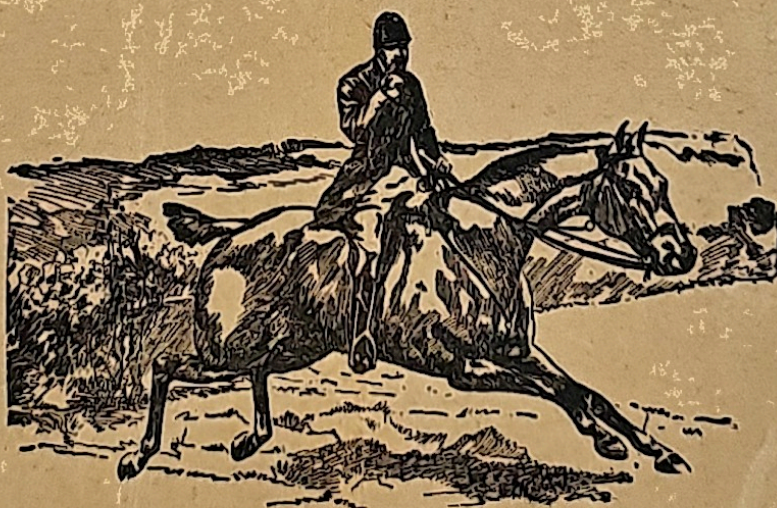

FOREWORD

Please read this program carefully and note the various changes made in keeping with the advancing requirements of the Show business.

It is found necessary to make renovations in many of the classes, in order to keep apace of the times.

We hope our exhibitors will appreciate our efforts, and strive to bring their exhibits up to these higher standards.

We shall thank you for your enthusiasm, good cheer and hearty cooperation.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

The grounds will be open on Sunday, September 4th with No Admission charges. All amusements will be closed.

The public is invited to participate in a social concourse Sunday afternoon—climaxed by a musical and literary program from six to seven o'clock.

Refreshments will be on sale.

All persons exhibiting stock under the auspices of this Association are hereby requested to read carefully the rules and regulations herein set forth and not attempt to enter any animal without being prepared to comply with them in every way.

1. Every exhibitor must take his own choice as to the class in which he will enter his animal; enter each in its proper class, and abide by it, as no alteration can be made after entries close, unless very good reasons demand a change.

2. Should the Association fail to get as many entries for a class as required, the prize will be proportionately.

3. The Association reserves the right to decline to accept any and all entries not in compliance with the Rules and Regulations.

4. All premiums will be paid by checks, drawn to the order of the exhibitor after deducting all amounts due the Association, and in no case will they be paid on days of the show.

5. All exhibitors are warned that any act of discourtesy to the officers or judges of the Association will disqualify their animals and their entry fee will be forfeited.

6. In case of animals being entered and not exhibited, the entrance fee and charge for stalls or boxes will be forfeited. provided he enters prior to the day of the show.

7. Each exhibitor will be allowed an admission ticket for his groom; in the event he has 3 or more horses, he will be allowed 2 groom tickets.

8. An exhibitor making objection to the award of the judges must lodge his objection in writing with the secretary within 12 hours, accompanied by a deposit of \$5.00, in which case the Board of Directors are required to pass upon the merits of the contention, and if they overrule the objection the exhibitor shall forfeit the sum deposited.

9. Each stockholder is entitled to one free entry, but no member of the Association will be allowed to enter any horse in the free entry other than his own.

10. Exhibitors hereby exempt the Association from any indemnity for any accident or injury which may be occasioned while exhibiting, and shall be held responsible for any damage that may result from carelessness and negligent handling of their horses while in the ring.

11. No person shall be allowed to remain in the ring but the judges and attendant stewards during the time of judging.

RULES AND JUDGING

1. The judging of any class may take place in the morning, afternoon or evening, as the Directors may decide.

2. The judges shall consist of three persons possessing expert knowledge of horses, who shall be elected by the Directors of the Association. A majority vote shall be necessary to decide all awards of prizes.

3. The object of the Association is to promote improvement in the breeding of all classes of horses; the judges in making their awards, will be instructed to decide strictly in accordance with the merits of the animals exhibited for breeding, symmetry and activity, and show no favoritism to owners.

4. Every horse shall be ridden at the jump in his turn according to the jumping program.

5. In the jumping competition and the classes for jumpers the following scale of points on which the horses will be judged in taking the jumps:

| Horse or rider or horse and rider falling | 4 | faults |

| Horse knocking down jump with hind legs | 2 | faults |
| Horse touching jump with front legs without knocking it down | 1 | fault |
| Horse touching jump with hind legs without knocking it down | $\frac{1}{2}$ | fault |
| Clearing fence without touching it | 0 | fault |

6. No horse will be allowed more than five minutes in the jumping circuit. At the expiration of that time the bugle will sound and the horse must immediately leave the ring.

