





# WONAN OF THE YEAR JA'NAEA MODEST 138

f you've been to a big event in Champaign-Urbana, chances are pretty good that you've seen — and heard — Ja'Naea Modest at work. Modest — who performs as DJ Silkee is a staple at business functions, campus events, homecoming dances and just about it. I can't wait to get to the next level."

anywhere that live music makes sense.

"I work for myself along with doing my classes," said the Urbana High School grad who lived in Danville until sixth grade. "I did not see myself getting to this point, I can say that. I'm just sitting here and loving



Modest's path to performing — which has enabled her to appear on "The Steve Harvey Show" and perform in front of a variety of crowds in East Central Illinois — began when she was dealt a challenging blow.

She was riding a motorcycle in September 2011 when she suffered a bad accident on Interstate 74.

"Honestly, I probably should not still be alive," Modest said.

The resulting settlement led to a chance to pursue a longtime dream.

"I bought my equipment, and from there, (I did) a lot of stuff pro bono, and then my name started getting out," she said.

In the decade since, the 2023 Forty Under 40 Woman of the Year has turned a near-death experience into a passion project that has made an impact on audiences and students around the area.

It came together quickly after she was able to invest in the right equipment.

"From the DJs that really didn't give me a (chance), it took me into a mind-set of 'OK, now I've got to prove myself," Modest said.

"That made me get my work ethic; that made me get out there and just say I can DJ it, you know, I don't have a problem DJing it, and from that, it built up, it kept building up, and my clientele kept getting bigger and bigger, and now we're here today."

There weren't a lot of people willing to show Modest the ropes when she first began to perform.

A few did, like NAME and DJ Mondo. The basics that Modest needed to know included blending music and investing in the right equipment for gigs.

Modest reflects their kindness while teaching children and teens the craft of mixing music at myriad camps throughout the area.

"Usually, a lot of a lot of girls or people that look like me, don't get a chance to experience different courses like this," Modest said. "They don't get a chance to touch the equipment, they don't get a

chance to be able to be around it or see what kind of the lifestyle is, in a sense."

The camps are designed to teach kids the same basics that all DJs should know, from setting a cue to mixing songs together to good stage presence.

Modest has access to portable equipment that allows students to get valuable hands-on experience that they might not always get.

"It just warms my heart every time I do a camp," Modest said. "I get a different set of girls every time and I just don't know where it's gonna head. This last camp, one of my campers, she came up and gave me a hug, and it almost made me like tear up because I'm just like dang, I really affected this girl."

Accessibility is a pillar of Modest's classes.

"I've always done the course for free," Modest said. "I didn't want kids to pay for it. If you want to try it, the craft is there for you. And like I said, it just blew up from there. It's still going; I wasn't expecting myself to be three years strong."

There's a bit of everything in Modest's repertoire, allowing her to play different

genres of music at a wide variety of functions.

As long as the crowd is into it.

"I'm also one of those types of people, like, 'I'll take your request,'" Modest said. "If I don't feel like it's going to move the crowd, I might not play it, but I'll take a request."

Those crowds frequently congregate around Modest's booth when she's on the University of Illinois campus performing at myriad events geared toward students.

She was able to get nearly the entire new freshman class to sing along to Rick Astley at a recent event at Memorial Stadium.

"One of my biggest events that I truly love doing is Sights and Sounds of the U of I," Modest said. "I'm pretty much one of the point people that freshmen get to see when they come on campus."

As for the one piece of advice Modest would offer aspiring performers?

"Just be a people person," Modest said.
"That's the biggest thing. Be a people person and just be willing to listen. A lot of people, they want to know that you can look at their standpoint."






istory is part of what drives Breaden Belcher to create a better future for residents of Urbana.

Belcher — a self-described history buff who earned history degrees from Taylor University in Indiana and Florida State has served as the city of Urbana's grants

manager since December 2020.

"I've always been a big history buff," Belcher said. "It was really fun and exciting to be able to kind of study that for so many years. That was where I got my first introduction into the grants world, that was primarily working with humanity grants, research grants and things like that."



It's a role that allows the 2023 Forty Under 40 Man of the Year to make a positive impact on the future of people in Champaign-Urbana every day.

"I've really loved the work because you can just see so clearly the impact that the work has on the community," Belcher said. "This money really just kind of flows through the city, we don't necessarily keep it. The whole point is that we're getting the money out into the community to do good."

Originally from the suburbs of Detroit by way of Florida and Illinois, Belcher moved to the area in 2017 and quickly became involved in a capacity that fit his degree.

He was associate director of the Champaign County History Museum for just over one year before becoming executive assistant to the Champaign County circuit clerk in 2018.

He said that experience — which ended when he began his current job in 2020 — informed much of what he does today, noting it was his "introduction into the intersection between housing issues and the criminal-justice system."

"Someone gets a ticket and it's a minor ticket, but they can't afford to pay it and then it just kind of snowballs," Belcher said. "Before you know it, they're facing serious criminal charges, and that was just very eye-opening, just the impact that policy has on people's lives."

