FROM WALK-ON TO WATCH-LISTS

Quarterback Chris Reynolds enters his final season with the 49ers on multiple award watch-lists

Fifth-year Quarterback Chris Reynolds has had a unique path to becoming the primary starter for the 49ers but has remained humble in his success. Reynolds will go from being a walk-on to multiple watch-lists as he looks to give it his all in his final year with the team.

Five years ago, Reynolds started his career with the 49ers as a walk-on having no offers from high school. He took a chance trying out for Charlotte, and it has paid off in a big way.

“Charlotte was my only option. I was a walk-on. They were the only opportunity, they were the only ones to give me a shot and the only ones that believed in me. From the moment I stepped onto campus, it has been home,” said Reynolds. “Starting from the first coaching staff and first guys I played with. I met some of my best friends and had so many relationships. It’s not home not only because of playing football here, but it’s home because of the relationships I’ve built, and it’s been special, and I’m so thankful.”

National recognition

Coming off a solid 2020 season where he threw for 1,305 yards and eight touchdowns in six games played, Reynolds has gathered attention nationally, as he has been added to both the Maxwell Award watch list and the Johnny Unitas award watch list.

Both awards recognize outstanding football players. The Maxwell Award is presented by the best all-around collegiate football player in the nation. At the same time, The Johnny Unitas award is given to an upperclassmen quarterback who expresses excellent leadership qualities. Reynolds fits both categories as he will look to take his game to the next level this season.

“Chris has been off the charts. He has responded to every bit of adversity he’s

ever faced since I’ve been here. He is our guy,” said Head Coach Will Healy Quarterback job competition

The 49ers come into this season with a very competitive depth chart for the quarterback position. James Foster, who transferred in from Texas A&M, and Dom Shoffner, who had an impressive stint as the backup quarterback in 2020, are competing for Reynolds’ job.

They pose a tough challenge for Reynolds, but he’s fought hard for his job so far against long odds going from being a walk-on to being named to national award watch lists.

“My preparation right now is for us to be a successful football team and to win football games. It’s not a matter of looking to your left and right and competing, it’s a matter of competing with yourself,” said Reynolds at the 49ers 2021 Media Day. “How can I get better every single day? Because if you aren’t getting better, you are getting worse. That’s how I operate as a person. Going into my fifth year, my time is ticking. My main focus is to win football games.”

For the time being, Reynolds looks like he has the starting job going into the season, having gained the coach’s respect over the years and having a very impressive off-season.

“There is nobody I’ve coached that I respect more than Chris Reynolds, ever,” said Healy.

Expectations

Reynolds hopes to return to his 2019 form, where he played 13 games throwing for 2,564 yards while also rushing for 791 yards.

“I expect to be the leader for the young guys, to lead us through adversity. When times get tough, I need to ask myself: how am I going to react?

How am I going to push through? How efficient can I be? I want to be extremely efficient. My main goal is obviously to win a championship. My expectation is to put myself in the best position to do so,” said Reynolds.

With this being Reynold’s fifth and final year with the Niners, he wants to ensure he goes out with no regrets and leaves no stone unturned.

“I don’t want to look back and tell myself I didn’t do enough or I didn’t put a certain amount of time in. I want to make sure I check every box so at the end of the season I can say I gave it my all, I gave it everything I had, hopefully, that leads us in the right direction,” said Reynolds.

Healy and company are still improving 49er culture

The moment Charlotte football coach Will Healy stepped foot on campus in 2019, the program's culture changed forever.

Maybe it was his bright smile, openness with the media and fans, or of course, the immediate change in performance from his football team.

Since day one, Healy has worked hard to keep improving the culture with the 49ers in many different ways. He has noted that he believes that's what gets programs from being good to great.

Now entering Year 3, Healy has improved the 49er culture both on and off the field.

Recruiting

Assembling a great team starts off the field, and that's where Healy has put his time and effort. There have been new editions to the football stadium,

including a brand-new turf field that sports the new Charlotte logo that debuted last year.

