County sheriff candidates square off in open forum

Tillamook County Republican Central Committee hosted Thursday, Sept. 3, a candidate open forum for Tillamook County Sheriff candidates Gordon McCraw and Josh Brown. Because of the number of attendants, the forum was moved outside to comply with COVID-19 guidelines.

McCraw is the Tillamook County emergency manager, weather forecaster and lieutenant on the sheriff's force. He was in the Navy for 20 years. He moved to Tillamook from New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina.

McCraw worked part time in emergency management and part time on patrol at the sheriff's office. He was made administrative lieutenant four years ago.

"I have a lot of experience in emergency management," McCraw said.

McCraw said he spent the past year working on emergencies such as the Manzanita tornado, flooding, cyber attack of the county and COVID-19.

Brown said he was born and raised in Tillamook and has raised

four children here.

"I'm also part of the fair board, which is a very involved position," Brown said. "I currently serve as the vice president of that board."

Brown is also a volunteer youth baseball coach. He started his law enforcement career in 2004 as a volunteer. He was a contract deputy for the first four

years and then moved back to regular patrol.

"During my entire time in law enforcement, I've logged over 1,570 training hours, specific to my duties," Brown said. "In 2012, I transferred to the patrol division, which is where I currently serve."

Community input is critical to the sheriff's office success, Brown

added. It is his goal to create opportunities for the community to interact with the sheriff's office on multiple levels.

A citizen asked if Gov. Kate Brown issued an executive order to take firearms away, if the candidates would comply. Brown said he would not take them away. McCraw added that the sheriff's office

cannot be the mask police and they won't be the gun police.

A citizen asked if there were riots in Tillamook County, would the sheriff's office deputize legal citizens.

"If what is going on in our community exceeds what the sheriff's office has, I would," Brown said. "There are a lot of good people in this community who are ready to help."

McCraw said the reality is it would be very risky to deputize people without training. He would try to get help from surrounding areas and bring in additional officers from other places.

Tillamook County citizens will vote for the next Tillamook County sheriff in the Nov. 3 general election.

Prepare for November general election

- The presidential general election is Tuesday, Nov. 3. The last day for new Oregon voters to register to vote for the election is Tuesday, Oct. 13.
- Oregon is Vote-By-Mail. You do not need to request an Absentee Ballot unless you will not be at your home address between Oct. 14 and Nov. 3. Check the status of your voter registration now with the county clerk or online at www.oregonvotes.gov - My Vote.
- Ballots cannot be forwarded. The county clerk's office starts

addressing envelopes for insertion ahead of deadlines, so the sooner you update the more likely you will receive your ballot timely. Ballots will be mailed to all local active registered voters beginning Oct. 14. If you have not received a ballot by Oct. 23, call the county clerk's office.

- Voted ballots are due in the County Clerk's office or in an Official Ballot Drop Box by 8 p.m. Election Day, Nov. 3. Postmarks do not count. Vote early. You do not have to wait until Election Day to vote.
- If you are concerned

with mailing your ballot back through the Postal Service or if you wait until the last week before the election to vote, use an Official Ballot Drop Box. Do not mail after Tuesday, Oct. 27 - Use an Official Ballot Drop Box.

- If you have questions or concerns, call the County Clerk's Office at 503-842-3402 for an official answer. Do not believe everything you see or hear. Ask the local office in charge.

donation to each agency was \$14,250. So far, Nehalem Bay Fire & Rescue has utilized

the funds to design and purchase a lightweight rope rescue system that can be deployed in remote or hard-to-access areas by a small team of rescuers. This kit can be carried and deployed very quickly by as few as two people. Remaining funds will be put

towards the purchase of an aerial drone to aid in search and rescue, and to provide initial rope rescue training for more volunteers.

The Port Fire started at 10:29 p.m. and had burned approximately 7 acres and is fully contained. No structures lost.

The Idaville Fire started at 10:38 p.m. at Idaville / 101 and was a brush fire and has been extinguished.

The Happy Camp Fire started at 10:38 p.m. in the woods between Netarts and Oceanside and was a small brush fire which and has been extinguished.

The Miami Foley Fire started at 3:16 a.m. and involve a power pole and has

been extinguished.

In addition, branches and trees are continuing to fall and obstruct roadways. If you must travel today, please do so safely and be aware of potential road closures due to obstructions and emergency / utility operations.

Currently there are over 12,000 Tillamook PUD customers without power throughout the county. Tillamook PUD has told the sheriff's office they are aware of the issues and have been working all night to repair the lines.

Phone service is out in the Nehalem area and they are working on it.

