BEN GOODWIN KILLED BY FALL AT BARKER HOTEL

Boy Out Upon the Roof to Escape the Heat Drops to Almost Instant Death.

Through the Skylight, Forty Feet to Floor Below. Ben Goodwin, a bell boy at the Barker

Loses His Footing and Goes

through a sky light at the place of his employment at 12:40 this morning and, as a result of his injuries, died a few min-

utes later.

boys had made it a practice to stay on the roof during the practice to stay on the roof during the evening—a place much cooler than the downstains portion of the house, were at their customary haunt when the accident cocurred. Non where they were sitting is a skylight, which slants upward from the toof. Goodwin attempted to sit down on one of the panes of glass and was cautioned by his companions not to do so. He persisted, however, and a moment later the glass gave way, precipitating him a distance of four stories to an areaway below. way below.
Those who were on the roof with the Way below.

Those who were on the roof with the boy hurried downstairs and to the scene of the accident, as did also those on the ground floor, who were attracted by the noise of the fall. Goodwin was found lying in a corner of the light pit unconscious. He was carried into the corridor of the hotel and Dr. W. H. Walker was summoned. He found that there was no hope of recovery, as Goodwin's lungs were filled with blood and his back probably broken. He died ten minutes latter. Goodwin had been employed at the Barker hotel two months and was 17 years of age. He has a mother, but it was found impossible to ascertain her address. He has also stated that he has an untillying in Omaha, but her name and address was not known at the hotel. Coroner Brailey took charge of the body. Written on a letterhead of the Harder hotel, Seribner, Neb., was a letter found in the pocket of the dead boy which was signed, "From Little Sisters and Mother," From this it is presumed the boy's mother is employed there.

Harry McDonald's Appendicatis. Harry, the 17-year-old son of Former Sheriff John McDonald, is very sick with appendictus, His condition has been such as to prevent an operation, and he has been kept under ice packing. A consultation is to be held to determine whether the conditions were such as to warrant proceeding with an operation.

ATTORNEYS' LAST APPEAL. Forlorn Hope for Injunction Is

Lincoln, Neb., July 10.—Attorney Adams, who has been counsel for Rhea, the condemned murderer, went to the supreme court this morning in company with T. J. Doyle and former Judge Hamer of Rearney, and applied to Chief Justice Sullivan for an injunction to prevent the execution of Rhea, which was set for to-

day. Adams had at first believed such an appeal out of the question, but he finally consented to act with Doyle, and Judge Hamor joined them.

Arguments Lasted Until Noon. Clerk Heraman of the supreme court, Clerk Heréman of the supreme court, acting aoubtiess under instructions of the judge, sent word at 12:30 this afternoon to the warden at the penitentary to await word from the court before hanging Rhea. The warden was also informed that he would get word of the court's decision by 3 o'clock, which is the limit of time set.

Word came about 1 o'clock, and was that the court had refused, but the governor had been appealed to.