Belcher's impact is substantial in a role that isn't always frontfacing or directly in the spotlight.

He manages about \$10 million annually and distributes the funds to those who take advantage of the city's grant programs. That could mean rental-assistance programs, social-service organizations or nonprofit organizations that target areas of need.

"Sometimes all the grant reports and numbers can seem a little cold and impersonal," Belcher said. "But I always try to remind myself that this is really about serving the people of Urbana and also the community as a whole."

Picking a favorite project is difficult in a role where any money doled out can play a big role in helping an organization get people on the right track. Belcher points to the work his team did at the height of the pandemic — when he was still relatively new to the job — as particularly rewarding.

"Just seeing how the community came together to see a problem and fix the problem," Belcher said. "I saw so many examples of people just really coming together and working together and being creative, being collaborative and just finding solutions."

Distributing funding to local youth programs also provides plenty of gratification. Belcher has helped distribute about \$300,000 in the last year to local nonprofits that provide program services through Urbana's youth-services grant program.

"Working with these nonprofits in the community has been so inspiring," Belcher said. "Just seeing the incredible work that they're doing, getting to read the stories of the kids that they're working with and their success and how this program has posi-

tively impacted them."

Belcher credits good people around him with making his life easier.

"There's that network, that community of people who are equally as passionate about making a positive impact in their community," Belcher said. "Seeing their drive, their enthusiasm, that I think keeps me going as well."

His impact comes in a city that he has embraced — and then some — since moving here six years ago.

He said Champaign-Urbana's myriad bars and dining options
— Rose Bowl Tavern and Golden Harbor are among his favorites — stand out, along with different opportunities to connect with the outdoors.

"I love being outside," Belcher said. "So you know, mountain biking at Kickapoo (State Recreation Area), or my partner and I, last summer, we had a goal of going to every Champaign County forest preserve, so that was really fun. I love running at Homer Lake, especially this time of year, when the weather is really nice."

American history — specifically the Civil War era — was Belcher's field of expertise when he studied the subject. Returning to it may be of interest to him down the line.

Not that he's planning on changing things up anytime soon.

"I would love to just be, like, a museum curator and/or, I don't know, a battlefield tour guide or something," Belcher said. "Because I just love things like that."

## Avoiding 'elderspeak' with older customers

Inderstanding and catering to diverse customer demographics is essential for success in business. One often-over-looked group with significant purchasing power is older adults. When interacting with them, however, businesses must be cautious about "elderspeak."

This refers to a manner of speaking characterized by overly simplistic language, exaggerated intonation and a patronizing tone. It often involves the use of terms like "honey" or "sweetie" and can include speaking louder or more slowly or a simplified register that sounds like "baby talk."

Elderspeak is problematic for many reasons. Most importantly, it undermines the dignity of older people and can be patronizing, implying that they are incapable or less competent than younger individuals.

Studies have shown that elderspeak can

lead to negative psychological effects. It can contribute to feelings of frustration, powerlessness and even depression, as they may feel infantilized or disrespected. Even when well-intentioned or unconscious, its impact can be just as detrimental.

Older adults are a significant consumer demographic with considerable spending capacity. Ignoring their needs can lead to lost opportunities.

There are many tips for avoiding elderspeak and engaging with older customers. This begins with not stereotyping them. Do not assume all older customers have the same needs or preferences. Treat each person as an individual, give them your full attention and listen to their concerns and preferences. Speak clearly and at a moderate pace, but avoid oversimplifying language or terms of endearment.

You should also avoid addressing them

as "young lady" or "young man." While this might seem harmless, it suggests younger is preferable. When in doubt, ask about their preferences. For example, should you use their first name or a title?

Lastly, provide employee training on age-sensitive communication, emphasizing the importance of polite interactions with customers of all ages.

Effective communication with older customers is crucial for businesses seeking to tap into this demographic's considerable buying power. Elderspeak is detrimental not only to older adults but also to business interests. By avoiding elderspeak, businesses can foster positive relationships and ultimately look forward to repeat business from older adults.



In the past, skills that launched careers in leadership roles were personal behaviors that exhibited authority, technical skills and a direct approach to work. There was little emphasis on soft skills. Today, companies emphasize skills such as emotional intelligence, active listening, conflict resolution, collaboration and relationship building.

Technology was limited in previous decades and did not factor into how people led their teams. The work was more manual and focused on managing physical resources. Today, leaders must be tech-savvy due to rapidly advancing technology, and must leverage changing tools for communication, collaboration, data analysis and project management. These tools create a new way of managing resources and leading a team.

In today's workplace, there is a much stronger emphasis on diversity in leadership. New leaders are more aware of the lack of representation of marginalized groups. New generations have a higher recognition of the value of diverse perspectives, and must create environments where all can be heard.

Workplace leaders in 2023 and beyond will likely need to be more collaborative, inclusive, tech-savvy and adaptable in their approach. Prioritizing the well-being and growth of their teams will become critical. Based on the Forty Under 40 Class of 2023, it is clear that Champaign County businesses are looking at a bright future, as the honorees pave a path with this evolving leadership style.
