Antique Boat Museum Small Craft Festival: Boats, Beer & Buoys

Boats. Beer. Buoys. The Antique Boat Museum is bringing them all together for a fall day on the St. Lawrence River at the 2026 Small Craft Festival.

Grab your friends, throw on a sweater, and spend the day by the river. Take a sail, challenge your crew to boating trivia, try your hand at rowing or paddling, watch molten bronze being poured, grab a beer, and see just how competitive you can get over knowing the difference between port and starboard.

No boating experience is necessary. Whether you grew up on the water or have never stepped aboard a sailboat, Small Craft Festival is your chance to get outside, try something new, and experience the St. Lawrence River.

Experience History on the Water

Small Craft Festival is held during New York State's Path Through History Weekend, when historic and cultural sites across the state bring New York's past to life through hands-on experiences.

At ABM, that means experiencing recreational boating history firsthand. Row a skiff, sail the river, watch traditional craftsmanship in action, and discover the small craft that have shaped life on the St. Lawrence River for generations.

Canoes, skiffs, sailboats, and other small watercraft have long connected people and communities while

providing transportation, recreation, and a way to experience the river. Small Craft Festival celebrates that history by putting boats back where they belong: on the water.

Festival Activities

Activities planned so far include:

- **Hands-On Boating:** Sail, row, or paddle a variety of historic small craft on the St. Lawrence River.

- **Bronze Casting Demonstrations:** Watch traditional craftsmanship come to life and learn how bronze hardware has been created for boats.

- **Trivia Contest:** Think you know boats? Test your knowledge of small craft, recreational boating, and life on the water.

- **Kids Activities:** Younger visitors can try knot tying and other hands-on activities.

- **Museum Exhibits:** Explore the boats, objects, photographs, and stories that preserve generations of recreational boating history.

- **Beer:** Grab a beer, enjoy the waterfront, and make an afternoon of it.

- **And That's Not All:** More activities are in the works, so stay tuned as we add even more to the day.

MASSENA — Take a trip on the wild side! The New York Power Authority (NYPA) will hold its annual Wildlife Festival Saturday, Sept. 26, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at NYPA's Frank S. McCullough Jr. Hawkins Point Visitors Center in Massena.

The admission-free event

will feature fun activities for the entire family with exhibits of live animals, nature displays, arts, crafts and entertainment. Activities include bounce houses, a petting zoo with farm animals, electric train rides, craft projects, wagon rides and a birds of prey display.

Representatives from the Nicandri Nature Center and Reptiles Forever will be back at the Wildlife Festival as well as Herpatology, the reptile and amphibian educator, and many others.

The annual event is one of the many ways that NYPA supports local initiatives and organizations that strengthen the ecological resilience of New York's natural resources. That includes responsible stewardship of more than 100,000 acres of land and 524 miles of waterways across the State and a statewide community greening funding opportunity that supports healthier, cooler and more resilient neighborhoods.

Weaving History Conference to explore textile traditions

Thousand Islands Arts Center to host Weaving History Conference Oct. 19-21

The Thousand Islands Arts Center will host the 31st annual Weaving History Conference online Oct. 19-21, 2026, with presentations exploring handweaving, textile history and the people and traditions behind fiber arts.

The three-day conference will be held entirely on Zoom. Organizers suggest a \$65 donation but welcome any amount. Attendees can join individual talks or attend all three days using the same Zoom link. Recordings of all presentations will be available to attendees for two weeks after the conference ends.

Founded in 1994 as the Historic Manuscripts Conference, the event was established to celebrate, promote and share academic work on handweaving. It later became the Weaving History Conference as its scope expanded to include all fiber

This year's program includes 17 presentations covering topics ranging from historic weaving technology and textile preservation to the relationships among cloth, labor and cultural

identity.

Michelle Amos will present "Little Loomhouse Archives Go Public," and OM Comstock will lead a community session on Allen Fannin and "The Black Craftsman Situation." Mag-

gie D'Aversa and Robin Muller will examine textiles' roles during slavery in "Making the Invisible Visible."

Several presentations will explore textile traditions across cultures. Maggy Fra-

goso will discuss what handwoven textiles displayed at the 1862 London International Exhibition reveal about Cabo Verdean society. Anita Grey will examine Tatar women's weaving traditions and changes in cultural identity, while Stuti Verma will explore the Kashmiri shawl's relationship to colonial textiles, comfort and bourgeois femininity in 19th-century France.

Historic equipment and weaving techniques also will be featured. Donna Dubinsky will discuss the rewards and challenges of restoring a Jacquard loom. Sandra Rux will trace the spread of patterning devices for ingrain carpets and coverlets from 1790 to 1840.

Tracy Murphy will discuss the Alling Coverlet Collection, its textiles and their makers. Marty Schlabach will present research on David P. Johnson, a coverlet weaver in Scipio, New York, and patriarch of the extended Conger family of weavers.

Other talks will connect historical practices with contemporary work. Maryanne Moodie will discuss carrying tapestry weaving traditions into current practice, and Allyce Wood will explore coded messages in cloth through NameDraft weaving. Patricia Martin will report on the 12th International Shibori Symposium.

The program also includes Rebekah Marshall's "The Labor of Warmth," Mickey Stam's "Weaving in the 1950s" and Liz Schott's presentation on Dorothy Liebes, "I'm With the Government and I'm Here to Help." Susan Torntore will trace tweed fabrics through the work of one American fashion designer and two British mills.
