LCPD increasing DUII enforcement

Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants (DUII) continues to be a leading cause of motor vehicle crash injuries and deaths throughout the nation, according to law enforcement agencies.

The Lincoln City Police Department (LCPD) will be utilizing grant funds to step up enforcement efforts against drunk driving from August 19 through September 7.

This additional Labor Day period enforcement is being conducted in conjunction with national crackdown efforts that are designed to curb impaired driving, decrease crashes, reduce injuries, and save lives,

according to LCPD Lt. John Goodman.

"Many substances can impair driving' Goodman said. "Alcohol, marijuana, and other drugs can impair the ability to drive because they slow coordination, judgment, and reaction times. Cocaine and methamphetamine can make drivers more aggressive and reckless"

Using two or more drugs at the same time, including alcohol, can amplify the impairing effects of each drug a consumed, according to Goodman.

"Some prescription and over-the-counter medicines can cause extreme drowsiness, dizziness, and other side effects," he said. "Read and follow all warning labels

before driving and note that warnings against "operating heavy machinery" include driving a vehicle."

Penalties for DUII convictions can range into the thousands of dollars and include jail time.

BY THE NUMBERS

In 2023, the LCPD made 64 DUII arrests, for 2024 there were 71 DUII arrests, and for 2025 there were 84 DUII arrests.

"Based on Oregon's Initial Fatal Crash Information Viewer (which launched in 2024) in 2024 Lincoln County had eight fatal crashes involving drugs or alcohol and in 2025 we reduced that to five fatal

D River Welcome Center taking shape

Construction for Lincoln City's new Welcome Center at the D River Recreation site began this past spring and the new center is quickly taking shape at the site this summer.

Improvements at the popular site that draws 1.5 million visitors each year include the new, \$6.7 million Lincoln City Welcome Center, upgraded parking and beach access, and increased accessibility amenities, scheduled to be completed in early 2027.

The Lincoln County Leader reached out to Stephanie Hull at Explore Lincoln City for insight into the progress of the project.

Lincoln County Leader: Have you received any reaction from residents/visitors as we see the Welcome Center building taking shape?

Stephanie Hull: The overall reaction from the public has been very positive. Many residents

County's short-term rental ordinances upheld by Court of Appeals

The Oregon Court of Appeals has upheld Lincoln County's short-term rental licensing ordinances.

The plaintiffs, short-term rental owners who are represented by Heather Brann, filed challenges in Lincoln County Circuit Court under ORS Chapter 215 and the Oregon Constitution. In 2024, the Lincoln County Circuit Court denied the plaintiffs' statutory claims under ORS 215 but invalidated some provisions in the County's ordinances based on the plaintiffs' constitutional claims, according to a release from Lincoln County.

The Court of Appeals ruling issued Aug. 12, reversed the Circuit Court's ruling that those provisions were unconstitutionally vague and found that, as a result, the Circuit Court erred when it invalidated them. In a significant legal victory for the county, the Court of Appeals otherwise affirmed the Circuit Court's decision denying plaintiffs' statutory claims.

"I am pleased by the Court of Appeals ruling upholding our short-term rental license program," Commissioner Walter Chuck said. "Other Counties without regulations for short-term rentals are facing significant housing shortages and decreased quality of life for their residents.

Ten years ago, the county was very forward thinking in anticipating the needs of our community and responding. Lincoln County's license program allows rentals while also balancing livability for residents."

In 2016, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners – then including Commissioners Claire Hall, Doug Hunt, and Terry Thompson – adopted Ordinance 487, which established a licensing program for short-term rentals. The board found that the licensing program was necessary because "the growth in the number of short-term rental of dwelling units within the County has been accompanied by increased problems of excessive noise, spilled garbage, shortages of

ODOT staff cuts would reduce maintenance and responses to severe weather events

KEY POINTS

The Oregon Department of Transportation is facing its fifth budget cycle in a row where the agency will have to cut services and staff unless the Oregon Legislature finds a way to provide additional revenue.

Democratic lawmakers in 2025 passed a law that would have brought \$4.3 billion in new tax revenue to the agency over the next decade, but voters frustrated by the cost of living overwhelmingly rejected most of those new revenue streams in a May referendum, including increases to gas and payroll taxes and car registration and title fees.

Transportation maintenance workers help respond to natural disasters including wildfires by coordinating evacuations and closing highways to serve as fire breaks.

TRADING JOBS

As fires scorched through a record 2.5 million acres this summer, mostly in eastern and central Oregon, many of the state’s transportation maintenance crews traded patching potholes and cleaning culverts for wildfire response.

Diverting resources to respond to severe weather events is becoming increasingly common for the Oregon Department of Transportation. But as the agency looks to cut nearly 200 maintenance positions to fill a \$200 million budget gap in the 2027-29 budget cycle, agency officials and climate experts warn that reducing staff amid a growing maintenance backlog and more frequent severe weather events could accelerate the deterioration of Oregon’s highways, bridges and roads.

On top of evacuating their own families and protecting their properties from wildfire, many workers managed traffic, hauled heavy equipment out of active fire zones, coordinated community evacuations and closed highway sections to serve as fire breaks for fire suppression crews, Oregon Department of Transportation Chief Engineer Tova Peltz said.

About 10% of the maintenance positions at risk are already vacant, Peltz said, but eliminating the rest would require layoffs.

When responding to severe weather, Peltz said she worries about worker safety and burnout.

“I know folks are working long hours and we’re bringing in folks from the west side of the state to support crews on the east side that have been working nonstop through the fires,” she said. “I worry that that is going to get so much worse in the future.”

Severe weather and Oregon transportation infrastructure

Jo Sias, a civil engineering professor at the University of New Hampshire and the lead researcher of a 2025 study examining the impacts of climate change on roads, compared maintaining road infrastructure to routine car upkeep.

“Any decreases in staffing and delayed maintenance are only going to make things get worse faster,” she told the Capital Chronicle.

Climate change is projected to increase the national annual costs of pavement maintenance by more than \$500 million on average by 2050, according to the study. The study found asphalt ages faster at higher temperatures, making it more prone to cracking and rutting. Additionally, flooding also reduces the lifetime of pavement by up to 16

months.

More wildfires in Oregon are a symptom of extreme summer heat — Oregon’s most common severe weather event, said Paul Loikith, an associate professor of weather and climate science at Portland State University.

Oregon is experiencing a rising number of days above 90 degrees, a trend he said is expected to continue. And with more wildfires comes the risk of more landslides across Oregon’s highways, he said. Numerous studies show heavy rainfall triggers landslides in places where wildfires consumed vegetation and created water-repellent soil.

Landslides already affect 7% of the state’s highway system, or nearly 500 miles of road, according to the transportation department. Many of those landslides stem from wave and stream erosion, including at least three locations along the coastal U.S. Highway 101.

Other areas prone to landslides include roads along the Columbia River Gorge and Cascade Mountain passes. The transportation department spends around \$2.5 million a year on landslide mitigation projects and \$18.1 million on landslide-related repairs.

Extreme heat also takes a toll on public transportation. Heat can cause rail, bridge and overhead wires to expand in public transportation infrastructure — resulting in slower trains and delays.

As winter temperatures also increase in the coming decades, Loikith said more rain in the mountains instead of snow will increase the risk of flooding.

The anticipated staff cuts would reduce a third of Oregon’s 80 statewide maintenance crews to five people or less, Peltz said. Crews currently range

from five to 20 people or more during the winter.

