Woman recalls role in integrating school

ntegration came quietly to schools on Aug. 30, 1965.

There was no angry, shouting mob, no politician barring the entrance of Leon Godchaux High School in Reserve, no cordons of law enforcement officers.

Only one young black woman and her mother walked through the entrance of the previously all-white school that day for registra-

Christina Marie Green Davis of Reserve was the first African-American student to attend Leon Godchaux High School, and the only African American in her graduating

"There wasn't any racial trouble here like we saw in New Orleans or Alabama or Arkansas because everybody knew everybody here back then," Davis said, speaking about the court-ordered inte-gration. "We didn't have all the publicity. But I still had to go through the verbal abuse

and people walking on the op-

posite side of the hall." Davis said she had not planned to be the lone student who forever changed the parish's education system.

Davis was in the 11th grade at Fifth Ward High School when integration was or-

"We were told at the school that there had been a court order to integrate the schools," she recalled. "We talked about it the last few months of school and some of
