## A Very Special Civil War Days Event

Bringing a Submarine to the Wilder Farm

The Almanzo Wilder Homestead, in partnership with the NYSV 118th Adirondack Regiment of Civil War Re-enactors, will host their annual Civil War Living History event and Harvest Festival on September 28 and 29, beginning at 10:00am both days. This year, the event will feature a full-size replica of the CSS H. L. Hunley; an oar-propelled submarine employed by the government of the Confederate States of America. The travelling model will arrive from Charleston, SC and will be on site all weekend.

Named for her inventor and chief financial backer, Horace L. Hunley, the submarine, often jokingly referred to as the fish boat or the porpoise, was cutting-edge naval engineering technology when she was retained by the Confederacy in 1863. And, even though she was never officially commissioned into service, on the night of February 17, 1864, the Hunley became the first combat submarine in naval history to successfully sink an enemy warship; the USS Housatonic; a wooden-hulled 1,930-ton steam screw sloop of war.

The Housatonic was part of a Union blockade of the Confederate seaport at Charleston, South Carolina, when the Hunley attacked her; plunging a live torpedo; an explosive device on the end of a spar attached to the sub's nose; into the hull of the Union warship, sending Housatonic to the bottom of the bay. Unfortunately, the Hunley sank as well. And her entire crew perished.

Civil War reenactments allow an audience to step back in time and experience the life and times of our forefathers during this difficult, dangerous, and violent chapter in American history. Many displays and vignettes will depict the daily-life events that ensued during the Civil war era. Visitors can meet and talk with re-enactors to experience a journey through time, hearing insights and stories about our

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

# Harvest of the Arts returns Oct. 4-6

LOWVILLE — After a long COVID break, the Harvest of the Arts is returning to the Maple Ridge Center, 7421 East Road, on Oct. 4-6.

The three-day event is being held to support the organization's mission to provide Lewis County residents with a place of recreation, relief and restoration.

The festival will kick off Friday night with a concert by the Atkinson Bluegrass Band in the Warming Barn. The cost is \$12 at the door and cider and

donuts will be served. The festival officially opens at 10 a.m. Saturday with a cost of \$5 per vehicle.

Numerous artisan vendors will line up along Maple Ridge Road to showcase their unique wares. These include local well-known artisans Oak Side Studio, H.Lynn Designs, Lakeside Lather, Five Oaks, Wicks and Whims and BRB Creations. There will be a raffle of various items from these and other vendors that will culminate in a drawing at 2:30 p.m.

The festival is held to honor artists in the community from furniture makers, wood printers, bookmakers, papermakers, weavers, jewelry makers, storytellers, quitters, musicians, writers, folklorists, rug hookers to blacksmithing, cooperage, harness making, tinsmithing, luthiers and crafts people of all types.

Artisans were invited to attend to share their knowledge and expertise about their art with the younger generations and with fellow artisans while offering the community a chance to learn about their art and to purchase it on site.

To honor the artisans, there will be a best in show award, the winner of which will be showcased all year on the organization's website, with photos and links to products or their own website.

The 20th Harvest of the Arts will include the Tug Hill Quitters honoring Nancy Beyer Smith, a Lowville native who passed away in 2017. Her prolific award winning designs will be showcased throughout the house.

In addition, the National Scholastic Gold Medal Award winning artwork by Emma Hermanowski of Carthage Central School titled, "Predestined," will be displayed. Out of 340,000 original works of art and writing, fewer than 2,500 received a National Medal. This places Ms. Hermanowski's creation in the top 8% of all submissions.

The Warming Barn will host children's activities which will feature nature, crafts and unique games. There will be an hourly nature walk to locate and identify natural items, then return to learn more about them and to create a nature-focused work of art which will be on display for all to view.

Food will be available at the event with various homemade soups, apple pie and ice cream. Festival goers will also be able to take a horse-pulled hayride.

On Sunday, Marving Zehr and members of the community will conduct a reflective and music-filled morning in the resonant space that will include lots of singing and reflections centered on gratitude and thankfulness for the harvest.

## Light Up the Night Parade approved for Nov. 23

OGDENSBURG — City Council has approved the Lions Club's Holiday Light Up

the Night Parade on State Street for another year.

On Monday night, a letter from Rhonda Roethel, chairperson of the Holiday Light Up the Night Parade requested permission to host its annual parade on State Street on Saturday, Nov. 23. City Council unanimously approved a resolution authorizing City Manager Fonda Chronis to sign a state Department of Transportation (DOT) application for the use of State Street, which is also a state highway known as State Route 68.

"The support of the City of Ogdensburg is crucial to the success of this very popular event that kicks off the holidays in the City," wrote Roethel.

The Holiday Light Up the Night Parade is scheduled at 6 p.m. and will begin at Ogdensburg Free Academy, ending at the Greenbelt with visits with Santa Claus at the Dobisky Center. The night will end with fireworks at Lighthouse Point.

Prior to the parade, Seaway Festival Special Events will present a Holiday Craft Show from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at John F. Kennedy School. Approximately 100 vendors are expected to be attending with visits from Santa and Mrs. Claus.

In other City Council busi-

 A public hearing was held on numerous proposed changes to the city code affecting its parks and marina. A resolution that followed was approved.

Several changes that took place include altering when parks are closed to the public from 11 p.m. to 10 p.m.; closing of the municipal dock to vehicular traffic at 9 p.m. instead of

11 p.m. from May 1 and Oct. 31 of each year; and changing the quiet hours in the city marina from 11 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Another change included towing inflatable devices as being prohibited within 100 feet of the marina or municipal dock. Previously, the code only lists water skiing as prohibited.

The code was also changed to prevent people from not being able to sleep overnight in the city's park system without receiving a permit to do so.

The last change adds the police chief and city manager to the list of those being able to prohibit dogs in city parks during scheduled events. Prior to the change, only the director of Parks & Recreation could do so.

 Council appointed M. Penny Sharrow to fill the unexpired term of Teresa Pinkerton on the Recreation

Commission, with her term to begin Sept. 23 and ending Dec. 31, 2028.

- The meeting ended with an executive session called for by Chronis to "discuss matters leading to the appointment, employment, promotion, demotion, discipline,
