk to the living historians," Mr. Wilson said. "Talk to those individuals and get a first-person perspective of what it was like. It's like this cooking demonstration. You're going to talk to individual soldiers who are telling you why they're doing what they're doing.'

He said they also want people to visit the new Congressional Medal of Honor monument that's on display at the fort, recognizing St. Lawrence County residents who received that honor.

"The reason I did the monument is to have one central location where we recognize them," he said.





- Sanctuary Life: shows sanctuary inhabitants such as birds,

fish and marine mammals. Follow NOAA wildlife viewing guidelines at https://sanctuaries.noaa.gov/wildlife-viewing/ to ensure inhabitants are not disturbed. Help NOAA highlight best wildlife photography practices by indicating what kind of camera/lens was used and the approximate distance from the subject.

- Sanctuaries at Home: shows the personal connection to sanctuaries, such as photos of stewardship activities or sanctuary-related artwork.
