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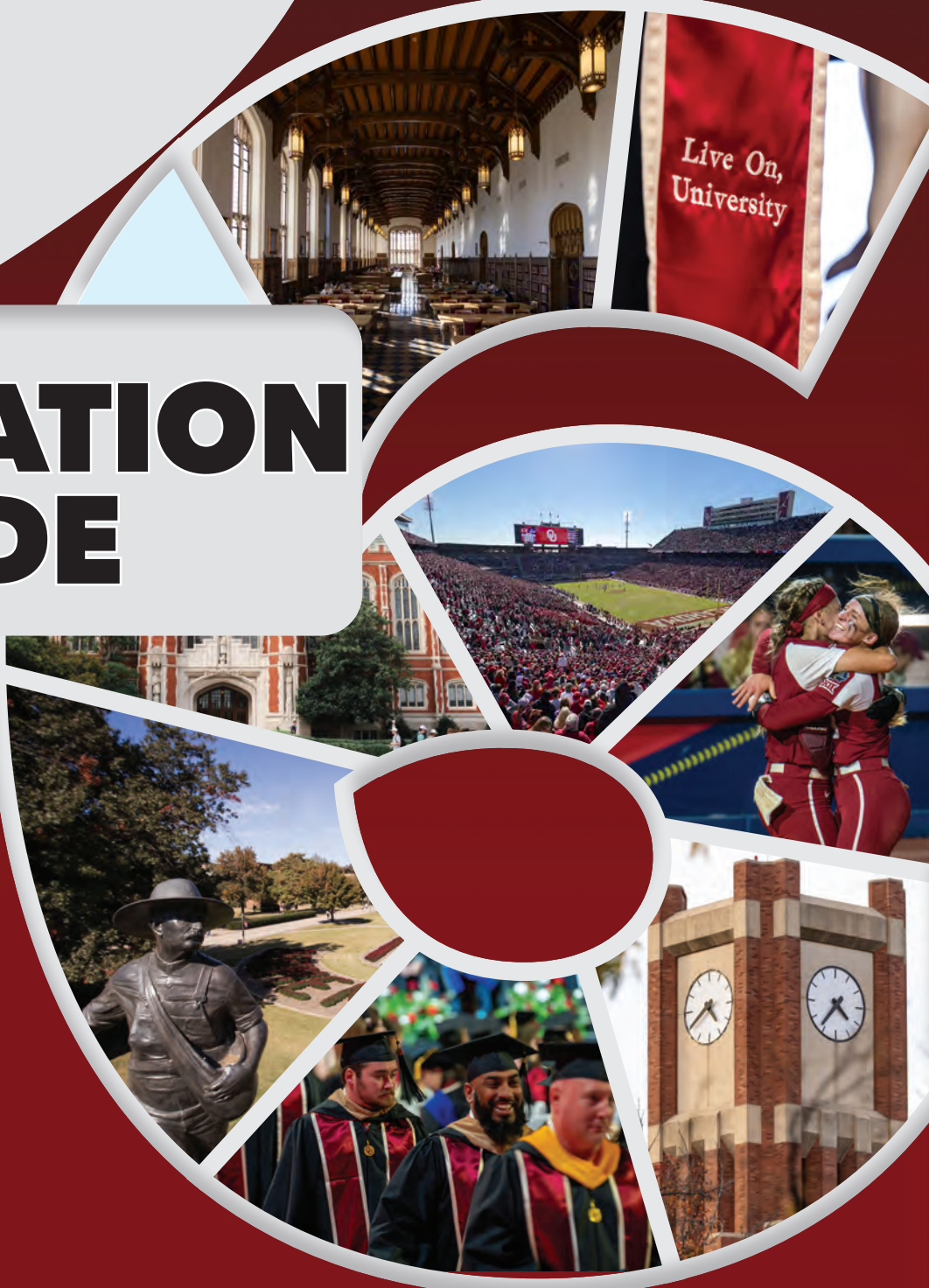

Make Smart Choices: Avoid Medication Misuse

- Never share prescriptions, even if it feels helpful
- What works for you may not be safe for someone else
- Mixing medications or substances can have serious effects

Sharing medications is unsafe and illegal. What helps you could harm someone else.

