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DDTwo adds PLC Wednesdays, 2 recesses

Dorchester District Two (DD2) administrators and staff continually seek ways to improve student and teacher wellbeing. They intro-

duced two new 2024-2025 school year changes to help students and teachers stay focused, healthy, and ready to learn.

Starting this year, all DD2 elementary schools have implemented Professional Learning Committee (PLC) Wednesdays and added an extra daily recess to improve teaching and student learn-

ing.

Every Wednesday, students are dismissed early at 1:45 p.m., giving teachers an hour for meetings and planning before their contract hours end at 2:45 p.m. During this time, teachers meet in groups to share ideas, plan lessons and find better ways to support students.

“When teachers work as a team,

they can come up with new ways to help students succeed,” said Carey Ball-Hodge, the assistant director of elementary education for DD2. “PLC Wednesdays give teachers the extra time they need to do this.”

Another big change this year is the addition of two daily recesses. Instead of one longer break,

students have two shorter recess periods to give them more chances to move around during the day. Many students and teachers love this change and believe it helps students stay active, which can improve focus and learning in the classroom.
