





1A semifinals before bouncing back with a three-set comeback win to place third. I'll be honest, the bulk of my attention that Saturday was on Mahomet-Seymour winning its first 3A state title, but I couldn't help but notice Landon and the Timberwolves' reactions to ending their season with a win.

Landon pumped his fist to the seemingly half of all of Cissna Park crowd in attendance as he walked off the court, getting emotional as his fans showered him and his players with cheers. That emotion returned in the postmatch press conference, and he couldn't hide the sniffles and tears while describing what that season and that team meant to him. The players, after a collective "Aww" at their coach's reaction, were soon crying themselves.

This meant something to the Timberwolves. It was their fourth state trophy in program history, but they knew how close they were to finally winning it all, and the soon-to-be seniors knew they had one more shot.

That brought us to this fall, and the expectations were already swirling in August at The News-Gazette's annual Faces of Fall event. Neukomm was there, and she was throwing out answers like "The one goal in mind is to be a state champion" and "We expect it of ourselves." I may have teed her up a little with my questions, but this was a different kind of confidence. I've had countless preseason interviews, where athletes and coaches say they want to win a state title, but this one felt more like a "We will win state" type of deal.

And the Timberwolves played like it all year. After a 15-0 start, they lost their first match to 4A Bolingbrook in Champaign Central's annual SETtember Fest on Sept. 26.

They didn't lose again.
The Timberwolves dominated their way back to CEFCU
Arena, sweeping every post-

season opponent while Landon never called a timeout from the sideline.

That dominance only continued at state. Cissna Park controlled its semifinal match against Tremont with a 25-19, 25-20 win before having its way with Stockton 25-11, 25-14 in the championship to finish the season with a program-record 40 wins.

Neukomm's confidence had ramped up following the semifinal victory, as she made declarations like "We're not done yet," "We got it" and "I'm expecting that championship trophy."

She proved herself right, but to do it how they did it, with that lopsided of a win in the state championship match against the returning 1A runner-up, was incredible to watch. Same for Landon at the head of the bench.

"I did not expect that. I expected a grind," Landon said. "We talked about it (that Friday) night. 'It's going to be a grind. It's going to be a dogfight.' It had those moments at

different times in the match, but our girls continued to strive to be better and never let the ball hit the floor."

"I did not expect that at all," Lucht added. "Obviously, they're a great team, and we don't take anything away from them, but we were able to zone in and go on a run. We were just so locked in as a team and had the right mindset that I don't think anything was slowing us down."

Every point prompted a bigger roar from the Cissna Park faithful, who took up an entire corner of CEFCU Arena's lower level. They got even louder as Landon walked across the stage afterward and was finally announced as a state champion. Facing the crowd with an emotional smile, he raised both fists in the air, this time with a gold medal around his neck.

"It's amazing to have the support from them," Landon said of the Cissna Park fans. "They're all-in, and they've been all-in since day one when the season started. It's not like they're randomly showing up now. They've been packing our gym, and they're there to support us on the road. It's huge for our girls to feel that support. They have no idea how much of a difference they're making in these people's lives. It just brings so much joy to the community."

To make it to the state finals in the first place is challenging enough, but to do it three years in a row and improve every single time is extremely impressive. This was what the Timberwolves expected all along, but it becomes fairytale-esque when you look at the last three seasons as a whole.

"We're blessed to be here for a third year in a row," Landon said. "They've been in the spotlight and on the big stage, and they were awestruck a few years ago. You experience it, and you embrace that opportunity to be treated like athletes on TV. They've embraced it, and that's just the maturity in


them. We'll take the experiences we've had and cherish them forever."

Don't think the Timber-wolves' stretch of success is over, though. Like Neukomm said, they're not done yet. She and her fellow seniors may have gone out on top, but get ready to learn names like Mady Marcott, Ava Henrichs, Kendyl Neukomm, Ella Schluter, Marina Day and a slew of others. They don't know what it's like to miss out on the state experience, and they have the

talent to continue that trend.
"Our run isn't over," Lucht said. "They're going to have multiple deep postseason runs over the next few years. We set the standard, and every class below us is going to try to rise up to that. Our seventh-grade junior high team just got second in state last year, so we've got a long line of kids really excited to play for Cissna Park."