"You have to win recruits when they step on the field. And it's just a beautiful stadium," said Healy at Charlotte's Media Day. "When we get it to where we expect to get it, it will be second to none."

Along with new additions outside of the stadium, there have also been changes to the inside facility.

"When it comes to indoors, it's just about piecing some things together, adding some graphics. When you do that, I think you can win recruits based on your facility," said Healy. "It's just about fine-tuning it a little bit. For us, you win in the city, and you win on a vision and the university."

Healy noted that the program needs to keep up with bigger schools in the state.

"You have to win your state first," said

Healy. "For us, that's the Carolinas. That's what they (recruits) look at."

The addition of 49er alums joining the NFL will help the recruiting case for the 49ers, as they will have highlights playing and pictures of former players such as former 49er and current Pittsburgh Steeler Alex Highsmith.

Bigger Stadium, Club Lit

As the program expands its horizons, the hope is for the stadium to get bigger in the future. "You're looking at doubling the size of the stadium and suits and all those types of things that make an unbelievable game-day improvement," said Healy. "I think what you have to do now is make a demand for 16 (thousand capacity) before you make a demand for 30, and that's on us."

The aspirations are high for Healy and the team in the long-term future.

Club Lit is the most notable change to the culture at Charlotte, which is where the 49ers as a team celebrate in the locker room with lights and music. With the return of somewhat normalcy, Club Lit will likely return after a mix of cancellations and losses stopped the regular celebration.

This season, Healy and the 49ers will hope to add big games against teams to their resume, such as Duke, Illinois and, new Conference USA foe, Louisiana Tech.

After a successful 2019 season, Charlotte looked to follow it up in 2020, but disappointing results ensued. Not only did Charlotte not win enough to again be bowl eligible, but they only managed to grab two wins due to multiple Covid-19 cancellations. With all that in the rearview mirror, the 49ers hope their season goes smoother and with less delay.

The 49ers will have big names returning, such as redshirt senior quarterback Chris Reynolds. Just a week ago, Reynolds was named the 2021 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award Watch List presented by A. O. Smith. This award recognizes the top senior or upperclassman quarterback set to graduate with their class. Reynolds is entering his 3rd year as the 49ers QB.

The 49ers will also be losing notable names like Tyriq Harris, who was named to the 2020-21 Academic All-America® Division I football second team two weeks ago.

Head coach Will Healy will enter his third year and has to help his team find a way to win with Covid impacting his squad. The Covid-19 pandemic may not be as extreme as it was during last year's season, but it's still a factor, and something Healy and the rest of the squad will have to be wary of and find a way not to let it impact the results of the team.

Charlotte will play 12 games this season. Six will be at home, and the other six will be away games. Below is a breakdown of each game for the 49ers.

Sep. 3 vs. Duke (7 p.m.)

The 49ers kick their season off with a home game against Duke. Charlotte had

only played against Duke once before when they lost to the Blue Devils 53-19 less than a year ago. Charlotte will search for a different result for their Green Out home game, and it will be the first time the Niners host an ACC or Power Five team at home.

Sep. 11 vs. Gardner-Webb (6 p.m.)

Charlotte will remain home to face Gardner-Webb, who they have beaten in their previous home games. The last time these two faced off, Charlotte wiped the floor with them, 49-28 in 2019.

Sep. 18 @ Georgia State, (7 p.m.)

For the 49ers' first away game of the season, they will travel to Atlanta, Georgia, to face off against Georgia State. They haven't played Georgia State since 2017. Charlotte took a 0-28 loss in the two team's last meeting. It won't be an easy game for the 49ers as Georgia went 6-4 last season and won the LendingTree Bowl 39-21 over WKU.

Sep. 24 vs. Middle Tennessee (6:30 p.m.)

Charlotte returns home to face Middle Tennessee, who beat Charlotte in their first four meetings, but the Niners were able to turn it around and finally beat them in late 2019, 34-20. Charlotte will look for a repeat performance this season.