Severe weather responses divert maintenance funding

Oregon’s transportation department doesn’t have the budget to respond to severe weather events, so it diverts maintenance funding away from routine maintenance projects, Peltz said.

It took five years and a federal emergency declaration for the agency to get reimbursed for the recovery work it did in response to the 2020 Labor Day fires that scorched more than 1 million acres and destroyed thousands of homes, she said. That work included repairing damaged pavements and signs and clearing debris, vegetation and hazardous trees.

Even routine work is impacted. Extreme heat shortened the transportation agency’s season for chip sealing because pavement temperatures spiked too quickly, Peltz said, forcing the agency to add the delayed projects to its growing maintenance backlog.

“As the weather gets weirder and less consistent and harder to predict, it’s harder and harder to do the preventive maintenance that is critical to taking care of the aging transportation system,” Peltz said.

TRANSPORTATION IN OREGON FUELING THE SEVERE WEATHER IMPACTS

As the transportation department scrambles to repair infrastructure damaged by severe weather events, climate advocates argue Oregon’s transportation sector is fueling those very events.

Oregon’s transportation sector is responsible for 35% of the state’s greenhouse gases, representing the largest sector of greenhouse gas emissions in the

state.

“When vehicles produce more climate pollution, that climate pollution is trapped in our atmosphere,” said Brett Morgan, the transportation policy director at Northwest-based environmental nonprofit Climate Solutions. “That is heat that dries out our forests, reduces the amount of snowfall and then dries forest more easily resulting in more wildfire in our system.”

Morgan argues that preserving the agency’s current maintenance levels while simultaneously investing in climate-resilient projects would save Oregonians money in the long run.

In a report, Climate Solutions estimated that investments in electric buses, bike and pedestrian paths and public transit would save Oregonians almost \$5,000 per person a year.

“If we do not fundamentally address climate change as a strategy that is interlinked to maintaining what we have, we are only boxing ourselves into an affordability crisis where it is more expensive to maintain what we have, and we are not offering everyday Oregonians tools and options that will directly decrease their cost of living,” Morgan said.

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Samaritan primary care clinicians announce intent to form union

Primary care physicians, physician associates, and nurse practitioners at Samaritan Medical Group have announced their intent to form a union with Northwest Medicine United (NWMU).

Two hospitals in Lincoln County are served by Samaritan Health Services and its associated medical groups: Samaritan North Lincoln Hospital in Lincoln City and Samaritan Pacific Communities Hospital in Newport.

The clinicians stated in a release that they are organizing to protect their ability to provide the high-quality, compassionate care their communities depend on.

“They want a meaningful voice in decisions that determine how much time they can spend with patients, how quickly patients can access care, and whether clinics have the staffing and resources needed to provide timely and consistent care,” the release states. “By addressing growing workloads, burnout, and provider turnover, they hope to strengthen patient relationships and keep experienced clinicians practicing in their communities.”

Healthcare is about teamwork, according to Olivia Danforth, MD, a physician who has worked at Samaritan Health for seven years.

“Unionizing is how we can work together as a team to stand up for patients and support each other as clinicians.

That’s why we have seen similar major institutions complete this process in Oregon and Washington in recent years, and why the Oregon Medical Association has firmly endorsed unionization as a response to the worsening conditions impacting us all,” Danforth said. “Many of us have worked here for years and never want to leave. Unionization is about making the work we love sustainable.”

“We understand our leadership faces difficult choices, they’re responsible for everything, but there has been a shift, and it feels like numbers are the number one priority. As clinicians, we understand that numbers are not the full picture and that reinvestment makes care possible. We’ve seen

how this type of management has impacted our professional and patient community, and a balancing force is needed from providers who are directly engaged in patient care,” said Richard Ames, DO, a physician for 24 years who has worked at Samaritan Health for 20 years.

The clinicians look forward to a professional and constructive process with Samaritan as they move forward.

Statement from Scott Russell, Vice President of Human Resources, Samaritan Health Services

“Samaritan Health Services has received a request for voluntary union recognition from Northwest Medicine United on behalf of a group of Samaritan primary care clinicians.

Samaritan respects the rights of employees to make decisions regarding union representation. We also believe that the most appropriate and democratic process for determining whether employees wish to be represented by a union is through a confidential secret ballot election conducted by the National Labor Relations Board.

For that reason, Samaritan will not voluntarily recognize the proposed bargaining unit and will instead defer to the standard NLRB election process, which provides eligible employees the opportunity to make their choice through a fair and confidential vote.

Throughout this process, our focus remains on supporting our clinicians and staff and ensuring we continue to deliver high-quality care to the communities we serve.”

BACKGROUND

Northwest Medicine United (NWMU), formally known as Pacific Northwest Hospital Medicine Association (PNWHMA), founded in 2014, is the first hospitalist-specific union in the U.S. and now one of the largest physician-led unions in the country.

It represents physicians and advanced practice providers in the Pacific Northwest at PeaceHealth, Providence, MultiCare, and Legacy Health. It is part of AFT Healthcare, the fastest-growing healthcare union in the nation, which represents more than 200,000 healthcare workers and is affiliated with the 1.8 million-member AFT, AFL-CIO.

Gubernatorial candidates trade campaign ads, jabs

As analysts predict that Oregon’s 2026 gubernatorial election cycle is becoming more competitive, some of the fiercest barbs the candidates have exchanged are taking place not on the debate stage, but instead on Oregonians’ screens.

On one side, incumbent Democratic Gov. Tina Kotek, backed by an increasingly vocal Democratic party apparatus, seeks to tie her two-time challenger’s record to the Trump administration. Kotek’s campaign has launched two ads: one criticizing the federal government’s cuts to federal food benefits and another slamming state Sen. Christine Drazan for introducing a bill to effectively end mail voting.

“Being a governor right now means protecting our state, defending our values against an overreach of a federal administration that does not care about people fundamentally and so that is a big part of my job right now,” Kotek told KOIN in a recent televised interview. “Senator Drazan has said nothing about President Trump and his policies, whether it’s abusive immigration enforcement to tariffs to his cuts around

healthcare.”

Drazan, a Republican from Canby who lost to Kotek by nearly 4 percentage points in 2022, is making a push to convince Oregonians that she is able to offer an alternative to what her party has long described as failed leadership on issues such as economy and education. Her team has accused Kotek of spreading falsehoods about her positions, pointed to polling suggesting the race is competitive and launched two television ads slamming Kotek’s leadership.

“Tina Kotek is lying about Christine’s record because she can’t defend her own. From driving up costs for families, record homelessness, failing schools and businesses leaving our state, Oregonians are fed up with Tina Kotek’s failures and excuses,” Drazan campaign manager Trey Rosser said in a statement. “Oregonians expect results and

Christine Drazan will deliver them when they elect her as governor in November.”

The dueling approaches are playing out across television waves and the internet. Both candidates have declined opportunities to debate one another, meaning Oregonians could have fewer chances to see Drazan clarify the extent to which her positions align with the Trump administration and Kotek defend the state’s performance on issues such as housing, education and economics. So far, both campaigns have agreed to debates in Eugene and Medford in early October, compared to three debates between the candidates in 2022.

Drazan seeks to provide alternative to Kotek, points to polling

Oregon hasn’t elected a Republican governor since 1982, and

its ranking from “Solid D” to “Likely D” for the Oregon governor’s race in July. The newsletter Inside Elections made a similar change over the summer as well, citing a potential for voters to express dissatisfaction with Kotek and decades of the state’s Democratic control.

