The overall sense of purpose for the school district is a strength, with a belief in people, and not programs.

The recent efforts to improve reading skills in the school district is another strength. These efforts are wide ranging, and several are being accomplished with the aide and direction of the Missouri DESE. K-2 teachers completed LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling) training over a 2 year period to give them a knowledge base for working with beginning readers. The district adopted a new reading curriculum last year. Missouri DESE instituted a new Reading Success Plan last year, with a goal of identifying and providing additional assistance to those students who are not proficient in reading. Rolla Public Schools is also participating in The New Teacher Project, which helps train primary grade teachers over a two year period.

Last but not least, our teachers are a strength. We have highly qualified teachers, and try to recruit the best by paying them competitively. RPS tries to stay near the top of the salary surveys in comparative schools. However, to increase pay requires more revenue, as 80% of the expenditures of the district are payroll related, and this fact is lost on many legislators who lament the fact that the state of Missouri is spending more money on K-12 education than in the past.

These strengths are significant because they are all centered on the mission of the district of providing the best educational opportunities for our students.