Stay Secure: Protect What Protects You

As you move into apartments, homes, or shared spaces, safe storage becomes even more important.

Keep your medications:

- In a secure and consistent location
- Out of common areas and plain sight
- Not in backpacks, cars, or easily accessible spaces

Busy environments make it easier for medications to be lost, taken, or misused.

Move Smart: Don't Take Unused Meds With You

Graduation often means moving. Before you pack everything up, take time to go through your medications.

- Do not keep leftover or expired medications just in case
- Unused medications increase the risk of misuse
- Use safe disposal options like designated drop boxes or disposal pouches

On campus, you can safely dispose of medications at the OU Police Department and OU Goddard Health Center.

Independence is not just about making your own choices. It is about making informed ones. As you step into what comes next, carry the facts with you.

Your health, your safety, and your future are worth it.

FROM THE EDITOR

SEPTEMBER 2022

OU announces demolition of Adams Center

OU President Joseph Harroz Jr. announced Adams Center would be demolished in summer 2023 to make way for new residence halls. McCasland Hall opened to residents in fall 2025. The South Hall, which is currently unnamed, will open to residents in fall 2026.



APRIL 2023

OU targeted in swatting incident, false active shooter alarm

On April 7, OU received calls claiming there was an active shooter on campus. Law enforcement found no evidence of a shooting, and OU President Joseph Harroz Jr. later confirmed it was a swatting incident.



JUNE 2023

OU softball wins third consecutive national championship

OU softball won its third consecutive Women's College World Series, defeating Florida State in two games. That season, the Sooners reached a win streak of 53 games, setting an NCAA record.



SEPTEMBER 2023

Norman City Council proposes \$1.1 billion entertainment district

Team Norman and city leaders proposed the Rock Creek Entertainment District to be built in the University North Park area. The district, which was later approved by city council in September 2024, will include a multi-purpose arena featuring select OU athletic teams as anchor tenants.



FEBRUARY 2024

OUPD investigates suspicious package outside Gaylord College

A sign and package found outside Gaylord College prompted an evacuation from surrounding buildings and a response by the NPD Hazardous Devices Unit. The university issued an all clear just over two hours later and the objects were determined to be part of an art display protesting the war in Gaza.



MARCH 2024

Students protest amid war in Gaza

Over 150 students took part in pro-Palestinian protests and pro-Israeli counterprotests in the Oklahoma Memorial Union food court. Since October 2023, students have marched on campus and organized protests to bring attention to the war in Gaza.



MARCH 2024

OU renames and restructures DEI office

In accordance with an executive order by Gov. Kevin Stitt, the university renamed its Division of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion to the Division of Access and Opportunity. The division is housed in the former DEI office space in Copeland Hall.



AUGUST 2024

First Friday night football game

OU played its debut game as a member of the Southeastern Conference, beating Temple 51-3 during the first Friday night football game in the Gaylord Family-Oklahoma Memorial Stadium's history. The Sooners ended with a 6-7 season, including a loss in the Red River Rivalry.



SEPTEMBER 2024

OU hosts first SEC matchup, ESPN's 'College GameDay'

OU faced Tennessee in the Gaylord Family-Oklahoma Memorial Stadium for its first Southeastern Conference matchup. ESPN's "College GameDay" visited Norman for this historic OU event. After a hard-fought second half, the Sooners fell to the Volunteers 25-15.

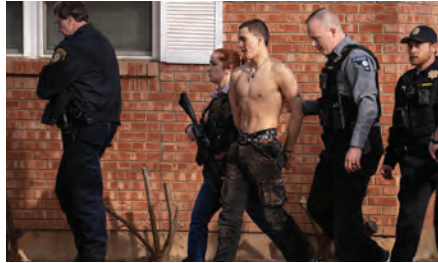

OCTOBER 2024 Norman residents petition entertainment district

After Norman City Council approved the district, residents filed a petition to bring the Rock Creek Entertainment District to a public vote that collected over 10,000 signatures. The petition was rejected by the Oklahoma Supreme Court in February 2026, clearing the development to move forward as planned.



