

# 348 SOLDIERS OF CAMP CROFT WILL BE NATURALIZED

## Capt. Hexter to Speak In Exercises Planned Here This Morning

The largest class of alien-born soldiers of Camp Croft to be naturalized in a series of 12 sessions directed by the camp public relations office is slated this morning at 9:30 o'clock when 348 men of Croft, together with 19 from the Greenville army air base and three enlisted men from Clemson college, gather in the federal courtroom of the Spartanburg post office building to take the oath of citizenship, with Judge C. C. Wyche of this district presiding.

Capt. Ambrose N. Hexter, commander of the army air corps' 40th college training detachment at Wofford college, was announced as the principal speaker. The devotion will be given by Lieut. Col. Harry H. Gregory, chief of the Croft chaplains branch.

Two sets of brothers are identified in the Croft class: Jack and Max Davidovitz, and Leo and Hyman Eaker. Another man to be naturalized is William J. Poust, who fought in Africa with Yank troops before stationed in Camp Croft.

### Clemson Soldiers

Soldiers currently stationed at Clemson college who are scheduled to appear are: Corp Frederick Keer of Belleville, N. J., a native of Ireland; Pvt. Earl J. Kenzie of Detroit, Mich., Canadian subject, and Pvt. John H. Meyer of Forrest Hill, N. Y., German national.

The largest single group of nationals marked in this class is Germany, with 116 subjects, while another Axis nation, Italy, is represented with 39 men; Canada shows 40; Austria, 26, and Poland 21. The balance of the Croft class is identified with 26 other nations.