Drazan backers see a chance to cut into Kotek’s margins in major population centers, seizing on issues such as homelessness and economic development.

“People see a state that they used to be really proud of, including Portland,” said Chuck Adams, a Salem-based conservative political consultant. “Portland’s a place that we used to tout and be really proud of, and now we have less to be proud of because of policies, really bad policies. I think that’s what Christine offers — a different approach to a lot of those issues.”

Drazan, a Klamath Falls native, appears to have adopted that strategy, describing Oregon’s problems in an advertisement as “not partisan.” She has also recently backed a campaign to ask Oregon voters to enshrine a right to hunt, fish and farm after an unsuccessful signature gathering campaign for a measure that would have effectively outlawed most of those practices.

“When I was young, we moved more than a dozen times just trying to get our feet underneath us. The politicians sat by

and watched while the mills closed and jobs disappeared,” Drazan said in her most recent ad. “Today, it’s Tina Kotek’s policies that are killing jobs and leaving kids and families like yours and mine behind.”

Kotek, Democrats emphasize Trump

The Democratic Party of Oregon, meanwhile, has been particularly vocal about tying Drazan to the federal administration. The party recently purchased multiple domain names tied to Drazan’s name to link to a site comparing her and Kotek on various issues when it comes to aligning with Trump.

“After weeks of refusing to make clear where she stood, Christine Drazan said she supported military deployment in Portland and stood by while Trump turned federal troops against Oregonians,” one section of the website reads. “Following The MAGA Agenda Instead of working to protect Oregonians from Trump’s gross abuse of power, Drazan blamed local leaders who were working to protect our communities.”

Drazan’s statement following Trump’s announcement of an attempted deployment to Portland condemned “violent mobs and domestic terrorists” and said “we need order, we need to restore safety, and Oregon’s local leaders have failed to provide

Surprise and warming donation

Editor's Note: The Coastal Range Food Bank was recently featured in the Lincoln County Leader in our series "Community Spirit."

In my 37 years of running the Coastal Range Food Bank (CRFB) in Nashville—a small, close-knit community in the Oregon Coastal Range—I have witnessed many beautiful things. But recently, I experienced the most touching, impactful

moment, all the wonderful moments at the food bank. It started like any other day. I answered the phone with our usual greeting: "Coastal Range Food Bank, how can we help you?"

The voice on the other end belonged to a young man named Mat. He had been a client of ours for years. I smiled immediately, remembering how our volunteers always praised him for his joyful spirit and deep appreciation.

But Mat wasn't calling to ask for help. He was

calling from the Portland International Airport. He wanted to say goodbye. Mat explained that he was boarding a flight to Colombia to start a new life—one where he hoped he could truly excel. He had recently received a small inheritance. While it wasn't enough to make a major difference for him here in the United States, he had friends in Colombia where the money would stretch far enough to change his entire future.

As he spoke, my eyes filled with tears. I began

to choke up, overwhelmed by the sheer gravity of the moment. Of all the things a young man has to think about when moving across the world, Mat chose to spend his final moments at the airport calling us to say goodbye.

He went on to share a beautiful tribute to our food bank, listing the many ways CRFB had been there for him over the years. He told me he simply couldn't have navigated his life without the kindness and support he received from our team. Through my tears,

I told him to please keep in touch. I reminded him that if he ever needed anything, we would be here for him, and that our community would always welcome him back home.

At the very end of our conversation, Mat added, "Oh, by the way, I want you to know that I dropped a donation in your mailbox as I was driving past on my way to the airport."

When I hung up the phone, I was completely stunned. It was the most wonderful, meaningful "thank you" our food

bank has ever received.

When we checked the mailbox, we found \$500 in cash. To put that into perspective, \$500 represents a small fortune for a young man trying to plant new roots in Colombia. Yet, he chose to give it away to the people who once helped him. I am still shaking, completely overwhelmed by how a few small acts of daily kindness can come back and impact your heart forever.

Oregon's 2026 race for governor: The facts on the ground

The Oregon governor's race this year may hinge on two factors.

One is the record of incumbent Democrat Tina Kotek and Republican Christine Drazan's critique of it and issues on the ground. The other is the Trump administration.

Here, let's look at the first of those, the ideas and topics more specific to the candidates and Oregon. (The Trump factor will come later.)

A good shorthand comparison of what the candidates generally seem to want to emphasize, and how they address those subjects, can be found on the issues pages on the respective websites of Drazan and Kotek.

These pages aren't all that the candidates have, can or will say about various issues. But they do offer useful core messages. The first Drazan television spot this season, for example, plays like a short summary of her website's issues page.

The two candidates talk about many of the same things, especially toward the top of their lists.

Both lead with the rising cost of living, described as a major problem.

From there, they diverge. Kotek says she

has addressed high costs through attacking "corporate price gouging," seeking to pause new taxes in the Portland area, blocking freeway tolls and utility rate increases and signing "bills that protect credit from medical debt, ban hidden online fees." Drazan calls for lowering taxes, "repeal(ing) regulations that drive up gas, utilities and food prices," and ending "Oregon's unique death tax" (though how that would cut costs broadly is unclear).

Both also talk about affordable housing as a top priority, though again differently. Kotek mentioned her efforts to increase housing stock through legislation and otherwise. Drazan proposed regulatory reduction, property tax cuts and programs to help first-time

parents to opt out."

Both had plenty to say too about the economy, where Kotek referred to "strengthening" it and Drazan to "unleashing" it.

Kotek spoke of business partnerships and projects and focused on efforts to develop clean and renewable energy; elsewhere, she spoke favorably of a moratorium on new data centers.

Drazan's bullet points were painted with a broader brush: "Fire anti-business bureaucrats. Freeze new rules and regulations. Clear barriers to trade. Tear up anti-business executive orders. Get government out of the way. Invest in Oregon's infrastructure. Prioritize access to affordable, reliable energy. Unleash our natural resource economy. ... Roll back Oregon's hidden sales tax."

Kotek spoke more about public safety, environmental concerns (except for wildfires, which Drazan simply said should be prevented so people could "get our woods working again").

In her review of Kotak's term, Drazan appeared to bear down on the governor's case four years ago that she would be a tough and effective administrator, suggesting she has not been. The headlines on the Republican's issues page says, "Oregon deserves

better. Christine Drazan will deliver."

Drazan devoted a major issue section to this theme: "Root out fraud and corruption. Fire ineffective agency heads. Issue a moratorium on new rules and regulations. Eliminate three rules and regulations for any new one. Undo Tina Kotek's legacy by tearing up her executive orders. ... Veto special interest giveaways, special interest and pork projects."

Drazan's website, however, offers few specifics to go with the rhetoric. Maybe she could document fraud, waste, inefficiency and so on, but she hasn't brought the receipts yet.

Oddly missing from both candidate's major specific talking points: Transportation funding, on which the two clashed repeatedly in the last couple of years, and in which voters strongly rejected a Kotek-signed plan. Maybe that's coming later.

Let's pull back. From a campaign perspective, what do these messages tell Oregon voters?

Both contenders are doing what you might reasonably expect of them. Kotek is making the case that her administration has been active and productive on key issues, and cites programs, funding and legislation to support

that. Drazan characterizes the term as ineffective and incompetent, and proposes mainly time-tested Republican answers (lower taxes, less regulation) in response.

She would, of course, have to deal with an (almost certainly) Democratic legislature. Of course, the popularity (ahem) of the Legislature isn't something Kotek has emphasized, either.

