Sackets Harbor Concerts on the Waterfront series back

SACKETS HARBOR — A summer musical tradition is being welcomed back here as fondly as a cool summer breeze, as the folks at the local historical society who host it are breathing easily.

"Everyone is constantly asking, 'Are the concerts going on this year?'" David Altieri, president of the Sackets Harbor Historical Society, host of the annual Concerts on the Waterfront series, said last month. "We kept on saying, 'We hope so. We're planning on it, everything is in place.' Now we can more definitely say, 'Yes, they are going on.' I think people are very excited."

The concerts, held at a grove on the Sackets Harbor Battlefield State Historic Site overlooking Lake Ontario, are regularly praised by its musical guests as one of the nicest outdoor venues they've performed at.

The series begins Sunday afternoon.

"We have a nice mix and some old favorites and some real big names," Mr. Al-

tieri said. "We're looking for a good year. Hopefully, there's a lot of pent up desire to be outside and do things."

Last year, the concert series, which would have been its 36th annual, was another victim of the COVID-19 pandemic but a few virtual concerts were held. This year, with the June 15 announcement

by Gov. Andrew Cuomo that the state has lifted pandemic-related restrictions, concert organizers are sharing a sense of relief that has spread across the state.

"The bands were scheduled with some hope and optimism that the restrictions would be loosening up and things would be reopening, and it looks like that's

happening," Mr. Altieri said. "We're operating under the hope that we can have them pretty much like they were before. We think it's a very safe outdoor environment for concerts. We hope people take advantage of it and get back to normal by at least going to some concerts."

Chateaugay theater group plans July show

Event is fundraiser due to 2020 lockdown losses

CHATEAUGAY — Their show had been cleared by the health department.

The Chateaugay Musical Theater Group was 24 hours from showtime.

But this was back in March of 2020, the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Their production, the Addams Family musical, was one of countless activities to be canceled, amid the global crisis.

The cast of 40 Chateaugay Central students had put in three months of work and practice, prior to the shutdown, Theater Di-

rector Heather Locklin said.

It would have been the 23rd musical performed at the school.

"The cast ... was just starting to change into their costumes for the final dress rehearsal when we got the call," she said. "Everyone involved was devastated."

With the world on the road to recovery from the pandemic and the state lifting its regulations, the cast will return to the stage — maskless, but this time, outside, Locklin said.

The performance will be for one night only starting at 6 p.m. July 8 in the Chateau-

gay Central parking lot off Bulldog Lane.

The theater group, along with its Class of 2020 seniors who have since graduated, will bring viewers the Addams Family. This time, there will also be a bottle drive, a silent auction, and concessions.

Those who attend will need to bring their own lawn chairs, Locklin said. Concessions, such as hot dogs, snow cones, and cotton candy will be served.

Instead of the group's traditional show, the play will be performed as a fundraiser, in hopes to recover money lost due to the





It is all that remains of Orville Hungerford's elegant Mexico Point Club House (1906). Guests were met at the train station in Mexico and brought to the Club House by horse-drawn carriage, and the horses were stabled in the carriage house. With the advent of the automobile, horses were no longer used and the carriage house was no longer needed.

William Casey, a frequent summer visitor to Mexico Point Club House and a professor at Columbia College asked if he could transform the carriage house into a medieval manor house, with the help of his close friend: Severin Bischoff, an artist who had studied wood carving in Germany. Together, and with the help of Casey's university students, they built a moat, installed stained glass windows, and carved every wall, floor and even ceilings with images of people and designs inspired by the medieval period of England. Casey provided the means and Bischoff provided the designs. Walking into the cottage, and after one's eyes adjust to the inside light, one has the feeling of walking into a work of art.

The luxury hotel burned down and was rebuilt twice. The third time the hotel burned, it was not rebuilt, and all that remains is the stone foundation and fireplace. Casey's Cottage did not burn, but was long neglected, until Grace Roop petitioned the state of New York to turn the property into a State Park and enlisted and founded the Friends of Mexico Point Park. They cleaned up the cottage, restored the carvings,

glass windows, and opened the cottage for tours by the public. They also commissioned the carving of "The Park People", a series of five wood carvings of people representing how the area has been used during different periods of history, all the way back to the Revolutionary War.

Just before the cottage was closed down for the winter of 2019-2020, they completed a big project to restore the stained glass windows in the "moat" area with designs submitted by Oswego

County residents, and partly

funded by grants from CNY Arts and from The Shineman Foundation. The designs chosen for the 18 embrasures or narrow windows are in keeping with the cottage's medieval character. Since the cottage was only open for one weekend after the last window was installed, most people have not yet seen all of the completed windows.

The project for last spring (also partially funded by CNY Arts) is a the latest "Park Person": a newly created chainsaw carving of William Casey himself, sitting

extend their Wild Center experience and commemorate their visit on their way out of the building.




