Case Summary

The new name <u>Fort Sumter Beach</u> is proposed for a beach located within Fort Sumter and Fort Moultrie National Historical Park (FOSU), between James Island and Fort Sumter, and southeast of Charleston in Charleston County. The beach formed as sand and other materials naturally collected over time due to a man-made island and a nearby water current. The proponent, who is the Chief Ranger at FOSU, reports that the accretion of sand "has connected Fort Sumter island to James Island from mid tide to low tide and it is believed that it continues to grow."

The proposed name refers to its location within FOSU and its proximity to Fort Sumter, named after Revolutionary War Brigadier General Thomas Sumter. The proponent notes that the beach is known locally as "No name beach," adding that "It has grown to be one of the most popular boating beaches in the Charleston Harbor, and park management would like to bring attention to the users that they are within the national park when in the area. A change in name and a park regulations sign with the beach name on it will help accomplish this."