That brings us to an unknown: how Oregonians perceive these arguments. The answer seems likely to be a jumble, since Kotek's polling popularity has not been high (raising the question of how well her message will sell), but Republican policies haven't been scoring well at least in Oregon either.

The decisive outlying factor could be summed up in one word: Trump.

Lower Columbia River sturgeon is closed, north coast fall Chinook fishing is a fraction of what it used to be, winter steelhead, spring Chinook; all challenging fisheries that have no draw for paying customers. There remains one great fishery, and that fishery is for Columbia River salmon.

I'm forced to make a full year's wages on 50 days of meaningful

opportunity, set aside what we've done to this iconic natural resource.

Sportfishing remains one of the greatest transfers of wealth from urban to rural communiites.

With out the necessary protections for the last of the basin's resource, we're done, out of business, and won't have any money to pay our electric bills.

If you're a conservation

minded sportangler, you owe a debt of gratitude to Governors Kotek, Kitzhaber, Brown and Kulongoski for continuing to fight the federal government for a properly

managed Columbia River. Our salmon, and our industry rely on it.

Challenge to boost student voter turnout launched

Oregon Secretary of State Tobias Read has launched the Oregon Campus Voting Challenge to boost student voter participation in the upcoming general election.

“Our elections decide our future, and no one has more at stake in that future than young Oregonians. However, too many young people don’t vote because they don’t feel connected to the process. That’s why we launched the Oregon Campus Voting Challenge. Lawmaker pressing for more cannabis regulations to protect kids

Karma Clarke, a Douglas County mother, thought marijuana was harmless in 2014 when she voted in favor of the ballot measure legalizing recreational cannabis in Oregon.

She believed that until six years later, when her then-20-year-old son began smoking marijuana regularly.

He had played sports and maintained good grades in college, but when he returned home after completing his associate degree, Clarke said her son began acting strangely. He stopped leaving his room, and he lost the ability to perform everyday tasks such as reading a tape measure or answering questions.

After several doctor visits, her son was admitted in two different psychiatric hospitalizations. Although

his drug tests came back clean, something had switched in his brain, she said.

Clarke shared her story of witnessing her son develop a psychotic disorder at a virtual meeting Wednesday, where state Sen. Lisa Reynolds, D-Portland, invited her and public health experts to speak about policy proposals aimed at preventing youth access to cannabis.

“I’m hoping that the cannabis industry will take the lead, and they’ll decide they don’t want to be like the tobacco industry and they don’t want to keep denying that there’s a link between their products and people’s lives being ruined,” Clarke said.

Reynolds looks to THC caps again, and more warning labels

Recreational cannabis has been legal in Oregon for adults 21 and older for more than a decade, but it

remains illegal for minors. Still, an estimated 13,000 youth between ages 12 and 18 use cannabis in Oregon, according to Dr. Julia Dilley, a Multnomah County epidemiologist who led a 10-year study looking at cannabis legalization and public health impact in Oregon and Washington.

Reynolds, a pediatrician who has served in the Legislature for five years, is seeking to improve cannabis prevention education in schools, cap individual edibles at 10 milligrams of THC and require manufacturers provide more warning labels on their products.

Reynolds’ efforts are inspired by her work as a pediatrician, and because she believes her brother’s habitual marijuana use in the ’70s contributed to his severe mental health problems as an adult.

Teens using cannabis are at 11 times higher risk of developing a psychotic disorder compared to teens not using cannabis, studies show.

“When we talk about the risk of psychosis, this isn’t just what we would call a bad experience while you are actually intoxicated

by cannabis,” Reynolds said. “This is a long-term disability.”

Additionally, more children are turning up in hospitals after consuming edibles resembling desserts such as brownies or cookies.

She spearheaded legislation earlier this year to cap individual edibles at 10 milligrams of THC. Her bill made it past the Oregon Senate, but it died in the committee process on the House side as members received intense pushback from marijuana industry groups. Reynolds said she’ll propose the legislation again, but this time with the help of a lobbyist.

The Cannabis Industry Alliance of Oregon did not immediately respond to the Capital Chronicle’s request for comment.

Oregon is one of the most loosely regulated marijuana states

More than 800 calls since 2025 to the Oregon Poison Center were related to cannabis, said Dilley, the Multnomah County epidemiologist. One-third of those calls were for children younger than 5.

Cannabis use among youth is higher in Oregon than it is in Washington

because it doesn’t have the same protective measures, she said.

Unlike Washington which requires that cannabis manufacturers individually wrap all edibles with a 10 milligram THC cap, Oregon cannabis manufacturers can sell individual edibles with more than 10 milligrams of THC, such as sodas or cookies containing 100 milligrams of THC that are meant to be split into several portions. Both states require an edible package contain no more than 100 milligrams of THC.

Unlike Oregon, it’s illegal to grow nonmedical marijuana at home in Washington. Washington also caps the number of retail cannabis outlets and applies a 37% sales tax. Oregon’s cannabis sales tax ranges from 17% to 20%, depending on where it’s bought. Both states require cannabis businesses to be located at least 1,000 feet away from public schools. Washington requires this buffer also apply to private schools, playgrounds, childcare facilities, libraries and other locations, though Oregon localities can establish additional buffers

under state law.

Oregon does require warning labels on cannabis products related to pregnancy. These labels are working and preventing people from using cannabis during pregnancy, Dilley said, adding that Oregon could go a step further at providing more warning labels about cannabis use contributing to worse mental health outcomes.

“These products should not be designed or marketed to appeal to children,” pediatrician Dr. Jill Pearson said. “Yet, time and time again, we are just repeating Joe Camel, Big Tobacco and all the things all over again to addict the next generation.”

it.”

Ashley Quinton, a campaign spokesperson, wrote in an email that the website had “plenty of inaccuracies and blatant falsehoods,” adding that Drazan “never said she supported military deployment to Oregon.”

But approaches like the website help Democratic politicians like Kotek to keep the focus on the federal administration rather than their own record, according to Jake Weigler, a Portland-based Democratic political consultant.

“Their base is frustrated and feeling like we are at an existential moment for the future of our country, and that the

Democratic establishment is failing to meet the moment in terms of the intensity of their opposition,” he said. “I think it’s useful for Kotek to shift the focus to Trump and his record versus trying to stand up for what she’s done.”

The governor appears to be taking note of those dynamics. Her campaign announced on Friday that she received a nomination from the state’s progressive Working Families Party, which previously declined to endorse her primary election bid. Kotek’s office also touted data last week projecting that Oregon has seen a rise in housing production for 2025 and 2026, bucking a national downward trend and reversing a decline taking place in Oregon when

she took office.

“Here in Oregon, we always have competitive races for governor. We always have. Four years ago was no different and Senator Drazan is back,” Kotek said during her television interview. “What I think voters will end up deciding (is that) they will look at my record. Elections are about choices. We are in a very difficult time in our country and in our state.”

The first debate both campaigns have agreed to participate in so far is set to take place Oct. 1 in Eugene.

crashes involving drugs or alcohol, each one a tragedy for those lost and their loved ones,” LCPD Patrol Sgt. Erik Anderson told the Lincoln County Leader in a published report in January of this year.

Of those DUII arrests in Lincoln City for 2025, approximately 41% were based on citizen

complaints such as people calling in poor driving they observed, or area establishments calling in patrons they warned not to drive due to intoxication getting into their vehicles and driving away, according to LCPD records. Approximately 39% of the arrests were based on officers’ self-initiated field activity.