Oct. 2 @ Illinois, TBD

The Niners travel to Urbana-Champaign, Illinois, to face an unfamiliar foe. This will be the first time the 49ers will face Illinois, a team that went a poor 2-6 last season. Illinois is already 1-0

this season, beating Nebraska 30-22. The team also has a new head coach in Bret Bielema, a veteran college football coaching space.

Oct. 8 @ FIU (7 p.m.)

After their match with Illinois, Charlotte will travel down to Miami to face off against FIU. Charlotte hasn't had much luck playing FIU, losing all five of their matchups. Their last matchup came in late 2019 when FIU took down the 49ers at home 48-23.

Oct. 21 vs. Florida Atlantic (7:30 p.m.)

Charlotte returns home to face FAU, a team they played back in October of last year. Unfortunately, that game did not go Charlotte's way, losing the close contest 21-17 in the debut game for FAU's new head coach. Charlotte also lost to the Owls at home in 2019.

Oct. 30 @ WKU (4 p.m.)

The 49ers hit the road for Bowling Green, Kentucky, to face WKU for the fifth straight year. Whenever the two meet, the game has been a blowout. The closest game was in 2019 when Charlotte lost 30-14. Unfortunately for the Niners, they have only beat WKU once before.

Nov. 6 vs. Rice, (3:30 p.m.)

Rice and the 49ers have just faced off twice before, the last game coming in 2016. That 2016 battle was close as the Niners took a one-point 22-21 loss after allowing Rice to score 22 unanswered points. With this game coming towards the end of the season, it could be a must-win for the 49ers.

Nov. 13 @ Louisiana Tech (3:30 p.m.)

Louisiana Tech and Charlotte have never faced off against each other, but there's a first time for everything. Louisiana Tech went an even 5-5 last season, finishing it out in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl against Georgia Southern, where Louisiana got blown out 38-3. Given the 49ers are facing a new brand team and have trouble on the road, this game will be tough.

Nov. 20 vs. Marshall (3:30 p.m.)

Charlotte's last home game comes against Marshall. When these two last faced, which was back in late 2019, Charlotte grabbed a 24-13 victory over Marshall to extend their winning streak that season to four and give them a bowl-eligible sixth win. After not being able to play in 2020 due to Covid-19, there's a high chance another classic can take place.

Nov. 27 @ Old Dominion (2 p.m.)

Charlotte will close off the season with an away game season finale against Old Dominion. While Old Dominion won their first three games against the 49ers, Charlotte has turned it around and won the last two. Charlotte will look to even the record and close out their season strong on the road.

New kids on the block

New transfers look to make impact for 49ers

Charlotte's football team gained a heap of experience with the seven transfers brought in this past February. With their first game just days away, the transfers are hungry to get on the field and will look to make their mark this season.

Head Coach Will Healy faced some hardship in recruiting because of fewer face-to-face interactions with recruits due to the pandemic. Nevertheless, Healy admits he had to be willing to take a chance on guys he had not been around. Healy says getting his players to buy in will be a "daily process." He plans to "invest in relationships" and making sure they trust the coaching staff.

The 49ers now have Jon Alexander, a 6-3 grad transfer from Kansas State, playing safety. In 2019, Alexander played in 12 regular-season games and picked up 25 tackles. He did not play in the 2020

season but hopes to produce at a high level this season.

Graduate transfer Davondre Robinson who played at East Carolina, is another safety transferring to the team. The SC native had a career to remember at East Carolina. Robinson has the potential to make this year's 49ers defense even better. Robinson stated he felt like Charlotte "was a good move for him." The safety brings his "football IQ and physicality" to the defense on the backend.

The Niners also landed 300-pound defensive tackle Joshua Bailey. Bailey is a redshirt senior who hails from Iowa State. He did not see much playing time at Iowa State. However, he has a chance to show his potential for the 49ers.