JANUARY 2025 NPD captures suspect after pursuit near campus

Norman Police Department captured a suspect just east of campus in connection with a stolen vehicle from Noble. For around three hours NPD searched for the suspect, causing OU to issue RAVE alerts warning students to stay away from the area.



FEBRUARY 2025 Stephen Tyler Holman elected Norman mayor

Former Ward 7 Councilmember Stephen Tyler Holman defeated incumbent Mayor Larry Heikkila and attorney Riley Mulinix in the election for mayor. A lifelong Normanite, Holman served 12 years on city council before becoming mayor and has worked the door at Campus Corner's The Eli for over 15 years.



FEBRUARY 2025 Former OU President David Boren dies at 83

Former U.S. Senator, Oklahoma Governor and OU President David Boren died on Feb. 20. Boren served as the university's president for 24 years, a tenure marked by fundamental changes to OU's physical appearance, academics and athletics. In retirement, Boren's legacy was complicated by allegations of sexual misconduct, for which he was never indicted, and the misreporting of alums' donor data.



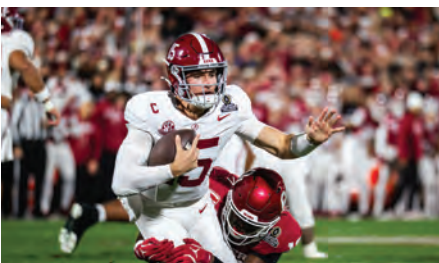
FEBRUARY 2025 DOGE cuts impact National Weather Center employees

As part of a mass strategy proposed by Elon Musk's Department of Government Efficiency, National Weather Center employees and OU meteorology students interning at the center experienced layoffs amid national NOAA cuts.



NOVEMBER 2025 OU student gains national attention over Bible-based essay

An OU student garnered national attention after she publicly contested a failing grade on a Bible-based essay and filed an illegal discrimination claim. The university removed the graduate instructor who graded the essay, triggering protests on campus.



DECEMBER 2025 OU hosts College Football Playoff

OU hosted its first College Football Playoff game in the Southeastern Conference against Alabama. The Sooners lost to the Crimson Tide 34-24 in the first round of the playoff.



JANUARY 2026 Joe Castiglione retires as OU athletic director

Former OU athletic director Joe Castiglione announced his retirement as the longest tenured athletic director in the country in July 2025. The university hired Roger Denny, former Illinois deputy athletic director and chief operating officer, to fill the position in January.



FEBRUARY 2026 Cadavers found at site of new lab building

Human remains, determined to be cadavers from the early 1900s, were found at the construction site of OU's new Life Sciences Laboratories Building. The new building is at the former site of Sutton Hall, which previously held OU's department of biology, including offices and laboratories.

Seniors, faculty reflect on importance of mentorship

Throughout college, students lean on professors, staff and fellow students to help build the skills and experience needed to be successful Sooners.

As the class of 2026 prepares to graduate, students and staff from across OU's colleges and mentorship programs reflect on the lessons learned and memories made throughout their college experience.

Engineering Pathways Mentors Network

The Engineering Pathways Mentors Network is a mentorship program within the Gallogly College of Engineering. The network focuses on student wellness, retention and career building, according to its website.

The network also focuses on fostering community and belonging with the engineering college through one-on-one student interactions, according to Allison Quiroga, assistant professor of the Engineering Pathways Mentors Network.

"Overall, the goal of (the network) is really focused on first-year students, trying to help them in their transition into the college experience because we know that that looks so incredibly different for every student, ..." Quiroga

said. "It's not fair for us to ask students to learn those things all on their own."

Quiroga said the network's mentors work to reduce burnout among first-year engineering students.

"Engineering (is) not a one-person sport, ..." Quiroga said. "You have to be asking for assistance, for feedback, for study groups, for moral support throughout the entirety of your academic career, or you're going to burn yourself out."

Matthew Agron, a computer science senior and senior mentor in the network, said the mentors work as "out-of-office TAs," or teaching assistants, which allows them to focus more on one-on-one mentorship and connection opportunities rather than supporting traditional classroom operations.

"When I first came (to the network's office), they had the students ... just helping out, ..." Agron said. "Then afterwards, (mentors) chit-chat with students, trying to help them find student (organizations) or ways they can get more comfortable on campus."