“The most common causes for stopping drivers on self-initiated activity, who later turned out to

be impaired, was speeding followed by driving without headlights on after dark,” Anderson noted, adding that approximately 19% of those arrests were based on officers responding to crashes and identifying an involved driver as impaired by drugs or alcohol at the time of the crash.

“We rely on our community to be our eyes and ears, as well as continual training of our officers, to try to get that last category

down to zero,” Anderson said. “We would much rather get impaired drivers off the street before their reckless decision ends up in a crash, possibly ending an innocent person’s life.

Anderson pointed out that Lincoln City has taxicabs, ride-share companies, county bus-lines, and private shuttles to safely get people home after they indulge, leaving no excuse for people choosing to drive impaired.

“The LCPD partners

with Oregon Impact, through the Oregon Department of Transportation, in various traffic grants throughout the year to help get our officers out on the street,” he said. “The Oregon Department of Transportation is also instrumental in hosting DUII Training events throughout the year in partnership with the Oregon Department of Justice. We send Officers to these events every year

so as to better serve our community.”

Goodman said the members of the Lincoln City Police Department are committed to the safety of the community’s citizens and visitors.

“Our goal is simple: to save lives and prevent injuries caused by DUII crashes. These grant funds were made possible through the Oregon Department of Transportation and Oregon Impact,” Goodman said.

they would target. While some states have limited enrollment for state-funded programs, such as health insurance for low-income individuals without legal immigration status, the federal Affordable Care Act ensures access to the marketplace for most Americans during enrollment periods.

Jason Horton, a division spokesperson, told the Capital Chronicle that the agency has not made any final decisions regarding caps, which would be developed in consultation with insurance companies and justified through market data and analytics.

“We don’t know when or if that will happen,” he wrote in an email.

Agency anticipates little from federal tax and spending law

Expiring tax credits to offset premium costs have been central to the rate increases. Low-income individuals have had access to tax credits

since the Affordable Care Act passed, and Congress expanded income caps in 2021 to address the fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic. That meant most of the nearly 120,000 Oregonians who purchase individual coverage through the marketplace have had help with more affordable insurance.

But Congress opted against extending the COVID-era enhanced tax credits last year. Now, people who make more than 400% of the federal poverty level, or \$63,840 for an individual’s annual income and \$132,000 for a household of four people, no longer qualify for these subsidies. They continue to remain in place for individuals who make anywhere from 100% to 400% of the federal poverty level.

Another provision from the GOP’s 2025 federal tax and spending law will also bar people who are kicked off of Medicaid due to new rules from qualifying for these subsidies. The law’s requirements mandate that people work, volunteer, train or

go to school for at least 80 hours a month along with income verification reviews every six months for most individuals. The Oregon Health Authority anticipates implementing these changes next year.

Under the 2025 law, people who lose Medicaid for not meeting work requirements become ineligible for marketplace subsidies.

Democrats and eligibility workers have said the new federal law will result in a less efficient system that will make it harder for people who qualify to access Medicaid. In Oregon, people making up to 138% of the federal poverty level, or \$22,024.80 for an individual, qualify for Medicaid.

Horton said the rising premiums approved by the state are not directly related to work requirements from the federal tax and spending law. People who are covered by Medicaid cannot simultaneously qualify for tax credits on the marketplace for subsidized plans.

“Some individuals who lose Medicaid may

choose to pick up unsubsidized individual market coverage,” Horton said. “However, we expect this to be a small number of individuals.”

parking, and overcrowded accommodations.”

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Oregon weighs enrollment caps, paying for claims as double-digit insurance hikes set for 2027

Oregon insurance regulators have approved premium hikes that could cost individuals and small businesses that buy health insurance through the state marketplace dozens of more dollars per month and are weighing policy changes that would limit availability. State officials with the Division of Financial Regulation in a news release framed the nearly 22% increase for individuals and 15.5% for small businesses as a win for preserving statewide access to coverage.

The average plan will cost a 40-year-old in Portland seeking a middle-tier insurance policy anywhere from \$599 to \$734, up from an average \$567 for similar plans in the current year. For small group plans, the cost per person for such an individual ranges from \$509 to \$754, according to state estimates.

Insurance regulators said they made the change after considering new data and updated rate requests from insurance companies to make sure the rates “were actuarially sound and justified based on additional market changes.” While they have pointed out that federal cuts have played a significant role in the increases, state regulators also cited other market pressures. “The finalization of rate orders comes as carriers gained more experience in the market and re-evaluated their market

presence,” the news release reads. “Continued marketplace uncertainty with the loss of the enhanced federal Affordable Care Act subsidies, heightened medical costs, tariff pressures on durable medical equipment and pharmaceuticals all caused greater cost pressures that were reflected in the rates.” The increased rates prompted three Oregon Democratic lawmakers to issue a press release

vowing to work to reduce Oregonians’ costs while pointing to federal cuts to health care. “I’m honestly worried about what this means for Oregon and our ability to provide affordable healthcare,” Rep. Rob Nosse, a Portland Democrat who chairs the House Committee on Health Care, said in a statement. “We have tools that can help keep

costs down, and we need to use them. At the same time, we need to keep fighting for federal policies that make health care more affordable. We can’t keep fighting with one arm tied behind our back.” State regulators pursue reinsurance, potential caps Financial regulators said they would budget an additional \$15 million toward the Oregon Reinsurance Program, which

allows the state to help insurers pay for expensive medical claims, to “offset anticipated higher than usual claims costs.” The agency will also explore enrollment caps for certain plans to “balance consumer choice with marketwide financial stability.” It’s unclear how such caps would operate or what plans

Oregon gets funding to expand pollinator habitat along highways

The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) will use \$150,000 in federal funding to create and restore pollinator habitats along the state’s highways. The funding will allow native seed mixes and adjusted mowing practices to improve roadside pollinator habitats. “This sort of project delivers so many benefits,” ODOT Interim Director Chris Warner said. “We’re creating healthier habitat for pollinators like native bees and Monarch butterflies, while increasing drought and fire resiliency, all while reducing the long-term need for pesticide use to control weeds. This work serves as an example of how our transportation system can work for people, the environment and the communities we serve.” The money is the maximum award under the Federal Highway Administration’s Pollinator-Friendly Practices on Roadsides and Highway Rights-of-Way Program, also known as the Roadside Pollinator Program.

Oregon’s U.S. Senators Jeff Merkley and Ron Wyden announced the funding in a release. “Pollinators need healthy habitats to survive and benefit Oregon’s farms, forests, and natural landscapes,” Merkley said. “This project is a great example of how we can make our roadsides work even better for Oregon, creating habitat for iconic species such as the Western Monarch and native bees while building greater resilience to drought. I’ll keep pushing for federal investments that strengthen our communities and ecosystems.” “Bees and butterflies will all benefit from this fresh federal investment in pollinator health that’s a key to fighting drought and supporting landscapes native to Oregon,” Wyden said. “I very much look forward as I travel our state’s highways all over Oregon to witnessing the results of this innovative effort.” For years, Merkley has led the charge to revive the populations of monarchs and other pollinators. He leads the bipartisan Roadside Pollinator Program Amendments Act,

which builds upon the success of his bipartisan Monarch and Pollinator Highway Act that was signed into law as a part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and created the Roadside Pollinator Program, according to the release. Merkley also wrote the Monarch Action, Recovery, and Conservation of Habitat (MONARCH) Act—which is cosponsored by Wyden—to help prevent the extinction of the Western Monarch butterfly and other critically important pollinators. Previously, Merkley hosted two Monarch Butterfly Summits, in partnership with the U.S. Department of the Interior, the first of which announced a \$1 million investment in the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation Pollinator Fund and established a Pollinator Conservation Center at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. As former Chair of the Senate Appropriations subcommittee that funds the Interior Department, Merkley has secured more than \$18 million in dedicated funding for monarch and pollinator conservation.