From Iowa, Charlotte signed redshirt sophomore running back Shadrick Byrd. Byrd only played on special teams in a

season opener at Purdue during his time at Iowa. He, too, has an opportunity to prove how valuable he can become to the 49er offense.

In addition, redshirt sophomore James Foster comes to Charlotte from Texas A&M. Foster will be competing for starting quarterback job after he opted out of the 2020 season. In 2019, he played in four games, completing three passes on nine attempts with five rushes for 15 yards. Niner Nation eagerly awaits the healthy competition inevitable between Foster and fifth-year starter Chris Reynolds this season.

Kofi Wardlow, a 6-3 defensive end coming from Notre Dame, will be a great addition to the Niner defense. Wardlow played in three games in four seasons at Notre Dame. However, Healy expects Wardlow to have an exceptional season

with the Niners. Wardlow says being a 49er has been "pretty amazing" so far. And according to Wardlow, entering the transfer portal was "nerve-racking," but Healy has created a new and fresh culture of which he is excited to be a part.

Lastly, signed graduate transfer linebacker Justin Whisenhunt from Troy will be a big part of the defense. Whisenhunt played in two games, made four solo tackles, and broke up one pass.

Healy has his eyes on both the newcomers and transfers this season. He is excited about what is to come as players will buy into the program. Likewise, fans have high expectations as they expect a transformation with the new additions on the team.

by preparing himself for every play. He was all over the field in 2019 as he would rack up 62 total tackles. Watts is also the third 49er to have double-digit sacks with 11.5. He has high expectations for himself to keep those numbers up.

"I ran to the ball and was all over the place in 2019, but I wanna add that knowledge to it as well," said Watts. "I want to be able to predict the plays before they happen."

Watts is not the only person with high expectations for himself as head coach Will Healy is also excited for his progression as a player. Healy feels that Watts will be highly successful on the field this season but even more successful off it. Healy reflected on Watts' progression as a player and how he will continue to grow this season.

"Markees went from being a guy that struggled with consistency to now being the heartbeat of the whole team," said Healy. "His work ethic, leadership, and determination have shaped him into the player he is now."

Assistant head coach and co-defensive coordinator Marcus West feels that Watts will fit into the defensive strategy by leading the team into battle. West thinks

that Watts has taken lessons learned from his predecessors and will apply them throughout the season. West is ready to see this new defense play together and see Markees Watts take a big jump in his game.

"Markees is walking in the footsteps of his predecessors, and if he continues to do that, he will be set up for success," said West. "We want to have consistency with Markees, and we feel like he will make a big jump this year."

The 49ers are looking to get back on track after a season that saw Covid-19 cause multiple cancellations for the team. Watts is confident that this group of players is ready to create more success for the program. The expectations are high, and Watts is excited for what is to come.

"I feel like we can only look up from here," said Watts. "I see us continuing to get better throughout the season."

Watts has many goals that he hopes to accomplish this season. He wants to get back to producing at the level he was in 2019 and helping the team in any way that he can. Watts is looking to tie his career-high of 9.5 sacks and bring passion on every snap this season.

"I have to beat nine and a half sacks

this season," said Watts. "If I can reach that goal, I feel like all the other areas of my game will take care of themselves."

Healy also has lofty goals for the senior this season, and he is ready to help him reach them. Watts continues to coach up younger players and genuinely wants to invest in the future of 49er football. Healy has confidence that this season will be the best yet for Watts.

"I expect Markees to have an all-American type season," said Healy. "Markees Watts has changed his entire life for his fellow teammates and the program in general."

Watts has been shaped throughout his life for this moment, and he will not let it slip by him. Markees Watts will step up and take life by the reins for his final season in Charlotte green. The time is now, and all the trials he has been through have shaped him into the person he is today. He has been ready to take on this role his whole life, and he looks forward to what is ahead.

"I have been tossed in the fire my whole life," said Watts. "It comes down to the player and person that I want to be, so I feel that I am in control of my future."

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
