## Checkup on Meat Is Begun

### OPA Here Forms New 'Police Group' for Complete Probe

President Roosevelt Friday delayed a report on the food situation. At the same time Senator Taft asked that the ceiling be removed from meat bought by Government. Story

With Omaha's meat supply shrinking daily, Ellis Hughes, act-ing OPA enforcement attorney, revealed Friday that an investigation at retail, wholesale, packer and slaughter levels is now under

way here. "We have reorganized our food enforcement section," Mr. Hughes said, "and have formed a separate meat enforcement section under a newly-appointed supervi-

Mr. Hughes said he preferred not to announce the name of the supervisor "at this time." Nor would he com-

ment on the na-ture of the enforcement drive, saying he would

prefer to talk about it after the job is done."
About 50 per cent of the enforcement staff here will work on the meat in-

vestigation, Mr. Hughes he said, adding that "special investigators from the regional staff in Chicago will be out, too.

## Will Affect Others

Mr. Hughes said the direction of meat enforcement activities will be in the hands of the newly appointed chief of the food section, Howard Redden.

Only this week the OPA regional office announced what it termed "the nation's biggest drive on the black market in meat" in

"Omaha is very important to the nation," Mr. Hughes said. "What is done here is not particularly for or against Omaha or Nebraska dealers. It will affect the little guy in Baltimore who can't get his share of what the country has.

"It (the black market) has happened in all other meat centers We don't know whether it exists here, but we will try to find out." and four other Governors recom-

Include Tie-In Sales Mr. Hughes expressed interest in stories that there are two kinds of black market—the "legitimate black market" and the "black, black market." The only difference being, the sources said, in the amount paid extra on the side. Tie-ins that involve purchase of a certain amount of sausage and similar meats in order to obtain a pork loan, also will be under scrutiny.
