### Danville

National Honor Society began the process of collecting donations for a meaningful scholarship: The **Gary Gritton** Memorial Scholarship. Mr. Gritton, who died in September, had a profound impact on not only District 118 but Vermilion County and the Big 12 Conference, as well. Students from NHS completed the task of emailing over 50 people throughout Vermilion County and the Big 12 Conference spanning Champaign to Peoria. This list included principals, athletic directors, superintendents and soon a mass outreach to all of District 118. The goal is to raise \$4,000 for a scholarship that will be awarded to at least one senior who is involved in athletics and plans to pursue an education in teaching. This money will be awarded to Mr. Gritton's wife, **Meridith**, on Feb. 10 during a home basketball game.

NHS hosts an annual trivia night fundraiser. This year, students will be including a bonus round — with a \$5 buy-in — in honor of Mr. Gritton to contribute to the scholarship fund. The theme will be focused on questions that Mr. Gritton would have gotten right. He was a humble man who loved sports and history and enjoyed listening to music.

For the following year of the scholarship, the high school's newly formed Key Club, along with the help of NHS, will be putting on a charity softball game in honor of Mr. Gritton. The charity game is tentatively scheduled for May 2. Proceeds will go toward the Gary Gritton Memorial Scholarship for the 2026-27 school year.