Quiroga noted this was an intentional change to the network's structure to foster deeper social connections, which in turn

increases the chance of students asking for help and getting plugged in, according to Quiroga.

Faith Morrison, an industrial engineering systems senior and senior mentor in the network, said one of the best parts of being a mentor is seeing her former mentees become leaders on campus.

"(A former mentee) is now the (aerodynamics) lead on the Sooner Racing Team. ... I think I'm the reason that she joined, because I was hyping it up so much to her whenever she was a little freshman," Morrison said. "She seemed to like it a lot because ... now (she's) running the (aerodynamics team) and has been leadership on that team for two years, which is great."

With a soft smile on her face as she watched Agron and Morrison, Quiroga said mentors like Agron and Morrison's "generosity of spirit" have made the engineering college — and OU — better.

"There's an underlying piece of wanting this place to be better and wanting to uplift the people that are around them. That is the heart and soul of what this program is," Quiroga said. "I can't teach them that."

Agron and Morrison will both graduate in the spring. Agron said that, although he will miss working with other mentors, he will miss helping mentor other students too.

"Being able to be there for students who are growing up, who are taking their first step out of their houses, or taking a step out of their jobs to take the freshman engineering experience," Agron said. "Being able to see them grow in a semester, or ... in a year or two. ... At the end of the day, I'm just a mentor."

JCPenney Leadership Program

The JCPenney Leadership Program is the flagship development program in the Michael F. Price College of Business. The program has been led for the past eight years by director Breea Clark, the mayor of Norman from 2019-22.

The program, which is exclusive to Price students, provides supplemental mentorship, career building and networking opportunities for those accepted into the program.

"We really focus on the personal side as well, ..." Clark said. "We've given you all the skills you need to get the job, but what do you need to be a good young professional and begin your career?"

Clark noted that the graduating class of around 55 associates has changed the program to be more attractive to potential new members.

"This graduating class has really upgraded the program in a much-needed way," Clark said. "That's probably going to be their greatest legacy."

The program recently overhauled its internal curriculum and requirements to be more competitive with Price's standard curriculum, something Clark said the graduating student leadership helped reshape.

"We want to remain the next level of leadership — the best of the best, (but) what does that look like? ..." Clark said. "Their leadership was instrumental in upgrading that in a way that I think has been truly impactful."

Clark said helping seniors land their first job out of college is where the program makes the biggest impact.

"It always warms my heart when, unsolicited, (seniors) tell me, 'I found the job, but I wouldn't have had the skills to be successful in the interview if it weren't for the JCPenney Leadership Program,' so they see that it makes a difference," Clark said.

Clark said the effects of the JCPenney Leadership Program extend long after seniors graduate from OU.

"When we say 'JCPenney Family,' it is 100% a family," Clark said. "My students grow up connecting with alumni that came before me. It's exciting, and it's really an honor to be a part of that legacy."

College of Atmospheric and Geographic Sciences

The College of Atmospheric and Geographic Sciences houses the School of Meteorology and the School of Aviation, both ranked as the No. 1 schools of their kind in the nation.

Liam Thompson, College of Atmospheric and Geographic Sciences outstanding senior,

said a large portion of his time at OU was shaped by his research mentor, urban meteorology professor Chenchao Wang, whom Thompson has studied with for over two and a half years.

"I first met him by a random cold email saying, 'Hey, I'm really interested in your urban and urban atmospheric research,' ..." Thompson said. "We set up an independent study course, and that is how I really got (started) with atmospheric research."

Thompson also noted his time and work with Amanda Kis, meteorology lecturer, and said her passion for teaching inspired him.

"She really loves teaching, and so I was really inspired by her passion for how she's used meteorology as a vehicle for being able to teach what she loves, ..." Thompson said. "She (is) somebody I look up to."

Ralph Keen, an aviation senior and OU RUF/NEK, also praised Kis for her impact on his academic experience.

"She is an amazing human being," Keen said.

Keen recounted an early story when he took an online Intro to Weather course with Kis. He attended her office hours to ask questions about meteorology and how it would impact aviation.