Oregon’s employment drops by 4,100 in July

Oregon’s seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment declined by 4,100 jobs, following a revised gain of 1,300 jobs in June, according to the Oregon Employment Department. July’s losses were largest in professional and business services (-1,800 jobs), leisure and hospitality (-900), and

government (-700). Gains were largest in retail trade (+500 jobs). In the past 12 months, professional and business services was on a slightly downward trend, declining by 2,500 jobs, or 1.0%. Most of the decline was in management of companies and enterprises, which cut 2,200 jobs, or 4.6%, in that time. The other two component industries saw little change during

that period: professional and technical services (+200 jobs, or 0.2%) and administrative and waste services (-500 jobs, or -0.5%). Leisure and hospitality employed 203,800 in July, which was 3,500 jobs below its average of 207,300 from 2023 through 2025. It cut 3,800 jobs since January, following a very flat trend during the prior three years. Despite recent weakness,

its component industry arts, entertainment, and recreation added 200 jobs in July to reach a record high of 31,300. Oregon’s government sector lost 4,500 jobs, or -1.4%, since July 2025. All components cut since July 2025. Federal government dropped 1,600 jobs, or -5.7%; state government lost 200 jobs, or -0.4%; and local government job counts declined by 2,700, or -1.1%.

Retail trade added 500 jobs in July, but that follows a consistent long-term trend of job declines during the past four years. It employed 198,000 in July, which was a drop of 12,700 jobs, or 6.0%, since July 2022. Oregon’s unemployment rate was 5.2% in July. It has been 5.2% each month since January. The U.S. unemployment rate was 4.2% in June and 4.1% in July

Mobile Crisis Team supports community, lightens load for hospitals, law enforcement

LINCOLN COUNTY Lincoln County’s mobile crisis team is fundamentally transforming how the community responds to mental health emergencies by bringing crisis intervention services directly to people in their communities rather than limiting response to emergency departments and jails. The program represents a significant shift in crisis response philosophy in Oregon and locally in recent years, moving from a reactive, institution-based model to a proactive, community-centered approach that meets individuals where they are – mentally and physically. The mobile crisis team operates 24/7 to provide immediate mental health support to anyone experiencing a crisis, regardless of whether they are enrolled in other county programs. The program is available to all community members and can be accessed through multiple pathways, including a 24-hour crisis line called Protocol, walk-ins at behavioral

health offices, and referrals from law enforcement and health care providers. When Shandi Hoey, a Mobile Crisis Supervisor and Licensed Professional Counselor, joined Lincoln County in 2019 – and later stepped into her supervisor role in 2021 – she quickly recognized the need to restructure the county’s crisis response model, drawing on her previous mobile crisis experience in Arizona. “When I began my position as crisis supervisor in 2021, I started working on making the switch from crisis calls mainly happening in the emergency departments and jails to mobile crisis, taking calls out in the community and meeting people where they’re at,” Hoey said. The timing of this transition aligned with a major statewide initiative. About a year and a half ago, Oregon implemented Mobile Crisis Intervention Servicesb (MCIS), which is a statewide program designed to provide urgent, community-based behavioral health crisis support to people experiencing a mental health emergency. “This was probably the greatest thing that could have happened because it really brought forth the importance and need of an actual mobile crisis team,” Hoey said. Lincoln County’s crisis team currently operates with four licensed crisis counselors working 12-hour shifts (3 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 3 p.m. to 3 a.m.) to ensure round-the-clock coverage, along with four case managers who work staggered shifts to support evening and night operations, though not for the full 24 hours. Building and maintaining adequate staffing has not been without challenges. Recruiting master’s-level and licensed clinicians is difficult in such a rural area, and these credentials are required for crisis counselor positions, according to Hoey. Despite this, she said the county has successfully maintained full staffing, enabling a comprehensive crisis response. “As a supervisor, I couldn’t

be prouder of our crisis team,” Hoey said. “Every single member brings deep compassion and genuine care to the people they support. I see them show up wholeheartedly, day and night, for individuals who are going through some of the hardest moments of their lives. They consistently go above and beyond, offering comfort, stability, and hope when it’s needed most. Their dedication to our community is truly inspiring, and I’m honored to work alongside such an exceptional group of people.”

The team usually fields up to four to five calls per 12-hour shift, though the calls vary significantly day to day. Rarely, Hoey said, will they have zero activations during a shift. During the final three months of 2025, the team was dispatched 222 times.

“Every activation involves a behavioral health crisis,” Hoey explained. “We’re not responding to everyday conflicts. We’re called when someone is experiencing significant distress, such as suicidal ideation, severe mood instability, or symptoms related to untreated mental health conditions. These situations are rarely simple, and each requires careful and compassionate intervention.”

How the Mobile Crisis

Team Works

The mobile crisis response process begins with triage and assessment. When someone walks into a behavioral health office or contacts the crisis line – crisis line staff first attempts to provide support over the phone – if that individual in crisis requests mobile assistance, the team immediately gathers information and springs into action.

Hoey described the assessment process: “As soon as the individual in crisis lets staff know they would like to speak to a crisis counselor face to face, a staff member calls an interagency line. We answer, we triage the call – what’s the person’s name, date of birth, what’s going on with the individual, is the environment safe – and then we head to their location.”

Once on scene, the crisis counselor prioritizes building rapport and creating a safe space for the individual to share what they’re experiencing.

“We introduce ourselves and then we take them somewhere private, to an office or room, and sit down with them. It’s really kind of a rapport building thing at first to get them in a comfortable place to be able to answer questions,” Hoey said, adding that the assessment itself is conducted conversationally rather than as a rigid checklist.

The team completes a crisis assessment that has

specific questions to cover – questions on suicidal thoughts, plans, intent, homicidal thoughts, substance use.

“But we don’t ever go in and ask the questions one by one,” Hoey said. “We sit with that person, build that rapport, and talk to them.”

This approach helps individuals feel heard and supported, rather than interrogated, she added.

The outcome of a crisis assessment depends on the individual’s situation and needs. For those struggling but not in immediate danger, the focus shifts to connecting them with services and providing continued support.

Hoey explained that if someone isn’t enrolled in services and is experiencing depression, but they don’t have suicidal thoughts, a plan, or intent, the next step is simply to ask whether they’re interested in services. If they are, staff focus on helping them get connected.

“We start looking at options for enrolling them in services and getting appointments scheduled,” Hoey said. “Anybody that has a crisis assessment is eligible for 72 hours of crisis follow-up. When they come in for that assessment and they’re done, there’s still 72 hours of us being able to call them just to check on them. The next day when we do that follow-up, we ask them how they’re

doing and if they’re interested in a phone call tomorrow.”

For individuals in acute crisis with active suicidal intent and means, the team facilitates inpatient placement.

“If we do have people who are severely depressed or we encounter somebody who says, ‘I don’t want to live, I am having thoughts, I have a plan to overdose, and yes I have medication at home,’ then we start talking about inpatient placement to stabilize and keep the individual safe,” Hoey said.

Community Benefits: Better Patient Experience, Reduced Health Care Costs, Reduced Law Enforcement Burden

The mobile crisis approach offers significant advantages over traditional emergency department-based crisis response, benefiting both individuals in crisis and their broader community.