Josh Landon. He also doubles as the Cissna Park athletic director, but Landon is no stranger to the area volleyball coach. The 2025 season marked his 20th in charge of the Timberwolves that also has included a state runner-up finish in 2015, a pair of third-place finishes in 2014 and 2024 and a fourth-place finish in 2023. Landon will enter the 2026 season needing just nine wins to hit 500 for his career as he sports a 491-203-11 record at Cissna Park that has include 13 of his teams winning at least 20 matches. State title a sign of dedication and talent



Lauryn Hamrick, Addison Lucht and Macy Sinn walked into The News-Gazette office on Nov. 9. A Sunday. A day off

But Hamrick, Lucht and Sinn showed up in Champaign on that Sunday morning dressed in Columbia blue Timberwolves' basketball uniforms to take part in our newspaper's annual Faces of Winter event. Enthusiastically and without complaint.

Even though the Cissna Park volleyball season was still ongoing. A season all three played a role in. Dedication, mixed in with talent,

can produce legendary results. Which is what Hamrick, Lucht, Sinn and the rest of the Cissna Park volleyball team is now for

the Iroquois County village nestled about an hour north of Champaign along Route 49. The Timberwolves' volleyball

program made history last Saturday, with Cissna Park sweeping Stockton in the Class 1A state championship match at CEFCU Arena in Normal to cap a memorable 40-1 season with the most coveted prize small-school volleyball teams: a state championship trophy.

All business

When Hamrick, Lucht and Sinn arrived in Champaign, volleyball was still their main focus. The Timberwolves had to play a super-sectional match the following night on Nov. 10 against perennial power Windsor/Stewardson-Strasburg in Heyworth. Another lengthy drive. Followed, of course, by another signature win.

The trio could have opted out of showing up to our event, choosing to rest, sleep and relax ahead of the most pressure-packed and highly-scrutinized matches of their career. Instead, they represented their school and their community. They embraced the opportunity to showcase Cissna Park.

Which is what they did throughout this fall. Lucht is a small-town treasure, with the Northwestern softball signee — she inked her letter of intent with the Wildcats on Nov. 12 before Cissna Park ventured to Normal two days later to start its state tournament experience — a multi-sport standout who dozens of grade-school kids in and around Cissna Park will emulate

for years to come. But it's not just the Lucht show with the Timberwolves.

Team terrific

A team doesn't win 40 matches and a state title with just one standout athlete. Coach Josh Landon's group had complementary pieces all around, from fellow seniors Josie Neukomm and Sophie Duis giving opponents plenty to worry about at the net to sophomore libero Kendyl Neukomm's defensive prowess to the passing ability of junior Mady Marcott and sophomore Ella Schluter.

It all added up to a winning combination the likes of which Cissna Park, and our area, has rarely seen. The Timberwolves are just the fourth team in The News-Gazette's coverage area to win a state volleyball title, joining St. Thomas More in 2017 and 2021, and Mahomet-Seymour in 2024.

Now, Hamrick, Lucht, Sinn and other multi-sport athletes for Cissna Park will try to add to their legacy this winter on the basketball court. The Timberwolves reached the 1A state tournament in that sport a season ago, ultimately placing third, with many of the same athletes who helped the volleyball team make history.

In the nearly 50 years the IHSA has hosted both a volleyball and girls' basketball state tournament, no public school has won both a state title in both volleyball and girls' basketball. Quincy Notre Dame accomplished the feat in Class 2A in the 2011-12 school year and Benet did so in 4A during the 2014-15 school year.

Can Cissna Park continue to make history? Don't bet against it.

Because dedication, mixed in with talent, can produce legendary results.