"I went to her office hours, and she admitted that I was the only student who had ever come in for this class, ..." Keen said. "She seemed really genuine about teaching in general."

Outside the classroom, Keen highlighted how Kis became the faculty adviser of the OU Speech Team, a registered student organization on campus that Keen founded, after connecting over their shared experience of doing speech in high school.

Keen said Kis' mentorship has been both academic and life-centric.

"She has been a really good mentor for me the past few years in college, helping me focus my passions into where they can really be beneficial, but also pumping the brakes sometimes and focusing me back in on what's good, and just growing as a human being," Keen said.

Thompson said his mentors at OU have helped him become a mentor for others, a role he said he never thought he'd see himself in.

"I have people reach out to me constantly like, 'Liam, can you help me revise these essays? Can you help me decide what I should do given my situation?'" Thompson said. "I'm always going to look fondly back on the environment that OU has fostered for its students."

Keen said that as he prepares to graduate, he will always remember his growth and the faculty that nurtured it.

"It all comes back to the family you build at OU. It's unlike any other — I truly do believe that," Keen said. "I don't just say that. I am living, breathing proof that we are a family."

Class of 2026's most outstanding senior aims to leave legacy

As OU's most outstanding senior prepares to graduate, she reflected on her experience as a first-generation student, the people she would leave behind and the communities that shaped her.

After seeing her sister at OU, business management senior Jhanvi Patel was drawn to the community and student experience on campus, and decided to follow in her footsteps.

During her four years at OU, Patel joined several student organizations, including the OU Food Pantry, Pre-Law Society and South Asian Student Association. During her junior year, Patel was inducted into the PE-ET Honor Society, which is made up of the top 10 seniors, and was selected for the 2025 Homecoming Royalty Court.

As a first-generation student, Patel said it is easy to become overwhelmed by the many ways to get involved on campus. Patel recalled feeling like she had a lack of institutional knowledge compared to her peers due to being a first-generation student, but she encouraged others in her position to pursue their passions regardless of obstacles.

"My goal coming into college was to be a better, more well-rounded person when I left. And I think that the things that were most important to me were getting myself involved in things that would allow that to happen," Patel said.

Despite the obstacles that came with being a first-generation student, Patel said she was proud to represent her parent's hard work and sacrifices through her accomplishments. In November 2025, Patel was selected from 16 distinguished seniors across campus and awarded most outstanding senior, recognizing her leadership, service and academic achievements.

Leaving a positive impact at OU was important to Patel. As a first-generation student, Patel created a new legacy for her family as a college graduate.

"I'm so proud to be a first-generation student. ... So much of being a first-gen student is just doing it scared," Patel said.

Patel credited her campus involvement with giving her the confidence to engage with the OU community. As a first-year surrounded by opportunity, Patel said she leaned on her community in the President's Leadership Class, a first-year scholarship and leadership development program, to help find her way during such an overwhelming period.

"My involvement in the President's Leadership Class my freshman year really kick-started what the rest of my three years here have looked like. Without PLC my freshman year, I probably would have been a little bit more hesitant to try the things that I ended up trying later on," Patel said. "Involvement has really been the cornerstone of what I do here, and I think it's made my experience as a college student that much more fulfilling."

PLC and other organizations introduced Patel to leadership opportunities that shaped her college experience — such as her positions as Crimson Club's vice chair, a civic engagement fellow for Oklahoma Votes, and becoming a Burr Scholar and cultural engagement chair for PLC.

Through her experience in campus organizations, Patel discovered a foundational principle to live by: mentorship. Patel said her involvement taught her the importance of bringing others forward by supporting the next generation.

"You are only as good as the people you can bring after you," Patel said. "It's not about

whether or not you're successful. Are the generations after you also going to be able to be successful after you're gone?"

As a first-year, Patel said that she understood the importance of mentorship but doubted her ability to be a mentor for others. Through her campus engagement and the mentorship she received, Patel said she found security in the wisdom and experience she has to share.

Patel said she was impacted by many mentors during her time at OU, including Faith Martin, Oklahoma Votes director; Nanette Hathaway, PLC and Crimson Club director; and Matt Marks, OU Food Pantry adviser. From Marks, Patel said she learned the importance of having passion for what you do.

