Whether you want to head west to south Texas or go east towards Mississippi, Alabama and Florida, the surf and the sand is plentiful and makes for an ideal getaway. COASTAL MISSISSIPPI

KISATCHIE NATIONAL FOREST

Louisiana's only national forest sprawls across seven parishes southwest of Alexandria with more than 600,000 acres of piney hills that are perfect for any outdoor adventure. What makes this national park unique is that it encompasses mostly open water, along with seven small islands. While there, explore the 19th century Fort Jefferson, snorkel in crystal clear waters alongside coral reefs and marine life and bird-watch to your heart's content. HOW ST. FRANCISVILLE IS *'Soothing to the soul'* for day trippers and other visitors

ne of the oldest towns in South Louisiana has become a mecca for history enthusiasts and others who want to take a step back in time, learn lessons from the past and maybe even connect with spirits who aren't quite at rest.

Located in the Florida Parishes, St. Francisville lies on a unique ridge that was only formed on a narrow swath of land between Baton Rouge and Tennessee. A Spanish settlement was one of the first signs of civilization, and the town eventually grew in multiple directions, especially as it became one of the largest cotton ports in the South.

Any trip to St. Francisville must include a stop at **The Myrtles Plantation**, which dates back to 1796 and is widely considered one of the most haunted homes in the country. Guided tours are offered daily of the mansion, including its 125-foot verandah, hand-painted stained glass, live oaks and more. Evening mystery tours are offered Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays for those who are particularly interested in ghostly encounters, and overnight stays are available to truly immerse yourself in the experience.

So, who exactly haunts The Myrtles? Stories abound, but the most frequent sightings are those of young girls, including a former slave who has been affectionately named Chloe by Myrtles staff. Most agree that the ghosts aren't harmful, merely curious and perhaps wanting to make new friends.

Also in St. Francisville is **Rosedown**, a former plantation whose buildings and gardens have been restored using diaries and notes from centuries past. Today, the site includes a main house and gardens and I3 historic buildings on 371 acres. In 2005, Rosedown was placed on the National Listing of Historic Landmarks. Tours and educational programs are offered on a regular basis.

In downtown St. Francisville, the community's spiritual roots are clearly evident by the numerous historic churches and cemeteries that dot the landscape. On Ferdinand Street, **Grace Episcopal Church** has been in its current structure since I858 and has survived numerous barrages from gunboats on the Mississippi River. Also on Ferdinand Street is **Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic Church**, which was built in I871 from plans by General P.G.T. Beauregard. On Royal Street, **United Methodist Church** was built in I899 to replace an earlier structure that was destroyed during Bayou Sara flooding. While history remains an important part of the St. Francisville culture, there are plenty of other activities year-round as well. A local artist and naturalist leads bird walks in the Tunica Hills area. The Bluffs golf course, designed by Arnold Palmer, overlooks Thompson Creek. The Cat Island National Wildlife Refuge is open for activities including hunting, fishing, hiking, photography and more.

Regular events in St. Francisville include a Jeep Jamboree in April, the Feliciana Hummingbird Celebration in July and The Southern Garden Symposium in October.

familiar sight to many visitors, as the medieval church has been the site of multiple royal weddings and coronations. It's usually busy, so plan ahead and decide which areas you most want to see. Multimedia guides are included in the price of admission and guided tours that take visitors to special areas are available.

If you need fresh air and open spaces, look no further than Hyde Park and Kensington Gardens. The 350 acres of Hyde Park include foot and bike paths, beautiful scenery, the peaceful Serpentine Lake and the moving Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Fountain. Meanwhile, many visitors laud the tranquility of Kensington Gardens with its Albert Memorial, Italian Gardens and Peter Pan Statue.

In addition to these attractions, there is live theater, other Royal Parks and additional museums. Go to visitlondon.com for more.