All emergency responders ask the public to not enter the area of the fire for your safety

and that of the firefighters. The weather pattern of east winds and low humidity will continue through Tuesday, Sept. 8, and into Wednesday, Sept. 9, and then followed by hot and dry conditions keeping the risk of fire high across the area. Emergency responders are asking for the public's continued efforts to limit fire risk and follow the county-wide burn ban put in place on Monday. Tillamook Sheriff's Office assisted with evacuations and traffic control to assist the Tillamook Fire District, Nestucca Rural Fire Department, Bay City Fire, Garibaldi Fire, Nehalem Fire and Oregon Department of Forestry, along with Tillamook 911.

Garibaldi resident arrested for filming child pornography

A citizen contacted the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office, with some concerns regarding some electronic devices. The electronic devices reportedly contained child pornography and were turned into the sheriff's office CAMI detectives.

The sheriff's office said an

investigation was conducted and through the course of the investigation, detectives were able to identify the suspect that filmed the recordings as Nickolas Edward Olson, 36, of Garibaldi.

On Aug. 11, detectives located Olson after having had returned from a fishing trip and contacted him at his residence. Following an interview with Olson, he was arrested for 16 counts of encouraging child sex abuse in the first degree, 16 counts of possession of child pornog-

raphy in the first degree, 16 counts of invasion of personal privacy in the first degree. During the arrest, a search of Olson's person produced evidence of drug use. He was consequently also charged with unlawful possession of methamphetamine and lodged in the Tillamook County Jail.

Sheriff Jim Horton said that the sheriff's office maintains two detectives assigned to investigate cases of child abuse/neglect and domestic violence.

Here we go again

About a year ago some residents became concerned that the direction of the Manzanita City Council towards the building of a too big, too expensive new city hall did not reflect the input or the will of the residents. This led to the resounding defeat of the council's proposed bond measure. Door to door discussions with voters revealed a decided distrust of the council including suspicions business was being conducted beneath the table.

Suspensions continued when it was discovered the council was approving questionable transfers of funds from the water fund for general fund purposes. Budgeted amounts for city manager and assistant city manager activities which bear little resemblance to their actual work are be paid by the water fund, meaning you will likely be asked to fund future water system repairs and improvements through additional taxes.

Your council is at it again.

The council is determined to impose their idea of a city hall on your city no matter what others think or desire. Without full consideration of remodeling alternatives, council is determined to tear down Underhill Plaza except the Quonset hut, and design and build a new city hall to their liking. They've gone in cahoots with a project manager and firm "at no cost" to plan the way forward and advise the council. As we are becoming accustomed with this council, this falls short of the truth. The project manager is funded by a grant to help local communities.

Of course nothing is free, except as in free, wink, wink, nudge, nudge. If the project manager truly wants to donate services to the city, he should recuse his firm from the actual project. Otherwise, I suspect the council will trade advice for the project they want for looking favorably on the project manager and his firm when the project is awarded. It stinks, but that's nothing new with this council.

City council has already lost the trust of the people

who can't wait to vote for other candidates for council in November, who will not assume taxes are too low, and who won't pull sneaky budget maneuvers and conduct business under the table.

The current council members have been on a power grab for years, imposing their ideas without regard for citizens' questions and comments. The time has come to vote them out. It's too bad we have to wait until November to do it.

Campaign to restore access to the Doris Davis Trail gains support

Classic Ridge Trail Access Campaign (TAC), a group of volunteers from the 200 plus home owners of the Classic Ridge and surrounding neighborhoods

of Manzanita, are moving forward with asking the court for relief in order to restore trail access to the beach community. The group has made numerous

efforts over the past months to reach out to property owners who built a fence earlier this summer across Doris Davis Trail. The response from the owners has been more fortification of the fencing and unfriendly communication with various residents of the Classic Ridge community.

The group details their plans to ask the court for relief in their latest blog post. Their first step is to file a quiet title action in Tillamook County Court seeking a declaration that the public has a right to continue using

the trail. According to the Oregon Supreme Court, if the public openly uses a trail for more than 10 years, without permission of the owners, then the public can acquire a prescriptive easement across private land. The trail has been used for well over 40 years by hundreds if not thousands of people, well before the present owners acquired the land. The goal of the action is to ensure the public has access to the trail they have utilized for over four decades and provide safe passage in the occurrence of

a tsunami. The group is also seeking to raise \$15,000 from community members to support the legal effort. A long-time trail user passionate about securing the right for everyone to continue to use the trail is initiating this fundraising effort. Any funds not used for the litigation will be applied to other efforts to improve beach access from the neighborhood or donated to Trailkeepers of Oregon's work on the coast.