"He's got this joy and passion for the work that he does, and it reminds me that's what it's about. ... From him, I've learned that community building is core to anything that we do and to have joy in your endeavors," Patel said.

As a Burr Scholar, Patel had the opportunity to mentor a group of first-years in the PLC program — the same spot she was in three years prior.

"Being a Burr Scholar was a dream of mine, ... so when I got it, I was just over the moon," Patel said. "I watch (the first-year group) and just think, 'Wow, you're going to do amazing things.'"

As graduation grows closer and Patel begins to plan her next steps, she looked back on the growth she experienced during her undergraduate career. Patel gave one last piece of advice to the next generation of Sooners.

"It all works itself out in the end. There really isn't anything to be scared of," Patel said.

'PERFECT TIME TO EXPLORE'

Music, biosciences senior shares unique college journey

Annelise Huynh, a chemical biosciences and music senior, is preparing for her OU graduation among the skyscrapers of Boston.

Huynh is a Tulsa native spending her final semester as an intern at Massachusetts General Hospital. She said she was initially drawn to OU by its research opportunities and medical programs.

"OU was a natural choice for me because I know that it has a really good pre-med program, ..." Huynh said. "(OU is) an R1-level institution, so that was the initial draw."

OU is a Carnegie Foundation R1 institution, which is the highest designation given to a university for research activity.

An aspiring physician who has played piano since the age of 5, Huynh said she felt fortunate to study in both fields.

"College is the perfect time to explore, ..." Huynh said. "When else would I ever have the opportunity to pursue music theory classes or all these music history classes?"

The decision to pursue both her professional goals and her personal interests has been a defining characteristic of Huynh's time in Norman.

"I feel like a lot of my OU journey, undergraduate journey, has been trying to merge those two things together," Huynh said.

The desire to weave medicine and music together drove Huynh to launch Music Outreach at the University of Oklahoma, an organization that aims to bring live music to vulnerable communities.

"Me and my friend, Joseph Mathew, ... actually thought of this idea in the Chick-fil-A line in freshman year," Huynh said. "It took a couple years to get it actually started."

Huynh said she hopes to harness the medical benefits of music to help residents of hospice care facilities, hospitals and other nonprofits.

According to the National Center for Complementary and Integrative Health, the cognitive effects of music can have physical and psychological benefits. While the connection between music and health is still being studied, it has been found to help alleviate anxiety, reduce depression and even promote rehabilitation in patients who have experienced strokes.

"There was so much talent in the School of Music that I wanted to bring out to

the community, ..." Huynh said. "I knew that, coming from a biomedical perspective, that music has a lot of healing benefits."

Beyond performances at medical facilities across central Oklahoma, Music Outreach organized the Katlett 4 Kids fundraiser to benefit the Oklahoma Children's Hospital. The first event, held in March 2025, raised over \$6,500 for the hospital's musical therapy department.

"That was just an awesome culmination of how could we bring a skill set that we knew towards improving healing for a vulnerable population like the children at the hospital," Huynh said.

While reflecting on her work with Music Outreach and Massachusetts General Hospital, Huynh said she still feels compelled to provide a level of care that music alone cannot match.

"Even if I could elicit some sort of happiness or ... some brief respite from just the monotony of being in the hospital, I was happy to do that," Huynh said. "I always wanted to find some way to provide more relief."

Her desire to provide meaningful, long-term solutions to patients has driven Huynh to pursue several cancer research opportunities, including the First-Year Research Experience program through the Honors College and a summer internship at MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston.

"It was really cool to be able to do research during the day, but then shadow physicians who were actively treating patients with the disease I was trying to find solutions to," Huynh said, reflecting on her 10 weeks at MD Anderson.

When summer ended, Huynh wanted to continue research, even during the school year. After emailing several researchers in Boston, Huynh secured the opportunity to conduct research in a lab at Massachusetts General Hospital, home to one of the nation's top-ranked cancer programs.

After securing the research opportunity in Boston, Huynh says she had to adjust her plans to graduate in four years. This change involved shifting to a planned program, which allows OU students to craft a degree plan that aligns with their unique professional interests.