According to Hoey, perhaps the most immediate benefit is the improved experience for individuals in crisis. Traditional emergency department responses can feel institutional and frightening.

“Before, if you’re struggling with any mental health symptoms or suicidal thoughts, you’ve got to walk into the ED, tell somebody, and they bring you back, ask you questions, dress you in scrubs, ask you for your personal belongings, and then

put you in a room that’s designed for safety and for most feels isolated. We’re told many times by people, ‘This didn’t feel good,’ or ‘I don’t like coming here,’” Hoey said.

In contrast, mobile crisis allows for assessments in comfortable, familiar environments, such as their home or a friend or family member’s home.

“When you can sit down with somebody in their own space, even our unhoused population ... I have a gentleman that we would see who lives in a tent, but we know where he lives, and even being able to go over there and meet him in his environment is a more comfortable experience versus being in a hospital,” Hoey said.

Avoiding admission to the emergency room also reduces costs to the individual and reduces health care costs for the community at large. Mobile crisis teams also reduce the burden on law enforcement and at times can help prevent unnecessary arrests for mental health crises.

“Previously, when law enforcement responded to a behavioral health crisis, options were limited. If the situation escalated and officers were unable to stabilize the individual, the person could end up in jail—even when the underlying issue was related to their mental health,” Hoey explained.

The mobile crisis model has transformed that dynamic, according

to Hoey. Now, officers can call in crisis team staff who provide assessment, de-escalation, and support.

“This partnership helps ensure individuals receive appropriate care rather than entering the criminal justice system, leading to safer and more compassionate outcomes for everyone involved,” Hoey explained. “Now that we operate a mobile model, the collaboration with law enforcement works well. When officers request support, we respond to the scene and connect directly with the individual”

Typically, law enforcement arrives first to assess the situation and ensure the environment is safe.

“Once they determine its secure, we can step in and say, ‘We’ve got it from here.’ This allows officers to return to their responsibilities while we take the lead, which often helps the person in crisis feel more at ease,” Hoey said. “Most of these calls end with us offering options like, ‘Would you like to come with us to our office so we can talk?’ or meeting the person in their home and sitting with them to provide support.”

Those experiencing a mental health crisis in Lincoln County can call the crisis line 24 hours a day at 866-266-0288. At any time, the individual in crisis can request a face-to-face crisis assessment from a mobile crisis team member.

Reedsport and Waldport offices. These offices are open for permit sales from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. Every year, 100 commercial use permits are available on a first-come, first served basis.

Commercial use permits are \$200 and are required for any individual

gathering more than six matsutake mushrooms per day or for anyone gathering to sell. Each harvester must be age 18 or older and provide valid identification issued by a state or the United States government. Permits are valid from the date of sale through Dec. 31, 2026.

Please be aware that similarly looking poisonous mushrooms exist in the same areas as matsutakes. Do not disturb topsoil when searching for

matsutakes by digging or raking. After harvesting a matsutake, return the soil or debris attached to the stem and cover any remaining holes.

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SWAFFORD ON WINE

It is a wine-dark sea that I sail seeking that near-perfect glass of wine to match a favorite cuisine of mine: hot, spicy Louisiana Seafood Gumbo.

I have New Orleans cousins with Cajun-French last names that introduced me to jambalaya, crawfish and gumbo at a long-ago family reunion at the family camp across Lake Pontchartrain.

As a boy growing up in the Maryland countryside, I remember harvesting okra pods from the garden where my father experimented by planting dozens of different kinds of seeds selected at random from the Burpee Seed Catalog just to see what would grow. That was before I had tasted

a gumbo or had learned that “gumbo” is a West African word that means “okra”. With a formidable concentration of garlic, okra, onions, Andouille sausage and Creole seasonings, even before any shrimp gets added to the recipe, one can easily ensure there will be plenty of heat to bring under control with a glass of wine when everyone sits down to dine.

Other well-known spicy hot cuisines, such as Thai sweet and sour specialties, have found the balance of good grape sugars and high acidity common to German Rieslings, have made them a nice

compliment to these contrasting flavors. However, here in the Pacific Northwest our Rieslings, which are currently getting some good reviews, should also get some consideration as an accompaniment to my Louisiana Seafood Gumbo.

Let’s look at one each from these two regions: 2023 Pacific Rim Sweet Riesling, Columbia Valley, Washington and 2024 Loosen “Dr. L” Riesling, Bernkastel/Mosel, Germany. Both claim on their labels to have the necessary sweetness and the crisp acidity to stand up well to hot and spicy cuisine. The cost (at Fred

Meyer) is a reasonable \$8 for the Pacific Rim and \$12 for the Loosen.

Pacific Rim was founded by the irrepressible Randall Grahm at a time when he was brandishing his wit and considerable talent making terrific American Rhone-style red wines at his Bonny Doon Winery in Santa Cruz, California in the late ’80s.

His iteration of California Syrah that were so similar to those that came from the vineyards around the village of Châteauneuf-du-Pape, that he landed on the cover of an April Fool’s edition of the Wine Spectator Magazine dressed in a white cowboy outfit and black mask, standing by a white horse and with

a caption proclaiming him to be the “Rhone Ranger”. Grahm also was a lover of Riesling. He founded Pacific Rim in 2007, moving this team to Washington’s Columbia Valley. He eventually sold, but after fifteen years the current owners have re-affiliated with the Rhone Ranger and Riesling flows again from the Columbia Valley. Pacific Rim is the only American winery solely making Riesling.

Back to the recipe: For an excellent recipe--and other sources of Cajun food and history--go online to thecaglediaries.com where the renowned TV chef Melanie Cagle will provide you with plenty of material to print out. But one thing

I want to emphasize above all else: The key to a successful gumbo is the roux. The roux is the sauce, a base mixture of equal parts oil (olive is my preference) and flour stirred together over low-to-medium heat in a thick-bottomed pan until it is chocolate brown.

This is the base into which all the other ingredients go. The stirring is time-consuming (easily up to 30 minutes) and the heat must be watched constantly. If you burn it, the flavor is ruined and you must start again. If you burn it and use it, thinking you can simply hide the taste, you will rue the roux.

benefit of digital cameras to assist with this type of photography.

The challenge is to get enough light to the camera’s sensor. I work this problem in steps using the exposure trinity, i.e., ISO, aperture and shutter speed. First, I adjust the sensitivity of the sensor (ISO). I always use the lowest ISO that gives me the latitude I need with the aperture and shutter speed. I select aperture and shutter speed to best fit the image I am making. As I’ve mentioned

in past columns, aperture controls depth of field. This can be used to isolate the subject or expand the sharpness throughout the frame. Shutter speed controls the sharpness and can stop or blur motion through the frame.

The photographs used for this week’s column were made during the Siletz Bay Music Festival. I was not able to use a strobe. I set my ISO at 3200. I opened my aperture from 2.4 to 8. I used Aperture Priority (A on the Nikon camera) to allow the camera to select the shutter speed, depending on

the aperture I selected. In addition, I used exposure compensation to darken the images and manage the “mood” of the photograph. Letting the camera’s computer assist with shutter speed, allowed me to think about the composition and gesture that I wanted in the frame. Taken one step at a time, the technical side of these photographs is not complicated.

Until next time, make some photographs!

Tigers soccer leaping into 4A

After making the playoffs last season at the 3A level, the Tigers' boys soccer team is ready to test their stripes in the 4A Oregon West Conference.