7. Any rider or driver who does not obey the direction of the judges or management shall be reprimanded and at their discretion shall, if so ordered, withdraw from the ring.

8. When the judges consider it necessary, they may ride or drive any of the contesting horses to determine any of their respective merits.

9. Horses not under sufficient control will not be allowed to compete.

10. The judges are requested to note the action of horses, "true action" being of much importance. In "true action" the forward movements must be parallel to a straight line of progress. They are also requested to notice the adjustment of harness, neatness and quality of equipment, and to discountenance cruelty, excessive of bearing reins, severe biting and heavy shoeing.

11. Any or all prizes will be withheld when the judges are of the opinion that there is not sufficient merit in the animal exhibited to justify an award.

12. Should any question arise not herein provided for, the same shall be referred to the Board of Directors whose decision shall be final.

RACING PROGRAM

The Association reserves the right to declare any race off that does not fill according to the prescribed conditions.

Racing begins promptly at 2:00 P. M.

FIRST RACE—"THE INITIAL"—Trot or pace in heats. Purse \$60.00 of which \$40.00 goes to the winner, \$12.00 to the second horse and \$8.00 to the horse that finishes third. Five to enter and three to start. Entrance fee \$7.00.

SECOND RACE—"BLACK JACK HURDLE"—About two miles, open to all ages. Purse \$72.00, of which \$48.00 goes to the winner, \$16.00 to the second horse and \$8.00 to the horse finishing third. Weights for ages. Five to enter and three to start. Entrance fee \$7.00.

THIRD RACE—"EIGHTH RUNNING OF THE DIXIE"—About six furlongs; all ages. Purse \$80.00, of which \$48.00 goes to the winner, \$20.00 to the second horse and \$12.00 to the horse finishing third. Catch weights. Five to enter and three to start. Entrance fee \$7.00.

FOURTH RACE—"CONSOLATION"—One-half mile. For horses owned by residents of Prince William and adjoining counties, not thoroughbreds. Purse \$40.00, of which \$20.00 goes to the winner, \$12.00 to the second horse and \$8.00 to the horse finishing third. Entrance fee \$5.00.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 5, 1932.

FIRST RACE—"TROT OR PACE"—One mile dash. Purse \$60.00, of which \$28.00 goes to the winner, \$20.00 to the second horse and \$12.00 to the horse finishing third. Entrance fee \$5.00.

SECOND RACE—"BROAD RUN CHASE"—Opened to all. Steeplechase, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles, under the rules governing such classes. Purse \$80.00, of which \$52.00 goes to the winner, \$16.00 to the second horse and \$12.00 to the horse finishing third. Weights for ages. 10 pounds penalty for winner at this meet. Five to enter and three to start. Entrance fee \$7.00.

THIRD RACE—"FINALE SPECIAL"—One mile, opened to all ages. Purse \$72.00, of which \$40.00 goes to the winner, \$20.00 to the second horse and \$12.00 to the horse finishing third. Catch weights. Five to enter and three to start. Entrance fee \$7.00.

Note.—Post entries.

Full prizes will not be awarded where classes do not fill.

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING RACES

1. Entries to any races are subject to acceptance by the Stewards and will be received only with the understanding and on the agreement that every person entering a horse in a race, to be run under these rules, accepts the decision of the Stewards on any question relating to a race or racing.

2. The Association reserves the right to change or divide, or withdraw entirely, any race within 30 minutes after closing time for entry.

3. Horses must be saddled in the paddock and paraded before the Grand Stand enroute to the starting post.

4. No horse will be eligible to start in a race unless the owner or trainer, or authorized agent, reports to the Paddock Judge at least thirty (30) minutes before the time set for such race that the horse is on the grounds of the Association.

5. Horses not engaged as starters will not be permitted to exercise on the track between races, unless permission is received from the Stewards. Violation of this rule is subject to a fine or forfeiture.

6. Warning is particularly issued to jockeys regarding the necessity for taking unusual care to avoid interference in all races. All avoidable interference will be punished by disqualification, fine or immediate expulsion from the course as the Stewards may deem proper.

7. Jockeys will be required to wear colors.

8. No person except the regular race officials will be allowed in the judge's stand. This rule will be rigidly enforced.