"The thing about OU is that ... there's just so much opportunity for you to find your way, ..." Huynh said. "(I'm) just beyond grateful for OU"

Following graduation, Huynh plans to remain in Boston as she completes medical school applications. She says that she appreciates being exposed to new perspectives and hopes to continue to learn from different models of care in Massachusetts.

"Ultimately, I'm driven by where I think my services would be best fit. If that's Oklahoma, I would love to come back, but I would definitely love to learn from models of care in different parts of the country," Huynh said.

‘DON’T COUNT YOURSELF OUT’

OU drum major encourages students to get involved

For two years Halle McFarlane strutted down the football field as the Pride of Oklahoma’s 70th drum major, a long-standing figure in OU culture. As she steps off the turf at the end of her term, she reflected on her experience at OU.

Originally from Edmond, McFarlane came to OU in fall 2021. She said graduating high school during the COVID-19 pandemic meant she had been unable to have on-campus tours anywhere but OU.

“A lot of my tours were from a camera strapped onto a cart, where I got driven around just virtually,” McFarlane said. “It was really hard to get an impression of a school, but OU really made an effort to get me on campus and let me walk around with the tour guide, even though we were 6 feet apart.”

McFarlane said she is a third-generation Sooner, and her grandfather Allen Bumgardner played on the football team.

“Getting to see the Pride of Oklahoma, and I was like, ‘Mom, I really think I want to do that,’” McFarlane said. “Then actually touring campus and realizing how at home I felt, I just knew right away that this was the correct choice.”

McFarlane is a fifth-year electrical engineering major with a minor in music, although she initially chose to pursue a music composition degree. McFarlane said her difficult major taught her to have more grace with herself.

“Sometimes your best looks like studying multiple, multiple hours a week, but sometimes all of the classes and the commitments really pile up, and maybe your best is just getting everything done, ...” McFarlane said. “It is OK to not always have a 100 on everything.”

McFarlane said being the Pride of Oklahoma’s drum major has been her most impactful OU experience.

“Getting to really connect with the community here, and also getting to bring so much Sooner spirit to all these different events, ...” McFarlane said. “Even though it seems like a really small thing to have band there, I think it really brings a lot of life.”

McFarlane worked her way through the Pride’s front ensemble and cymbal line to serve as OU’s 70th drum major. She is the

fourth woman to hold the role in OU’s history and said that distinction has been a privilege.

“It has been a huge honor not just for representation, but just to advocate for young girls who see themselves in leadership positions,” McFarlane said. “To be able to encourage them to pursue leadership roles in a predominantly male-dominated field or position.”

McFarlane said though she is grateful for the many opportunities she has had in the Pride, balancing her roles as a drum major and as a student has posed challenges.

“One of the big things that it has taught me is a sense of preparation and responsibility, ...” McFarlane said. “I know that I’m going to be on a bus on Friday, and then at a football game all day Saturday, and then on a bus on Sunday. ... At the end of the day, you’ve got to put your headphones on and do your homework on the bus.”

McFarlane said once she arrived at OU, she struggled to decide where to invest her time.

“One thing that was hard for me is that I was so excited because of all of the new opportunities,” McFarlane said. “It was almost intimidating to be like, ‘Oh my gosh, what group do I pick? What clubs do I go to?’”

McFarlane said even though it was difficult to choose which organizations to invest in, OU has encouraged her to pursue opportunities outside her major and supported her aspirations.

McFarlane worked as a campus tour guide and serves as the president of PE-ET Honor Society, which recognizes the top 10 seniors on campus. She was also a recipient of the PACE award her freshman year and the Kristen Partridge Campus Life Award.

Currently, McFarlane works at the Fabrication Lab at the Tom Love Innovation Hub, a student-run engineering lab. She said

she helped construct a torch for the Oklahoma Special Olympics team and a sign for Campus Activity Council’s High School Leadership Conference.

“If I told my freshman-year-self that I would be working in a lab where I could build things for people, I’d be like, ‘No way,’” McFarlane said. “If I told my freshman-year-self that I got an internship last year in Wichita, Kansas, I’d be like, ‘No way.’ ... If I told my freshman-year-self that I got drum major as an engineering student, I would have been like, ‘What in the world?’”

