Citizens of Gloucester and other Tidewater counties are considerably exercised over the fact that federal authorities have posted notices that it is unlawful for them to build duck blinds along navigable streams in their nection unless they first secure permits to do so. Some of the Gloucester people express the fear that this will prevent duck shooting from blinds this year by the general hunting public.
