State Rate Of Jobless Takes Dip

Figure in Omaha Is 6.5 Per Cent

Nebraska's unemployment rate dropped to 4.7 per cent in May, the lowest level since last November, State Labor Commissioner Gerald Chizek said

Omaha and Lincoln unemployment also declined to the lowest rates since late last year. There were increases in employment in all job cateexcept manufacturing, which continued to decline, Chi-

The May statewide figure compared to 5.7 per cent in April. The Omaha area rate, which includes Douglas, Sarpy and Pottawattamie Counties, dropped from 7.6 per cent in April to 6.5 per cent in May. Lincoln's May rate was 4.9 per cent, down from 6 per cent in

Up From Year Ago

The rates still were up from May 1974, when the statewide figure was 3 per cent. Omaha, 4.2 per cent, and Lincoln, 2.7 per cent. But they were the lowest statewide since November 1974, and lowest in Omaha and Lincoln since December.

The statewide unemployment rate last November was 3.9 per cent. In Omaha last December. it was 6.1 per cent; in Lincoln it

was 4.7 per cent. Chizek said there were major seasonal increases in the number of persons employed in agriculture-related work and con-struction in May. The number employed statewide in agriculture rose from 98,700 in April to 105,700 in May; in construction from 29,300 in April to 33,400.

The number employed in manufacturing statewide de-clined from 85,600 in April to

85,000 in May. \$3.9 Million Benefits

The total number of persons unemployed statewide in May was 34,870, down from 41,358 in April. In Omaha, the number dropped from 19,709 in April to 17,139 in May, and in Lincoln, from 5.959 to 4.913

Unemployment benefits totaking \$3.9 million were paid out in Nebraska during May, down from \$5.4 million in April.

He said the Goldfarbs could not buy a home without a title examination and that only a lawyer licensed in Virginia could perform the work, so the Goldfarbs "could not turn to alternative sources for the necessary service."

'Rigid Floor'

The fee schedule issued by the county bar association es-tablished "a fixed, rigid price floor" and the schedule "was enforced through the prospect of professional discipline from the state bar and the desire of attorneys to comply with an-nounced professional norms,"

Burger said.
"These factors coalesced to create a pricing system that consumers could not realistically escape," Burger wrote. "On this record (the bar association's) activities constitute a classic illustration of price-fix-

Clayton Byam, Omaha Bar Association president, said the Supreme Court action regarding legal fee schedules will not have any effect in Nebraska.

Byam said both the Omaha Bar Association and the Nebraska Bar Association dis-continued advisory fee schedules "at least two years ago."

Fired by Terry; 'Let Report Lag' Tim Kielty has been dismissed as Douglas County corrections coordinator by his new boss, Corrections Director Charles Terry. Kielty's dismissal is effective

June 26, Terry said. Kielty, 28, has been corrections coordinator since February 1972.

Terry, named corrections director two weeks ago, said he fired Kielty because of lack of progress on a corrections plan, which the county has been told it must have by Sept. 1 to quali-

fy for federal aid.

Work should have been done on the plan during the last year, before an acting director or di-

rector was named for the department, Terry said. The coordinator should have done that work, he said.

The director said he was told that Kielty did not have the authority to undertake "prelimi-nary coordination and program planning." However, Terry said, he found that claim "did not ring true."

Terry also said there was a

lack of communication with the Citizens' Advisory Board on Corrections while Kielty has been coordinator, and that has made it difficult for Terry to obtain assistance from that

Kielty declined to comment Monday and said he would make a statement later. Prior to being selected coordinator by the Douglas County Board, Kielty was on the staff of Sen. Roman Hruska.

Los Angeles (UPI) - The first time I walked the streets of the city, I felt uneasy. When I realized that nobody paid any attention to me - a Vietnamese refugee - I regained my composure.

But I felt lost. That feeling soon faded. I tried to be casual and, difficult as it was, act like an American in an American city, and at the same time take delight in all the marvels of daily life.