Taft's playoff appearance last fall was their first since 2019, and it was a big moment for a team that had finished 1-4-2 in the previous season. With the confidence of 2025's success, Head Coach Meggie Chapman is hoping they can carry that momentum into this season.

"Last year's run was meaningful for this program; it showed our players that they belong at that level. Now we're stepping into 4A, and not just any 4A, the OWC. As one of the smallest 4A schools in Oregon, we're hoping to be competitive and earn our place among some great programs," Chapman said. "That's actually one of the reasons we scheduled 5A friendlies this summer. We needed to stress-test ourselves before league play. It's going to take discipline, soccer IQ, grit, and a confident mindset to compete in this league, which is what we've been building toward."

The Tigers finished 4-4 in 3A/2A/1A Special District 2, and this summer they've been hard at work. Speaking with Chapman about the regimen over the out-of-school months, she joked about how quick the days have flown by.

"What? Did I miss summer?!! Just kidding. We covered a lot of ground this summer. The team met for training and open field twice a week, with our focus on repetition, movement and transitions, and building chemistry on the field. There was a core group that showed up for every session," Chapman said. "Beyond that, many of the players arranged their own additional

work through position-specific camps and clinics, a Monday night community meetup, and a Sunday men's league, so the dedication was there even when we weren't all together."

To prepare for the step-up in level, Chapman's Tigers played friendly matches against 5A squads. No surprise that the team looks forward to the scrimmages more than any other activity during the summer. There was plenty of other action going on, though.

Chapman said the program partnered with Lincoln County Parks and Recreation and the Taft Boosters to host a week-long youth soccer camp. The Tigers got to work with more than 40 local kids ages 8 to 13, one of the highlights of the summer. With World Cup fever hitting the United States, Chapman's team did a little tournament of their own, and the team repping Brazil won. But the growth wasn't just

spurred by on-field activities.

"Outside of the soccer side, we did team building any chance we could: upper-classmen coaching younger players in a Salem rec league, a Timbers game, helping out at a bicycle club campout," Chapman said. "This group finds a way to be a team everywhere they go."

On the field, the Tigers are moving past the fundamental refreshers and into the tactical elements of the game. Ahead of their jamboree on Aug. 28 and their first game against Banks on Sept. 1, Chapman said the team has been tailoring training to skills specific to their opponents and to specific game scenarios. The reps are in, and now it's about "sharpening the details and making sure everyone understands not just their role, but why they're doing it."

Leading the way for the Tigers are the upperclassmen. They've been setting

a "strong example" for the up-and-comers.

"We have two captains, both seniors, Fernando 'Fer' Cortez-Jimenez and Juan Ortiz, and a few others who are actively building their leadership in a way that sets them up for a bigger role as the season progresses: senior Emiliano Rivas, junior Dario Topete, and senior Rylan Manning," Chapman said. "Juan is a dual-sport athlete — soccer and football — and we make it work. He's the more vocal of the two captains and has been instrumental in helping the younger players develop confidence. Fer is consistent, quiet, and calming. He may not be the loudest voice on the field, but his presence carries real weight, and the guys feel it. Both bring something different, and together they complement each other well."

Thanks to the solid connection between the experienced

players and the program's fresh faces, Chapman is already sensing something unique building. The mix of experience and youthful hunger has Chapman feeling like there's been a measure of triumph before a ball has been kicked.

"This is a genuine group of guys. The culture and camaraderie feel different coming into this season. We've got players who've been in the program for four years playing alongside freshmen who just walked on the field, and there's no gap there. The seniors have taken real ownership of bringing the new guys along," Chapman said. "When you have that kind of culture, you've already won something important before the season even starts."

Kickoff isn't far away, and the Tigers are ready to take a bite of the season.

Newport football getting ready for new season under new coach

It's a season of change for Newport on the gridiron. Mark Moore has stepped down as head coach, giving way to a familiar face on the Cubs' sideline, former defensive coordinator Jeff Taylor.

Taylor spent three years as defensive coordinator for the program, his final season in his first stint with the Cubs coming eight years ago. In the meantime, Taylor spent time at Toledo High School as head coach of its football program before taking a position as Vice Principal and athletic director at Dayton. Taylor and his family decided they missed the Newport area, and they opted to return.

This year, he'll take the reins as head coach for the Cubs, a post he's excited to take on, and he credited Moore for the work he did developing the program's culture and instilling team values during his time at the helm.

"I'm relatively new to coming back, but I think Mark and the staff have really done a great job of building that program. So it's been a really smooth transition coming in, having great coaches as mentors, and really getting these kids where they need to be at this time," Taylor said. "Moore took it over, and he has left the program in a much better place than where he found it. When you are looking at a football program as a whole, it's a lot more to it than just wins and losses; there's a financial aspect, there are culture aspects, there are all these different pieces. Coming in,

I've been blown away by how coachable the kids are and the culture he's been cultivating over the past 3 years. You can just really see the fruits of what he's done. So, coming into a situation like that, I don't know if it could be much better, to be honest. He's really set the program up to be successful."

With a solid culture already in place, it's now up to Taylor to get the Cubs in his charge ready to play his brand of football. The team has been hard at work in the weight room and playing 7v7 this summer, and Taylor is focused on setting his team up for success during this period of transition.

One key part of his approach is emphasizing the fundamentals so they have a solid foundation to build on.

"We're gonna be a fundamentally sound football team that works incredibly hard and plays to the whistle. It's kind of tough, because we're in the middle of installing a new offense and a new defense, and having not coached with these guys last year," Taylor said. "We got about 40 football players so far, and I think a lot of them are relatively new. I'm super excited about how we're looking."

Moore will still stay on as an assistant coach for the program, and Taylor said Moore and other staff were crucial in helping the Cubs train this summer. After the jamboree on Aug. 28, the Cubs will start the season with two proper rivalry games. The first will be against Taft on Sept. 4, while the second will see them face off against Siuslaw/Mapleton on Sept. 11. Both are non-league games, but hold some significance given

the history of the matchups.

Taylor is expecting to hit the ground running with the start of school, but with lower numbers than he'd like, he's aiming to get more students out to play. There still will be both a JV and varsity team, but Taylor would love to get as many athletes out to play as possible.

While he wants more participation overall, he's excited about the large crop of seniors leading the program.

"Right now I think we have 22 seniors that are out. So, lots of upperclassmen," Taylor said. "I've seen them really kind of embrace their teammates and kind of pull them alongside them. One thing that really stands out about this group of players is they're incredibly

coachable. They've done absolutely everything we've asked them to do. Just a phenomenal group of young men, and I think they're gonna see some good things pop up this fall."

Whether the team racks up the wins or not, Taylor said the program is "ultimately in the business of building great citizens." He wants his players to be successful not just on the field, but in the classroom, at home, and in the community. It's a holistic approach, and he's excited to see how the squad progresses throughout the fall.

For the Cubs' players, the first games can't come soon enough, and the anticipation up and down the program is about to be paid off.

"The kids are incredibly excited to get this thing going. Coaches are incredibly excited to get going. We're ready to get into it and really get out there and compete. I'm incredibly excited to be back," Taylor said. "I've seen a lot of familiar faces that are excited I'm back in the fold of things, and it's just been really, really positive and really good. I would love to see as many people come out and support the Cubs, come watch the games, and support these young men that have been working all summer long. And if you have any kids, we need them to come play football!"

The first home game of the season will be against Siuslaw/Mapleton on Sept. 11.