While she is stepping down as drum major, McFarlane is continuing to pursue an accelerated master’s degree in electrical engineering. She hopes to graduate in spring 2027 and work in audio technology.

McFarlane said her biggest piece of advice for incoming first-years is to make the most of their time on campus and that there are no rules to campus involvement.

“Go to a new club meeting, try it out, get an executive position for one year and see if you like it,” McFarlane said. “Don’t be afraid to try new things. Don’t count yourself out just because you’re a freshman or a sophomore or you haven’t been involved in the past.”

First-generation students reflect on finding their place on camp

OU has a large population of first-generation students who face a unique set of hurdles while pursuing higher education, though programs can provide support systems to help them feel at home.

The university defines a first-generation student as someone whose parents or legal guardians have not completed a bachelor's degree. In fall 2025, 27% of undergraduates enrolled at OU's Norman campus fit this description.

OU is a part of the FirstGen Forward network as one of over 470 higher education institutions across the U.S. selected for their commitment to aiding first-generation students.

Outreach programs like Miracle Mindset serve first-generation and low-income high school students in Oklahoma, pairing

students with advisers and aiding in early career preparation to help them get through college.

Angel Carbajal-Martinez, a first-generation management information systems junior and chair of OU's Miracle Mindset, said he applied to OU after attending a Miracle Mindset conference in high school. Carbajal-Martinez said the conference gave him the confidence to feel ready for college.

"When I was a junior in high school, I actually attended one of the conferences, and it really put OU on the map for me, ..." Carbajal-Martinez said. "This is a good university, but I can actually do this. I have the capability."

Carbajal-Martinez said OU was the best choice for him because of the quality of education, his family and the campus community.

"I just felt like it was something I had to do for (the) sacrifices that my parents gave out for me, the legacy I wanted to leave for my future education. It was what was best for my education as well," Carbajal-Martinez said. "People that I had met at the Miracle Mindset conference really felt like it would be home for me, and three years later, I really do feel like I made the right choice."

For some first-generation students, struggles can stem from having no one to guide them through the uncertain aspects of college, like enrollment.

The college application process can be full of unknowns for many first-generation students.

"(At) my freshman orientation, they didn't really teach us how to enroll to our classes. They kind of just threw a computer at us. Told

us, 'Hey, enroll on this,' and just expected us to know," Carbajal-Martinez said.

Nathalia Mireles-Mota, a marketing and accounting junior, is a first-generation student at OU. Mireles-Mota said she struggled with imposter syndrome when she first arrived on campus.

"I was able to gain a really quick support system on campus of people that were also going through similar things."

ant things that came with coming to college, whether that was dorm life, whether that was joining clubs across campus," Mireles-Mota said. "I was thrust into the deep end, not really knowing what to do, and I had to figure out a

lot of things for myself."

Similar to Carbajal-Martinez, Mireles-Mota was first connected to OU at a Miracle Mindset conference and said, throughout her college experience, the organization has helped her get acclimated.

"Their whole mission was helping first-generation college students," Mireles-Mota said. "I was able to gain a really quick support system on campus of people that were also going through similar things, and people that were dedicated to helping mitigate those challenges."

Mireles-Mota said OU has been a supportive place, providing her with a community and new challenges.

"I feel that I've been pretty supported here. I feel that it's such a big community that you're able to find your spaces and find people that are going to support you in a lot of different directions, ..." Mireles-Mota said. "OU overall has been supportive. It's a really great place to not only find people that support you, but also to grow and to be challenged by new things and to continue learning."

The community of students in Miracle Mindset is one of the reasons Mireles-Mota said she has felt so welcome.

"Everyone is extremely passionate about the work they're doing, and so it's really easy to make connections to other organizations, to resources on campus," Mireles-Mota said. "Everyone has just been overall so supportive and so welcoming."

Mireles-Mota said graduating from OU means more to her and her family than just getting the degree — it's about redefining her family's story.

"It's going to be really impactful for me because being the first in my family to graduate from a higher institution of higher education in the United States symbolizes me adding a new tradition to the family," Mireles-Mota said. "Just symbolizing change and growth and achievement whenever I didn't really have a guidebook or something to follow when I was going through this."
